New Use for Freon Found

Modern fire alarms and the kitchen refrigerator now have one thing in common: "freon," a hydro-carbon.

First developed as a freezing agent 25 years ago, freon is now being used to blow whistles in fire alarms. When heated under pressure in a small container, the chemical expands, releases a valve, and sounds off through a built-in whistle device.

The list of petroleum chemicals that help safety engineers make the US safe grows every day.

For the Man Who Has Everything

May we suggest a present for "the man who has everything"? A monstrous 1500-page book telling all about rattlesnakes.

The book, called appropriately enough, "Rattlesnakes," was published recently and should put many a mind at ease. If everything isn't written now, it never will be!

Actually, the book is a complete treatise on one of nature's least-known forms of animal life. It covers rattlesnakes from A (Crotalus viridis abyssus) to Z (Crotalus zetaxomae).

Rattlesnake venom, according to the author of this amazing tome, has variously been used as a cure for epilepsy, bronchitis, pneumonia, neuralgia, lumbago, sciatica, cholera, yellow fever, leprosy and elephantiasis.

Pills have been made up of poison glands and prescribed for polio and typhus. Even rattlesnake oil has been used as a remedy for man or beast. Both venom and oil, according to the author of the book, have now fallen from favor as medical concoctions.

Popular remedies for rattlesnake bite are as numerous as the diseases the venom has been claimed to cure. They include onions, garlic, chewed tobacco, ammonia, kerosene, gunpowder, nitric acid (horror!), lye, quicklime, whiskey, and freshly-killed chickens!

The reader is warned solemnly that "rattlesnakes do not make good pets." Which sounds like pretty useless advice for most people, we'll wager!

Without miniaturization, present dial-telephone systems would be so big as to be impractical. Automatic pilots used on modern planes would be more bulky than the wings. Automobile radios would displace the engine of modern cars.

Miniaturization also can be used in some mighty unimportant applications.

There being no restrictions on who could buy the radios, the second game found the radio-equipped team playing against a team whose coach had a receiver-tuned to his opponent's helmet-radio frequency and he received his answer. His team was strongly trounced.

Luckily for all concerned, the governing body of the league met and outlawed the miniature radios.

The next logical step would have been Russian-style jammers, anyway!
