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## Windows Add Style, Color To All Homes

In architectural circles, the question occasionally arises: Why not build a house without windows?

The reasons are obvious. A house needs windows for light, air, and visibility. No amount of artificial lighting can replace sunlight. Even air conditioning is no substitute for a spring breeze. And since his cave-dwelling days, man has had an inherent need to gaze outside.

Less obvious, however, is the fact that windows are also one of the best decorating elements a house has. Various shapes, sizes and styles can enhance the architectural design and color can improve the overall decorating scheme both inside and out.

Wood windows offer architects and home-owners both these advantages. Because they are made of ponderosa pine they can be painted when new to harmonize with color plans, then repainted as often as the home-owner cares to make decorating changes.

In choosing exterior colors for windows, the home-owner should observe a few points of caution, according to Practical Builder magazine, light-construction industry publication. Windows, the magazine says, should be painted in warm, inviting colors which harmonize with the roof, trim and siding. Bright accent colors should be reserved for focal points, such as on the panels of a modern panel entrance door or on window boxes. One exception, Practical Builder says, is on picture windows, which frequently are painted in the accent color.

The color of windows inside depends primarily on the size of rooms and the home-owner's taste. A room can be made to appear larger by painting windows the same color as the walls. On the other hand, painting the windows in a contrasting color will break up large wall expanses and add highlights.

Considerable soft warmth can be added to a room by staining the clear ponderosa pine in one of a number of shades from mahogany to blond. This retains the richness of the natural wood grain.

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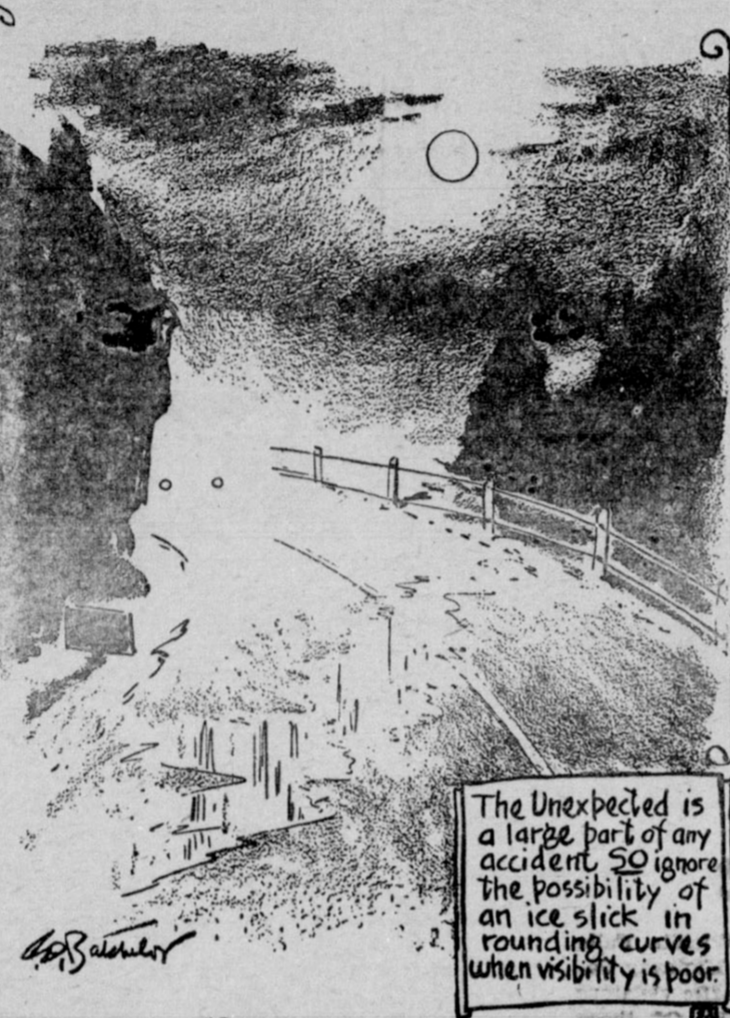

Ralph Yarborough of Austin has called on every Texan who loves his country and loves democracy to pay his poll tax before the Jan. 13 deadline.

Yarborough, in a speech at Dallas recently, said: "Poll taxes must be paid by Jan. 31 in order to qualify a person to vote in the U. S. Senate race, many mayors' races, many wet-dry elections, all school board elections, and elections on bonds, higher taxes and constitutional amendments.

"Control of the Senate will hinge on the vote in the special election in Texas this spring. Never before have the people of Texas faced one single race in which issues of such worldwide importance are at stake. Issues that affect the future of Texas, the nation and the world be at issue in this one race. No man or woman can afford to be without a poll tax, the price non-participation in our government is too high for anyone to pay. Every instinct of good citizenship demands that every person be qualified to vote this year.

"Republican hard money and high interest rate policies will be at stake, and so will Democratic issues of 90 per cent of parity, lower interest rates, and expanded opportunities for the aged. The peace of the world hangs on the balance point in the middle East, and Texas will elect a Senator who will hold the balance of power in the U. S. Senate.

"I plead with every Texan who loves his country and loves democracy to pay his poll tax now so that he can vote in the Senate and other races this year."

Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow in Iowa Park High School is Melva Lee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Lee.

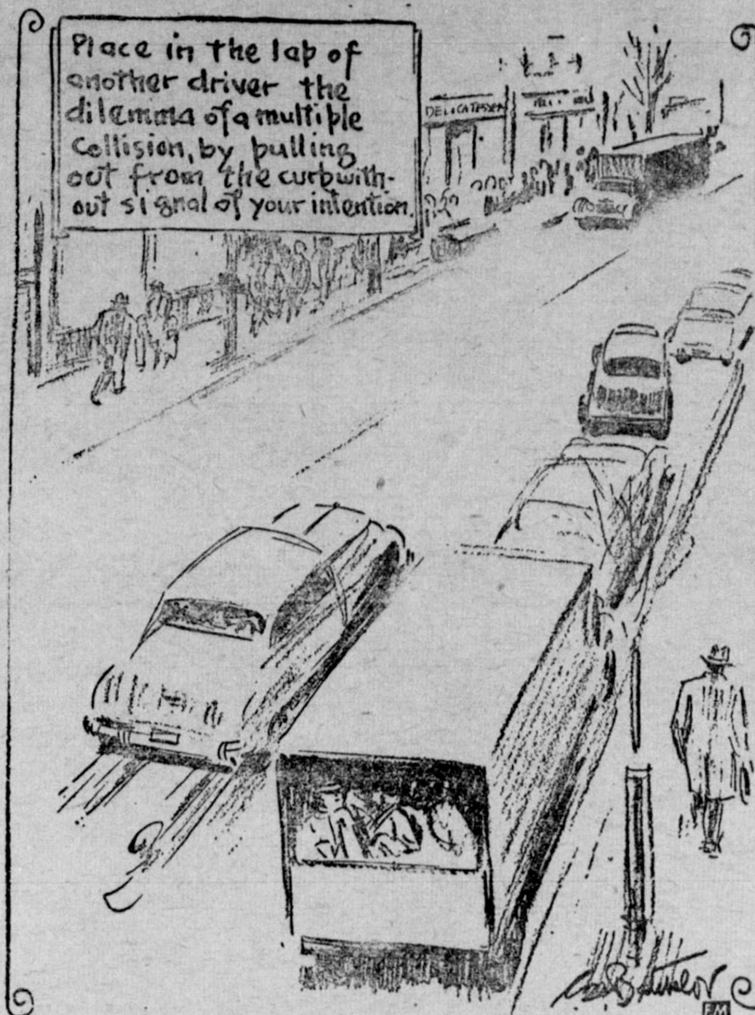

Patrolmen of the Wichita Falls district of the Texas Highway Patrol contacted 3882 traffic violators during December 1956. Of these 1178 were arrested while 2704 were warned. Speed was the leading cause of arrest, with passing violations second and driving while intoxicated ranking third.

Counties in the district are Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Hardeman, King, Knox, Montague, Wichita, Wilbarger, Young.

The patrol investigated 48 accidents with the following breakdown: 34 property damage, 13 personal injury, 1 fatality. Total of the property damage was \$19,947; and 17 persons were injured.

This was an increase of 15 accidents and 1 death over the same month of 1955.

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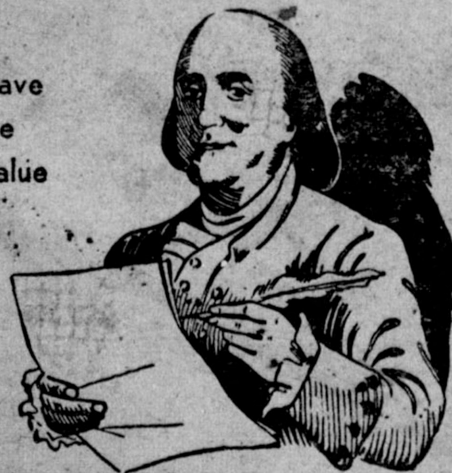

Even if you're a home-owner who's all thumbs with tools, here's one way you can get your finger into the do-it-yourself pie: Insulate the attic floor of your home with "pouring wool," which comes in big paper bags. This is one of the rare jobs around the house that doesn't require any tools more difficult to handle than a garden rake and a couple of pieces of board. The procedure—so easy even the wife and children can help—is to pour mineral wool out of bags into the space between the floor joists, rake it out to an

even depth and smooth it with a piece of board. The wool should be leveled out to an even six inches in depth. If you deviate from this thickness, it's better to use more wool rather than less, for with insulation thickness is what counts. Batts or blankets of mineral wool also can be installed in attics with a minimum of tools. For attic areas you'll need a knife to cut the batt or blanket for odd-shaped spaces. The batts and blankets are installed in walls and attic ceilings with a staple gun.

It is important to have all residents of school age in the school district listed in the census because the number of teachers is governed by the number of scholastic enrolled on the census list.

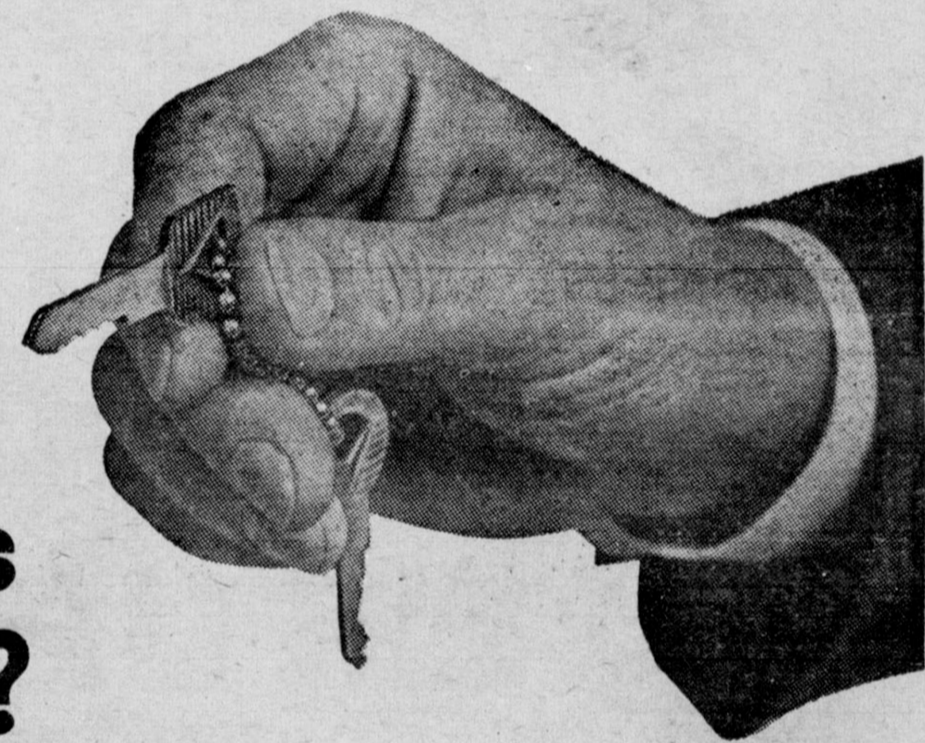

No kidding, seniors, the rings are beautiful.

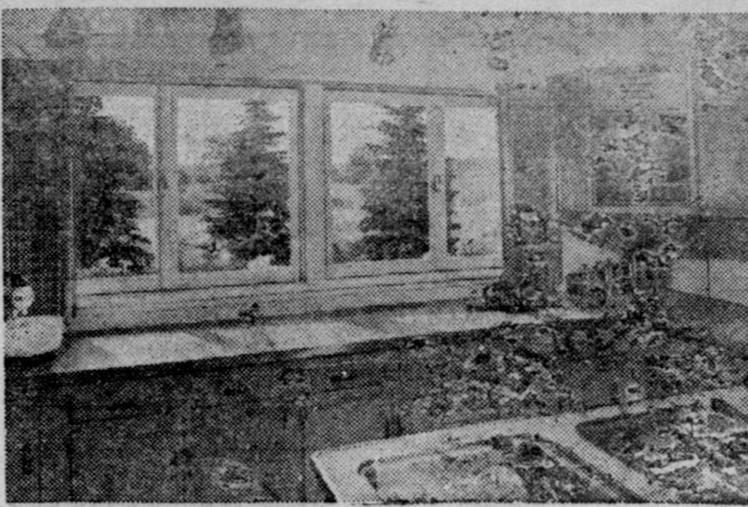
