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Jaycees Get Charters, Hear History, Install First Officers

Iowa Park Jaycees headed by N. E. Guthrie Jr. are now an official organization.

At a Charter Night banquet attended by approximately 125 interested Jaycees and friends, the local group received state, national and international charters.

Guests at the banquet included the sponsoring group from Wichita Falls headed by Al Ritenger, president, Arion Meads and Ruben Covington, vice-presidents, and Harold Parnell a state director.

Dr. E. H. Roberts headed the 10 member group from Bowie. State Director Melvin Coley of Stephenville was present. John Crow, president, brought a 10 member party from Electra.

Cliff Davis, past state and national director, also graced the banquet with his presence.

Ben F. McHenry, national director of the United States Junior C of C, presented the charter and gave the young organization a few remarks tended to enliven the young men of the community to greater action.

McHenry told that the Jaycees were started in St. Louis, Mo., by Henry Gleibner, who thought the younger men were not being allowed enough voice and part in the activities of the city. He got together 32 members and set about to improve on that situation.

By 1915 large numbers of young men had taken up the challenge and the Jaycees were officially organized.

McHenry also stated that a Jay-

Guthrie accepted the charters on behalf of the club and pledged to lead the group to greater service in the community and to live up to the ideals and standards of the organization.

ORDINANCE NO. 272 An Ordinance Fixing and Determining a Reconnect Charge to Be Made for the Re-inauguration of Gas Service to Customers Within a Period of Twelve (12) Months Within the City Limits of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, and Providing for the Manner in Which Such Charge May Be Made.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park:

Section 1. Effective with the date of passage of this ordinance there is hereby fixed and determined a Reconnect Charge to be applied as follows:

A charge of \$2.00 is to be made in instances where service is being re-inaugurated for the same customer in the same distribution plant within a period of twelve (12) months following the date service was last discontinued for nonpayment. This Reconnect Charge shall apply in those cases where the customer discontinues service at one location and resumes service at another within the same town, and will also include seasonal customers who discontinue and resume service at the same location within a period of twelve (12) months. This charge however shall not be made to a new customer or one whose services have been discontinued and resumed after a period of more than one year. The Reconnect Charge will apply on right of way accounts so long as the customer's moves are confined to within a billing district.

This charge is not to be made to churches, public schools and governmental buildings supported by city, county, state or federal funds.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its final passage and approval.

SHUCKS

We don't have much success in getting folk to vote like we do, but we do hope we can get a lot of Iowa Park citizens to make themselves eligible to vote, by paying their poll taxes.

If you are interested in killing your vote, run, don't walk, to the Chamber of Commerce office and cough up \$1.75 before Mrs. Livingston and Mrs. Woodfin shut the door next Thursday.

Here are some facts on voting: 1. In order to vote, all citizens 21 to 60 years of age must obtain a poll tax receipt. This includes citizens in the regular military services (to be paid or secured in the county of their residence at the time they entered the service).

2. Persons 60 years of age or older before Jan. 1, 1956 are exempt. 3. A husband can apply for his wife's poll tax receipt and vice versa.

4. Any person becoming 21 years of age after Jan. 1, 1956 and before Dec. 31, 1956 is exempt but must secure an exemption certificate.

5. New residents of the state, after Jan. 1, 1956, are entitled to exemption certificates, but must have lived in Texas at least one year and in the county six months prior to the election in which they wish to vote.

As a citizen it is your duty to vote in every election. But you can fulfill that duty only if you have a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate.

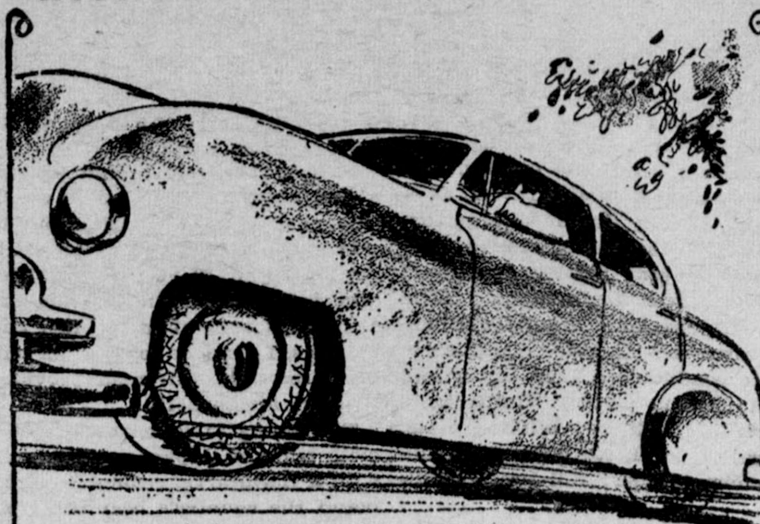
In case of a tie at the end of district-half season, one game will be played to determine the division winner. A flip of coin will determine on which school ground the game will be played.

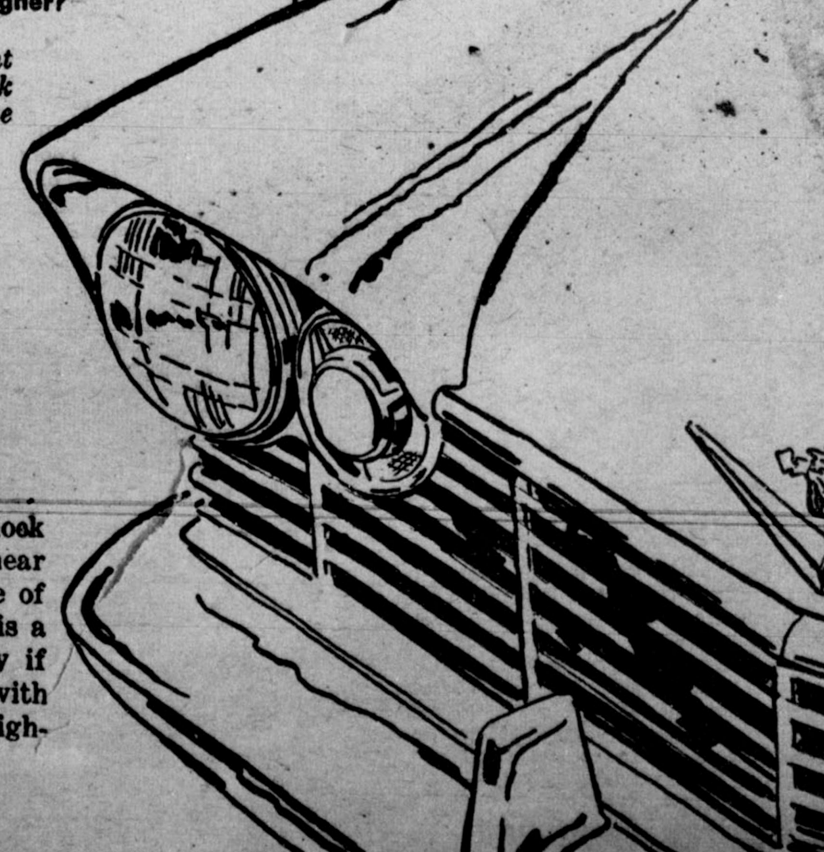

Mrs. McCray is the former Miss Billie Joyce Bryant of the Valley Farms community.

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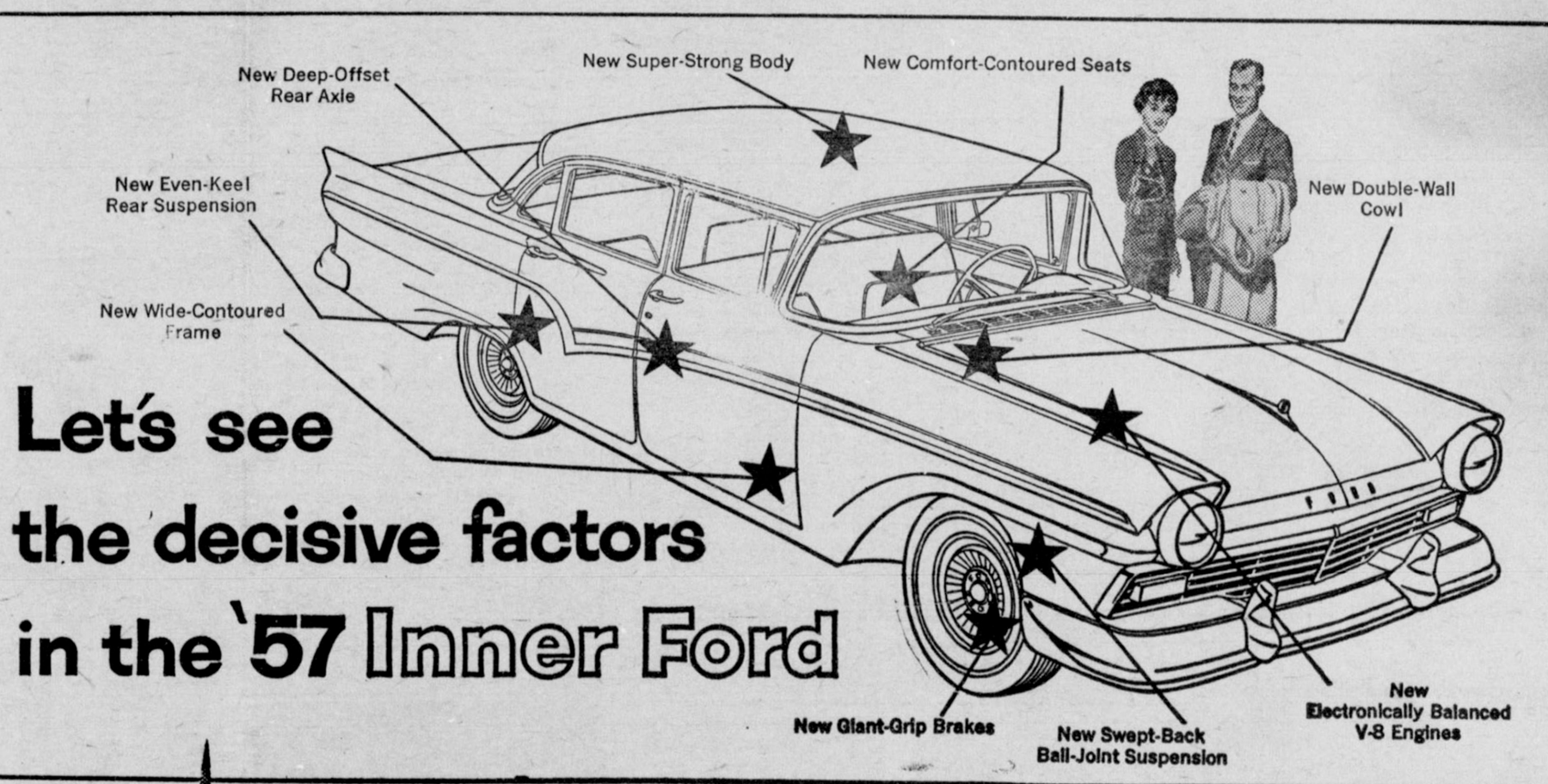
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
