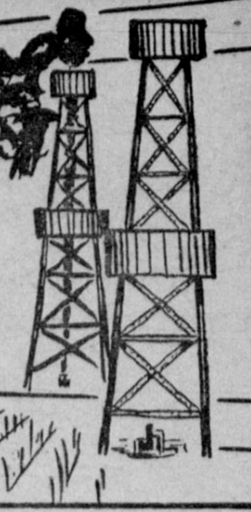

## Reflections from the Bible

Truth is the key that unlocks the prison, but a man is not free until he has applied the key to the lock.  
I know the truth when I know the will of God. Now how can I use the key to unlock the prison? In I Peter 1:22—"Seeing you have purified your souls in obeying the truth—" How is a sinner freed from his bondage? By obeying the truth. That is the way that truth is used to free from bondage. To obey the truth is to obey Christ, for he said, I am the way, the truth and the life. He who obeys the word, obeys the truth for "my word is the truth," Jesus said. He who obeys the gospel obeys the truth. They are one and the same thing.  
But what is obeying the truth? It is simply believing the gospel; turning away from unrighteousness in repentance; and being baptized into Jesus Christ for remission of your sins. That is obeying the truth, and Jesus said, Except ye believe that I am he, ye shall die in your sins. When I believe I have obeyed the truth, to that extent, Jesus said, "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish," and so when I repent, I have obeyed the truth. I have obeyed the Lord. Jesus said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." When I am baptized for the remission of sins I have obeyed the truth. Think on these things and obey that truth. adv

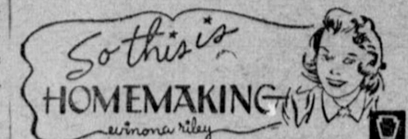

**Johnson Works for More Aid to Farmers**

A Senate subcommittee on agriculture will hold hearings next Monday on Sen. Lyndon Johnson's bill to establish a deferred grazing program for hard-hit pasturelands in Texas and other drought disaster areas.

Johnson's bill would authorize annual payments to farmers and ranchers in drought-stricken areas for keeping stock off pastures until the grass can recover from such drought conditions. Payments would be roughly equivalent to the normal rental value of grazing lands.

Similar legislation has passed in the House.

"Recent rains in Texas have made action on this bill more urgent than ever. The rains will cause some grass to appear. This will offer a strong temptation for our stockmen, who have seen no grass at all for so long a time, to turn their livestock into the pastures," Johnson said.

"It is important that these pastures be allowed to reseed themselves during the next few years. Otherwise, they will never again be as productive as in the past. Their full potential productivity will be needed in the years ahead if our livestock industry is to make a comeback from the disaster of the dry years."

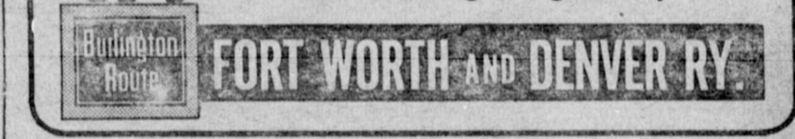

**TRAFFIC REPORT**

Patrolmen of the Wichita Falls district of the highway patrol contacted a total of 1,457 traffic law violators during February. Capt. K. B. Hallmark jr., commanding officer, reported 396 of these were arrested while 1,061 were warned. Speed was the leading cause of arrest, with following too closely, and Right of way violations ranking second and third.

The highway patrol investigated 41 accidents with the following breakdown: 32 property damage, 8 personal injury and 1 fatal accident. Hallmark reported property damage of \$13,875 with 11 persons injured and 1 killed. This is an increase of 18 accidents and 1 death for the same period of 1956.

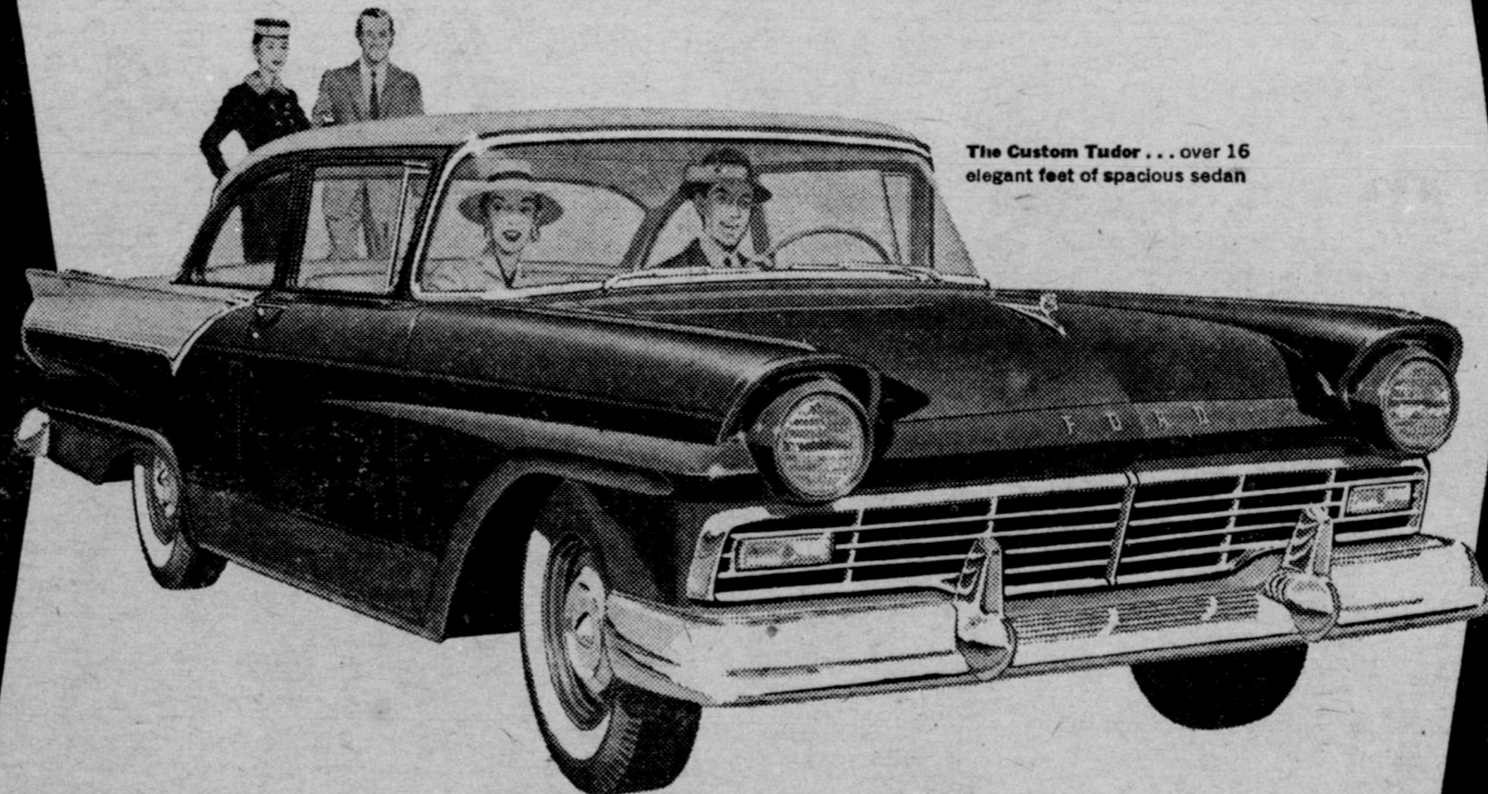
