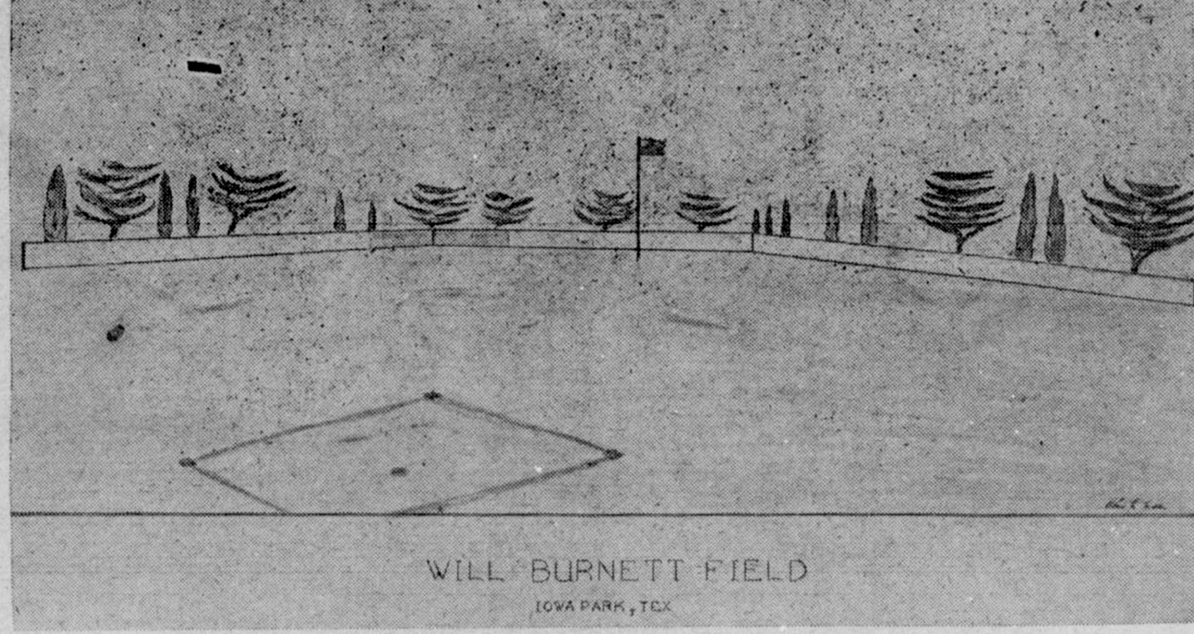

Ikard says

Ranchers and farmers who have been forced to sell their basic herds because of drought conditions are forced to pay taxes on the gain resulting from the sale if they are not replaced within one year from the time they are disposed of.

I have introduced legislation which would allow them a five year period in which to replace their foundation herds without seeking an extension from the Internal Revenue Service. This bill should have a good chance to be favorably acted on before Congress adjourns.

Last week the House acted on the first of the major appropriations bills and sliced well over a half-billion dollars out of the president's request. This week another appropriation bill will be up in which the committee has recommended cuts which will bring a total reduction in the budget up to this point of about three-quarters of a billion dollars. If this trend keeps up, and all indications are that it will, the budget will be substantially reduced.

Social Security Problems Solved

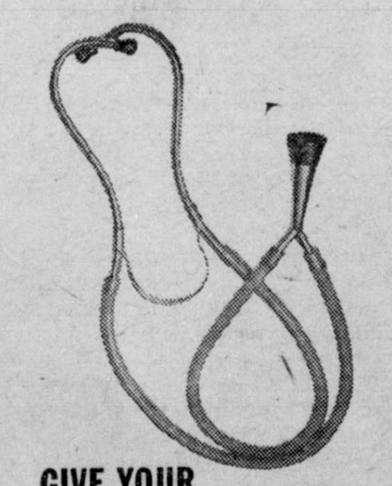
A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in Iowa Park at the City Hall on Thursday, April 4, at 9:00 a.m.

Good news for you dirt gardeners. Not long ago, weeds were a little like the weather. Everyone complained about them but nobody did much about them. Now we can grow vegetables or flowers through plastic without weeding or watering and with the expectancy that they will be stronger and more productive plants.

The new black plastic film comes in rolls 104 feet long and 40 inches wide—enough to cover a garden 18 feet wide by 18 feet long. It's called Kordimulch and is available through most hardware stores and some supermarkets and grocery stores. If the reports from famous agricultural centers like Cornell University, Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, Mississippi State College, Oregon State College and the University of Florida hold true, the canning job will be bigger than ever this fall.

Easy Car Wash
We read somewhere that the easiest way to wash a car is to add detergent to the water. That's fine if you don't let the wash-water-and-detergent dry on the car. If you do it looks like a zebra. Just keep the hose running and wash off the solution right after you apply it. Then let it dry. There's hardly a streak... and no wiping dry.

Moth Proofing Winter Clothes
Harking back to plastics, our cleaner is sending Jim's suits back in neat plastic bags. You can tell what's in the bag without tearing it off or peeking underneath. And they can be sealed against air and moths with regular tape we use to seal bags of frozen food.

In almost every denomination there are devout ministers who pray for the sick and see them healed.

Wins Fashion Citation



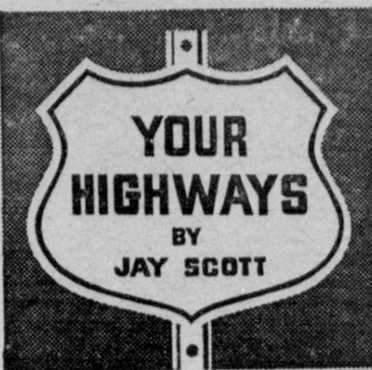

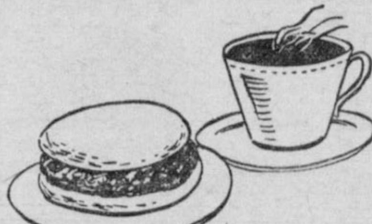

Mr. Edwards, who superintends 142 Post Houses in 38 States and the District of Columbia, and last year, served 69 million people, reports "Day in and day out, hamburger is the No. 1 choice."

Each sector has its own way of serving the hamburger. In Mississippi, slaw is served right on the burger. On the West Coast they like it broiled with Bermuda onion and tomato.

In the Southwest the 'chili burger' gets a big call while in New England the favorite is the Dub-L-Burger with onion, pickle and potato chips. Down South it's well done with onions.

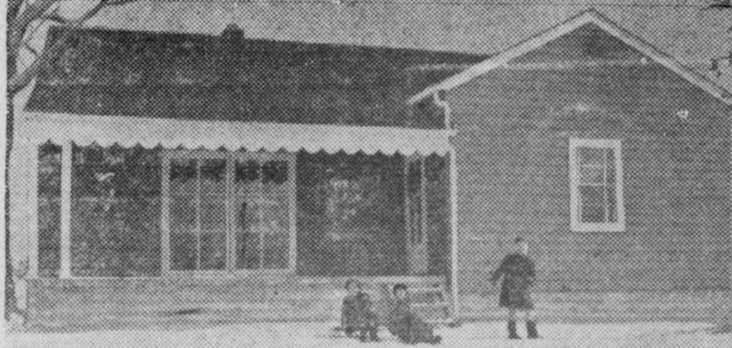
Ketchup is most popular, mustard second. Some teenagers have tried hamburger with ice cream on top, but we certainly don't recommend it.

Second in popularity for lunch or a quick bite are the salad sandwiches—egg, ham, tuna. And nearly everyone takes coffee. The Post Houses served 18 million cups last year. And milk tops the soft drinks.
