Mike Livingston Dies after Years Of Poor Health

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon April 7 for Ralph Moore (Mike) Livingston, 63, in the Presbyterian church, with Rev. Harold Dykstra, minister, officiating.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Morris V. Jacks, Locke Lowrance, Wayland Jinks, Ernest Birk, King Abernathy, W. C. Brown.

Mike was a native of Liberty, Mo., born there Sept. 4, 1893. He served in World War I and was overseas about a year.

He came to Wichita Falls in 1943 from Beaumont. He was employed with Managhan-Jones Motors and later had his own automobile body repair shop in Wichita Falls.

Mike was married to Miss Lella Grace Cornforth of Iowa Park on Dec. 6, 1946. They have lived in Iowa Park the past 10 years where he operated Mike's Upholstery.

Mrs. Livingston is secretary of Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce and deputy county tax collector.

Mike died early Friday morning, April 5, in the McKinley veterans hospital after a long illness.

Surviving also are his son Bob of Kansas City, Mo.; four sisters: Mrs. Roxey Fischer, Mrs. Marguerite Abrahamson, Mrs. Hazel Reynolds, Mrs. John K. Burke; a half-sister Mrs. Lillie Carney; and one brother Frank M. Livingston, all of near Liberty, Mo.

Out of town relatives and friends here for the funeral included Mr. and Mrs. Bob Livingston of Kansas City; Mrs. Roxey Fischer, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Reynolds, all of Liberty; Mrs. Bruce Kendrick of Waco; Mr. and Mrs. George Derleth of Kansas City; and many friends from Wichita Falls and surrounding area.

Work Begun on Education Plant

First Methodist church had their Ground Breaking ceremony last Sunday morning for the Educational Building that is being constructed. This is the first major building the church has done for several years.

The church was organized sometime during 1889 and the Rev. R. M. Kerr supplied the charge that year with Rev. W. S. May as presiding elder of the Montague district, in which Wichita county was located at that time.

This new charge was called Red River Mission and included Iowa Park and all Wichita county congregations except Wichita Falls and Allendale. At the next session of Conference the name was made Iowa Park Mission.

Iowa Park Mission remained as such until 1907 when it became self supporting, but for many years it continued as a circuit.

After Burk Burnett and Electra became strong enough to support a church they were left off the Iowa Park circuit and then, one by one, other places were arranged with other charges until, about 1918 Iowa Park became a station with but a meager salary. However at that time it was one of the strongest and best paid stations in the Wichita Falls district.

The one room frame structure that served so well as a place of worship located at the south part of town, was torn down in 1910 when the congregation under the leadership of Rev. C. P. Martin, pastor, purchased almost half a block of land centrally located near the business section and erected what at that time was considered a modern brick house of worship.

Bro. Martin was considered by many as too eager and disposed to risk too much. At the time the building was one of the best in the county outside of Wichita Falls, and adequately served the congregation until the rapid growth that was experienced after 1916.

In 1926 the congregation dedicated the present building, having added to the old structure. The cornerstone of the old building put up in 1910 was replaced and the new cornerstone was added.

Last Sunday morning when Rev. C. C. Davis turned the first shovel of dirt, he represented many years of service to the Iowa Park church and the local people. Mr. Davis was sent here by the conference in 1900 and served four years as pastor. He was also pastor here for several years. He makes his home with his daughter Mrs. James A. Sewell and Mr. Sewell at 1119 N. Pelfric.

W. F. George turned the next shovel of dirt. He too has served long and well in any capacity the church has asked of him.

All members of the construction and finance committee were present for this meaningful ceremony. Members are F. E. Hill, T. J. Pace, John Mixon, Paul Zink and W. F. George.

Rev. Elden Cole, pastor, was in charge of the ground breaking ceremonies, with James Elms, Sunday School superintendent, taking part representing that part of the church program.

The new building will house the nursery, recreation hall, a kitchen and a church library.

Carl Sullivan has been employed as construction supervisor, and the work will soon be underway.

House-to-House Canvass Planned

American Cancer Society began last week a month-long educational and fund raising program. All citizens are being urged to have a regular health examination as protection against needless death from cancer. What you don't know could hurt you!

Lack of information lets cancer take lives every day. Almost one-third of the Americans who died last year of cancer could have been saved by early diagnosis and treatment.

T. M. Clark is Cancer Crusade chairman for Iowa Park. ESA is sponsoring the house-to-house fund campaign, which will be at 7:00 p.m. Monday, April 15.

The town will be divided into sections: Southeast, 23 Study club; Southwest, Modern Music club; Northeast, Evening Lions; Northwest, ESA. The business district will be solicited by members of the Noon Lions club.

Wichita county is seeking \$19,000 as part of the nationwide effort to raise \$30,000,000 for research, education and service.

Mr. Clark gives the following breakdown: 60 per cent remains for county and state programs. 12 per cent is used by national headquarters to administer national programs of professional and public education and service.

Twenty-five per cent supports a nationwide program of cancer research conducted by more than 1,000 top scientists in nearly 140 institutions.

The remaining 3 per cent provides medical grants, scholarships and fellowships. Since this program was started in 1951, nearly 600 young scientists have received advanced training in cancer research.

Pioneer Dies

Cloyd C. Crites of Fort Worth, a resident of Iowa Park in the early days, died Wednesday morning in Fort Worth.

Funeral services were to be conducted there Thursday afternoon, April 11.

Mr. Crites came to Iowa Park while a baby with his parents Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Crites. He grew to manhood here before moving to Wichita Falls. In 1930 he went to Fort Worth to make his home.

He was a brother of the late O. H. Crites of Iowa Park and uncle of Mrs. Tirzah Portis and Miss Hazel Crites, both of Iowa Park.

Reflections from the Bible

Apollos was happy to give up the position he once occupied for one nearer to the truth.

I would to God today that preachers who find themselves in error were as willing as Apollos to give up that position. Many feel duty bound to uphold the banners of the sect to which they are attached. They are especially interested in the lines of orthodoxy that are attached to each denomination. It is hard to get one of them even after he has learned that he is in error to give up his profession in order that he may walk closer to the Lord. Could it be that they refuse to believe God when He says that He will add them materially (Matt. 6:33)? May I urge ministers who have become converted to a position closer to the Lord than that which you have formerly occupied, that you have the moral courage to change.

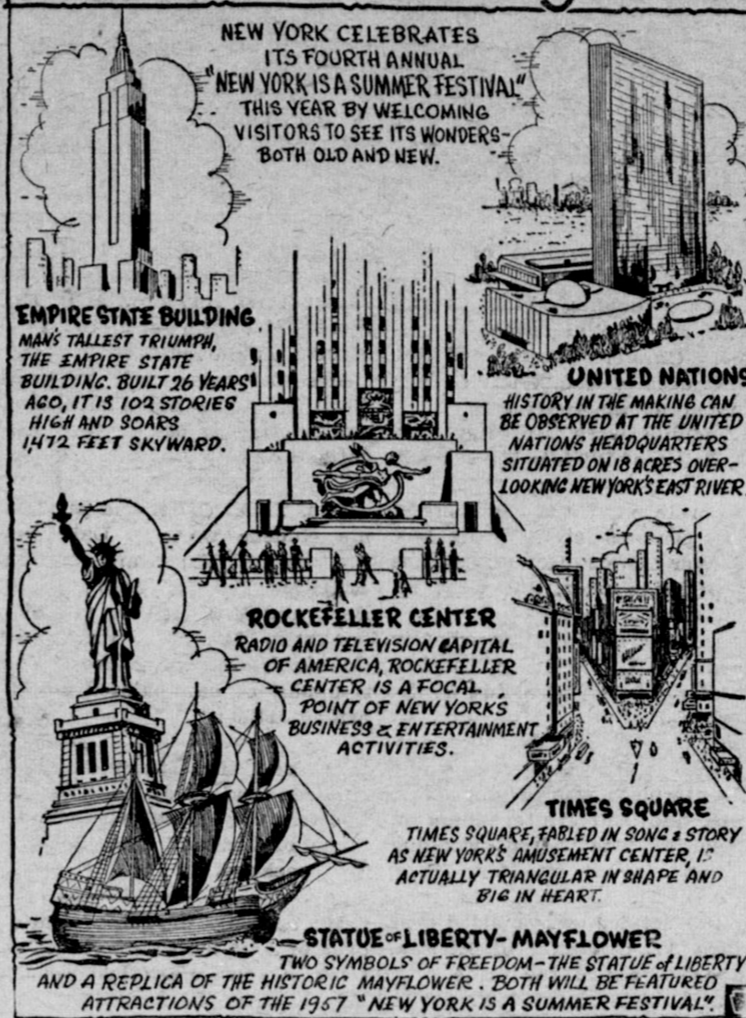
