trom the Bible

There is no such thing as an old fashioned gospel. There is no such thing as an old fashioned church, unless we speak of the churches of men, which of necessity, bear the marks of the age in which they were created. There is no such thing as "an old fashioned plan of salvation. An old fashioned thing is something that is outmoded. The church is not out of date. The plan of salvation does not bear the brand of an age long dead.

The Bible, the church, the plan of salvation-they do not need revision. They are as fresh and as sufficient as if they had been written today. They do not breathe the culture of an ancient past nor are they distinguished by the oriental mysticism in which they were born. There is nothing Jewish about them. They are as thoroughly acceptable by one race as another and by one age as another. They meet the needs of men the world round, until the end of time.

We plead with you to go back to the Bible and leave off those changed characteristics of modern religion which bear upon the very face of them the earmarks of the generation in which they were born, and the culture of the class for which they were designed.

Lindi To Do in a Tornado

C People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.

@ The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).

• Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums. • Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.
