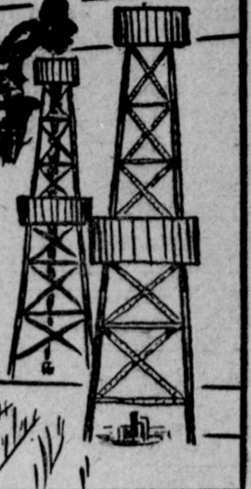

Reflections from the Bible

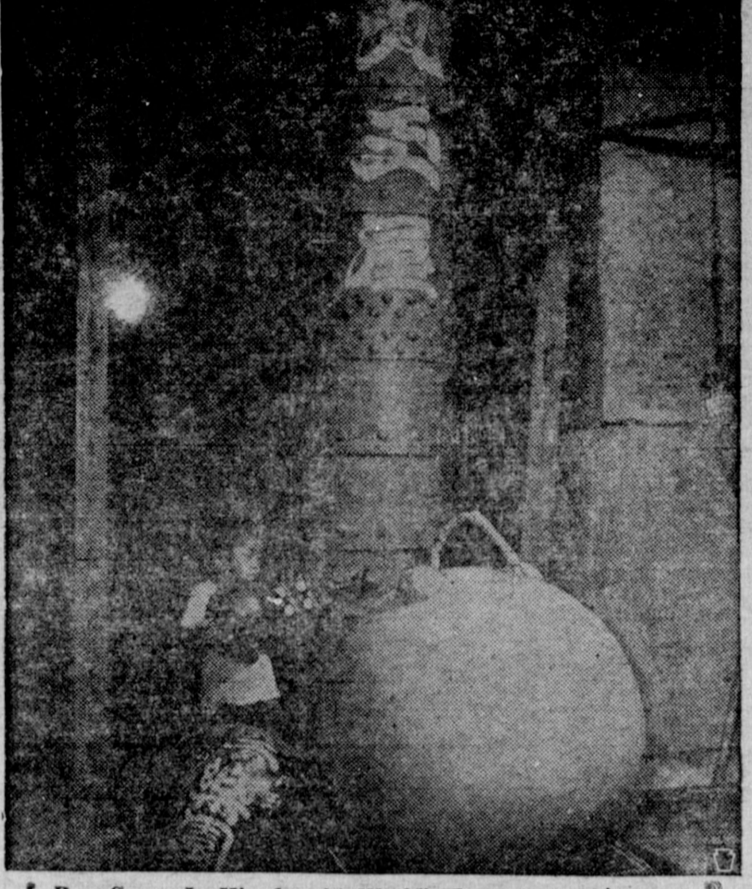

7,000 Miles To Set Off Fireworks



Boy Gazes In Wonder At World's Largest Rocket Shell.
The first U. S. World Trade Fair at the Coliseum, New York, this spring is being ushered in with a vast and dazzling fireworks spectacle along the Hudson River. Toshio Ogatsu, the pyrotechnician who designed the display specially for the Fair, traveled 7,000 miles from Japan to light the fireworks, among them a 300-foot high replica of Niagara Falls.

Mr. Ogatsu is the twelfth direct descendant of the firm bearing his name. Over 250 years ago, his ancestors entertained the feudal lords with fireworks.

Two and a half tons of fireworks have been presented as a goodwill gesture by JETRO (Japan External Trade Recovery Organization), with headquarters at the Japan Trade Center, New York, to the people of New York in connection with the Fair at the Coliseum. Japan is exhibiting thousands of her finest quality products in 92 booths.

Japan today is the most industrialized nation in the Far East. She is herself now the largest single buyer of U. S. agricultural products, and purchased in 1956 far more merchandise than she sold to the United States.

More than 580 of Japan's commodities must now pass rigid tests for export, and standards of quality are set for 396 products. They range from highly sensitive electronic equipment to chemicals and cultured pearls, from scooters, bicycles and cameras to the finest microscopes in the world.

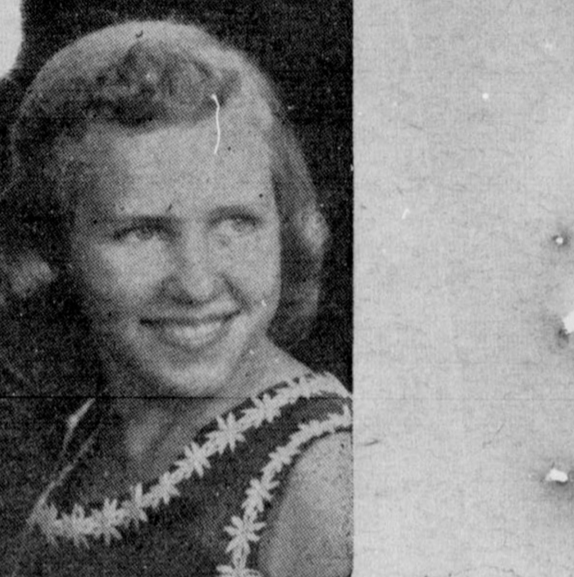

New City Ordinances

ORDINANCE NO. 275

An ordinance setting out the limits and boundaries of the Rigid Primary and the Secondary Fire Zones within the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and providing a penalty for violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

Section 1. Fire Limits: The following shall be and are hereby declared to be the fire limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas; Beginning at the intersection of North Jackson Avenue and West Bank Street; thence east along Bank Street to the intersection of North Bond Street and East Bank Street; thence south along Bond Street to the intersection of North Bond Street and East Railroad Avenue or Highway 287; thence west along the north boundary of Railroad Avenue or Highway 287 and North Jackson Avenue; thence north along Jackson Avenue to the place of beginning; which boundaries include all of Blocks numbered 71 and 84, and all of Blocks lettered "C," "D," "L," "Z," and the City Park.

In addition to such Fire Limits as above set out, Secondary Fire Limits shall be that portion of the City within the following limits and being, all of Railroad Avenue, all of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company properties, and all of Smith Avenue lying between Jackson Avenue on the west and Hawthorne Avenue on the east; all of the south one-half of Block lettered "H," all of the south one-half of Block lettered "G," all of Denver Park or Block 96 on the north of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company tracks; and all of Block lettered "N" and all of Block lettered "O" on the south of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company tracks.

Section 2. Permits and Inspections: No wall, structure, building, or part thereof, shall hereafter be built, enlarged, or altered, until a plan of the proposed work, together with a statement of materials to be used, shall have been submitted to the City Council who shall, in accordance with the provisions herein contained, issue a written permit in triplicate for the proposed work. Permits to be kept on file with the City Secretary.

Structures hereafter erected without a permit, or not in conformity with this ordinance, shall be removed.

No building shall be moved from without to within the fire limits, nor from one location to another within the fire limits until a permit shall have been issued therefor. No permit shall be issued unless such construction is in accordance with this ordinance.

The designated Building Inspector shall inspect, as often as practical, construction in progress to see that all provisions of this ordinance are being complied with.

NOTE: All plans and specifications submitted to the City Council shall comply with all City Ordinances of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and with Article 271A of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas.

Section 3. Construction Required within the Fire Limits: No building or structure of wooden, iron-clad (whether on wood or metal supports), stucco, or veneer type construction, or any buildings whose walls contain wood supports, shall be permitted except as indicated in Section 4. No building shall hereafter be built, enlarged, or altered, except in accordance with this ordinance.

The thickness of walls shall be not less than as given below:

Brick walls shall be not less than 12 inches thick, except that small one-story building with floor areas of 750 square feet or less may have walls 8 inches thick.

Reinforced concrete walls may be three-fourths of the thickness of brick walls, but in no case less than 8 inches.

Hollow building tile may be used as filler walls provided such walls be supported on reinforced concrete beams and footings, and by adequate reinforced concrete or brick pillars or columns spaced not more than 16 feet apart; walls to be not less than 12 inches thick. Small one-story buildings of less

than 500 square feet floor area may have walls of 8-inch hollow building tile.

Solid stone walls shall be 4 inches thicker than brick walls for like construction.

All exterior walls, party walls, and division fire walls shall have parapets extending at least eight inches above the roof, and said parapets shall be at least 12 inches thick, except where eight-inch walls are permitted as above, in which case parapets may be eight inches thick.

For the Secondary Fire Zone every building or structure hereafter erected, enlarged or altered within said Secondary Fire Limits shall be enclosed on all sides with walls whose outer construction shall be asbestos siding or brick veneer or other and similar incombustible material. All roofs of such building or structure, and whether same be the roof proper or the sides of roof structures or cornices, shall be covered with incombustible material as hereinbefore defined in Section 3.

Section 4. Frame Building in Fire Limits: The following frame structures are permissible in the fire limits:

a. Temporary one-story frame building for the use of builders.

b. Wooden fences not over 8 feet high without roof or cover.

Section 5. Roofs: All buildings or structures hereafter constructed in the fire limits shall have incombustible roof coverings.

No roofing on an existing roof shall be renewed or repaired to a greater extent than 10% of the roof surface, except in conformity with this ordinance, and in no instance shall more than one permit be issued each existing building in any one year.

Section 6. Repairs and Additions: Any existing building within the fire limits which may hereafter be damaged by fire, decay, or otherwise, to an amount greater than 50% of its present value, exclusive of the foundation, shall not be repaired or rebuilt, but shall be removed.

Extensions, remodeling, or additions to existing buildings shall not be considered as repairs, and shall not be permitted except when conforming with Section 3 of this ordinance.

Section 7. Arbitration: Whenever an application for permit to repair any existing building already located within the fire limits is made by any person or firm, and the City Council and the applicant disagree on the extent of repairs to be made, and a permit is denied by the designated Building Inspector, then the City Council or Commission shall appoint a competent and disinterested person and the applicant shall appoint a competent and disinterested person, which said two persons so appointed shall select a third member, and these said three persons shall appraise the building, examine the plan of the proposed work, and the statement of materials and labor to be used in the repairing or rebuilding of said building, and make a signed written report of their findings to the City Council or Commission. If such report reflects clearly that said rebuilding or repairing would be a violation of this ordinance, then such application for permit shall be denied by the City Council or Commission, and if such report reflects that the person seeking said permit has complied with said ordinance, and the requested rebuilding or repairing is not in violation of said ordinance, then said City Council or Commission shall issue a permit for the proposed rebuilding or repairing.

Section 8. Validity of Ordinance: If any section, paragraph, subdivision clause, phrase, or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid or held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part or provision thereof, other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 9. Any and all other ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 10. Penalties: Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) and not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for each offense, and each and every day's violation of any provision hereof shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage hereof, and after due publication as required by the Statutes of the State of Texas.

Passed and approved by said City Council in regular monthly session with all members being present, on this the 8th day of April A.D. 1957.

Ordinance No. 275

An Ordinance relative to the number of fowls to be kept and housed within the city limits of Iowa Park, Texas, and providing a penalty for violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas: Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to have or allow any chickens, ducks, geese, guineas, or any other fowls in excess of twenty-five (25) adult laying hens, or one hundred (100) friers to be allowed on the premises at any one time; and these fowls will not be allowed to run at large but must be confined within a pen or house.

Section 2. Any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) and not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in lieu of Ordinance Number 92 which was passed and approved by the City Council of Iowa Park, Texas, on February 14, 1921, and any or all other ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, and after due publication as required by the Statutes of the State of Texas.

Passed and approved by the City Council in regular monthly session assembled on this the 8th day of April A.D. 1957, with all members of the City Council being present.

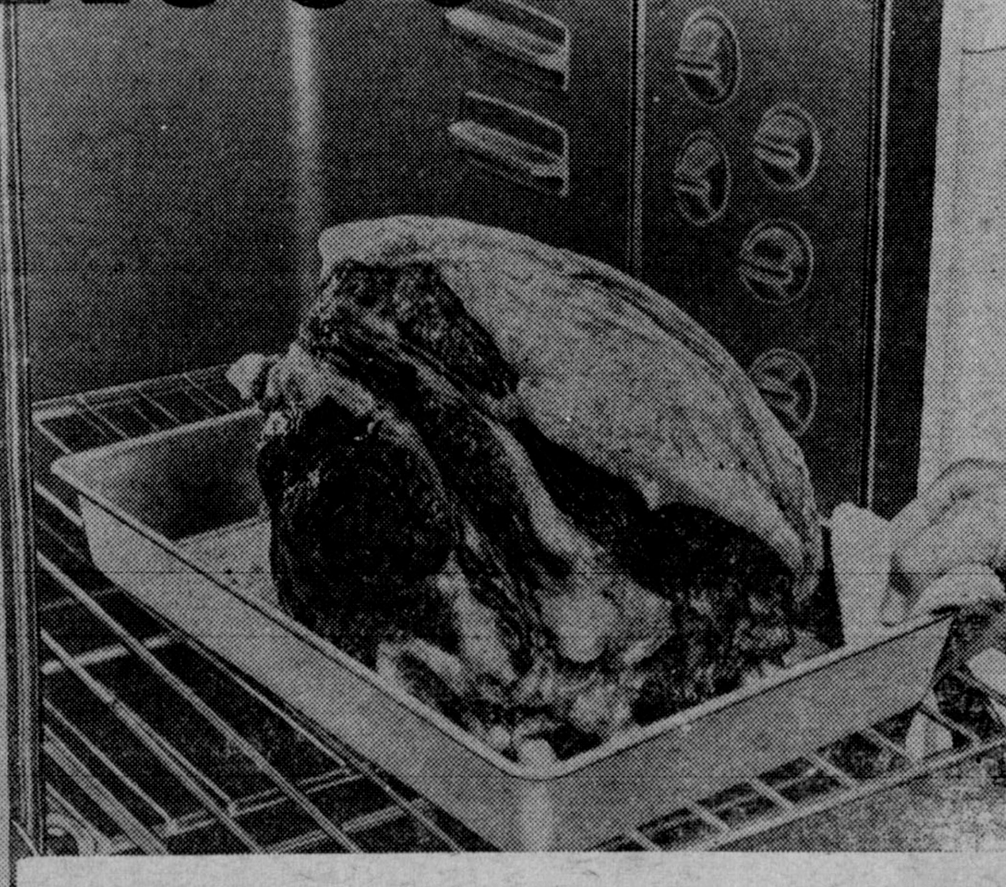

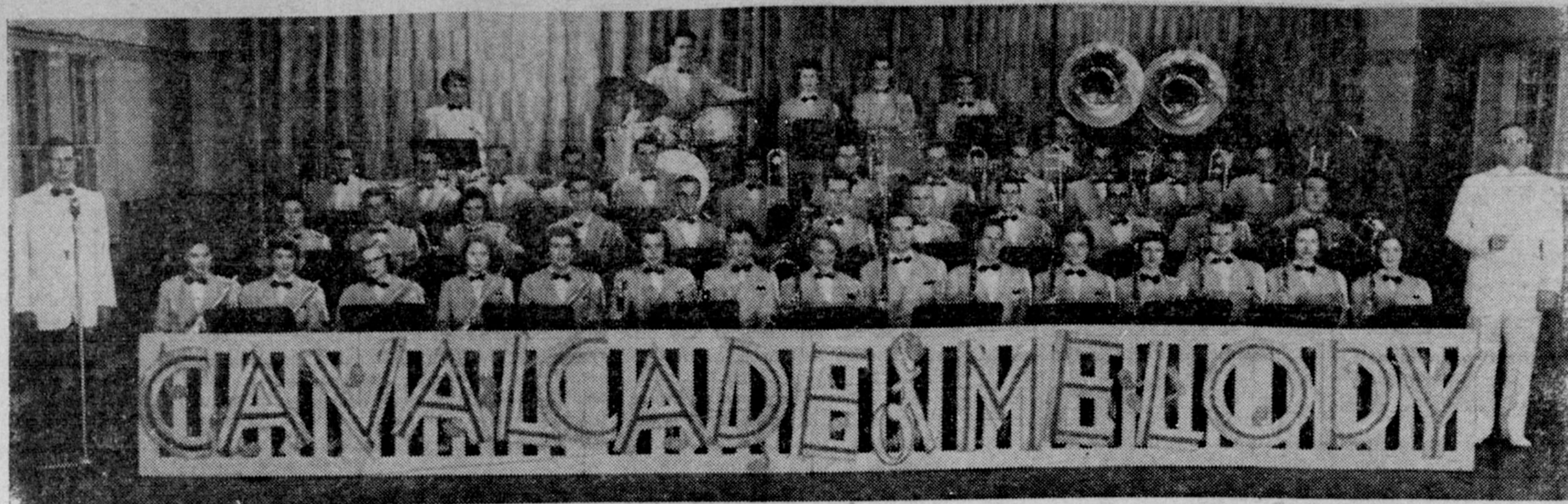

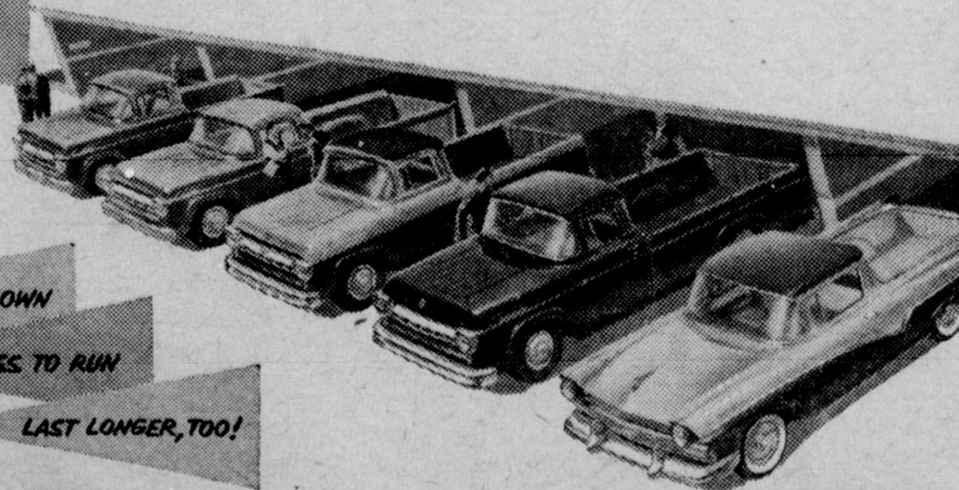
