## Reflections from the Bible

## Report on Clean-up

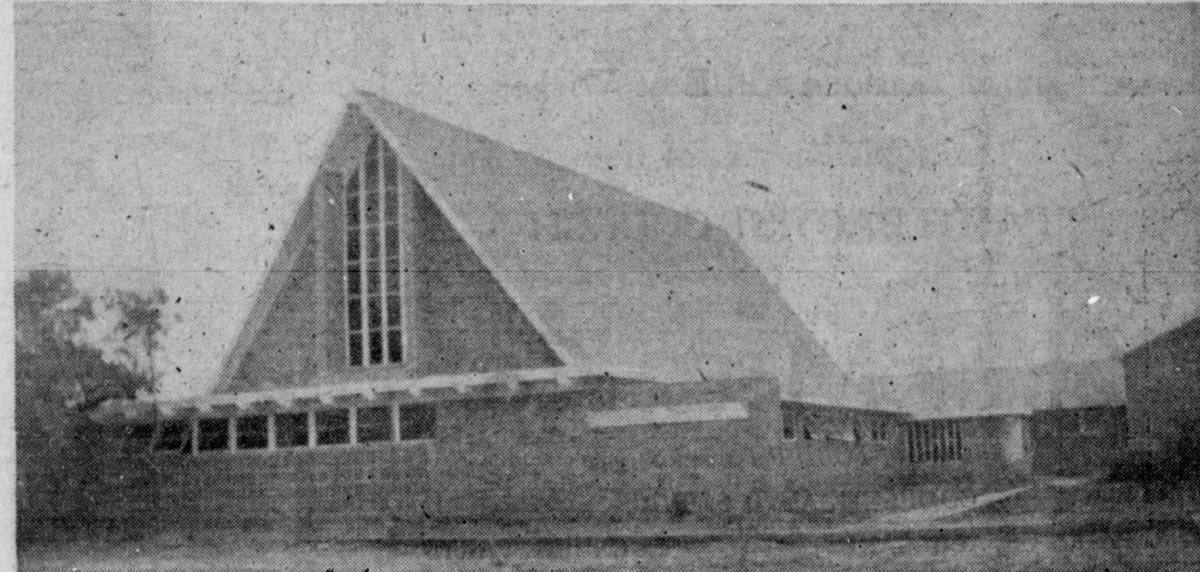
The Clean-up, Fix-up campaign this week has been a huge success in Iowa Park.

## New Faith Baptist Church to Be Dedicated Sunday

Faith Baptist church of Iowa Park will hold its Dedication Service and Openhouse for its new auditorium next Sunday afternoon at 2:30.

Dr. W. B. Billingsley of Wichita Falls will bring the main address. The choir will be composed of representatives of the different churches of Iowa Park.

This auditorium is the most recent phase of the building program of this young church. It was constructed and furnished at a cost of \$70,000.

The building is on modern Gothic design of College blend brick. In the interior, the arched ceiling reaches 35 feet into the air and is of knotty spruce stained aquamarine. The supporting arches are stained ivory. Side walls are cobble haydite block colored to match the ceiling. The color of the pews, furnishings and the new Baldwin

piano, which is a gift of the John F. Quicks, blends with the arches.

Another attractive feature of the building is the front and rear windows that point heavenward. The amber glass in the front is symbolic of the fire described in Ezekiel 1:4 which is the Living Fire of God. When the lights are on at night, the blue, red and amber of the rear window send forth the message of God's glory in color. In the daytime the light shining into the sanctuary through this window draws the thoughts of worshippers ever upward when they enter the building.

Faith church had its beginning as a mission of the First Baptist church in January 1954. Less than two years later it was organized into a church.

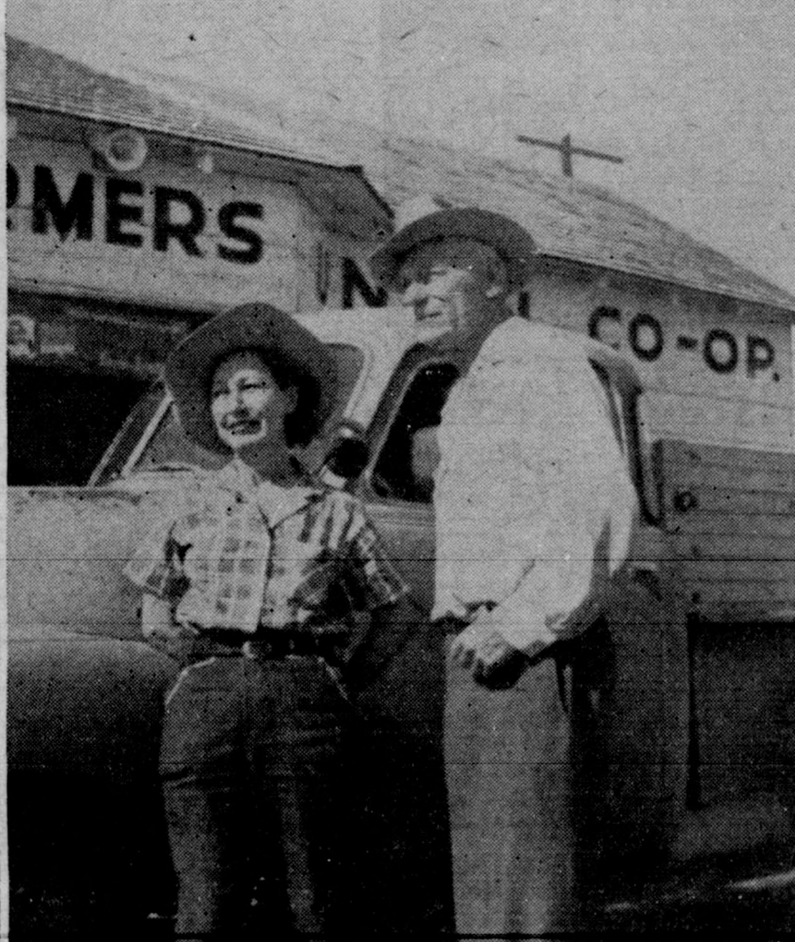
La Wanda was chosen on the basis of being a good, all-around student, with a well-balanced personality and character. Members of the high school faculty made the choice.

## City's Growth Poses Water and Sewer Problems

One of the most interesting programs of the year was presented to the Noon Lions club Tuesday, R. R. Brubaker, program chairman, and presented Clifford Roberts, city water and sewerage superintendent, who gave a report on the daily use of water in Our Town since 1952.

At present there are 956 water meters, as compared to approximately 749 in 1952. The city has 70 fireplugs.

Roberts pointed out that many gallons of water are wasted by just small leaks under the ground or dripping faucets in the homes and businesses.

"Water is essential to life, to

business, to everything," Roberts said. He told Lions that the water department does not make water; it processes it to make it safe, and delivers it to the customers.

Clifford pointed out that the distribution system here was designed for fewer users than we now have, and that the time is here for an expansion of facilities.

Another water tower has been recommended in order to keep fire insurance rates down. Along with that is the need for another settling and storage basin, plus miles of new mains and feeder lines.

Coupled with the water needs, are the needs of the sewerage system. As more water is used, more

sewage disposal facilities will have to be acquired.

Roberts believes there is enough water in Iowa Park's two lakes to supply the city for four or five years under normal conditions.

Roberts and two other water department employees are registered water and sewerage operators, having attended schools for water and sewer employees the required number of hours, and having at least two years of experience.

Roberts has been with the water department since 1942. Lion Tamer Peanuts Wilson introduced Bill Andrade of Ardmore, Okla., as a guest. Sweethearts Harriett Coppock and Thelma Gay provided dinner music.
