

Reflections trom the Bible



We continue the study "The Beginning of the Church."

The history of the church from the beginning of the second cen tury to the great awakening period following the Dark Ages reveals an ever-widening gulf between things practiced in the name of Christianity and the pattern set

down in the New Testament. Ignorance engulfed the world; the written word meant nothing to the vast multitude of people who could not read; religious leaders had drifted far from God's instructions, "For lack of knowledge the people perished" (Hosea 4:6).

During this period many false doctrines were introduced and by ignorance were accepted. Officers were placed in the Church that were not authorized by the Scriptures. There was organized a special clergy class, who were forbidden to marry. The Holy Spirit had given final, complete and authorized decisions on matters pertaining to organization, worship and teachings; these were overthrown, religious conferences were called to decide these matters. People thought going down into the water to be baptized was a needless command of God so sprinkling and pouring were substituted for baptism. The minds of men kept wandering farther away from God. adv
