## Reflections trom the Bible

try. Hundreds of local congregations were established patterned after the congregations of the first century. Each was under the oversight of elders, with only Jesus Christ as the head. Each congregation was independent of the other yet the same form of worship was followed. These congregations were doing Bible things by the one way which the Bible teaches.
