Soil Conservation

Annual Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District stubble mulching field day has been set for July 12 at 10:00 a.m., Fenton Dale, chairman of the board, said this week.

The field day will be held at the Homer Harrell farm at Punkin Center. In addition to stubble mulching, fertilizer equipment will be shown. The day's activities are sponsored by W-W SCD and the farm implement dealers of the district.

Protection of soil surface by mulching crop stubble is important in conservation farming, says Elvy Sargent, work unit conservationist for the SCS.

Dr. Carl Gray of Midwestern University soils laboratory will assist in field day and make fertilizer recommendations.

Implement dealers will show the mulching equipment and drills that best apply fertilizer.

C. H. Arnold of Electra reports erosion control and good yields of wheat on 1956 stubble mulched land. Arnold is again stubble mulching more than 100 acres.

Reflections from the Bible

The decision to teach and practice all things and only those things commanded or practiced by the early Christians was arrived at independently by many groups in widely separated localities. The same thing happened in Scotland, southern United States, Germany and elsewhere. Recently groups have been found that for years have been motivated by the same basic purposes. Such groups have been located in India, Mexico, Poland and Hawaii.

They all have a common purpose, the restoration of Christianity as it was known and practiced in the first century.

In the Restoration plea was the cry to return to the Bible. When this concept was first announced in America, the responses were immediate and refreshing. Thousands quickly echoed the slogans.

"We'll speak where the Bible speaks!
We'll be silent where it is silent!
We'll do Bible things in Bible ways and
Call Bible things by Bible names."

A mighty revival swept the country. Hundreds of local congregations were established patterned after the congregations of the first century. Each was under the oversight of elders, with only Jesus Christ as the head. Each congregation was independent of the other yet the same form of worship was followed. These congregations were doing Bible things by the one way which the Bible teaches.

3 Die in Plane

John O'Neil, 38, Wichita Falls oil operator, with two other occupants of his plane, were found dead in its wreckage 20 miles east of Albuquerque, N.M., Wednesday.

John was a brother-in-law of the former Miss Eva Joy Sumrall of Iowa Park. Her husband Pat was a partner of John in an independent oil firm. Their parents were pioneers of this area.

Mr. O'Neil was piloting the plane. With him were J. G. Frey of Fort Worth and Owen Curran of Phoenix, Ariz. They were returning from a fishing trip to Springerville, Ariz.

The crash occurred in a restricted atomic research area, and military personnel handled removal of the bodies. The nearest road was six miles.

Pat and Lt. Col. Ben F. Lowell of the CAP of Wichita Falls flew to Albuquerque. Funeral services will be in Wichita Falls with burial at Houston.

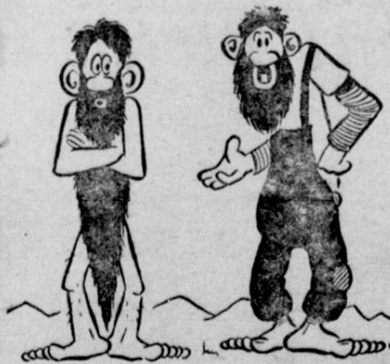
