Reflections from the Bible

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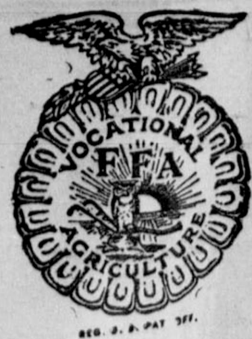

Soil Conservation


Wildlife is an important part of conservation farming, according to Elvy Sargent, soil conservationist of Iowa Park. Irrigation and drainage ditches, farm waterways and odd areas can provide ideal habitats for wildlife, he added.

Good fences to protect from overgrazing, prevention of burning, and seeding are most common needs of such areas. Switchgrass, sunflowers, and ragweeds are often found on ditches that are not cleaned each year, and provide good quail food and cover.

Joe Cunningham reports a good balance between wildlife and cover provide benefits while improving native rangeland. Weeds in natural drain, along fireguards, and on farm pond drains are furnishing food and cover for quail.

Soil Conservation Service assists in fish pond improvements, Sargent pointed out. Stocking with proper fish, fertilizing and harvesting of fish are parts of management.

There's Color, Fun At The Fair, You Can Capture It All On Film

Ever think of lassoing the whole big State Fair of Texas? Like to bring it back home with you complete in all its color, action and thrills?

This is easy. Just take your camera along. Advance planning and careful use of your still or movie camera will let you capture the Fair and hold it for years on film.

Here's some simple advice to help you make better pictures at the State Fair:

The first suggestion is important to a good cook or a seasoned traveler as well as a photographer: plan ahead. What you've read about the Fair will provide good ideas of what you'll want to see and photograph. Decide on the sequence of pictures you'll take at the Fair. Later on, this sequence will tell a complete story about the day your family spent at the Fair. And to make it a complete story, plan to take pictures before and after your actual stay at the Fair. Snaps, slides or movies of the family getting ready for the Fair should be included as well as pictures of the sleepy children arriving home at the end of an enjoyable day.

Be sure you're equipped to take good pictures. If the family camera has been on a shelf for several months perhaps it should be checked by a photo dealer. You can have this done at the same time you buy enough film to shoot all the pictures you'll want at the Fair.

Take enough pictures. The professional photographer often shoots several hundred negatives on one job. To be sure, this is more than the family snaphooter will need, but by "overshooting" you'll be sure to have all the pictures that will tell your story. Too often, the "perfect picture" is spoiled because its subject blinked his eyes or a stranger walked in front of the camera.

Many of the finest pictures you'll find at the Fair will come up fast. You'll see and shoot . . . to capture fast action or a charming expression. Keep the camera ready for instant use.

Other shots should be carefully arranged. But when posing people, don't make their presence in the picture meaningless. A straight line of people looking at the camera is uninteresting and unrelated to what's going at the Fair. Have the family watch some one of the Fair's attractions when you snap their picture. Compose adults and children in different poses. And vary your camera angle and distance too. Shoot some pictures from eye-level, others from a kneeling position or get up high and look down at the subjects. Try close-ups of facial expressions, tight group shots and long-range pictures to achieve variety.

Some of the most exciting activities at the Fair take place indoors and at night. Here's where you'll probably need to use flash. A tiny flash bulb packs a lot of action-stopping light. Even in daylight flash can be an effective means to better pictures. It fills in the shadows of facial expressions, makes outdoor photos extra snappy. A supply of blue bulbs is convenient to carry when you're shooting Kodachrome or Ektachrome transparencies outdoors.

How about exposures . . . what lens opening and shutter speed to use? There's a wide range of cameras and films on the market today and the best general advice is to follow the manufacturer's instructions which are enclosed in each carton of film.

At the State Fair of Texas, you have a center where photographic experts are on hand to answer any and all questions about picture-taking. Drop by and ask for the answers at the Kodak Photographic Information Center, General Exhibits Building.

Civil Defense Is More Important Now

The PTA met Wednesday afternoon with Kathleen Shropshire furnishing the prelude and David Steele leading the pledge to the flag.

The speech class of Mrs. O. R. Owens gave the devotion. Mrs. D. O. James brought the Texas birthday observance.

Col. Steve Marchand gave an interesting talk on Civil Defense. "There are 12 targets in Texas and 76 in the United States. Russia would like to put out of commission all these 76," said Marchand.

In telling of civil defense plans, Marchand said, if the siren were sounded in Wichita Falls, the radio stations would be cut down to 1240 kilocycles and start giving directions to the people. Our evacuation area is Seymour. Closest target there is Amarillo.

If Amarillo were hit, in three hours a lethal gas fall-out would reach Iowa Park.

If a bomb were dropped in Wi-

chita Falls, nothing would be left in a five mile radius. Iowa Park would be wiped out. Even in a 15 mile zone, half would be killed.

When the siren sounds in Wichita Falls, all Sheppard AFB will evacuate toward Burk and go on to Crowell. Archer City is the eastern boundary line for local evacuation, since Fort Worth will evacuate as far west as Archer City.

Seymour is divided into areas, and parents and children will be united at the area there.

We have two rescue groups: the united armed forces, and civilian groups such as firemen, police and highway patrolmen.

Marchand said PTA groups are a good starting point for civil defense organizations.

The Red Cross furnishes shelter, beds, food and clothing. The Civil Defense gives warning and transportation.

The expert said every town must plan and organize to take care of

each area of town. First aid and home nursing courses are important for the people to study to prepare for an emergency, not only for bombings, but for tornados and fires.

Marchand said that the 20 county area under his supervision has 614 hospital beds. There are at this time seven empty beds in Wichita General hospital. Then he asked, "How many could Iowa Park provide?"

He pointed out the school should have buses and cars enough to evacuate the students.

Civil Defense is set up in Wichita Falls so that 100,000 people can be evacuated in two hours.

In discussing the warning of Iowa Park, he said Texas Electric Service company will soon have a buzzer to plug in a light socket. In case of danger Texas Electric will throw the switch and the buzzer will sound.

The PTA plans to send Mrs. Rollins Woodall to state convention

at Galveston.

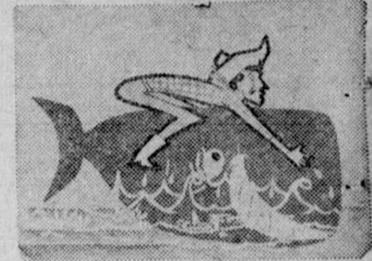
Murder Victim Kin of Parkans

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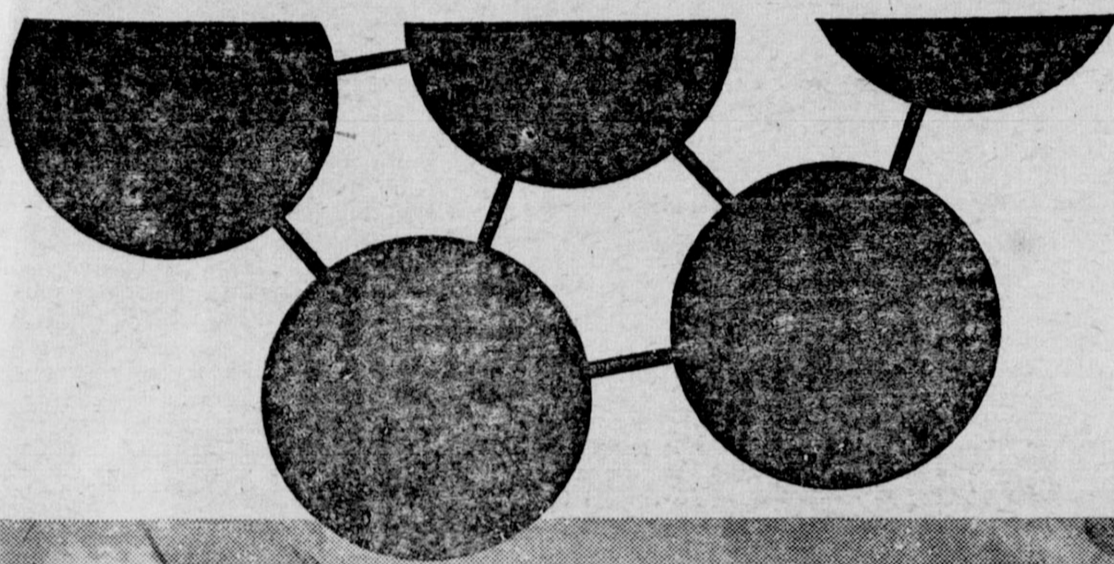
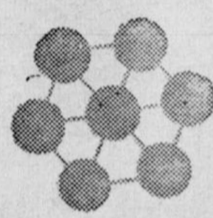
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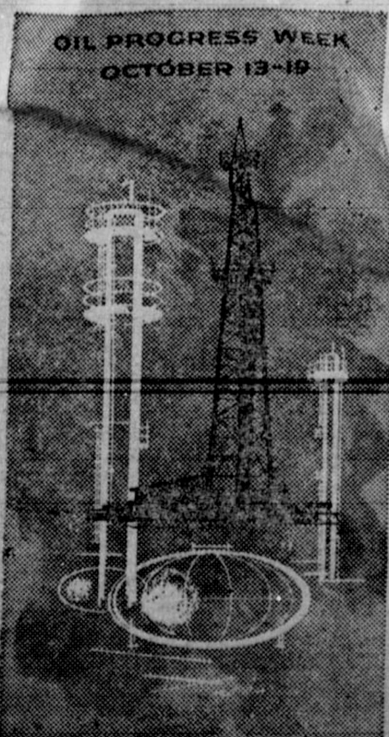
