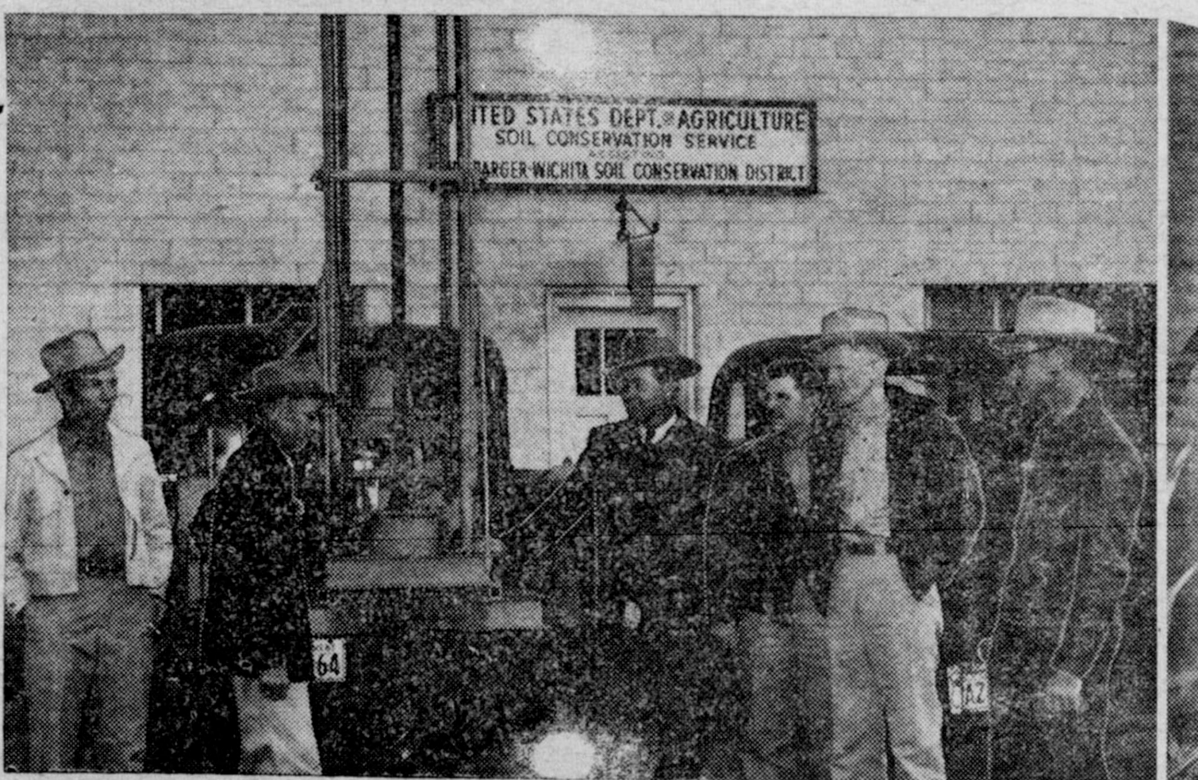
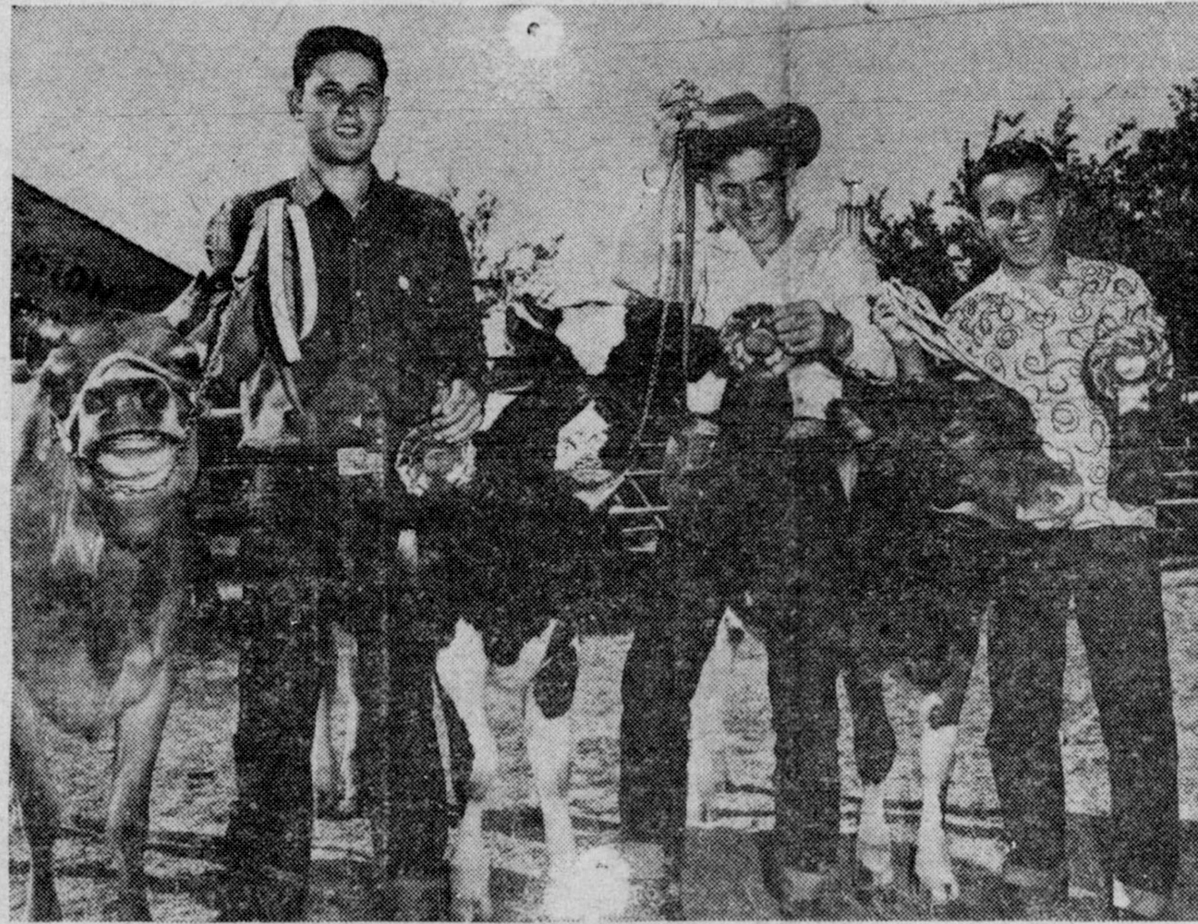

## W. D. Walker Taken by Death

Funeral services were conducted for William David Walker, 76, at 2:30 Wednesday, Sept. 11, in the Church of Christ, with Ray Marcum, minister, in charge.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Claud Reaves, E. L. Bradford, W. R. Bradford, Keith Swim, O. J. Robertson, Floyd Busby.

Mr. Walker died Tuesday morning at his home on West Jefferson street after several years of illness.

Born Sept. 17, 1881 in Collins county, he moved with his parents to Cooke county in 1893. In 1903 he was married to Miss Margaret Watkins.

He taught school and farmed in Cooke county several years before the family moved to Stamford in 1914. They moved to Iowa Park in 1916, where he did farming for many years.

Mrs. Walker died in 1925 and their oldest son William O. Walker died in 1955.

Surviving are two sons J. Watkins Walker and Richard H. Walker, both of Iowa Park; three sisters: Mrs. Lela Holland and Mrs. Lorene Hudspeth of Brownfield; five brothers: Guy of Brownfield, R. L. and Dee, both of Ft. Stockton, Tom of Dallas and Charles of Hattiesburg, Miss.; and one granddaughter Mrs. Clayton Boyd of Austin.

## O. P. Kiker, 83, Former Minister Here, Passes On

Funeral services were held for Rev. Orville P. Kiker, 83, retired minister, of Wichita Falls, Monday afternoon in the First Methodist church here. He was father of Mrs. T. J. Pace of Iowa Park.

Dr. C. Q. Smith, president of Oklahoma City university, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. J. Daniel Barron, superintendent of North Texas district of the Methodist church, and Rev. W. B. Hicks, former associate pastor of Floral Heights church. Burial was in the Crestview Memorial Park of Wichita Falls.

Mr. Kiker died at his home Saturday night, Sept. 7, after a long illness.

Born in Erath county near Stephenville, Mr. Kiker attended the school which is now Texas Wesleyan college in Ft. Worth. He married Miss Estelle Burkhead of Valley View in Cooke county at that town. They would have been married 56 years Dec. 10. She survives.

Mr. Kiker served pastorates in North and West Texas, including the church in Iowa Park, for 50 years before retiring in 1941. His only pastorate out of Texas was at Okmulgee, Okla.

Survivors are the widow; the daughter in Iowa Park; two sons George W. of Lubbock and Orville P. Jr. of New Orleans; three brothers; two sisters; 12 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

## Beef Crop Inspection

An eight acre field that promises to yield a bumper crop of beef will be seen Sept. 17 when tours will be conducted at Martin Herford ranch near Iowa Park.

The tours will include a 45 minute inspection of intensive rotation grazing on coastal bermuda.

Joe Price Jr., manager of the farm, has fenced the eight acres into three equal plots and each plot is grazed seven days and rested 15.

While the resting period is underway, each plot is fertilized and irrigated.

Nearly 300 pounds of beef per acre have been produced during the first 60 days of the experiment. No protein supplement has been fed.

A display of sod cutting and springing equipment will also be shown. John Sibley, vocational agriculture teacher at IPHS, and B. T. Haws, county agent, will direct the equipment display.

Wichita Farm and Ranch club will have its September meeting following the tours, at the Fair Park auditorium. Clinton Harbers of West Point will speak. Barbecue supper will be served at the club meeting.

## Reflections from the Bible

There is much confusion over the Holy Spirit in the realm of religion today. Why? Because, we fail to accept the teachings of the word of God.

Some teach there is only one mode by which the Holy Spirit is conferred and that is by the laying on of the hands. If this is so, then there is no Holy Spirit to aid the gospel of Christ today.

There were three measures by which the Spirit was given. Two of these measures have passed on as their usefulness has been accomplished.

First, the Holy Spirit was given in a Baptismal sense when He gave the words to the Apostles by which the world might be saved (Acts 2:1-4; 10:44-47; 11:15).

Second, the apostles had the power, by the laying on of the hands, to confer the gift to others (Acts 8:12-17; 19:6; I Tim. 4:14; II Tim. 1:6). None but the apostles could confer the Holy Spirit, by the laying on of hands. "Apostle" means witness, thus an apostle can have no successor. An apostle had to be a witness of Christ (Acts 1:22).

Third, the general gift of the Holy Spirit which is given to all as a comforter or counselor, after we have been baptized into Christ (Acts 2:38-39; Gal. 3:27). This is the only measure the Holy Spirit is given in today.

The other folk in the neighborhood who gathered on front porches to watch, said the four-lane highway was "lit up bright as day."

R. E. Waters, who resides two doors west of the Cowden home, investigated, and found some remarkably strange remains of the bomb. He notified Col. Steve Marchand, civil defense expert, who came out and inspected the scene. His theory is that the thing was a tear gas bomb of the type that has an incendiary effect to keep recipients of the weapon from picking it up and hurling it back at the person who released it.

It is Marchand's opinion that the bomb was set off by a prankster.

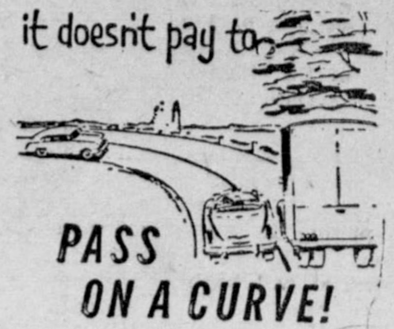
