Reflections from the Bible

In New Testament times there were thousands of Christians who belonged to no denomination. As Christians, they were all members only of that broad universal church for which Jesus died. They were not sectarian in any sense. They had joined nothing. They had been added only to Christ. In the unity of a faith universal, they were recognized universally as simple Christians.

If this view of Christianity had been maintained through the centuries we would not have the divided warring factions that spend their energies fighting each other rather than fighting Satan. Denominational religion is a relatively new thing.

This New Testament view of Christianity is not a narrow view. It is the broadest possible view. Any denominational view, regardless of how fraternalizing, is bound to be more restricting and narrow than this. Under this view alone can men hold that every person who has been born again is a brother or sister in Christ. It is not necessary that he be restricted to a certain communion in order to be fellowshiped.

This broader view of Christianity claims no copyright on true doctrine or true worship. It holds that all men are free under God to believe and obey the commands of God without human restrictions. This view holds that every man is responsible to God alone for studying the Book for himself and for following it to the very best of his ability. When a group of people in a community follow this pattern, you have a New Testament church.

Christmas Seal Sale Starts Nov. 15

Iowa Park citizens will receive their 1957 Christmas Seals by Monday, Nov. 11, according to Mrs. D. O. James, local chairman of the seal sale.

Christmas Seal letters will be delivered to the Wichita Falls post office this Friday. Opening day of the sale is Friday, Nov. 15.

1957 Christmas Seals are designed to be used in pairs. On one Santa Claus's jolly face is reflected in a gleaming red Christmas ball with a background of dark evergreen boughs, "putting him right where he should be," according to the artist Clinton Bradley, "in the home, the night before Christmas, leaving presents under the tree."

On the companion Seal, a silver ball reflects the joyous surprise in the face of a little girl as she finds her gifts on Christmas morning. The light in the eyes of the child is taken from life, for Bradley has a young daughter.

Christmas Seal funds have carried on the work of tuberculosis associations in the U.S. since 1907. When the first TB associations were organized, the disease was the leading cause of death in the world. The Christmas Seal battle has reduced the death rate by 95 per cent, thus saving more than 7,000,000 American lives.

Mrs. Joella Terrill Butler, president of Wichita County Tuberculosis association, points out that "new cases being found has not declined in proportion. In Texas last year more new cases of TB were found than in any previous year."

Mrs. James points out that the 1957 Christmas Seals are taking on an additional job: employment of a full time tuberculosis public health nurse. During the 1957 x-ray survey, 176 cases of TB were reported with an additional 133 cases of suspicious tuberculosis. Of this number, 10 cases were reported for both categories from Iowa Park.

Christmas Seal funds will pay the salary of a nurse and the county health unit will take care of automobile expense. This nurse will work under direction of Mrs. Joseph Mann, director of public health nurses at the health unit. She will do a complete follow-up job on all tuberculosis cases reported in the county as a result of the x-ray survey. Her job will also include all contacts with all county TB cases.

Mrs. James expresses the belief that every person here who receives Christmas Seals will make a contribution this year to insure this vital service, along with the Association's other activities.

She points out that the people of Texas are taxed at the rate of about \$7,500,000 annually to hospitalize known tuberculosis patients, and that it is more economical to prevent the disease than it is to hospitalize and rehabilitate its victims.

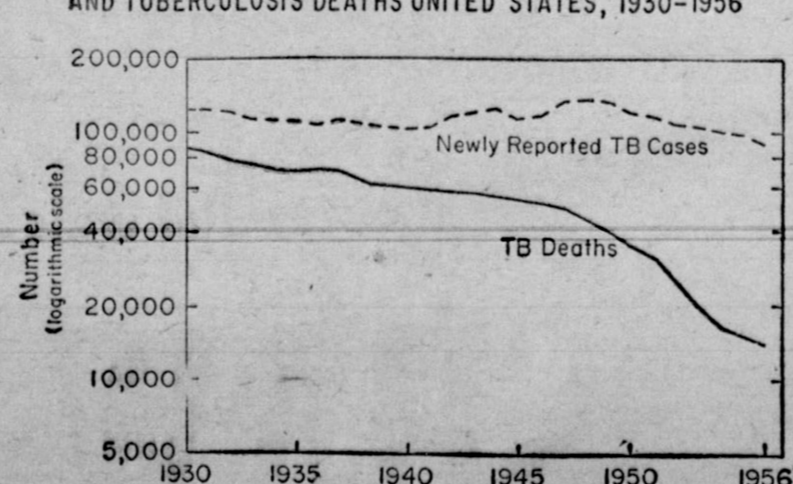

TB Cases And Deaths

NEWLY REPORTED TUBERCULOSIS CASES AND TUBERCULOSIS DEATHS UNITED STATES, 1930-1956



Great progress has been made in the last quarter of a century in preventing death from TB, less progress in preventing spread of the disease. TB strikes one American approximately every five minutes. ORDINANCE NO. 187
As Amended October 28, 1957
An ordinance requiring a building permit for the construction or alteration of any building within the City of Iowa Park, Texas, where the cost of such alteration or construction exceeds \$25.00; requiring the payment therefor of a permit fee; requiring information concerning the class of construction used and providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas: Section 1. Permit required—No wall, structure, building or part thereof shall hereafter be built, enlarged or altered until a plan of the proposed work together with a statement of the materials to be used shall have been submitted to the building inspector or designated officer of the City of Iowa Park, who shall, in accordance with provisions herein contained, issue a permit for the proposed construction. Before such permit is issued, the builder, his representative, or contractor shall be required to furnish detailed information regarding the name of the owner, proposed location, character of occupancy, kind of materials, plumbing, wiring, roof covering, chimney and flues construction, manner and kind of heat to be used, estimated cost of building, estimated time for completion and the name of the contractor.

On securing this information, it shall be the duty of the building inspector or other authorized agent to issue a building permit upon the payment of \$1.00 by said owner which gives the builder the right to erect said building and the right to place the materials required for said construction upon the streets and alleys adjacent to the lot where said building is to be erected provided that in no event shall such materials be placed in any street or alley so that it will interfere with the traffic over and through said street or alley or endanger the public in passing such building. All other applicable ordinances must be complied with.

Permits are required on all buildings erected within the corporate limits of Iowa Park, Texas, with the exception of buildings where the total cost does not exceed \$25.00.

The building inspector or other designated officer shall be required

to keep a record of all building permits issued in a well-bound volume that shall be available for the inspection of the public.

Structures hereafter erected without permit or not in conformity with this ordinance shall be removed.

No building shall be moved from one location to another within the City limits of Iowa Park, Texas, until a permit has been obtained herefor. A permit shall be issued only in case the construction is in accordance with this ordinance.

A Surveyor's Certificate must be presented to the City Clerk upon an application for a building permit; and anyone starting a structure upon any lot within the City limits of Iowa Park, Texas, without first presenting a surveyor's certificate and having a permit signed by the City Secretary shall be subject to fine.

Section 2. Any person violating this ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.
