Guest Preacher

A former Dallas pastor who has spent the past four years in Belgium and in the Belgian Congo, as a missionary for the Methodist church, will be guest-speaker at the Iowa Park Methodist church on Dec. 8, at 7:30 p.m.

Rev. Harry Tracy Maclin Jr. heads the educational work of the mission in Lodja, Belgian Congo; he is director of the Teacher Training school, of the school for Christian lay workers, and of the boys' boarding departments. He is also district missionary of the Lodja and Lemela districts.

"A tremendous People's Movement has been in progress in the Lodja district since August 1955," Maclin reports. "I left in July 1957 and it was still in progress with thousands of persons coming into the church as beginners.

"Villages everywhere are demanding a preacher. We are limited primarily because of insufficient staff and cannot meet the demand. Our most urgent appeal is to qualified young people, both single ones and couples, to answer the call to mission service."

Maclin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Maclin of Fort Worth. Born in Oklahoma City, he received his education at SMU, Dallas, and the Ecole Coloniale in Brussels, Belgium.

New Building

A major step toward improving Iowa Park's telephone service was announced this week by Gene Brusenhahn, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone company.

Brusenhahn said a contract has been awarded for construction of a new dial telephone building at 111 West Bank street here. Work is scheduled to begin Monday.

The building and installation of new equipment is expected to be complete in late 1958. When this work is finished, Iowa Park customers will be able to dial all Wichita Falls telephones without a long distance charge, Brusenhahn said.

"We call this extended area service," said Brusenhahn. "It simply means that Iowa Park customers will be able to dial Wichita Falls in the same manner they now dial local calls."

This means an additional 35,500 telephones will be within the local calling scope of all Iowa Park telephone users.

When the change is made, all Iowa Park telephone numbers will be changed to the seven-numeral system. Wichita Falls will get its own numbering system on January 15, Brusenhahn said.

Directories listing the new numbers for both cities will be delivered to customers in advance of this change, which is scheduled for late 1958.

"We will notify all Iowa Park customers of the exact date of the change as soon as it has been determined. Also, everyone here will have their new numbers as soon as they can be made available," Brusenhahn promised.

"Extended Area Service will make telephone service in Iowa Park more valuable because customers here can call more people and more can call them," the manager added.

Hawkins and Westbrook of Abilene have the contract for construction of the new steel building.

IPHS to Host Basketball Tourney

The tourney will be run on the consolation plan with the finalists in the winners bracket ranked in first and second position; and the winning team in the consolation bracket rated third.

Wednesday's first game, at 6:30, will pit Burk Burnett against Chillicothe. Valley View and Petrolia will meet at 7:30, and Iowa Park will play Prairie Valley at 8:30.

First game Thursday, 7:30, will finish the first round, with Archer City and Seymour squaring off against each other. Nightcap of the session will be a consolation game with Burk-Chillicothe loser facing Valley View-Petrolia loser.

Starting at 6:30 Friday, a three-game session will be seen. First will be a game between the AC-Seymour loser and the IP-PV loser.

Reflections from the Bible

We express our thanks to all of this community who have encouraged us by accepting our invitation to "Hear Paul McClung." This meeting, we believe, will be recorded as the best in the history of the church of Christ in Iowa Park. All this is true only because you are helping it to be so.

Brother McClung is an eloquent speaker. From the first words uttered your eyes and ears will be upon him and nothing will tear them away.

Monday night his subject was "The Proper Conception of God." He said, "For the most of us we have the wrong conception of God. We picture God as something just like us. If we are white we naturally think of God as being white; if we are black we think of Him as being black also. In other words we try to design God to our own peculiar likes," but he emphasized, "God does not change to our every whim" as "God is a Spirit; and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth" (John 4:24).

Mail Early ...

Postmaster Pete May said this week, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas."

When wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper for extra protection against shock, and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord.

Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped. Make sure all addresses are correct, legible and complete, with full name, street address, city, zone and state.

"Remember these three rules, wrap securely, address correctly and mail early."

Pete also advocated the use of first class postage on Christmas cards. First class postage—a three cent stamp—allows a written message to be included inside. There are other advantages. The post office considers first class mail as preferential mail which is entitled to the fastest handling. Also, a Christmas card with first class postage may be forwarded or returned to the sender.

If an ever flow of mail can be achieved, the public will benefit through better service. Postal patrons can co-operate in these ways: Mail early in the month and early in the day.

The post office windows will be open from 8:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday; 8:30 until 12:00 noon on Saturday.

Mother Dies

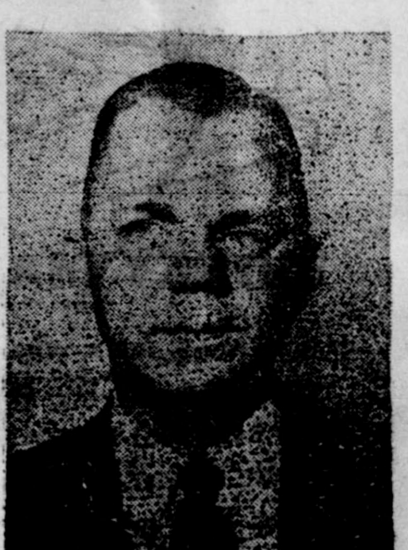
