ORDINANCE NO. 278

Be it ordained by the City Council of Iowa Park, Texas:

1st. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, individual, co-partnership or corporation to engage in the business of installing wires, appliances, apparatus, electrical equipment, electrical signs, and fixtures without first complying with all the provisions of an ordinance passed by the City Council on the 10th day of February, A.D. 1958, No. 277, regulating such aforesaid installations.

2nd. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

3rd. That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication as is required by law.

AN Invitation TO FAITH

"Therefore, being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1).

Paul, the Apostle of Jesus Christ, makes this simple declaration, "We have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." It is good to have peace with God. It is most wonderful to know that this comes by faith. The dictionary says about the word justify, "1. To prove or show to be just; to vindicate. 2. To pronounce free from guilt or blame; to absolve." Justification is a complete act of God. One cannot justify himself; God must justify him. This He has done and will do for all who in penitence for their sins—sick of sin and wanting a new life—will come to God by the High Priest, Jesus Christ.

If one could have been justified by the doing of anything, Paul already had reasons to be justified. Now we know that before he met Jesus on the Damascus road he was justified in the sight of men. But the day he met Jesus face to face he realized he needed to be justified in the sight of God (see Philippians 3:4-11). Paul's teaching came from his experience. His experience produced his teaching. Paul declares through experience, "But God commendeth His love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. Much more then, being now justified by His blood, we shall be saved from wrath through Him . . . and not only so, but we joy in God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have now received the atonement" (Romans 5:8,9,11).

Harriet Coppock directed the practice session for members who will participate in the Lion's club minstrel.

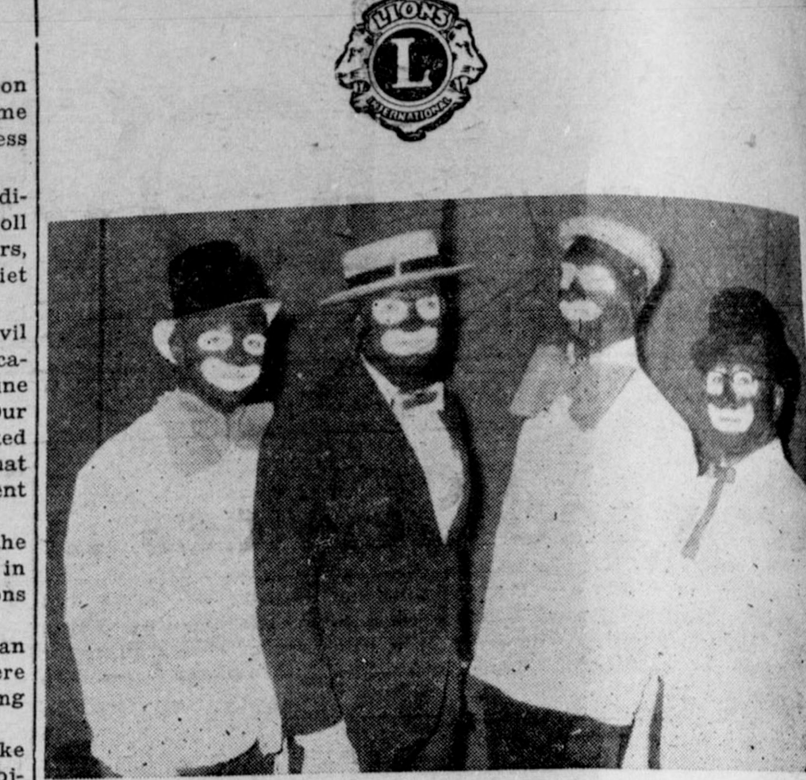

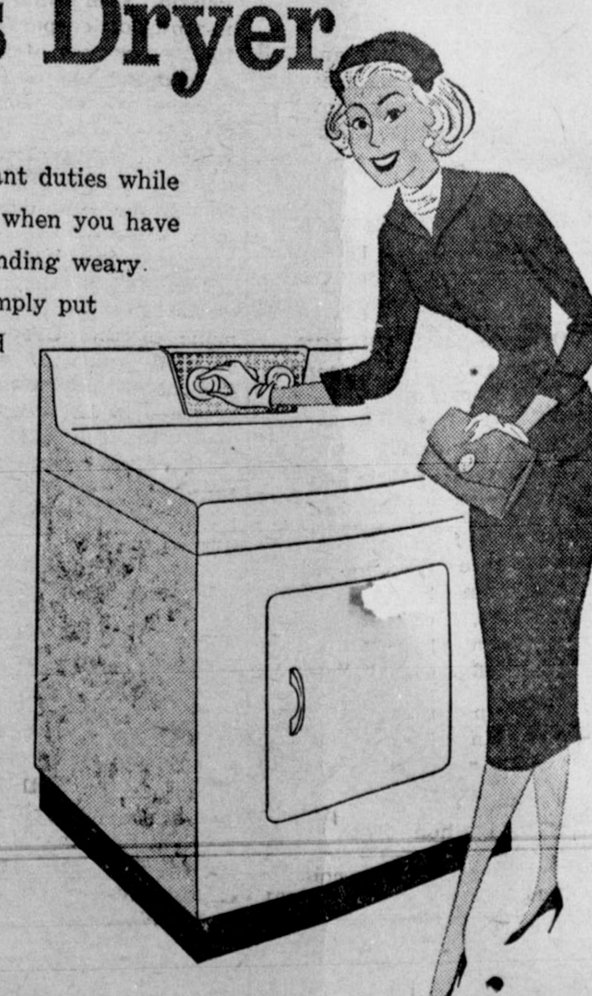

LEPROSY CAN BE HEALED BY PRAYER

God loves people. He wants to be near us. That is why he sent Jesus to speak with us face to face. He came to touch us with his hands and heal us, to bless us and give us his power.

While Jesus was on the earth, he got just as close to the people as he could with his hands, his voice, his robe.

And one thing he made clear while he was here was this: There is no distance in prayer.

Jesus' hands laid upon the sick were powerful to heal. But his spoken word was just as powerful as the touch of his hands. He could heal in person and he could heal at a distance.

There is one thing, however, that needs to be made crystal clear. The miracles and healing powers of Jesus are not confined to the time when he was here on earth in bodily form. His words and his promises are just as powerful now as they were then.

Not long ago, I received a letter from one of my partners telling me a most unusual story about a modern-day leper. Here is a portion of her letter:

"Less than a year ago, a young man in a leper colony in the Philippines saw my name in the ABUNDANT LIFE magazine and wrote to me. He told me he was a leper and had been banished to the Island of Palawan for the rest of his life. He asked only for letters and reading material. I sent him a subscription to the magazine and a New Testament.

"Justiniana, the leper, has a wife and two little girls who also have been recently admitted to the hospital in Palawan. But Justiniana began to read the magazine and the New Testament to his wife and two daughters. The two little girls were very ill. Their bodies were showing the crippling effects of leprosy. Their limbs were stiff and awkward, and death was only a matter of time. As he read daily to them, their faith in the healing power of Jesus was kindled.

"Time passed. Their prayers became more assured. They believed God. They believed that he would heal them. Later he wrote to me and asked that I, in turn, write you and ask for your prayers.

"And now for the glorious news: Justiniana and his wife, Adelaide, have not only received healing for their bodies, but they are sure that Christ lives in their souls.

"Justiniana and his family have been undergoing tests to prove that they are healed of the deadly leprosy. And every test has proved negative.

There are many other instances where faith has spanned the distance. People have believed in the power of Jesus Christ of Nazareth for salvation and healing.

There is no distance in prayer. Faith bridges the distance and brings near the things that are far away. God, who is everywhere, does the healing. The thing that counts is our believing.

Kite Flying Can Be Dangerous

Texas Electric Service company appealed this week to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires.

"The windy season brings kite flying time and this traditional sport is one that is lots of fun for children if it is done safely," Wayne House, TESCO manager, pointed out. "Many youngsters do not realize the dangers in this innocent pastime if certain safety practices are not observed, the most important of which is never to fly kites where there is possibility of their getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite flying include using metallic cord or wire for the kite string, making the frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve a kite in case it does get caught in electric wire, Wayne stated.

If your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service company. We will send someone to get it down for you.

"Lol youngsters have been cooperative in the past and we've had no serious mishaps in several years, but each year, over the nation, there are many cases of injuries to kite flyers," Mr. House said. "If kites are made right and flown right, kite flying is an enjoyable, wholesome sport."
