Park Girl's Husband, Lt. Maurice W. Price, Dies in New York

Lt. Maurice W. Price, 31, husband of the former Miss Virginia Boyd, died Wednesday, Sept. 10, at Kings Point, Long Island, N.Y., at St. Alben's Naval hospital.

He was aide to the superintendent of the United States Merchant Marine academy of King Point.

Lt. Price entered the merchant marine cadet corps in Nov. 1942 and on Dec. 7, 1942, his ship, SS Henry Knox, loaded with ammunition, was torpedoed in the Indian ocean by an enemy submarine. He suffered serious injuries and burns. After 11 days the lifeboat reached the Maldive Islands but no medical service was available.

After two weeks there, the survivors proceeded to Colombo, Ceylon on a native sailboat where Lt. Price received medical attention at the Colombo general hospital. After 1 1/2 months he was transported to the Marine hospital in San Francisco. After a sick leave he was assigned to SS Edward MacDowell.

Jan. 7, 1944, he entered the academy at Kings Point and Sept. 15 was awarded a diploma and certified for license as third mate.

Military services were held for Lt. Price in Kings Point and in New York at Tulsa, Okla.

He is survived by the widow, a daughter, and his father, Senator Price of Oklahoma.

Driving by a farm near Wichita Falls the other day, T. H. Eckelkamp, president of the Wichita County Farm Bureau, saw three tractors in operation, a sight not unusual in this county. "It put me to calculating," Eckelkamp said.

"According to the 1950 census, there are 910 farm tractors in this county. Every legislative session for the past 12 years at least, the Farm Bureau has waged a fight in Austin to save the tractor gas tax refund for the farmers. Figuring conservatively, if the farmers had to pay this four-cent road tax on gasoline burned in tractors not used on the highways, it would cost them about \$40 per tractor per year. With 910 tractors in Wichita county, this means that the Farm Bureau (which is primarily the only organization or group that puts up a scrap on this issue) saves county farmers \$36,400 every year.

"That's a goodly sum that can well be used in meeting other farm operation expenses," Eckelkamp said. He summed the situation up this way:

"Farm Bureau dues in this county are \$10 a year. Say an operator has only one tractor. He can pay him dues and have \$30 left on what Farm Bureau dues him on this one issue."

George F. Hill 78, Dies in Wichita Falls After Short Illness

George F. Hill, 78, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Sunday night, Sept. 21, after undergoing surgery two weeks ago.

Mr. Hill was born Jan. 24, 1874 near Nashville, Ark. When he was 17 years of age he came to Texas and settled in Lamar county near Paris.

Mr. Hill was city marshal and peace officer there for about 20 years.

On Oct. 15, 1893, he was married to Miss Maggie Jackson in Blossom.

The Hill family moved to Iowa Park in 1919 where Mr. Hill entered the real estate business. Mrs. Hill preceded him in death Dec. 11, 1946. They had observed their golden wedding anniversary two months before.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon in the Baptist church with Rev. James N. Easterwood officiating. Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

Six grandsons acted as pallbearers. They were Don Hill, Richard Hill, Howard Hill, Kenneth Hill, Wesley Davis, Milton Brubaker.

Mr. Hill is survived by two daughters: Mrs. Bill Brubaker and Mrs. Earl Davis, both of Iowa Park; three sons: Dalton of Clarksville, L. C. and Clarence of Iowa Park; 12 grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren, 2 half-brothers and 3 half sisters.

BLUEBONNET SEEDS ARE HERE

Bluebonnet seeds have been received at the C of C office and persons who ordered them may call at their early convenience for them.

Best results, Alfred Lang says, are obtained in sowing the seed on top of the ground and scratching the ground gently with a rake. The ground must be kept watered until the plants get a good start. They can look after themselves after that.

Lang reminds us to plant the seeds where they will not need to be moved—preferably in a special bed or along the edge of the lawn. After they bloom and go to seed, gather the yellow pods and replant.

Lang stresses the importance of keeping the ground wet until the seeds sprout and get a good start. Unless this is done, you cannot hope for success, he says.

Scoring in every quarter, the Iowa Park Hawks picked up their first victory of the young season by defeating the Valley View Warriors, 34 to 0, last Friday evening. The Warriors were completely outclassed by a vicious, hard charging Hawk line headed by Jackie Sampson and Jimmie Martin.

Iowa Park's first score came late in the first period after the recovery of a VV fumble. Lee hit paydirt on a handoff from Weiss from the 7 yard line. James Williams carried the extra point over.

Larry Lee set up Iowa Park's second touchdown with a beautiful 28 yard run off his own left tackle, finally being stopped on the 7. Williams carried to the 4 and then Lee scored on the next play. Mickey Sewell kicked the extra point.

Early in the third quarter the charges of Coaches Averitt and Corbett marched to a third touchdown. Lee, Klunkerman and Spradlin did most of the gaining. A pass from Weiss to Spradlin was later ended to Lee, who carried over standing up. On the extra point try Sewell passed to Weiss.

Later that period Williams fell on a fumble on the Warrior 37. In five plays the Hawks had their fourth TD. An end run by Weiss for 19 and a 12 yard scamper by Lee put the ball in position for Weiss to sneak over. Again Sewell's pass to Weiss was good.

In the fourth quarter Jean Paul Moore blocked a Valley View punt and recovered the ball on the 2. James Williams took the handoff from Sewell and scored. Sewell's kick was short, ending the scoring for the game. Final 34-0.

Outstanding players for Coach Sutherland were Ed McDonald, tackle and Lee Belsch, guard.

There are three types of membership available to men who want to see Hawk football improve. An active membership consists of at-

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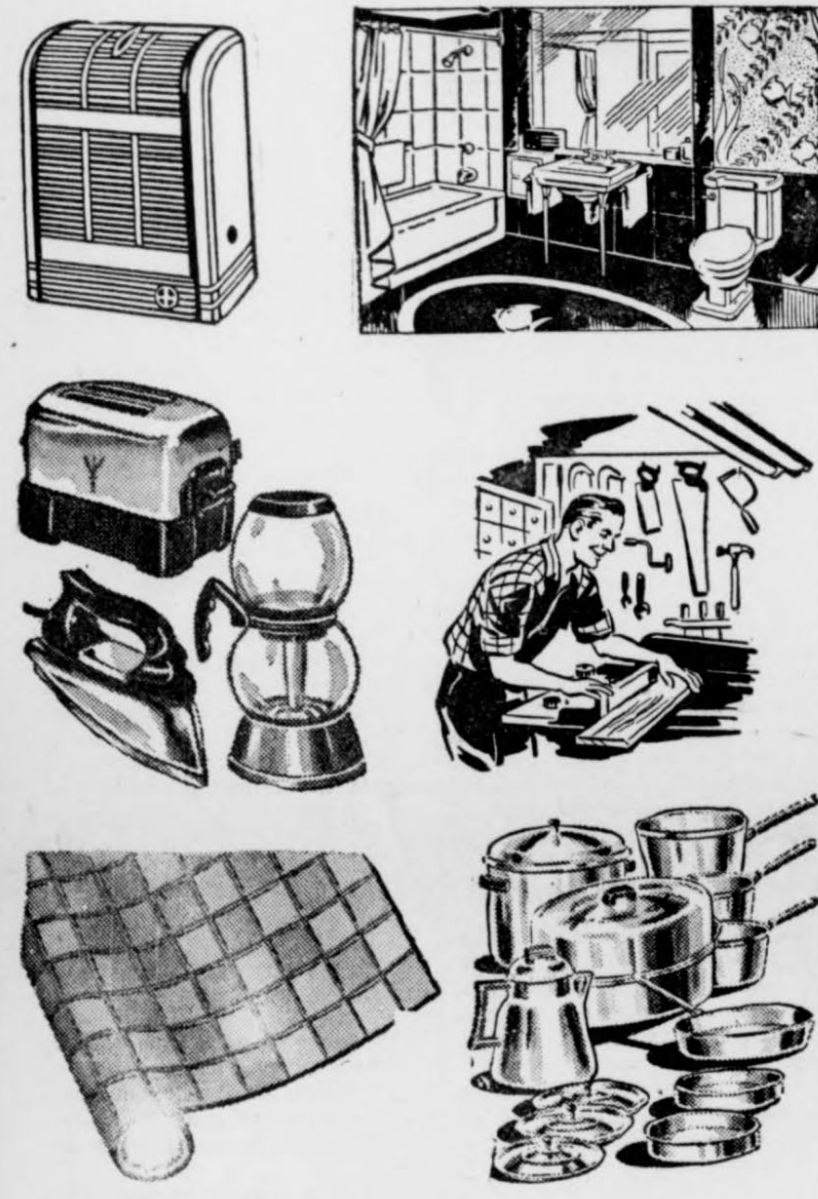

Another species of American wildlife, the tiny Key Deer, are well on the way to extinction. Over a year ago a census revealed less than 100 of the little creatures which once roamed all the Southeast and the Florida Keys. Conservation groups and sportswriters became alarmed, too late seemingly, and started a movement to set aside the area they now inhabit as a national refuge.

For some time the bill dragged through Congress and when it appeared as though it would pass, the people of the locality to be set aside objected because the county would lose the tax revenue from the area. Amendments were offered to compensate the county for the loss, but before the debate ended, Congress adjourned. It is not likely that another Congress will meet in time to pass legislation to save this last herd of the smallest deer in the world.

Loss of tax revenue to local governments due to federal ownership of great areas of their lands is an ever constant fight in Congress. It has hampered development of many refuge areas and many proposals have been made to reimburse states and counties, though few have succeeded.

Latest advice to gunners from the various gun manufacturers is to keep both eyes open while aiming. One bulletin says this is something new in gunning. Shucks, Great-granddad said he always did — used one eye to aim the gun and kept the other open to look for injuns!

The Trumpeter Swan is on the comeback: 1935 found the rare swan's population down to 73, but quick action set aside nesting area and the population has now risen to 555 birds, mostly around Yellowstone National Park.

It is against the federal law to tease, touch, feed or in any way molest any of the big game animals in national parks. The law was made for the protection of the public, not the animals.

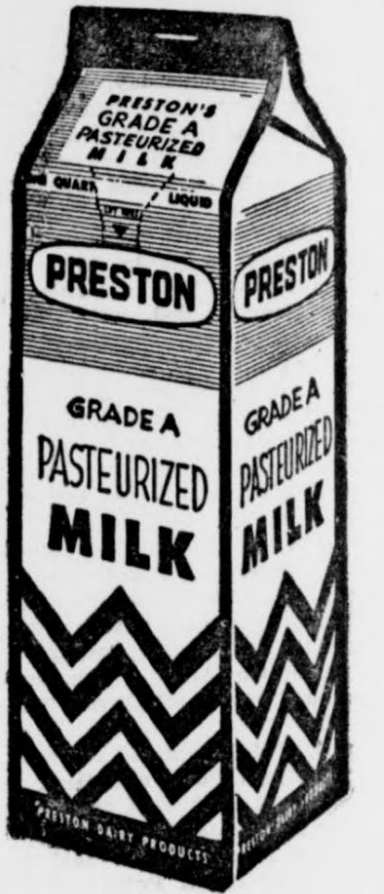

The Texas-Oklahoma Fair is becoming larger each year. Now in its 24th showing, the fair started in a small tin building on West Park with a few exhibits on tables.

The late C. C. Hudson, editor of the Herald and known as Irrigated Ike, was instrumental in starting the project. For several years it was known as Wichita County Free Fair and was sponsored by the merchants and the Chamber of Commerce here.

Our fair has continued its growth until now it is well known as the Texas-Oklahoma Fair with publicity over the nation. It covers 12 acres of land and has ample parking space off the grounds.

Nationally known judges are secured for most divisions. The finest horses, cattle, products and arts are shown.

Last year and this the official opening has been in the form of an all-church worship service held in the large air-conditioned main auditorium on Sunday evening. All preparations are stopped during the hour.

Rev. Kenneth L. Teegarden, pastor of Central Christian church of Vernon, was guest speaker for the service last Sunday. The Iowa Park band, under direction of C. L. Vaughn, gave a 30 minute concert preceding the service.

The procession of the flags by Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts of this area was a sight of beauty and impressiveness.

Music of the service was enjoyed by all, being furnished by the Nona Men's choir and by David Gish, vocalist of Frederick, Okla., accompanied by Mrs. Oscar E. Lochridge of Iowa Park.

The welcome to worship was given by Dr. Gordon G. Clark, president of the Fair. Several Iowa Park ministers took part in the worship period.

This is the first year the Fair gates have been opened at 9:00 Monday morning with all exhibits on display. Heretofore it has been at 5 p.m. with an official ceremony.

Tuesday, Pioneer Day, the big day of day for all area oldtimers. This traditional celebration held each year, is a time for people to meet people they haven't seen in years.

In fact they wonder if they look as old as the one they are talking to. But all they need is a mirror. These pioneers come from near and far. Some have been gone for a long time, while others have moved recently, but they all come back if possible, all 2000 or more.

The ones who traveled the longest distance were Mrs. Maude Scofield of Newport, Minn., and Dr. Maude Lindsey Campbell of Chicago, Ill.

Mrs. Scofield was born in Wichita Falls in 1904, daughter of Mrs. W. A. (Lillian) Soule, who settled in Wichita Falls 60 years ago.

Dr. Campbell is a long time resident of Iowa Park. She and her husband F. M. Campbell are visiting her parents Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Lindsey, her sister Mrs. John B. Barbour and other relatives.

Dr. Campbell does general practice in the Jackson Park hospital in Chicago and in Cook County hospital clinic as a volunteer worker. She is secretary of the local chapter Academy of General Practitioners in Chicago. She received the medical degree from Washington University in St. Louis, Mo., and served internship in the Children's hospital in San Francisco and later in the Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minn. She practiced in Wichita Falls from 1928 to 1936. Mrs. Campbell is a former faculty member of the Iowa Park school. She taught here in 1915, 1916 and 1917 in the first, fourth and fifth grades.

Mrs. Mary Ann Garvey of Archer City, who is 97, was the oldest person attending Pioneer Day celebration. Maft Banta of Electra formerly of Beaver Creek community, was the longest time resident. He has been in this area since 1877. Coming here from Missouri with the family when he was four years old. His parents were J. H. and Nannie Banta and his father was Wichita county's first tax assessor.

Mr. and Mrs. Banta moved into Electra seven years ago, but otherwise Mr. Banta had lived on the same place since coming to this county. He has occupied himself with farming and ranching.

Highlight of the program for the last three years has been the announcement of the Pioneer Queen. Mrs. Margaret Neal, 92, from Altus was crowned queen of the day. Her parents owned the land which is now the city of Altus. She is widow of the late Sam B. Neal who was presented an engraved cup by Gen. Sam Houston when he was named for that famous man. Mrs. Neal's father in law fought with Houston's army.

After the ceremony, in which the queen received many beautiful gifts, D. A. Huley, a well known Dallas industrialist, chairman of the board of the US chamber of commerce and president of Lone Star Gas co., was the keynote speaker.

Pioneers who have lived in a

radius of 100 miles of Iowa Park for 40 years were served a noon meal for the 15th consecutive year by the Electra Chuck Wagon Gang. Oral Jones of Wichita Falls has been chairman of Pioneer Day for three years. Serving on the committee from Iowa Park are Mrs. Mae Tanner and W. F. George.

Jim Robinson of Wichita Falls has served for years on the transportation committee.

Mrs. Neal is the third queen to reign over the Texas-Oklahoma Fair Pioneer Day celebration. Mrs. Doan of Vernon was the first and Mrs. Mae Tanner of Iowa Park was second queen.

Runners-up for queen honors this year were Mrs. Abbey Cooper of Electra, Mrs. Katie Douthitt of Henrietta and Miss Robbie Castleberry of Vernon.

The Old Fiddler's Contest is always interesting. L. M. Mosier of Wichita Falls won by a large ovation from the audience. Five others competed, including Joseph Lindsey of Iowa Park, who will be 85 years old next month. Mr. Lindsey is a two time winner of the yearly contest.

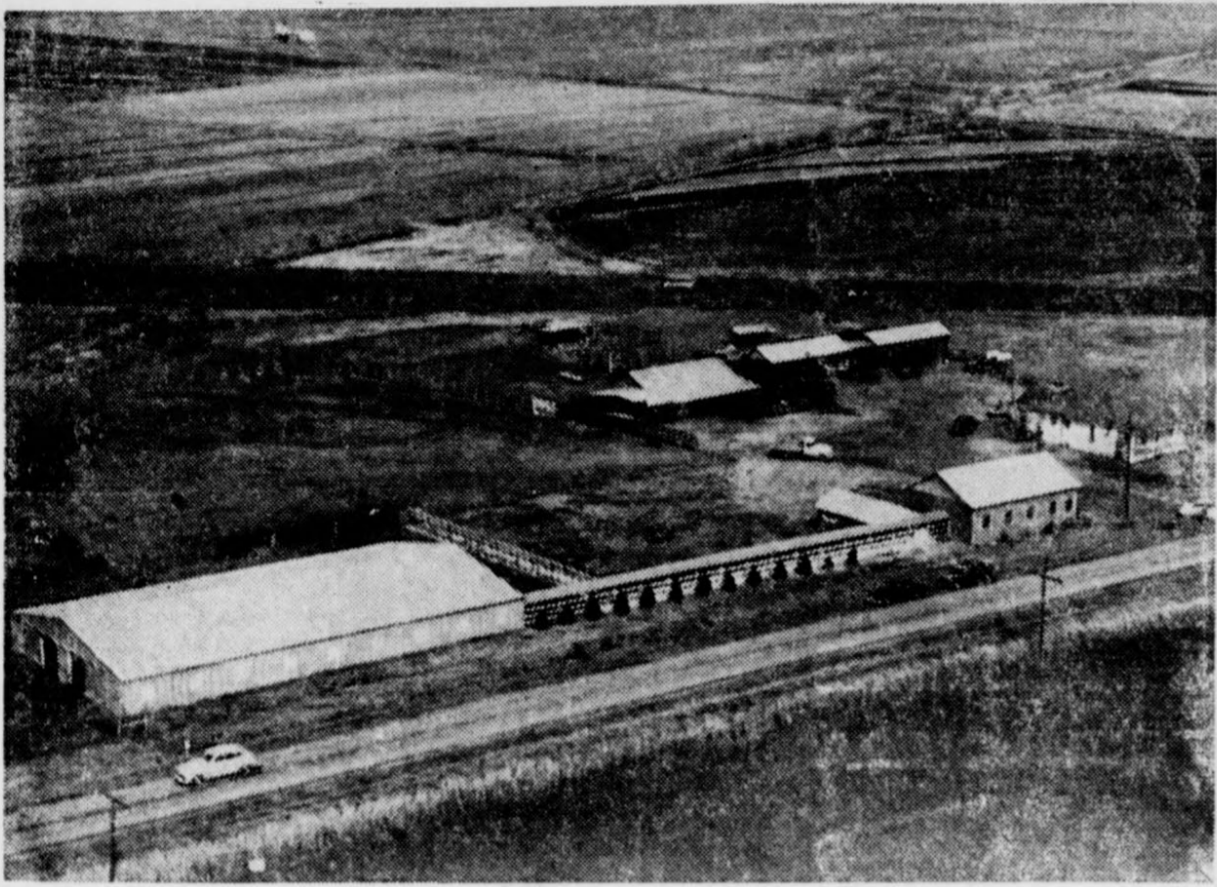
