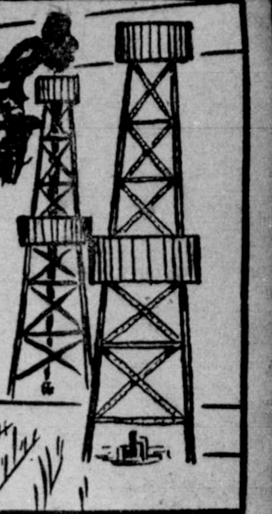

AN INVITATION TO FAITH

"For Christ sent me not to baptize, but to preach the gospel; not with wisdom of words, lest the cross of Christ should be made of none effect" (1 Cor. 1:17).

Your eternal life is adjudicated by this cross of Christ. God was in Christ on this cross, reconciling the world unto himself. He stands at the center of history. Men must look upon Him who is God's Redeemer of Men. "Search the Scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life; and there are they which testify of me. And ye will not come unto me that ye might have life" (John 5:39-40).

If you will read the Word, the Word will find you. And He will save you from your sin. You who are burdened with guilt, and powerless against sin, receive the Invitation to Faith in Jesus Christ, the Son of God. There is forgiveness for the repentant sinner at the cross.

February Was Drier, Colder Than Normal

Virgil Woodfin reported this week that February was drier and colder than usual.

During February, 0.85 inch of moisture was measured at the Experiment Station. Of this .72 inch was sleet and snow. The February average precipitation is 1.60 inches.

Average maximum temperature for the month was 52.9 degrees. This is 8.8 degrees below normal. Average minimum temperature was 32.6 degrees. This is 2.3 degrees below the average. Average temperature for the month was 42.7 degrees. This is 5.6 degrees below normal.

Highest temperature for February was 75 degrees on the 4th and 5th. The mercury slid to 6 degrees on the 10th for the lowest temperature reading.

February had 9 clear, 4 partly cloudy and 15 cloudy days. Fourteen days had temperature readings of 32 degrees or colder.

February also produced strange air pressures. The barometer was down to 28.70 inches on one occasion. And the result was wind. There were 207 miles of wind in one February day.

UCW Historian

Mrs. Gordon G. Clark was elected historian of the United Church Women of Texas at the 24th annual assembly held in Amarillo Feb. 25-27.

Mrs. Clark and Mrs. T. R. Horne, president of the Iowa Park UCW, attended the assembly.

Iowa Park's Dog Ordinance

The State of Texas, County of Wichita, City of Iowa Park.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 143
(As amended September 10, 1956)
Be it ordained by the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

Section 1. That it is hereby levied and assessed upon each dog, male and female, kept or owned within the City of Iowa Park, Texas, an annual tax of One and No/100 (\$1.00) on each male dog and Two and No/100 (\$2.00) on each female dog, the tax is to be due and payable on the first day of January of each year, and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or keeper of any dog, male or female to pay over to the Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent, the said tax on or before the first day of January of each year.

Section 2. The Chief of Police shall collect or have collected under his supervision all dog taxes, and he may employ a special officer to be known and designated as "Dog Catcher" whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of this Ordinance and the Chief of Police shall be authorized to pay unto the Dog Catcher a commission on all dogs impounded, not to exceed \$1.00 per head. The Chief of Police shall be responsible to the City of Iowa Park for all money collected under this Ordinance, and shall make monthly reports in writing of all money collected under this Ordinance to the City Council, and shall pay over to the City Clerk for deposit with the City Treasurer all money so collected, at least once a month.

Section 3. Upon the payment of said tax, the Chief of Police or his authorized agent shall furnish the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs with a tag on which is stamped the number of registration with the year on which tax is paid, which the owner or keeper shall attach to a collar, securely fastened around the neck of such dog, male or female, and while the tag is attached to the collar around the neck of said dog, the dog may run at large in the city, provided said dog shall also, while running at large be securely muzzled by its owner or keeper so as to prevent it from being able to bite anyone. But, in no event shall the Chief of Police or his authorized agent, issue a license tag to any owner or keeper of a dog, male or female, unless and until such owner or keeper shall furnish a vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian, stating that such dog or dogs have been vaccinated against rabies by him.

Section 4. All dogs within the City of Iowa Park, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by some licensed Veterinarian on or before April 1st, 1928, and each year thereafter, and it is further provided herein that every Veterinarian who vaccinates any such dog, either male or female within the City of Iowa Park, Texas, shall collect his fee for same from the owner of the dog and shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, stating the name of a owner, a brief description of the dog, the date of vaccination and the fee collected by him for same; provided, however, that the fee charged by such Veterinarian for

such vaccination, including furnishing the vaccine material, and issuing such vaccination certificate, shall not in any case exceed the sum of Two and 50/100. Whenever any person has complied with the provisions of the preceding sections, and the said dog tag is lost or otherwise destroyed, it shall be the duty of said owner or keeper of said dog to procure another tag from the Chief of Police, by paying the value of said tag and all costs that may have accrued, as hereafter provided.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police or his authorized agent to capture and impound in a pen, to be provided by the City Council of said City, for that purpose and called the "Dog Pound," any dog, male or female found running at large within the City of Iowa Park, Texas, without a tag and muzzle, as provided for under the terms of this Ordinance, and if such dog, male or female is not redeemed and reclaimed and taken from said pound within the time required under the provisions of this Ordinance then the Chief of Police shall advertise said dog for sale twenty-four hours, by posting one notice of said sale at the door of the City Hall, which notice shall give the time and place of sale, and shall if not redeemed sell said dog, male or female, at public auction, and if no one shall bid upon the same, the amount of charges due on said dog, the said dog shall be bought by the City at once and killed by the Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent.

Section 6 (A). The provisions of this ordinance Sections 1 to 5 inclusive shall not apply to any animal of the dog kind, which is not over six months of age, nor to any animal of the dog kind, which is at all times kept securely tied with a good strong collar and rope, chain, strap or leash of sufficient strength to hold such dog upon the premises of the owner or person in charge of such dog, nor to any animal of the dog kind which is kept in a house, box, pen, or enclosure upon the private premises of the owner or person in charge of such dog, and which is at no time allowed to run free or go upon the premises of other persons or upon the streets or other public places, except as said dog may be led by leash and under the complete control of the owner or person in charge of such dog.

Section 6 (a). The owner and keeper of any dog or dogs, captured or impounded, under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be permitted and allowed at any time within forty-eight hours, as such dog or dogs shall have been impounded to redeem, reclaim and again receive possession of said dog or dogs upon payment to the Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent, the sum of one dollar per day or fractional part thereof, during which time said dog or dogs may have been impounded, and \$3.00 redemption fee to redeem such dog, which sum so paid to him shall be by the Chief of Police be paid over to the City Clerk for deposit with the Treasurer for the use and benefit of the City, as well as all other money received by him

under the terms of this Ordinance. A sum of One Dollar shall, in addition thereto be paid to the Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent to recapture and impound said dog, provided, however, that the City shall in no case be held responsible for any part of the fee or any commission mentioned herein to be paid to the Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent.

Section 6 (b). Should the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs, male or female, fail to redeem the same as provided for in paragraph (a) of this section, within the forty-eight hours, then said dog or dogs shall be advertised and sold or killed in the manner provided for in this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police and duly authorized "Dog Catcher" to see that the terms of this Ordinance are strictly enforced, provided, however, that the terms of this Ordinance shall not be applicable to dogs following countrymen into the City.

Section 7. The Chief of Police and any policeman of this City shall have the right to shoot or kill any rabid dog or any dog on the streets, which shall manifest a disposition to bite.

Section 8. That any person who shall willfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Ten Dollars.

Section 9. It shall be unlawful for the owner of, or any person having the custody of any vicious dog to permit the same at any time to run at large within the corporate limits of Iowa Park.

Section 10. It shall be unlawful for the owner of, or any person having the custody of any bitch in heat, to allow the same to run at large in the City. In addition to the penalty to be imposed upon such owner or person, any policeman may kill such bitch found at large.

Section 11. Any person who shall harbor or keep on his premises or in and about his premises under his control, any dog or animal of the dog kind, which, by loud or unusual barking or howling, causes the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or the occupants of the adjacent premises to be disturbed, or reasonably calculated to disturb the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and each and every twenty-four hours that said dog shall remain or be kept on any premises shall constitute a separate offense. Before a person shall be deemed guilty of violating any provision of this section, he shall first be given twenty-four hours notice that said dog is disturbing the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or the occupants of the adjacent premises, or is reasonably calculated to disturb the same.

Section 12. Any person violating any of the terms and provisions of the preceding sections of this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined any sum not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Section 13. All Ordinances in conflict are hereby repealed and this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and operation from and after the publication hereof as required by law.

At the last meeting, Iowa Park FFA chapter voted to sponsor a campaign to control rabies here. Deryl James reported that 20 persons are now taking anti-rabies shots in Wichita Falls.

The boys discussed the fact that owners who let their dogs run free without vaccination are making it difficult for those who comply with the law.

Saturday, March 15, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon Dr. Raymond Hander will be available to vaccinate dogs. He will be at the vocational agriculture building. Fee for this service is \$2 per animal.

Any person who does not have transportation to bring his dog to be vaccinated may call 4811 between 8:00 and 12:00, March 15 and members of the transportation committee will pick up the dogs and owners.

FFA members invite all organizations to participate, urging all dog owners to have dogs vaccinated. Money and time spent in this way might save the life of an innocent child.

Reflections from the Bible

The International Sunday School lesson for this Lord's day: "The Church's Influence on Society." The church of Jesus Christ has many duties toward those of the world but its chief one is to proclaim the gospel of Christ wherein man finds salvation for his only eternal possession. Paul says, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek" (Rom. 1:16).

There is but one true Gospel (Gal. 1:6-9), yet there are many perversions of the Gospel (v. 7). Some teach that "Faith only" will save, others teach that one must "repent" before he believes while others teach salvation by "prayer." Man cannot be saved by accepting the denominational theory of the Gospel (Mk. 7:7).

The Gospel decrees that man: 1. Believe (1 John 3:23; John 8:24) this is faith in action. In other words doing what God says. Where there is no act of faith, there is no saving faith (James 2:26) (Rom. 10:17). 2. Next step is 77: Repent (Acts 17:30; Lk. 13:3). 3. Be Baptized (Acts 2:38; 10:48). 4. Add to the faith (I Pet. 1:5-10).

Man may possess a great knowledge of the Word, he may claim to have a great faith and still be lost. The Gospel must be obeyed: "For the time is come that judgment must begin at the house of God; and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God?" (I Pet. 4:17). adv

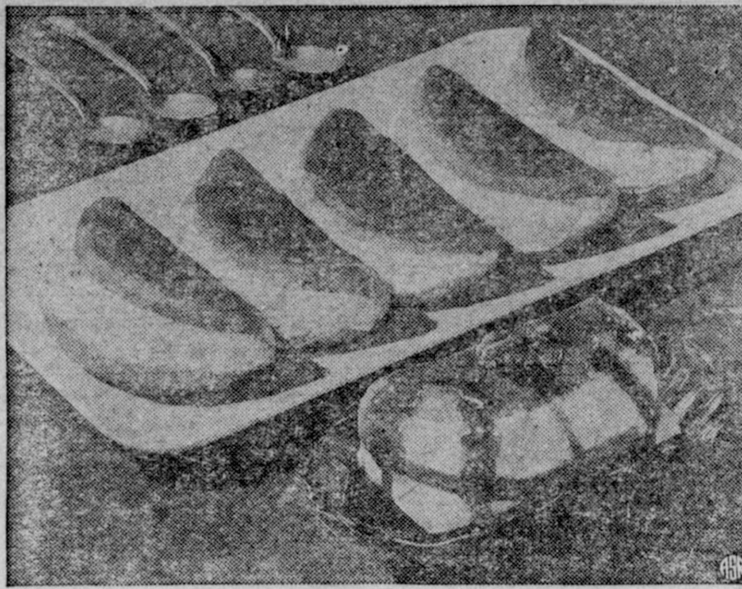

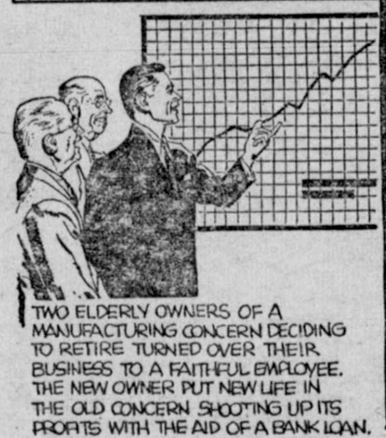

School News

As a part of Public School Week, a financial report to the general public concerning Iowa Park Independent School District should be rather interesting.

This school district has an assessed valuation of \$4,462,970. Of this amount we could expect a total tax collection of approximately \$80,000. Of this amount \$20,000 would be set aside by law into a Sinking and Interest Fund for retirement of bonds and interest.

The district has an outstanding indebtedness of \$182,500: from the 1949 issue \$42,500 and from the 1955 issue \$140,000. The 1955 issue was sold to finance the gymnasium and band hall. The gymnasium cost this school district approximately \$130,000; and the band hall cost approximately \$35,000. The cost of the site and architect fees and other expenses involved in building a building amounted to approximately \$10,000. The people voted for \$225,000 in bonds in 1955. The school district is still holding \$65,000 in bonds that have not been sold. These bonds will be sold to build a permanent school structure at an early date, as soon as the need has been proved.

From local tax money, after the bond money has been deducted, the school district has approximately \$60,000 left with which to operate the school. Of this amount \$22,062 must be set aside as the local district's economic index to guarantee payment of teachers' salaries. The state sets the number of teachers a school can have by the average daily attendance of each school child. We get one teacher for every 25 pupils on ADA. We are at present earning 31 teaching units. Our total cost of teacher instruction is \$157,052.76.

In addition to this amount, the state allocates us \$10,150 per year to operate five school buses. From this amount, bus driver salaries and cost of maintenance of equipment and purchase of new equipment must be paid. This money may not be spent for any other purpose than transportation. We have been able to this date to make needed replacements of the buses without supplementary aid from local tax money.

Subtract the economic index from the balance of local tax money, and that leaves approximately \$38,000. From this must be paid such things as: Utilities (for a year they run approximately \$5,497), janitorial salaries, clerical salaries, all maintenance and repair, all teaching supplies, all library books (\$1,000 has been set aside for books this year), any salaries that are paid above the salary schedule as set aside by the state (this district pays \$100 above salary schedule and this costs \$3600), all new equipment and replacement of old (such as typewriters, sewing machines, refrigerators, etc.), costs of elections, awards made to the band, and all supplementary salaries, namely: coaches, band director, and administrative personnel. Also, any temporary classrooms must come out of this fund.

The school board in August employed the firm of John B. Allred to audit all school books which included: Transportation Fund, Local Tax Fund, School Athletic Fund; all state funds, and all federal funds. After the audit, Mr. Allred wrote, "Your records are in good condition and well kept." He certified as follows: "This is to certify that we have audited the books and records of the Iowa Park Independent School District for the year ended August 31, 1957, and that the exhibits and schedules attached hereto are true and correct, according to the best of our knowledge and belief, and that they were prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting practice and procedure and present fairly the condition of the records at that time."

We also receive each year some federal aid on Sheppard Air Force Base personnel students.

The public would be cordially invited to inspect the school books at any time or to ask any questions concerning the financial status of this school district.

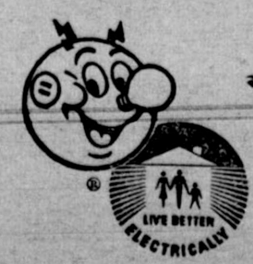

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Van Horn Visits Washington, To Discuss Farmers' Problems

Mrs. John Tidwell was involved in a two-car accident in Wichita Falls, Monday afternoon. She had three ribs broken and was bruised around the head and body. She was released from the hospital after treatment. Her automobile is described as a total loss.

Jim Van Horn of Iowa Park returned March 2 from Washington, D.C., where he discussed farm legislation with congressmen from this area and visited other government offices.

Making the same trip were about 100 other members of the Farmers Union from Arkansas, Illinois, North Dakota and Texas, who were part of a series of such delegations going to the nation's capital this winter.

Van Horn reports his week's stay in Washington was highlighted by hearings on farm proposals before congressional committees and by the administration's strong appeal for continuation of military and economic foreign aid, along with a renewal of trade agreement authority, and by President Eisenhower's strong defense of Secretary Benson against congressional criticism.

Agriculture committees of both the Senate and House heard the witnesses' proposal to deal with the wheat and dairy situation. Spokesmen for the Farmers Union endorsed proposals to prevent the announced cut in dairy price supports scheduled for April 1, and to raise the wheat support back up to \$2 a bushel from the figure of \$1.78 previously announced. The Farmers Union representatives also urged congress to extend and expand the school milk program; to continue availability of milk and dairy products for the armed forces; and to extend the Brucellosis program for dairy cattle.

At mid-week during the delegation's visit to the capital, Eisenhower rejected demands by several midwest Republican congressmen that Benson be asked to resign. The president praised Benson as a dedicated man of courage and personal honesty. "We should say to ourselves," he declared, "we just don't believe that America has come to the point where it wants to dispense with the services of that kind of person."

In talking with congressmen, members of the three state delegation also urged action on the feed grain and livestock problem, but stressed the importance of

handling it within a comprehensive program to give farmers more bargaining power to obtain full parity income from all enterprises.

Delegation members voiced opposition to attempts to increase the borrowing cost of rural electric co-operatives and to current federal policies which are delaying desirable hydro-electric and atomic power developments. The members recommended extension of the export assistance act (Public Law 480) for five years with increased appropriations, and extension of the National Wool Act for 4 years.

In a visit to the USDA, delegation members heard talks by officials dealing with the current agriculture situation. One report disclosed that the farmers' investment for each dollar of income is far higher than for most workers in non-farm jobs. At the Department of State, delegation members were briefed on recent world economic and political developments.

Van Horn says his visit to Washington impressed him with the value of strong organizations to keep congress and administrative officials of farmers' difficulties. He reports that most of the people in official Washington showed keen interest in viewpoints brought directly from the country by such means as the Farmers Union trips.

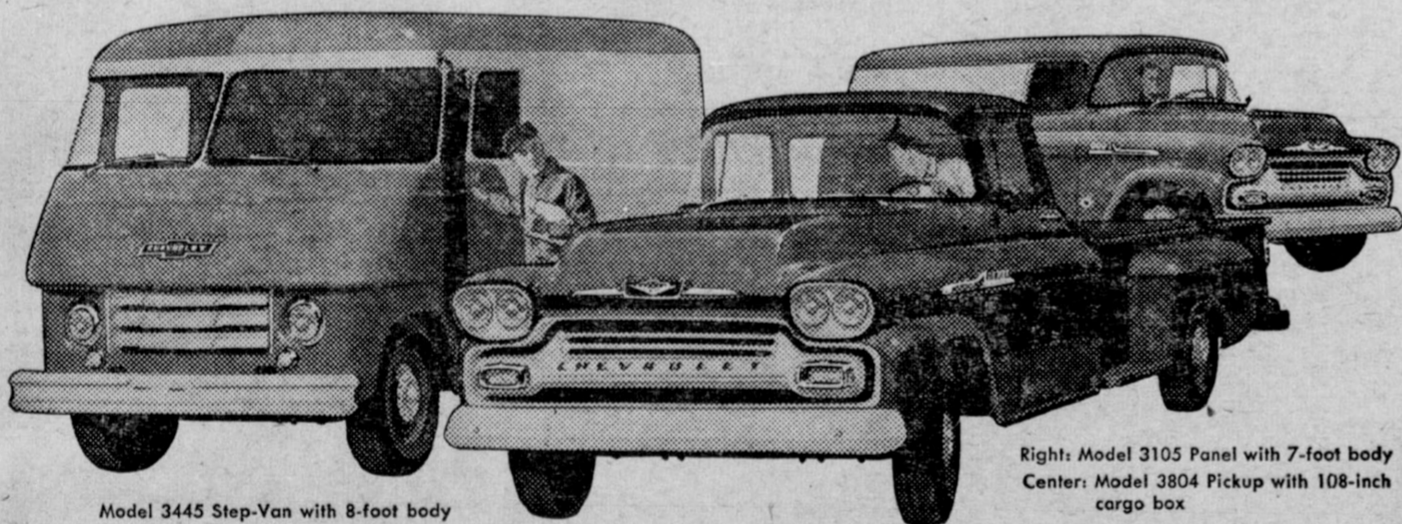

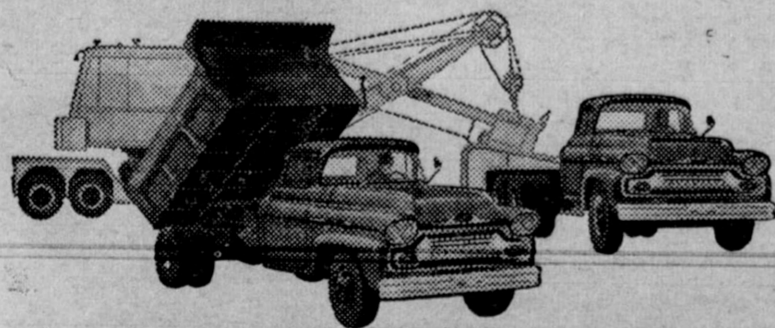

IT HAPPENED TO AN EPILEPTIC

One evening the Lord and his disciples took a little trip on the Sea of Galilee. A sudden storm swept down upon them. Soon the timbers of the boat were popping and the disciples were wild with fear. They rushed to where Jesus was asleep and awoke him. When he awoke, he commanded the winds and waters, saying, "Peace, be still!" And the storm ceased.

People today still call upon him for help in the storms of their lives. And they find that he still has power to speak peace.

Vep E., a minister, had "come to the end of his row." He said: "About eleven years ago I was sitting alone in my church, playing the organ. At that time I was assistant pastor of that church and director of the morning broadcast. I had been working rather hard at my job. Perhaps the pressure of my work was largely responsible for what happened that day.

"As I sat at the console of the organ, suddenly I was almost overcome with a great weakness in my body. My strength seemingly oozed out of me and I began to tremble from head to foot. I had an overwhelming urge to weep. I staggered out of the church, got in my car and managed to get home. These symptoms didn't leave me; in fact, they grew worse. A severe pain stabbed at the base of my skull, and I experienced an uncontrollable twitching and jerking in my body.

"The doctor's diagnosis was the

thing I dreaded most to hear. I had incipient epilepsy complicated by sugar diabetes.

"In the days that followed, I suffered untold agony. There was the agony of shame, of bodily affliction and of trying to hide the disease from other people. When the attacks began to come on me, I would quickly excuse myself from those around me and rush to a rest room, a garage or any hiding place. There I would stay until the fury of the attack had spent itself.

"After suffering for 5½ years with these afflictions, I became discouraged that one night I came home and said to my wife, 'Honey, I am at the end of my row. I will have to give up my ministry.'

"In great desperation, I asked God to help me. I asked others to help me pray.

"One night, while a minister friend was praying for me, I looked up and said, 'Oh, God! Here goes everything! If you don't help me, I'm finished.'

"Then, in that moment of utter desperation—my faith reached out! Suddenly, a heavy load was lifted, and the pain and weariness were gone.

"It has been 5½ years since I prayed that prayer. There has never been a single symptom of the old trouble.

"My ministry has increased. I am busier than I have ever been in my life. God spoke a peace, he still in my troubled life. I am completely healed."
