## Reflections from the Bible

Our lesson deals with Pharaoh's continued rejection, God's punishment for his stubbornness and the Lord's Passover.

Nine plagues of God came upon the Egyptians, followed by a tenth plague which finally wrung from Pharaoh his permission to let the Israelites depart. The plagues were to have twofold effect; first, they were to oppress the oppressor and break his will; secondly, they were to arouse the faith of the Israelites in the one true God. Again God was teaching a lesson of obedient faith.

The tenth plague was severe. Jehovah is a good God but He is also a severe God. "Behold therefore the goodness and severity of God: on them which fell, severity; but toward thee goodness, if thou continue in his goodness: otherwise thou also might be cut off" (Rom. 11:22). Paul was sending this message to Christians! Can a Christian live in disobedience to God and remain on God's glorious tree of salvation? The Israelites had to obey God. Under God's direction, every Hebrew family was required to select a lamb of the first year without blemish, and to sprinkle its blood on the lintel and doorposts. Would the death angel have visited them had they said they believed God but refused to obey Him?

Will man be saved from sin who refuses to obey as God directs? The Israelites acted on the authority of God's word, as delivered to Moses, clearly showing that their faith was to them as a conviction of things not seen. adv

## Hat, Coat, Boots for Each Fireman

Iowa Park will soon have the best dressed firemen in this part of North Texas. This week an order was given for 26 pairs of boots, 30 helmets and 23 coats.

As additions to the department's equipment, and to replace some that has become unusable, the order also included 200 feet of 2½-inch hose, 200 feet of 1½-inch hose, some nozzles and an ax.

Total bill for this equipment is over \$2,300, of which the City Fathers have agreed to pay about \$1,600, and the fire department the remaining \$700.

According to Fire Chief Oscar Singleton, this was the minimum needed of the department, and when the shipment is received, the firemen will be safer, more comfortable, and their civilian wearing apparel will be better protected.

**New City Hall  
To Cost \$75,000**

Talk of a new City Hall has now gone beyond the talk stage, with action to follow soon. The City Council has authorized a contract with First of Texas corporation of San Antonio, to handle

a bond issue for \$75,000 to be used for construction of a new City Hall and Fire Station.

Plans call for a city jail, living quarters for a paid fireman, assembly room with seating capacity for 50 persons, firemen's recreation room, Chamber of Commerce office, office space for the police department, three extra offices for future expansion, fire truck storage to accommodate four trucks, storage room for equipment.

Plans call for incorporating all the present building in the new structure. The entire building will have a central heating and air-conditioning system.

In discussing the plans this week Mayor Bert Van Horn pointed out that the bond issue will not call for raising the present tax rate. Funds to retire the bonds are expected to come from increasing revenue because of the constant growth of Our Town.

In a meeting of the City Council next Tuesday evening, the call for election is expected to be authorized.

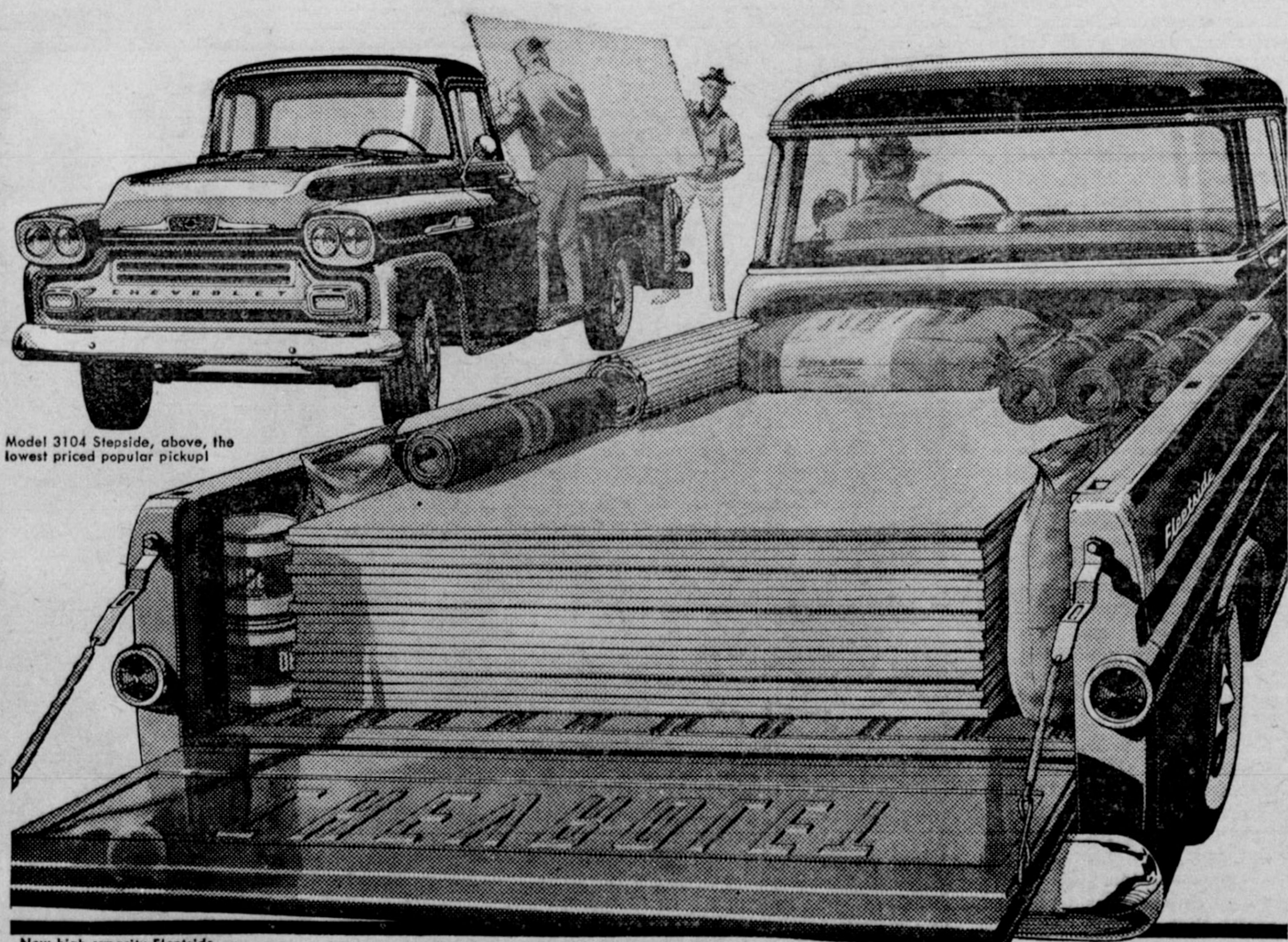
