> The tenth plague was severe. Jehovah is a good God but He is also a severe God. Iowa Park will soon have the best dressed firemen in this part of North Texas. This week an order was given for 26 pairs of boots, 30 helmets and 23 coats.

As additions to the department's

equipment, and to replace some that has become unusable, the order also included 200 feet of 21/2inch hose, 200 feet of 11/2-inch hose, some nozzles and an ax. Total bill for this equipment is over \$2,300, of which the City Fa-

thers have agreed to pay about \$1,600, and the fire department the remaining \$700. According to Fire Chief Oscar Singleton, this was the minimum need of the department, and when the shipment is received, the firemen will be safer, more comfortable, and their civilian wearing


