NOTICE OF ELECTION
 The State of Texas
 County of Wichita
 City of Iowa Park:

To the resident, qualified electors of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, who own taxable property in said city and who have duly rendered the same for taxation: Take notice that an election will be held in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, on the 11 day of August, 1962, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the resolution adopted by the City Council on the 9 day of July, 1962, calling said election which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION
 Calling an election on the proposition of authorizing execution of a water supply contract by and between the City of Iowa Park and Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3; prescribing the proposition to be voted upon and the form of the ballots; directing the giving of notice of said election; and resolving other matters pertaining thereto.
 Whereas, the City is urgently in need of obtaining an additional adequate supply of water to assure a continuing and certain source of water for its inhabitants; and
 Whereas, Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 organized pursuant to and deriving its power from Article XVI, Section 59 of the Constitution of Texas will construct facilities for providing water and will have available for sale to the City an abundant supply of water; and
 Whereas, said District and the City desire to enter into a contract as authorized by Chapter 342, Acts 1949, 51st Legislature of Texas, Regular Session, under which water may be purchased by the City and the term of such contract will be for not exceeding forty (40) years from the date thereof, provided that it may run until all bonds issued by the District for the acquisition of facilities necessary or convenient to enable the District to supply the City with water, have been paid in full; and
 Whereas, such a contract may not be made until its execution is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified property tax-paying electors voting at an election held for such purpose;
 Therefore, be it resolved and

ordered by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park:
 1. That an election be held in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, on the 11 day of August, 1962, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:
 "Whether the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, shall be authorized to make a water supply contract with Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3?"
 2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall, within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election, to-wit:
 Donald C. Hill, Presiding Judge,
 Jesse O. McCullough, Judge,
 Mrs. Pauline Crumpton, Clerk,
 Mrs. Swan Reaves Jr., Clerk.
 3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of the General Laws of the State of Texas except as otherwise provided by Article 1109e of Vernon's Civil Statutes of the State of Texas. Only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.
 4. That ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:
 'For Contract'
 'Against Contract'
 Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.
 5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have said notice published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen full days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in Article 1109e, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws relating to general elections.

O. E. Harlin Dies in Waurika 20 Years Began, Ended at SAFB

Funeral services were conducted for Mr. Oliver Ewing Harlin, 85, father of Frank Harlin of Iowa Park, Monday afternoon, July 9, in First Baptist church of Waurika, Okla., with Rev. Leonard Sullivan officiating.

Burial was in Crestview Memorial Park, Wichita Falls. Pallbearers were Woodrow Brandon, Roy McGinnis, Roy Bartley, Wayne Dunn, Woodrow Elkins.

Mr. Harlin died in Waurika hospital Saturday night. He had suffered a heart attack early Monday while eating breakfast at a cafe in Waurika.

Born Nov. 22, 1879, in Hillsboro, he was married to Miss Nora Frank, August 1903 in Savoy. They moved to Comanche, Okla., that year, where he owned and operated the first Coca Cola bottling works in that part of Oklahoma, and a general merchandise business.

In 1909 the family moved to Madden Grove community where Mr. Harlin engaged in the cattle business. In 1952 he retired and they moved to Waurika.

Mrs. Harlin died March 24, 1960.

Mr. Harlin was an active member of the Baptist church in Waurika. He was known affectionately in Iowa Park as Dad Harlin.

The water board canvassed the votes at their Monday night meeting in the C of C office. Plans for improvements to the water facilities were adopted and resolutions calling for an election on Saturday, Aug. 11, for the sale of bonds in amount of \$700,000 to finance construction of a new lake and additional water mains.

Following the meeting, the water board met with the city council in the City Hall to discuss business common to the two groups.

Since it is necessary for the city to conduct an election to authorize its purchases of water from the district, it was decided to have both elections at the same time, lowering the cost of the two elections.

The city council has agreed tentatively to pay the water district \$30,000 a year for water. This with the tax levied on water district property is believed to be sufficient to meet payments on the bonded indebtedness and meet operating costs.

Under this plan the water rates will not have to be raised, and the tax rate will not be increased.

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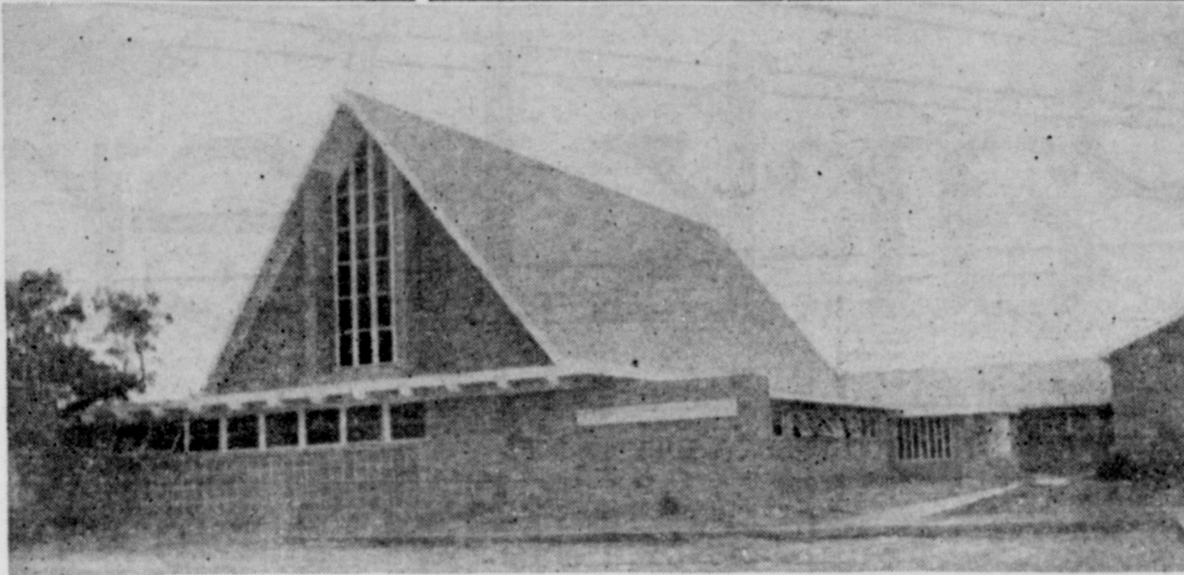

Faith Baptist Church Begins Expansion Program

Faith Baptist church reports an expansion program underway. The church has purchased the R. R. McCullough property north of its auditorium, giving Faith Baptist title to the entire block.

There will be more parking area besides more room for Sunday school and other church activities. The church plans to add more educational facilities in future years.

The house on the new property will be used for classrooms. The yard will be used for parties and outings.

Faith Baptist was started as a mission by the First Baptist congregation here in 1954 in a small building at its present location. On Jan. 1, 1956 Faith Baptist

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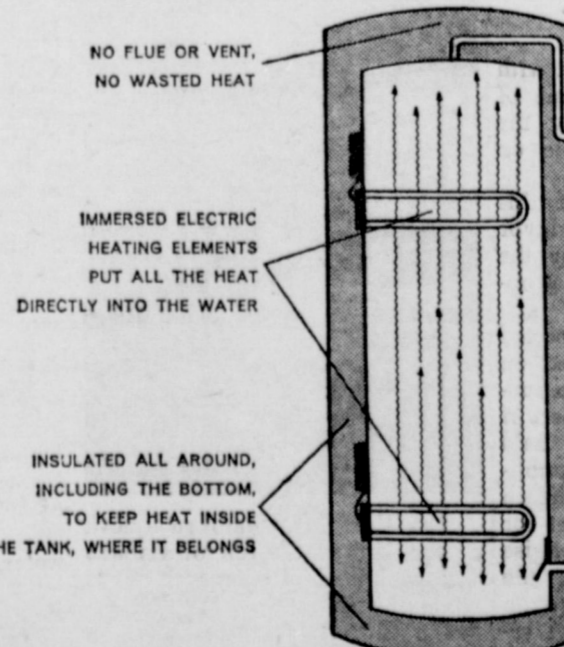

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Christ and a Faith for Our Day

by Boyd Schlenker



You remember the parable of the sower and the seed. We all know the main thrust of this story is to tell us about the necessity of the Word of God falling upon open hearts and being allowed to take root. Only in this way, says the parable, can there be a good fruit—if there is good ground.

But there is one part that always makes me stop and think. Just think of all the seed the sower wastes by tossing it on poor ground! Now this has something to say to the preaching of the Word, but it also has a meaning, I believe, for those who work directly with the land God has given them.

I am certain that the farmer often cries out, "Why does so much effort produce so little result?" And the answer would come: "You may have to waste some seed and some effort by tossing it on bad ground, but at least you will know you have gone the full way, you have explored every possibility."

What God says is that no matter how much seed may seem to be wasted, in the end a great harvest is sure. No farmer would refuse to sow his seed just because he knows some of it will be wasted. He knows that even if some of the seeds never grow, still a plentiful harvest will result.

There are, then, three things we can learn. First, and this is really the rub—really the roughest thing of all—we must never be discouraged even though nothing seems to be happening, or even when everything seems to be going wrong. Ministers need this advice too! All this can be difficult to say, let alone understand, when a storm has wiped out a crop. But we have many years to our lives, and this year is just one of them.

We can see the future as being much brighter and having nothing to do with this year—unless—unless we ourselves drag our bitterness and grumbling on to the next year. But we can drop that off. We can let this day, that is a poor day, stay right where it is, while we make plans for the next. The parable teaches that over the long-view God is working his purpose out and that even

if much effort seems to go for nothing and much labor and life seem wasted, yet the harvest is sure. The universe is not in the hands of a gigantic madman, but in the loving and knowing hands of the Lord God Almighty.

Second, we must be prepared to take a risk. After all, isn't this what faith really is: going out on a limb? Every time the farmer sows he takes a risk. If we sit around just waiting for the "right time" we will never act. Remember the words of Kipling: "(If you can) watch the things you gave your life to, broken, and stoop and build 'em up with worn-out tools—then you'll be a man." Living life fully and faithfully involves risk, great breathtaking risks.

Third, there must be that note of thanksgiving which we ring throughout our lives; the thanksgiving that God has given the opportunities to live thrilling, risky lives, and that He gives the seed for us to sow; and thanksgiving that He is the great harvester.

Distinguished Service Citation Given Former Iowa Park Airman

Major General Daniel Edwin Hooks distinguished himself by exceptionally meritorious service to the United States in positions of great responsibility as Commander, Air Force Research Division from 25 Sept. 1960 until 31 March 1961, and as Commander, Headquarters office of Aerospace Research from 1 April 1961 until 10 June 1962.

General Hooks displayed exceptional ability in organizing and furthering basic research efforts for the Air Force, Office of the Secretary of Defense, and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. General Hooks' efforts have added measurably to the fundamental scientific knowledge of the free world at a time when there was an urgent need to support the increasingly rapid pace of development of aerospace weapon systems of the future.

He also devised new and far more economical procedures in the financial and procurement support of basic research being done by private institutions associated with the basic research effort.

The invaluable management skills, astute scientific knowledge and judgment, and imaginative, dynamic leadership displayed by General Hooks reflect great credit upon him, the United States Air Force, and the Nation.

The above citation to accompany the award of Distinguished Service Medal to Daniel E. Hooks refers to a native born Iowa Park man.

Known here as Edwin, he is son of the late Daniel Eli and Lily Ferguson Hicks, grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ben Ferguson, early day pioneer family here. He began first grade in Iowa Park area and was graduated from IPHS in 1925. He received the BS in physics from TCU and MS in physics from Harvard university in 1932.

That year he was appointed a flying cadet and entered primary school at Randolph Field, San Antonio. The following June he finished advanced flying at Kelly Field and was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant in the Air Corps Reserve.

Receiving appointment in the regular army in June 1935 Hooks was assigned as flying instructor at Randolph Field.

Four years later he was assistant supervisor of the primary flying school at Dallas, serving in succession as supervisor at Fort Worth and Bonham.

In January 1942, Edwin was ordered to Air Corps headquarters, Washington, D.C., where he served as a staff officer. In June he returned to Kelly Field as assistant chief of the sub-depot section, San Antonio air depot.

Taking command of the 55th Air Depot group there in Feb. 1944, Hooks took the group to Wheeler Field, Hawaii. In Dec. 1944 he went to Guam and was chief of personnel and services division, Guam Air Depot, Harmon Field.

From March 1946 to June 1947 he studied nuclear physics at Ohio State university. Then he was assigned to the tactical and technical liaison committee at Kirtland AFB, N.M. In 1948 he became chief of research and development, field office for atomic energy.

In Aug. 1949 he went to the air war college at Maxwell AFB, Ala. After completion of the course in June 1950 he was made deputy chief of staff for research and development at the Air Force special weapons center at Kirtland. In 1951, Hooks became chief of staff there and in 1953 he was made vice-commander.

In 1954 he returned to Air Force Hdqtrs. as chief AFOAT-1 DCS operations. He became commander AFMDC in July 1958.

In Sept. 1960 he became commander of AFRD which became on April 1, 1961 the Aerospace Research office responsible directly to the chief of staff, USAF.

Hooks became a major general June 30, 1959 and is rated as a command pilot. He has received many military awards and decorations.

Gen Hooks is married to the former Miss Marian Smith. They have two sons: Laurence Edwin and Kenneth Robert.
