### Bobby Gilbreath Is Victim of Encephalitis

Funeral service was conducted  
for Bobby Gilbreath, 20, in First  
Baptist church Saturday morning  
with Rev. Homer Thompson, pas-  
tor, officiating.

The body lay in view at the  
church one hour before the serv-  
ice.

Burial was in Barbee cemetery  
of Dublin under direction of Tan-  
ner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

A short graveside service was  
conducted at 4:00 p.m. with Mr.  
Thompson officiating. He was as-  
sisted by Rev. T. F. Collier of  
the Dublin First Baptist church.

Pallbearers were members of  
the 1960 state Class A champion-  
ship track team of IPHS of which  
Bobby was a member: Jackie and

Parkey, Donald Thompson, Jim-  
my Gillispie.

coach of Texas A and M college,  
and former high school coaches.

Bobby died in a Houston hospi-  
tal Thursday morning, Nov. 1,  
following a week's illness of en-  
cephalitis. Bobby, a sophomore at  
A and M, became seriously ill  
Friday, Oct. 26. His parents Mr.  
and Mrs. T. E. Gilbreath left for  
College Station that night, where  
was in the college infirmary. He  
was later taken to St. Joseph hospi-  
tal in College Station and then  
was transferred to Herman hospi-  
tal in Houston.

Bobby was born Sept. 22, 1942,  
in Dublin and moved to Iowa  
Park with his parents in 1946.  
He attended the local schools and  
was graduated in 1960. He was  
a fine student and outstanding in  
football and track.

This year Bobby was listed by  
National Collegiate Athletic asso-  
ciation as having the best time of  
any freshman in the US in the  
440-yard hurdles, 54-2 seconds.

While in high school he went  
to state with the Hawk track and  
field team for three years. Several  
of his records still stand.

A Bobby Gilbreath Memorial  
Scholarship Fund has been set up  
at IPHS.

Surviving are the parents, his  
grandmother Mrs. Kate Gilbreath  
of Dublin, several uncles and  
aunts.

A large number of Iowa Park  
friends went to Dublin for the  
graveside service.

### B'bcats 26 Hawks 25

Despite a 19-point binge in  
the second quarter last Friday  
night, the Iowa Park Hawks fell  
one point short and allowed Chil-  
dress to win 26-25.

The Bobcats jumped into an  
early lead by scoring 12 points  
in the first stanza on two sus-  
tained drives.

Second quarter saw Mike Dav-  
enport carry 41 yards off right  
tackle for a touchdown. This was  
matched by a 62-yard run by  
Mitchell of Childress. At this  
point the Bobcats led 18-6.

Still in the second quarter,  
Mike Caldwell scored twice for  
the Hawks, giving Iowa Park a  
19-18 bulge.

Receiving the second half kick-  
off, the Hawks went 70 yards in  
11 plays to score on a Robert  
Dawson touchdown pass. Run  
for extra point failed.

Mitchell put Childress in the  
win column by scoring the final  
3 points.

The 4th quarter was scoreless.  
Iowa Park led the Bobcats in  
rushing and passing, but couldn't  
quite make the points to win.

Pee Wee football team played  
Knox City last Saturday after-  
noon to a scoreless tie. An 11-car  
convoy accompanied the players  
to Knox City.

The team played Wichita Falls  
Longhorns, Monday evening and  
won 12-0.

Hoyt Watson and Clyde Bonner  
are coaches of the Pee Wees.  
The Little All America Hawks  
also played the Longhorns and  
won 43-6.

### Farmers Union

Voters throughout the US will  
cast ballots Tuesday to determine  
the makeup of the 88th Congress.  
At stake is the future of Presi-  
dent Kennedy's programs.

Should the Democrats buck the  
historic trend in off-year elec-  
tions and add to their numbers,  
it would be a clear indication the  
people agree with the President's  
proposal.

While the Cuban situation has  
caused prognosticators to hedge  
on their forecasts, the farm issues  
remain clearcut.

Republicans in the Senate voted  
to the man against the Agricul-  
tural Act of 1962. In the House,  
only two lame duck GOP con-  
gressmen, who were previously  
defeated in primaries, voted for  
the bill.

Democrats can point with pride  
to the more than \$1 billion in-  
crease in farm income, plus many  
other gains under the present Ad-  
ministration. Republicans say  
there is too much government in-  
terference and are calling for a  
cut in income for farm families.

Perhaps some day soon the  
American farmer will receive a  
fair return for his investment and  
labor. Meanwhile he can be re-  
lied on to do his job and produce  
adequate food and fiber for the  
world's growing needs.

American Medical Association,  
trade union of the nation's doc-  
tors, has been caught in another  
big lie. Seems it took a survey  
made by the University of Michi-  
gan and got the exact opposite  
interpretation of it that the peo-  
ple who made the survey.

Michigan experts said the sur-  
vey showed people over 65 are  
worse off financially than other  
groups on several counts. AMA  
stated the study showed elderly  
people are "substantially better  
off on the average than younger  
Americans."

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Value of stubble mulching can be seen on lands cropped to small grain on the Henry Wolf farm two miles north of Iowa Park, according to Elvy Sargent, soil conservationist.

In so far as is known, Wolf purchased the first large sweep plow in Iowa Park work unit area about 1953, Sargent says. Most of his fields have had all tillages with this plow using either large sweeps or chisels. Erosion has been reduced, water intake increased, dead furrows on terraced land prevented, and yields maintained or increased.

Planning of complete conservation plans are in progress for V. B. Dickerson jr., J. F. Foster and James F. Foster, 77 Ranch, Clyde E. Robertson, Dr. Ted Alexander, Steve Gose. All of these will plan and schedule their conservation work, and most of them may take advantage of cost-share through the county Great Plains conservation program.

SCS furnishes co-operators soil survey information, engineering and agronomic assistance, with which complete basic conservation plans are developed by land-owners.

### Study Club

Home Life department was given emphasis in a program presented last Thursday for the 23 Study club in the home of Mrs. Homer Blalock. Mrs. Rollins Woodall served as co-hostess.

Theme of the program, directed by Mrs. K. P. Abernathy, was "Legislation and Job Opportunities for Youth."

For the devotional period, Mrs. Noel Troutman contributed a talk on the origin and meaning of Thanksgiving. She noted the day was decreed by the president and authorized by congress. She said the mandate is obeyed by Jews and Christians and by millions who have no church affiliation.

She cautioned there is danger of the day's becoming a lost virtue since people take too much for granted their blessings and the privilege of living in a land where the dignity of man is preserved and where dreams, aspirations and hard work are still rewarding.

The speaker listed many material, physical and spiritual blessings which Americans enjoy and urged that people pause to say with the Psalmist "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits."

Mrs. Dave O. Harbour presented a paper on Legislation for Children and Youth. She said the need for legislation to regulate child labor was evident in the 19th century when the public had a tolerant attitude toward employment of young children. The neglect of their education brought the first effort to control by law the working conditions of youth.

At present all states have laws regulating the conditions under which boys and girls may be employed. Enforcement is usually in the hands of state labor department personnel.

There are still some areas with little protection, according to Mrs. Harbour. Most states exempt domestic service, and farm laborers have little coverage. Children who sell or distribute newspapers or magazines are subject to special regulations in about half the states.

Mrs. Harbour stated the Fair Labor Standards Act was a decided advance over state laws. This was amended in 1949. In discussing child labor in agriculture, she said many children work long hours at early ages, get insufficient legal protection.

During the business conducted by Mrs. T. M. Clark, reports on the Santa Rosa district workshop at Crowell were given by Mmes. W. G. Steele, Chauncey Weiler and Clark. Department chairmen reported on possible projects for the club.

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Suppose you are hunting, and shoot a deer or a duck, which falls mortally wounded. Before you can get to it, another hunter gets there and claims the fallen game as his own. What are your rights?

Jim had been hunting all day without success, and had headed for home when he finally saw a deer. He took aim and hit the deer with his first shot. Although mortally wounded, the deer managed to run a short distance, with Jim in hot pursuit.

Roy was also deer hunting. He heard Jim's shot and saw a deer running toward him. However, before it reached the spot where Roy was standing, the deer fell to the ground.

Although it was obvious the deer was about to die, Roy walked to within three feet of it, delivered the finishing shot, and quickly put his tag on it. When Jim ran up and claimed the deer, Roy said that such deer were wild animals, and belonged to no one until killed. Since he was the one who killed the deer, Roy claimed it belonged to him.

Which hunter has legal title to the deer?

The deer belongs to Jim. He was the first to wound it, and did so before Roy appeared on the scene. He had mortally wounded the deer, and had it in such condition its escape was improbable, if not impossible. The rule is that the instant a wild animal is brought under the control of a person so that actual possession is practically inevitable, a vested property interest in it accrues which cannot be divested by another's intervening and killing it, or reaching it first.

Jim had delivered the shot which so crippled the animal as to cause him to cease trying to escape, thus permitting Roy to walk up to the animal and deliver the finishing shot. Jim had effectively brought the deer under his control before Roy took a hand in the matter.

The deer belonged to Jim, and he can enforce his claim in court.

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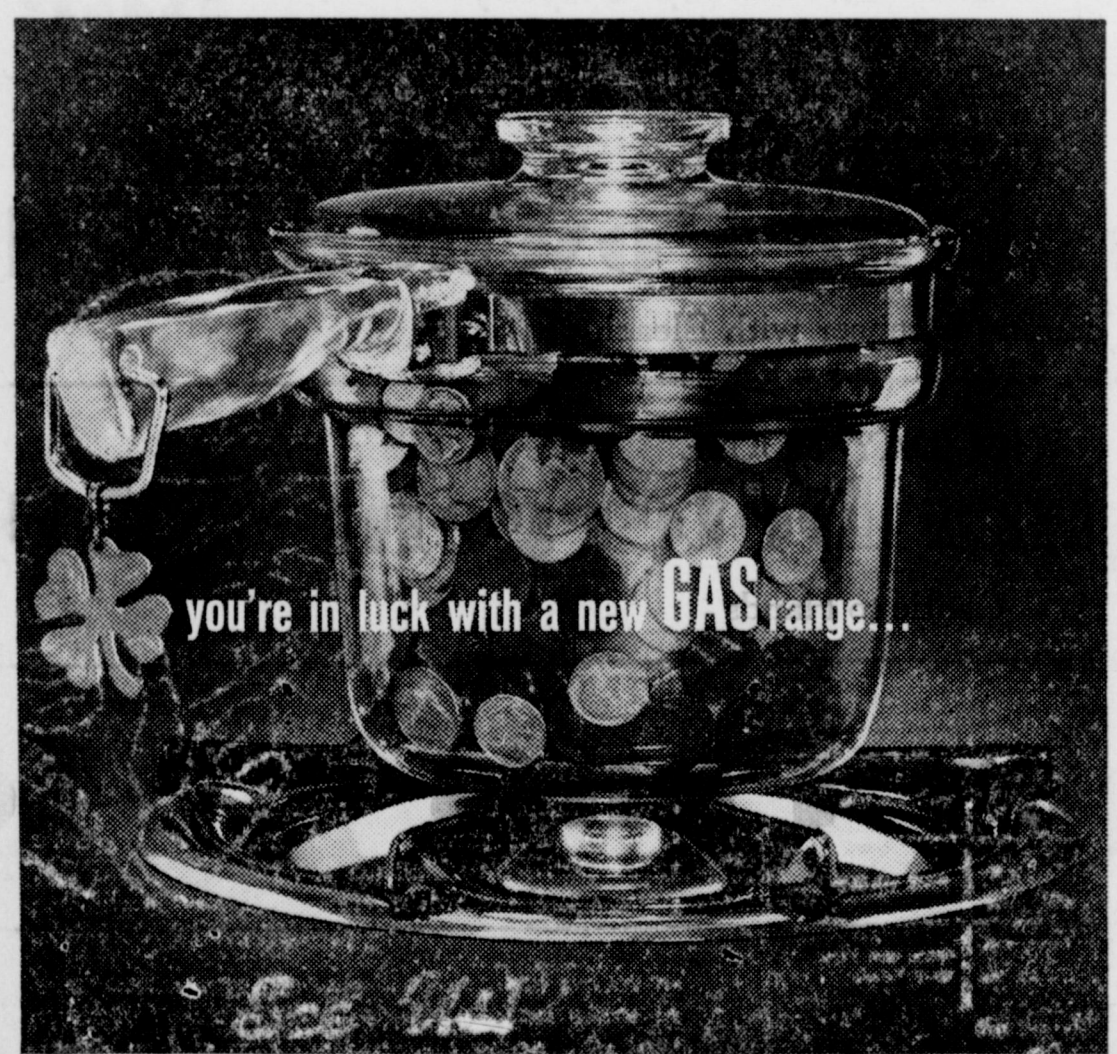
