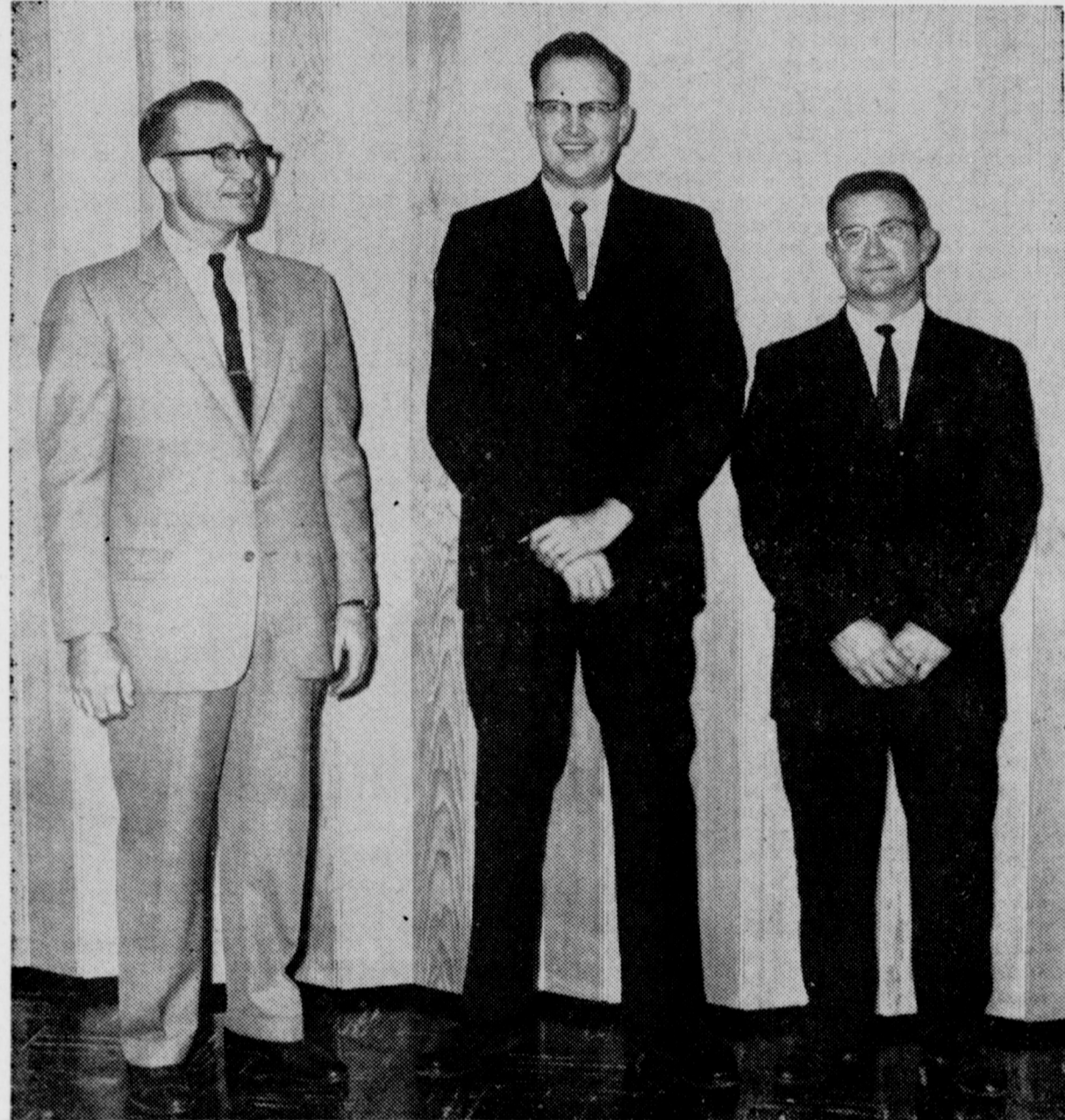

The family moved to Iowa Park and joined the First Baptist church in 1955. They were for-

mer members of the Highland Heights church in Wichita Falls. Patterson teaches 10-year-old boys in Sunday school, is group captain in Training Union, and serves as a church usher.

Curry joined the church when he was nine years old. At present he is superintendent of Adult III Sunday school department; member of the church choir; chairman of the Master Plans committee of the church. He is a former teacher in the junior and intermediate departments.

The Currys have two daughters—Barbara Dale 6, and Jo Ann 10 months. Bill's mother Mrs. Ada Curry now resides in Wichita Falls with a daughter Mrs. Dorothy Thompson.

Wayne Williams was born in Iowa Park, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Williams. He has attended First Baptist church all of his life, becoming a member at the age of 12.

She was the oldest member of First Baptist church. She had been quite active and drove her own car until a few years ago, when she fell and broke a hip.

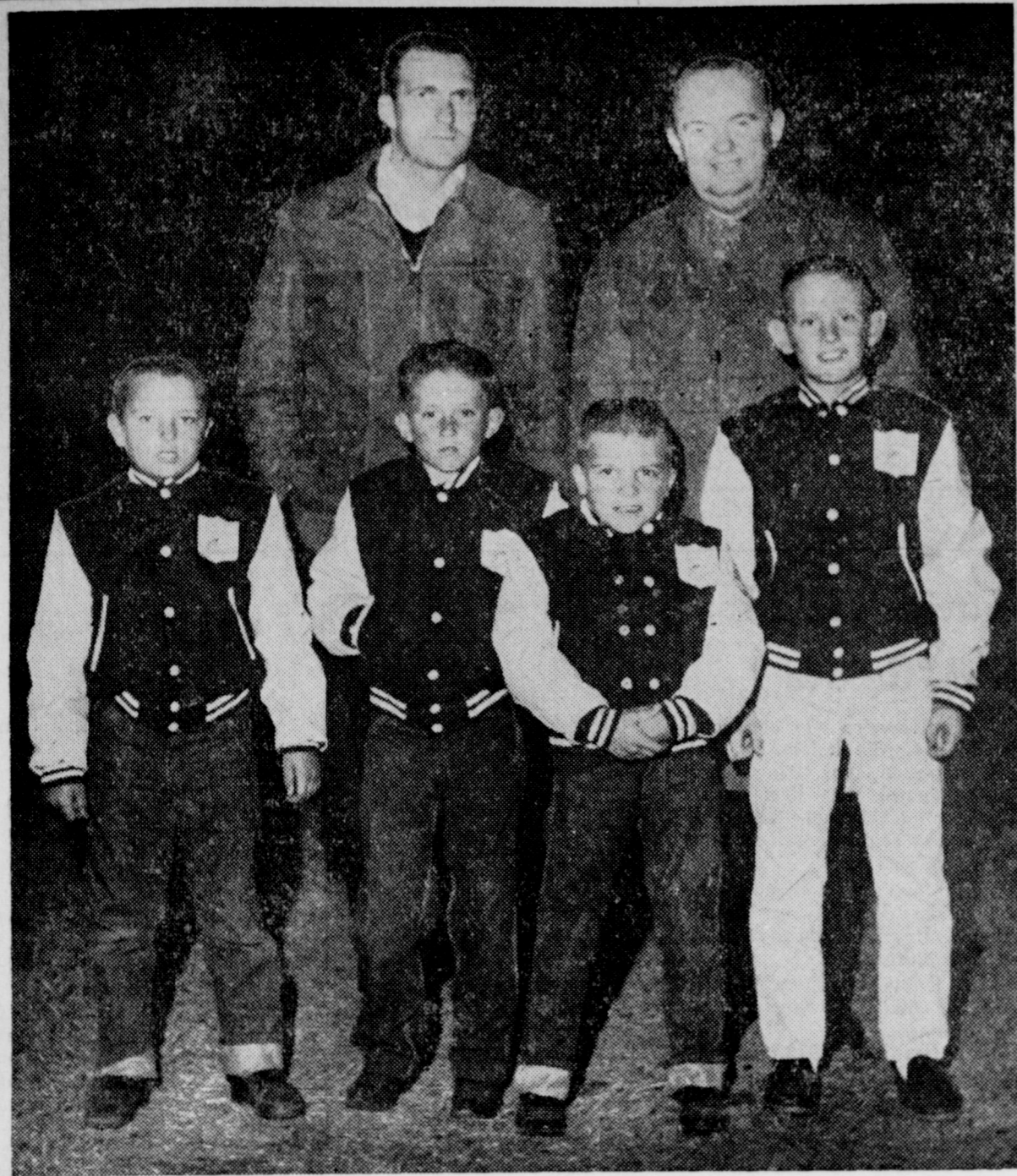

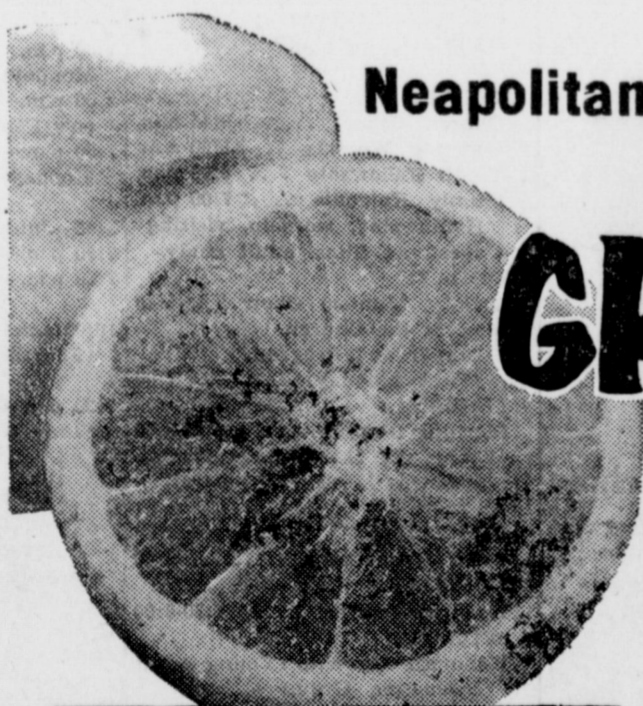
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Christ and a Faith for Our Day

And that was done 2000 years ago!

This is what our forefathers were thankful for; this is what we must be thankful for; that God loves us in spite of ourselves, that God gives himself to us even when we reject him. This is that for which the Pilgrims gave

thanks — certainly not for the abundance of their wealth. They had none.

Half their company died that first winter. They had to bury the dead at night so Indians would not see how small their group had become. Goods lost at sea; loved ones buried on the little hillside yonder. But they gave thanks with their whole heart!

You and I can put gaslights in front of our homes and spinning-wheels in our parlors to try to prove that we are early Americans, and we know it. The Thanksgiving that is acceptable to Jesus Christ is the humble and dedicated life.

That means that we show forth our thanksgiving to God by serving other people. What a way to give thanks, now that our celebrations are over: by searching out someone in need rather than constantly trying to see how much food we can eat!

It's a lovely song and a nice old cliché, but "Count your blessings" is only a poor half of the Christian's Thanksgiving. It's never so much counting your blessings as making your blessings count, that is the real watermark of the Christian life.

Make your blessings count now that Thanksgiving is past, and in so do glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

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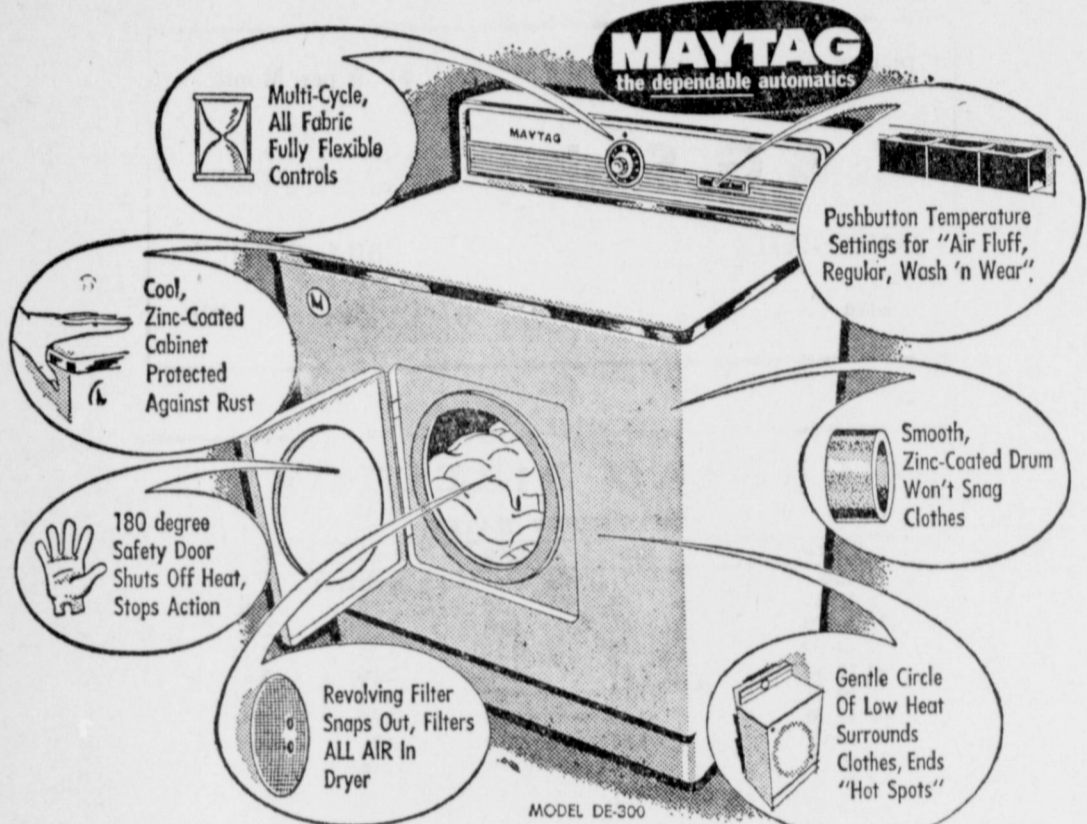
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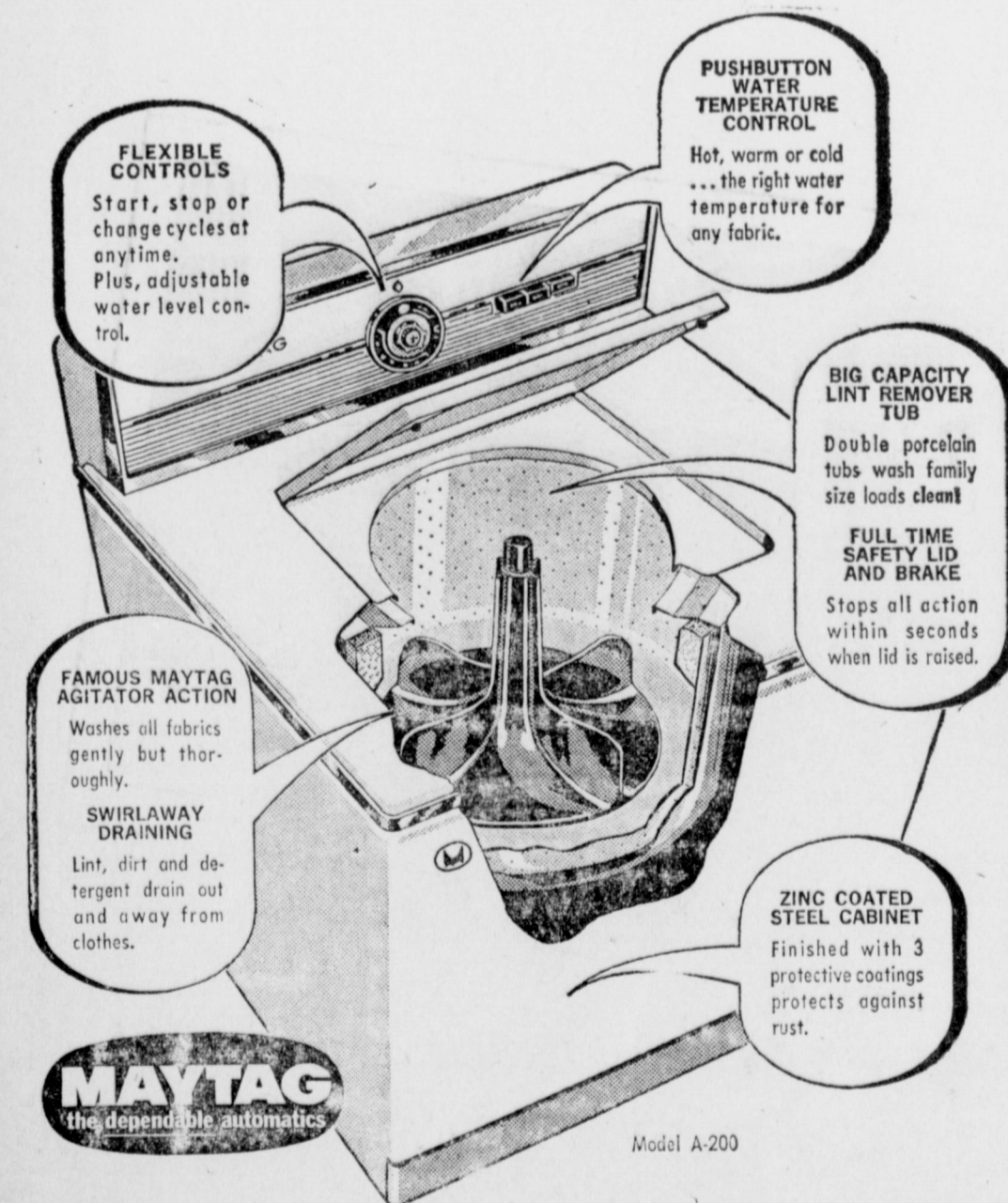


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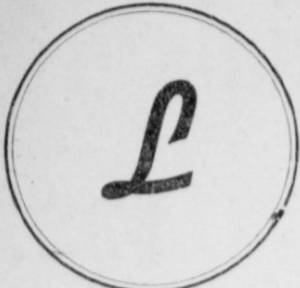

The fun came in improvising and exercising our active imaginations. Youngsters these days have too many toys and gadgets handed to them by grandparents and parents. They miss the fun and thrill we had, and I wonder if some of the ingenuity that has been characteristic of our nation is being lost when a child no longer has to "make do."

Something else I've been wondering about. I notice the Teen-Angels, especially the female of the species, have to be in a prone position with feet elevated in order satisfactorily to hold long-winded telephone conversations. I wonder if they have to have their feet higher than their heads for their brains to be in gear! One mother says she believes that is true. She further observed that some of them wear slimjims to schools on test days. Imagine taking a test with your feet higher than your head!

Some time ago I wrote at length regarding violations of traffic reg-

ulations. Seems nothing has been done, and now property is being destroyed by some of these drivers. They have no regard for life or limb, certainly they would have none for public property. 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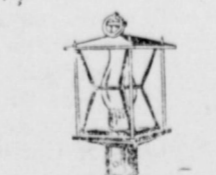
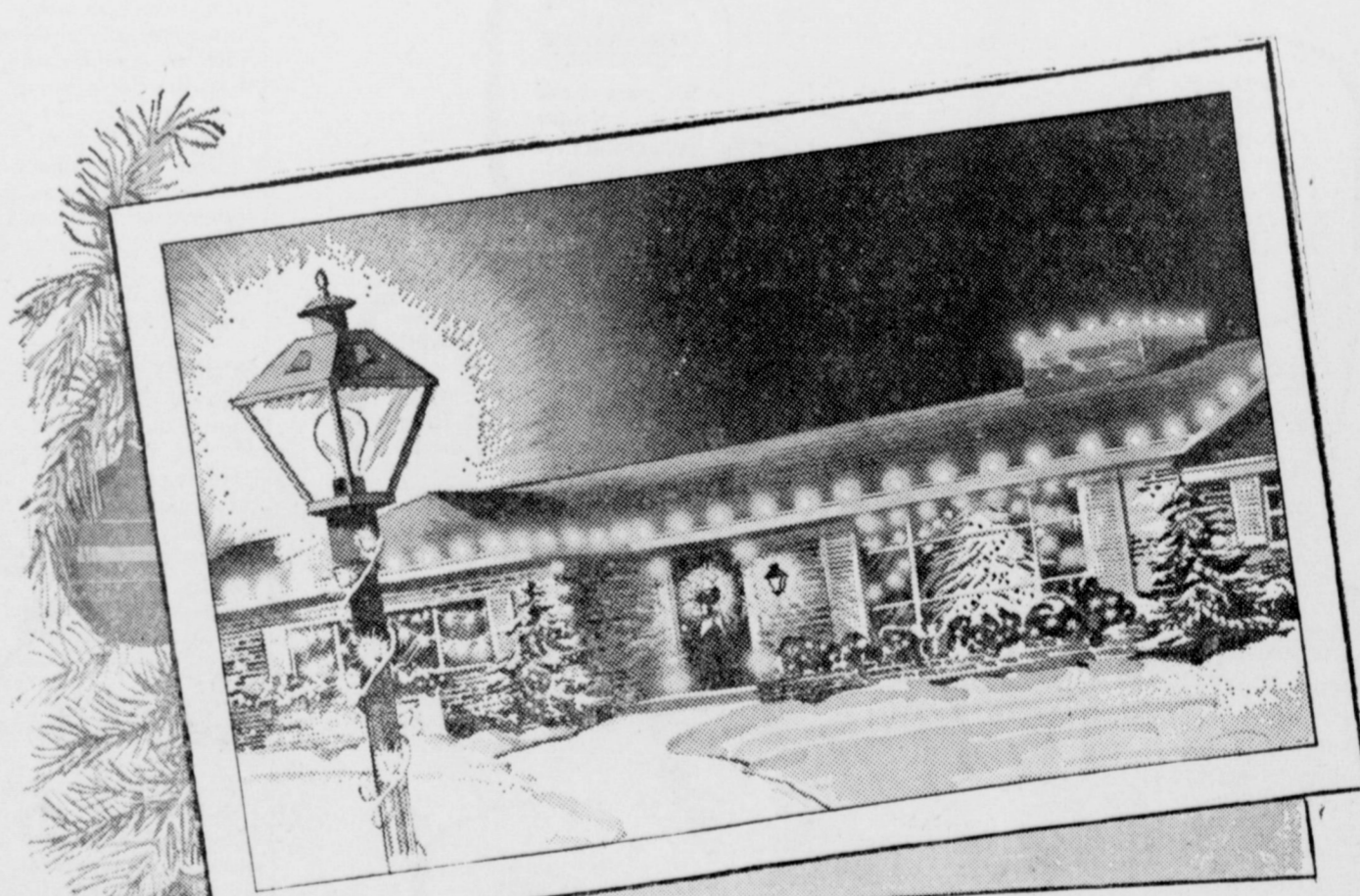
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
