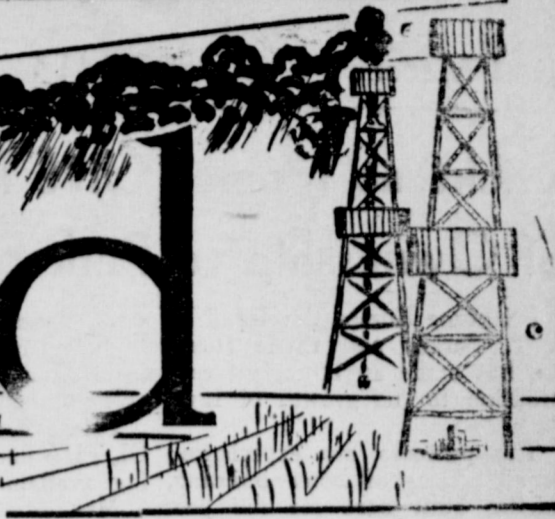

Vegetables Seen on Field Trip

Vegetable Field Day was held at the Iowa Park Experiment Station Monday, with 55 present. B. T. Haws, county agent, was general chairman and directed the program.

Lester E. Brooks, station director, explained that weather conditions have caused the crop yield to be lower this year than normal.

Vegetables seen in the field included asparagus, cantaloupes, watermelons, sweet corn, beans, tomatoes, Virgil Woodfin, horticulturist at the station, discussed these. He said asparagus as a commercial crop is good for this area because it is harvested in early spring.

Woodfin discussed the corn varieties grown on experimental basis at the station: Stay Gold, Aristogold, Bantam Green, Calumet, Golden Security and Paymaster.

There are 67 varieties of tomatoes in the current program at the station. One of the tests being carried on in tomatoes is crack resistance.

In general assembly following the field trip, Woodfin told of the vegetable work being done in the Munday area of Knox county in which the Iowa Park station is participating.

Brooks spoke on soil and water problems of Wichita Valley and some of the things done to correct them.

Water District Annexation Voting Set for Saturday

Iowa Park folk have opportunity to use their poll tax receipts again this Saturday, July 7, for an important series of elections.

It seems that when the Redin Heights and Garden Valley additions were annexed to Iowa Park there was a corresponding annexation by the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3.

Now comes the joker — the Redin Heights and Garden Valley folks must now vote to request annexation, and request to be allowed to assume their fair share of the water district's indebtedness!

And to top it off, the folk in the original water district must now vote to allow the annexed

water district, and vote to allow them to assume their part of the bonded indebtedness.

Voting place for Redin Heights folk is Bricktime Homes, 1000 West Highway; for the Garden Valley folk, at the Clint McBay home, 200 Hope Lane; for the regular town folk, the City Hall at 103 North Walk.

Another interesting point to remember when Saturday comes is that there will be two ballots at each polling place, and two separate requirements for getting to cast the ballots.

Any qualified voter residing in the area affected may vote on the annexation question. But in order to vote on the assumption of indebtedness, the qualified

voter must also own property in the affected area, which property has been duly rendered for taxation.

Reason for all this election stuff is: Someday soon the water district will need to build another lake for Iowa Park, and the additional valuable property which is to be served will be needed to float the necessary bonded indebtedness. Otherwise we'll all be out of water with no method available to obtain it.

So, go vote Saturday and show the water board you are interested in the future of our city, and appreciate the hard work the board members are doing for us. Their only pay is your appreciation of their efforts.

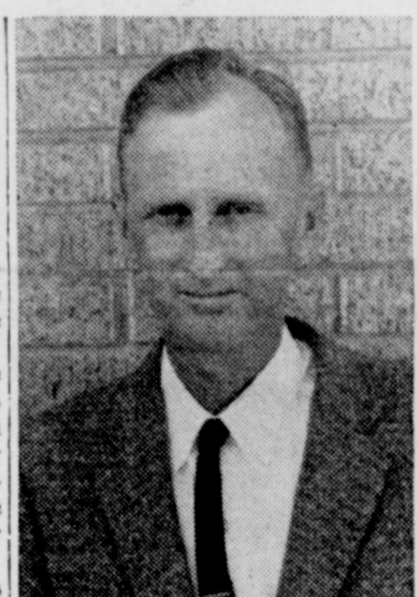
During World War I he was in the army medical corps four years, serving in Attu Islands, England, France, Belgium and Germany.

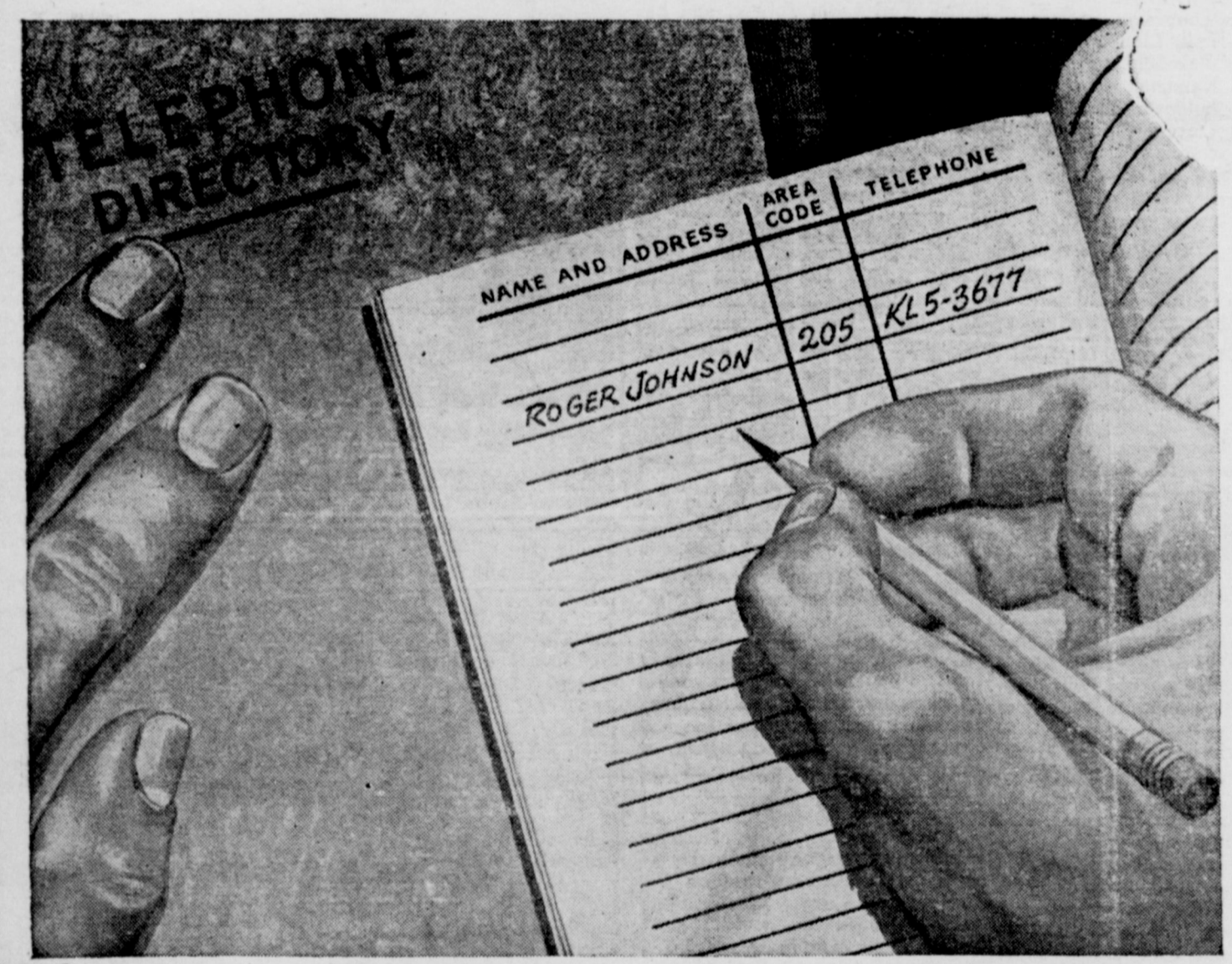

Area Code Numbers are an easy, convenient way to improve your Long Distance service. They are simply three-digit numbers which automatically route your calls to one of 117 Long Distance areas in the United States and Canada.

When you tell the operator the Area Code Number of the city you're calling, she can dial your call almost immediately. No waste of your time while she looks up the Code Number.

Area Code Numbers for cities frequently called are listed in the front of your telephone directory.

How to call: Suppose you want to phone KL 5-3677 in Birmingham, Alabama. A check of your telephone directory shows the Area

- Code Number for Birmingham, Alabama, is 205. After you have the Code Number, then:
1. Dial "Operator" for Long Distance.
 2. Tell her: "Area Code 205 KL 5-3677." (No need to mention Birmingham.)
 3. When the operator asks, tell her the number you're calling from.

The Area Code Number here is 817. Let people in other cities know this Area Code so they can call you faster, easier.

For handy reference, include the Area Codes in your list of Long Distance telephone numbers. The Blue Book has a special column for listing Area Codes beside the numbers. If you don't have a copy, just call the telephone business office. No charge, of course.

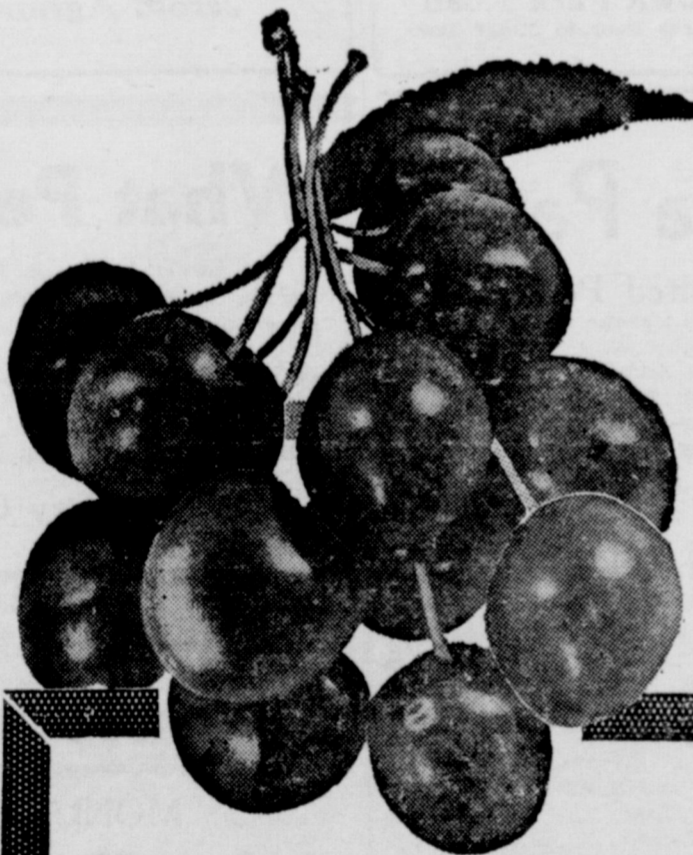

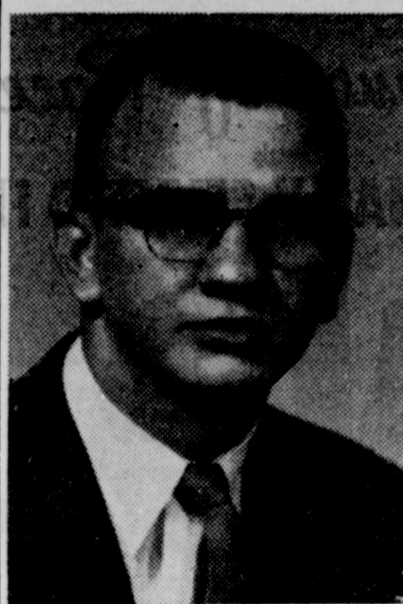

AGED HEALTH CARE THROUGH SOCIAL SECURITY

Giant rallies are being held in some 40 cities across the country to highlight what has become the biggest national issue in this country today: How to pay the high health care costs of our aged population.

The rallies will support President Kennedy's plan for health insurance for the aged through Social Security, and it is our belief that this is, without doubt, the best answer to the dilemma facing many Americans who are trying to raise and educate their children, and, at the same time, pay the rapidly mounting hospital bills of their parents.

For the truth is, most of our 17 million elderly live on small pensions and can't afford to pay for their health care. Private insurance plans are too expensive and inadequate. So are public relief programs. And the family budget can't be stretched far enough to take care of the needs of three generations.

Everybody, it seems, agrees that some plan is necessary to cope with this problem, but opponents to the Social Security — administered measure not only are not in step with the '60's, they are not even in step with the '30's, when Social Security was adopted as protection against loss of earnings when Americans are old or disabled. Now, a simple extension of the Social Security system that has worked so well over the years would provide our aged with a wide range of health services (guaranteeing the right

of free choice of doctor or hospital), and would give every American a chance to save a little money each month during his working years to take care of his health needs when he is 65.

This plan is so obviously of benefit to the individual, the family and the entire community, we wonder why it should need any defense at all. Any American, we feel, should gladly jump at the chance to buy his own aged health care benefits, rather than donate tax dollars for public relief to do the job — dollars that do not earn for him the right to that care when he will need it most.

It is heartening to know that many doctors favor this plan. Recently, a group of physicians — including the renowned child care specialist, Dr. Benjamin Spock, met with President Kennedy to express their support for his measure, and formed a nation-wide Physicians Committee for Health Care Through Social Security.

As every doctor knows, there are sick but proud old people, who go without hospitalization, who quietly suffer and die for lack of health care, because they will not ask for charity or add to the financial burdens of children raising their own families. Let's prevent this from happening to them — and to ourselves.

We, as a community, can do much to help get the bill passed by Congress by letting our Congressmen know we are for it.

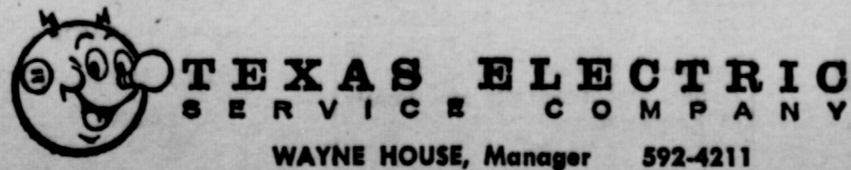
