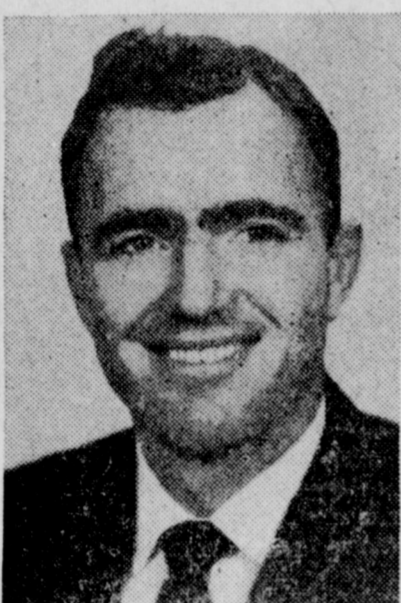

PAY YOUR POLL TAX BEFORE FEBRUARY 1

So far in a population of 4,943 in Iowa Park, less than 300 poll tax receipts have been issued.

Elections we are sure will be held this year are: City and school and water district. If you have lived in the city 30 days you may vote in city elections. If you have lived in the county six months you may vote in county elections. Those who have reached the age of 21 may have a free vote for one year. Those who have become 60 years of age before Jan. 31, 1962, will be exempt for this year and the future.

CAR LICENSE TAGS

Go on sale Feb. 1. If you have special numbers spoken for, you may get the tags, the receipts, say for them, before Feb. 1, and be on your merry way for one more year.

CHANGE IN TRAILER TAGS

Trailers up to 10,000 lbs. gross weight use the same tags as before. Trailers from 10,001 to 18,000 lbs. gross use a different series. Trailers over 18,000 lbs. up to 2,000 lbs. gross, use another series.

Change has been made to avoid having tags inter-changed among all weight trailers.

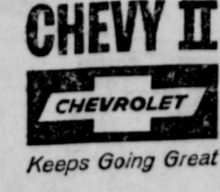

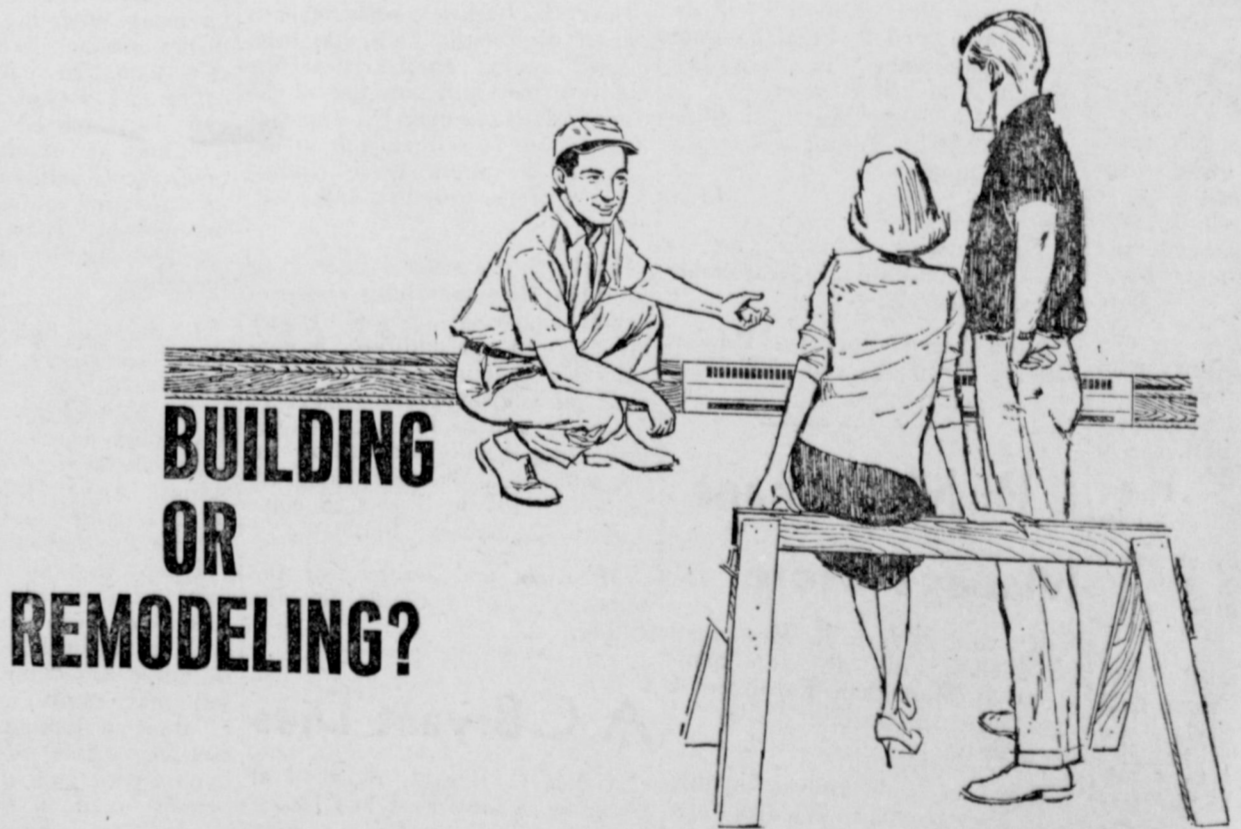

Some of the findings are:
Estimated population of Iowa Park—4943.

5,711 people were listed. Of these 492 were residents of rural areas and 660 were in Valley View community, leaving 4,559 as residents of Iowa Park.

An estimated 248 persons were not at home and an estimated 136 refused to give information.

1,386 families were contacted in Iowa Park, 184 at Valley View and 153 rural families.

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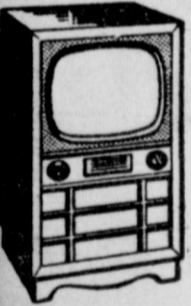

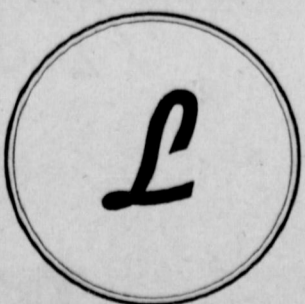
