### Belgian Couple Visit Friends in Iowa Park

Mr. and Mrs. J. Janssens of Antwerp, Belgium, recently visited Sgt. and Mrs. F. G. Tilton, 704 Rebecca. They arrived in New York on May 21 and made the trip by bus to Iowa Park.

The Janssens met Tilton in Liege, in the eastern part of Belgium, in an arms museum which is the most complete hand arms collection in western Europe. The sergeant invited the couple to Bitburg, Germany, to visit him and his wife.

This was the beginning of their friendship, and before the air force couple returned to the States the Janssens planned to visit them in the U.S. A teller in the Bank of Antwerp, Janssens had to work without any days off to accumulate vacation time.

Janssens and his wife Lieve speak Flemish, French and German, and they are mastering English quite rapidly. She is a home economics teacher and is considered a regent in her profession.

Schools in Belgium are not graded as they are here. Pupils start at 6 years of age and are in elementary school until they reach 12. Next 3 years are divided into 3 divisions and education equivalent to a college degree is completed by the time one has reached 21 years of age.

The Janssens have been married 3 years. They met through the Keere Weerom club, similar to our square dance clubs. One night the leader requested the girls to correspond with boys in service who were also members. Janssens was present when the request was made, which was a short time before he entered the army.

He believed Lieve could write just the kind of letters to boost his morale, so he asked her to correspond with him. By the time his service time had expired the couple were in love but Lieve had about 2½ more years in school before they could be married.

In Belgium a couple has a civil marriage ceremony and then a church ceremony. The Janssens had a most unusual honeymoon. They had spent most of their savings on furniture so they decided to go camping the hitch-hiking route. Their goal was Garmisch Partenkirchen, Germany, but before they arrived there an accommodating gentleman driving a Mercedes picked them up and offered to take them to Innsbruck, Austria.

The man carried them on to Venice, Italy, where they stayed 3 days. Hitching is not allowed in Italy, so they left the country by train. By chance the Janssens and a Danish couple were invited

to share a first class compartment on the train with three American officers, in the army, the navy and the air force.

The 900 mile honeymoon trip was so enjoyable it inspired the pair to hitch-hike to England the following year and to Europe the next.

Surprisingly, French fried potatoes are the most famous food in the Antwerp area. All through Belgium are found French Fried stands similar to our hamburger stands. The potatoes are served in cone-shaped sacks in 12c and 20c sizes. For 2c more, one can order mayonnaise, tartar sauce, pickles or pickled onions to eat with the potatoes.

Mrs. Janssens says the hand figures prominently in the life of Antwerp as result of significance attached to a legend.

Antwerp originated around a castle. The legend says that before the castle was built there was a castle of the giant Druon Antigoon. The giant stood at the fork of the two rivers Schelde and Schijn, where there was much traffic.

Every boat which passed was held up by the giant who demanded a toll. If the captain refused to pay, his right hand was hacked off and thrown into the river.

Eventually a Roman centurion came, fought the giant, slew him and threw his right hand into the river. A huge statue of the centurion stands before the town hall in the Big Market, which has been kept in repair since 1600.

Favorite cooky in Antwerp is hand-shapped; and hands appear on the coat of arms on the town hall.

The Janssens said they especially like the delicious roast beef served them by their hosts. The custom of taking both hot and cold foods and drink during the same meal and of eating a variety of foods together is new to them.

The couple will leave New York early in July to return to Belgium.
