

Guns Prohibited by Water Board

Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, Iowa Park, Texas.

ORDINANCE NO. 1

Be it resolved that the following Ordinance of Rules and Regulations are adopted by the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, and that the same shall be applicable upon the lands owned by said District,

1. SANITATION

No trash, garbage and refuse may be left or deposited on District property, or on property under control of said District. No dead animals, or any part thereof, fish, decayed vegetables, food, ashes, garbage, offal, rubbish or filth of any kind, by which its decay or putrefaction could or would become offensive, shall be placed, or permitted to be placed, on property belonging to the District or on property under control of said District.

2. FIRE ARMS

The possession of any rifle, shot gun, side arm, compressed air gun, or air gun on District property, property under control of the District, or on water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

3. SAFETY

Rules of safety concerning speed, operation, lights, life preservers, size of craft, construction, etc., shall be the same as provided by the Laws of the State of Texas covering the operation of all crafts.

All bathing and swimming in the water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

All water skiing, boat racing and high speed operation of boats on water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

No wading shall be allowed without boots or waders.

No fishing shall be permitted within the locations identified as being restricted areas.

No boats or boat trailers shall be allowed to remain unattended in the water.

4. SIGNS

No sign or signs shall be removed, destroyed, defaced, or otherwise manipulated, which has been placed on District property or on property under control of the District.

5. FISHING

The general laws of Texas, as the same are, or may be amended, save and except as specifically provided by proper Ordinance and Regulations passed by the Board of Directors of the Water District shall control the taking of fish from Lake Iowa Park. All fishing in the lake will be subject to the laws as outlined by the State Game and Fish Commission.

6. PENALTIES

The performance of any act forbidden to be done by this Ordinance, or the failure to do any act required by the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor, which, in case of a lawful conviction, shall be punishable by the infliction of a fine of not more than \$200.00 together with the costs of court, provided the fine and costs of court may not exceed \$200.00. The fines collected here and under, in so far as may not be required for payment of the cost of the court, shall be payable to the District and shall be credited to its general operational fund.

Any person or persons refusing to abide by the regulations as set forth by the laws of this State shall be deemed guilty of violation and subject to penalties provided thereof.

If any provision of this Ordinance and these Rules and Regulations, or the application thereof to any person, situation or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions, or applications of the Ordinance or these Rules and Regulations which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance and these Rules and Regulations are declared to be severable.

This Ordinance and these Rules and Regulations shall become effective after its and their passage and publication, as required by law.

McAdams said there are only 6 per cent of Americans on the farms which feed the American people.

He also said the Wichita area is fast turning from depending on oil to dairying. The industry is the largest in America. There are more than 400 persons employed in milk plants in Wichita Falls.

He showed the new plastic coated cartons now in use which will supplant wax covered cartons soon.

McAdams compared dairying of yesterday to dairying today. Then all you needed was a few cows, a bucket, stool, cowlot, and good strong hands.

Today a dairy producer must invest \$14,000 for barn and milk handling equipment, besides the land, cattle and other necessities.

No Fair in '63

Suspension of the 1963 Texas-Oklahoma Fair was the highlight of a called meeting of the board of directors last Thursday evening in the Chamber of Commerce office.

The 1962 Fair was the 34th anniversary of the Fair.

Ways and means committee, appointed soon after the disastrous fire which destroyed the Auditorium on Sept. 10, submitted the following report:

1. That all directors and officers of the Fair in general and Gordon G. Clark, chairman of the board; C. E. Birk, president; and T. Leo Moore, executive vice-president and general, in particular, be commended for the leadership and direction they have given the Fair through the years.

2. That T. Leo Moore be especially commended for staging a successful Fair in 1962 under the most adverse conditions and circumstances imaginable caused by the destruction by fire of one of the Fair's main buildings just two weeks prior to opening day.

3. That any construction or improvement program to the present facilities of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair should be viewed from an overall standpoint with consideration being given to the repairs and renovation of existing buildings as well as construction of a new building or buildings; parking area and other factors that will be important to the staging of a successful Fair for the next several years.

4. That no decision be made at this time regarding a construction program and that the money currently in the Special Fund be retained in that fund and that a committee be appointed to give thorough and determined study to the long range program and needs of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair and submit a complete report and recommendations to the board of directors within six months.

Motion of suspension of the 1963 Fair was made by Clark, and stipulated that a five-man committee be appointed to close the functions of the Fair on Dec. 31. The committee will make provisions for maintenance of the buildings and make future arrangements. The group will then report to the annual meeting of the directors on Jan. 15, 1963.

Suspension was caused by the decline of attendance during the past four years and the fact that the event this year cost \$5,000 over income.

The Fair is suspending current operations in a complete debt-free condition after operating several years to overcome a deficit that occurred previously.

ZANZABUKU by Lewis Collow.

Reviewed by Mrs. James A. Sewell

The author, an insurance man, disclaims the title of Explorer or Scientist. He says he is just a man with an insatiable curiosity who has traveled around the world to see strange and wonderful sights and to become acquainted with strange and wonderful people.

Collow says, "Africa is a time machine that can carry you back along the world's lifeline as far as you want to go. You can unwind the reel of history 500 years, a thousand, two thousand—even 20,000 years, but this primitive world is shrinking fast. I made up my mind to visit it before it was demolished by the steam roller of modernity."

The result is what must be priceless color pictures of animals in their habitat. The book, however, carries word pictures of the animals and of the natives which are entrancing.

Those who enjoy animal stories will like the description of the King of Beasts walking majestically toward the waterhole for a drink, while some of his lesser subjects cavort in derision—at a safe distance. Then there are descriptions of snow-topped mountains on the equator. The ancients had described these mountains, but until 75 years ago their stories were regarded as fantasy, which shows just how ignorant these people were.

Zanzabuku is full of adventure and thrillingly designed for the adult armchair traveler who likes to know what is "on the other side of the mountain."

Revive Your Rooms and Furniture, by Brostrom.

The Passionate Playgoer, by Oppenheimer.

How to Make Origami (the art of paper folding), by Honda.

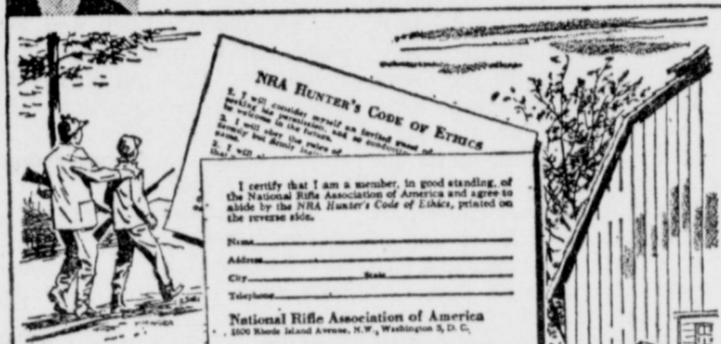
