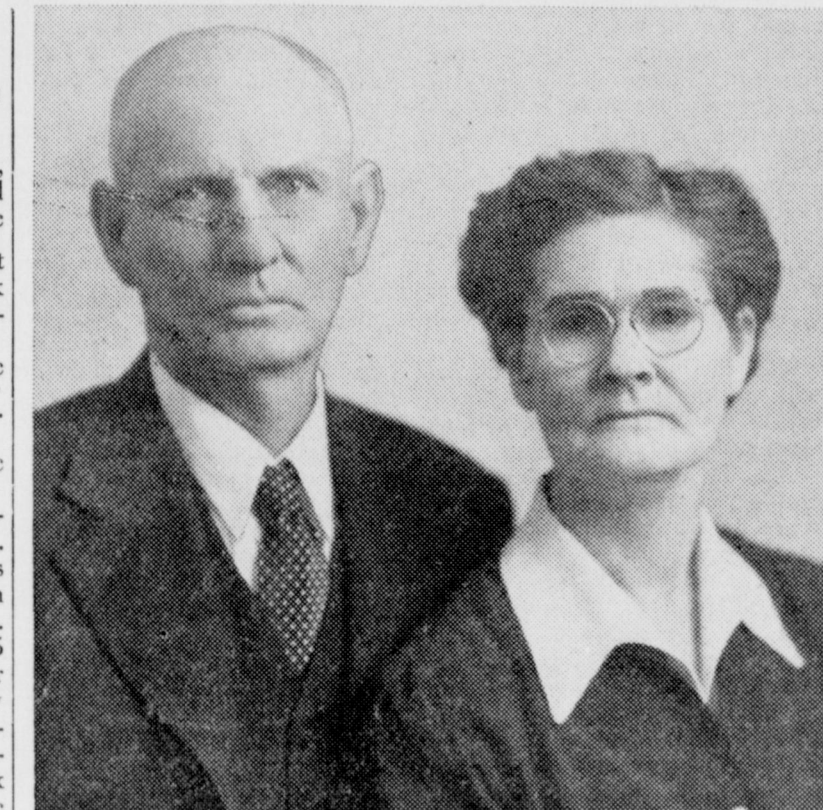

National Fire Prevention Week To Be Observed in Iowa Park

Iowa Park joins other towns throughout the U.S. in observing Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 7-13. Purpose is to remind people of the need for greater fire prevention and safety.

Last year Iowa Park had only \$2000 in insurance fire losses. One garage had a \$500 loss and a garage apartment fire cost \$1400. There were several other small fires and many grass and trash fires to keep the fireboys busy.

Iowa Park answered several calls to neighboring areas to fight some damaging fires. Check your home for fire hazards, such as accumulations of old newspapers, empty paint cans and other combustible items.

Worn out electrical appliances and extension cords are always dangerous. All electrical circuits and fuse boxes should be examined periodically.

Matches in reach and children, and careless smoking habits continue to be causes of many fires. There are some important "not to do" hints: Never leave children at home alone. If you employ a baby-sitter, be sure she know how to call the fire department — 592-4321.

Never burn leaves on a windy day. If we all do our part we can keep fires from happening.

Iowa Park firemen will have their equipment on display for some of the elementary school students Friday afternoon, Oct. 12. All schools will hold fire drills next week.

Elementary school children here will join in an all-out national attack on home fire hazards next week. They will qualify as Junior Fire Marshals by completing a home fire-hazard check, with the help of a parent, and returning the report to teacher.

Qualifying Junior Fire Marshals will receive official badge, membership card and red plastic fire helmet from R. W. Hill Insurance Agency, which sponsors the program locally in co-operation with the fire department and schools.

This is the second year local children have participated in the Junior Fire Marshal program, a national public service effort of the Hartford Insurance Group.

Urging parents to assist the youngsters with home inspections, Mr. Hill said: "A total of 11,700 persons died in fires during 1961, of which almost 40 per cent were under 14, the highest fire-death toll since 1954.

"Property losses from building fires topped a billion dollars in 1961 for the 5th straight year," he added.

Take time to study catalogs or folders. You may want your gift sent directly from the store. This saves time—no packaging, no waiting in line at the post office. Be sure to take addresses to the store if you plan to take advantage of the direct mailing service.

Get to the stores as early in the day as possible, you accomplish more. List gifts to look for in each store. You'll save miles of backtracking.

Naturally, you will shop all the Iowa Park stores for gifts. The local salespeople can supply your needs, especially if you shop early enough to give them a chance to order what they do not presently have in stock.

 gen for each 1000 square feet of
 lawn. This amount of nitrogen
 will be found in 20 pounds of
 10-5-5 or 25 pounds of 8-3-3.

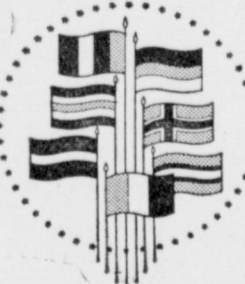

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Christ and a Faith for Our Day

If you were to make a list of the most desirable traits that make a person, what would you list? I imagine that somewhere down the line you would make mention of a sense of humor, a "well-oiled funny-bone." Now by this I do not mean a person who can tell a number of good, funny jokes. Real humor, a true sense of humor comes from being able to sense the built-in smile in many of the situations of life.

Being able to laugh in the face of many of our great problems is one of the grandest gifts that God grants us. It means that a person can take life seriously but not morbidly. Both Christianity and humor give us a sense of perspective. Humor, like Christianity, has a way of cutting a pompous strutter down to size.

The self-made man who worships his maker must act as if he were performing in the main spotlight of creation; and so he looks at everything with a kind of suspicious grimace. Nothing must challenge him. He is too self-important to recognize that his life may be just a little ridiculous. Certainly he could never take a joke on himself. That would be heresy!

Ethel Barrymore once said, "You grow up when you get your first laugh at yourself." So self-humor is the moral banana skin dedicated to the downfall of all who look at themselves with too serious an eye.

It is the man who is conscious of God who can be simplehearted enough to laugh at his own attempts at greatness.

And what about Christ? Even to suggest that He giggled a bit would cause some sobersides to cry "Blasphemy!" But Jesus' words quite often ring with a note of positive laughter. Think of the quite humorous comparisons He would make, like trying to squeeze a camel through the eye of a needle, or with his other humorous reproof involving a camel: "You blind guides, straining out a gnat, and swallowing a camel!"

If a person cannot smile at the mental picture of a big, hairy camel going down the throat—well surely God Himself would give up! Does God have a sense of humor? Well, we have it on pretty good authority that "He that sitteth in the heavens shall laugh."

When one man asked another, "Does God have a sense of humor?" he got this answer: "Well he made you and me. That must be evidence of something!" Perhaps one of the things holding back the Church today is our army of dedicated religious sourpusses!

G. K. Chesterton had a marvelous way of using humor in

the service of Christianity. In support of the uniqueness of man he once argued, "You can say to a man taking his tenth whiskey, 'Stop! Be a man!'—but you cannot effectively say to a crocodile eating his tenth missionary, 'Stop! Be a crocodile!'" And Chesterton answered the common criticism of Christianity that says that religion was created by the priests—by saying that has just as much sense as the statement that sex was created by jewelers in order to sell wedding rings!

A bit more humor, my friends. A few more chuckles in church, if you will. Not that life is just a laughing matter; but it will be just a crying matter if we don't keep ourselves in the right perspective. I'm certain that we would have a healthier society today if we all laughed more; I mean real carefree stomach-shaking laughter and not the quick smile which we see more often.

And nowhere, perhaps, is good humor more needed than in the Church!

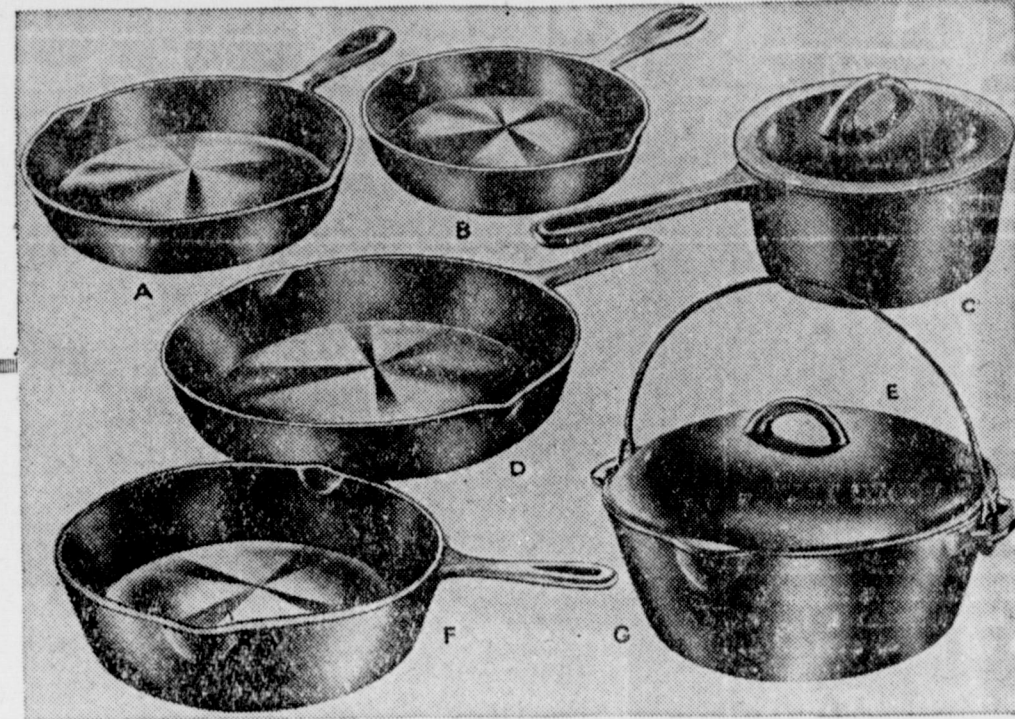

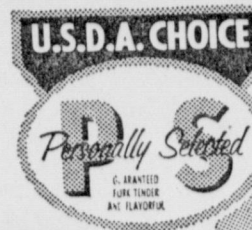

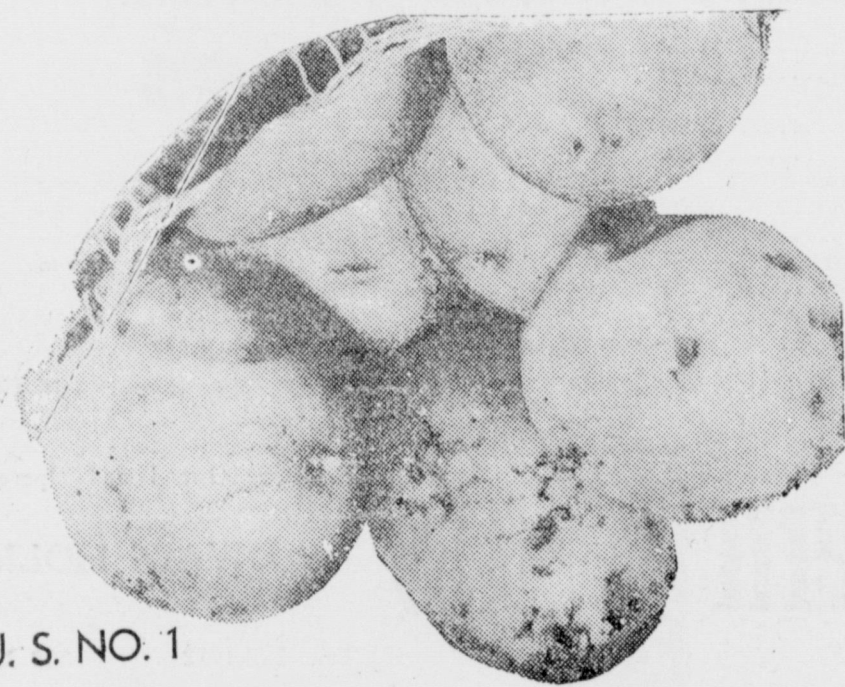

A NATION OF SHEEP
by William J. Lederer,
co-author The Ugly American.

Within 2½ years after publication of the much talked about *The Ugly American*, the authors received letters from more than 3000 readers asking the same questions: What can the average American do to help . . . us . . . in large areas of the world?

The answer, in part, to these questions is that we are ignorant of the facts about the rest of the world. "Since the US is a democracy, the broad answer to the questions is that all of us must become informed."

In his Conclusion, the author says, in part: "The final and vital point of this book is that the state of the nation depends upon individual citizens. It is we who, in a democracy, must set the examples for our officials. "I believe that only if we, you and I, inform ourselves and then act with energy and courage according to our knowledge, only then will we breed strong leaders, principled and informed. They come from us; they are among us in potential. We must create a climate in which they will flourish."

"You inherit the heart and stamina to sustain our nation in its hour of need. A citizen must perform a citizen's duties in everyday life."

Practical suggestions are given for informing ourselves about things that are happening in the world.

This book would be excellent material for discussion groups and is worthy of thoughtful consideration of all of us.

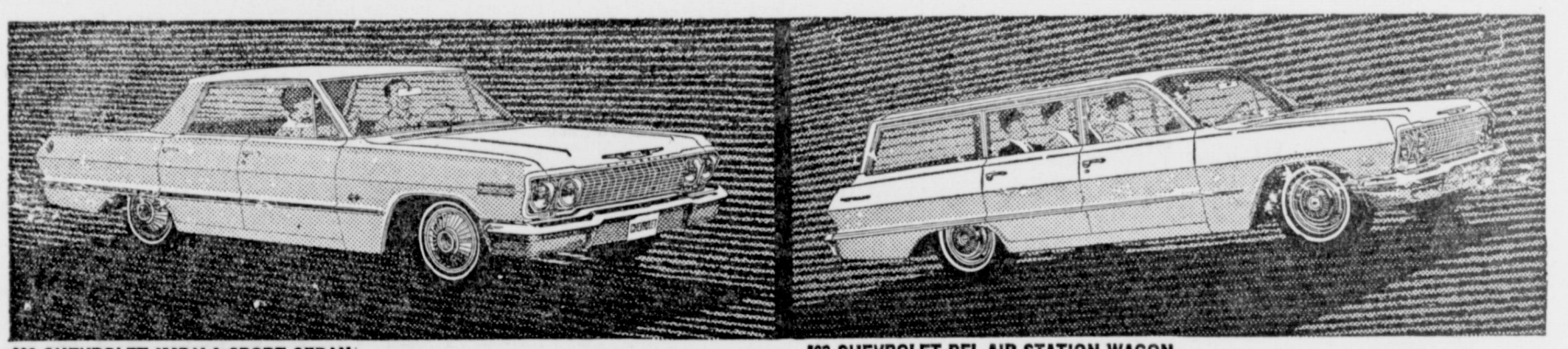
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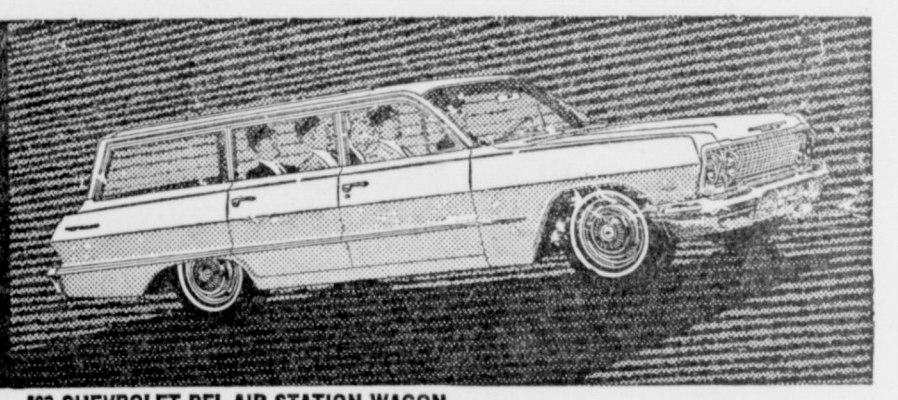
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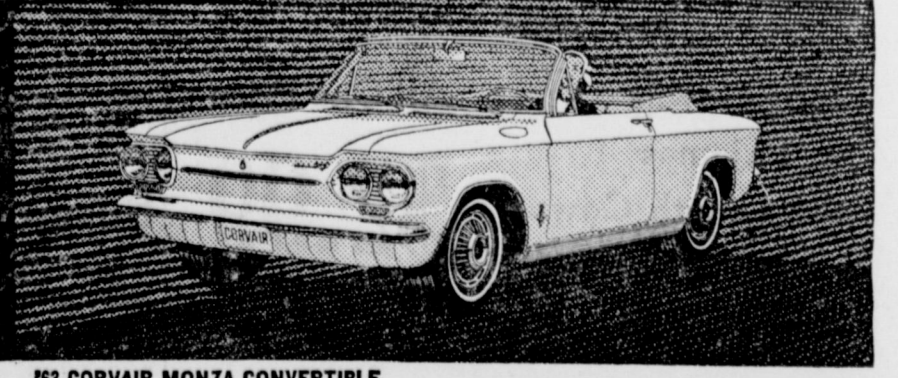


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
