KON-TIKI — Across the Pacific by Raft—by Thor Heyerdahl. Reviewed by Mrs. James A. Sewell.

"Am going to cross Pacific on a wooden raft to support a theory that the South Sea islands were peopled from Peru. Will you come? Reply at once."

That is how six brave and inquisitive men came to seek a dangerous path to test a scientific theory.

On a primitive raft made of 40-foot balsa logs and named Kon-Tiki in honor of a legendary sun, king, Heyerdahl and five companions risked their lives to show that the ancient Peruvians could have made the 4300-mile voyage to the Polynesian islands on a similar craft.

Life on the raft was strange and wonderful. Perhaps the most amazing part of the voyage was that not once during those 101 days were the men bored. The always present danger of storms (and the storms themselves) the eternal, ever-changing sea and sky, and their own ingenuity took care of that.

And the huge company of fish. They encountered the rare whale shark—Walt Disney with all his powers of imagination could not have created a more hair-raising monster—and they were the first men ever to see a live snake mackerel.

On every page of this true record—from the building of the

raft through all the dangerous and comic adventures on the sea to the spectacular crash-landing and the native islanders' hula dances—each reader will find a wholesome and spell-binding escape from the 20th century.

For its fearlessness and daring, as well as for the scientific value of the results accomplished, the Kon-Tiki Expedition has been hailed as one of the great feats of our times.

The writer, Thor Heyerdahl, had devoted more than 10 years to tracing the origins of Polynesian islanders. Born in Norway, he first studied to become a zoologist but during a year spent on a remote Pacific island, he made archeological finds that turned his attention to the history and the origin of the Polynesian race.

Christ and a Faith for Our Day

Someone has said "Life is one crazy thing after another and people in love are two crazy things after each other." When these crazy things settle down to marry and rear a family, there are some responsibilities that go with all the craziness.

You would probably expect me to say that the real question of family relationships is whether or not you have family devotions, ask blessings at meals or to church. But this is not the basic question at all! This is vital, extremely vital to your family. But it is not the basic question. The basic question is: How well are you accepted?

If you are the head of the family, does anyone else think so, besides you? If you are a mother, does anyone take seriously your motherhood, besides you? If you are young people, are you accepted as young people, rather than having your parents wish you had never happened?

Real acceptance is the heart of family life; it is the most essential thing parents can and must give to their children. If this relationship of mutual acceptance really happens in a home, then that home will become much more than the service station and cafe into which many houses have developed.

And for husbands and wives, there is absolutely nothing that is as great a constructive influence on the life of your children than your love for one another. Some parents think they should not show affection of any kind in front of the children. This is nonsense. Mutual affection between husband and wife is to the family what a heating system is to a house; it provides a warm and comfortable atmosphere for the whole home.

No better advice was ever given to married people than what the old mountain preacher said: "Don't both of you get mad at the same time." The grammar is a little mixed but the advice is straight down the road. The point is that when God really moves into a family relationship then there is a true affection between parents and between parents and children, which can meet all the disagreements and disturbances which do come up!

As Malachi says, "He (God) shall turn the heart of the fathers to the children, and the heart of the children to the fathers."

our children certainly does not mean to leave them alone; yet it does not mean to devour them! It is for Christian fathers and mothers to treat their children as full persons, and not merely as pawns on the chessboard of their own lives.

With mutual understanding and mutual acceptance of each person as he is and where he is, our families will be a credit to God and a living channel for the love of Jesus Christ.

Lone Star Gas Pushes Safety

Year-round home safety program inaugurated in 1961 by Lone Star Gas company will enter its second year Sept. 1. Texas Safety Association and the Iowa Park Herald will be co-sponsors of the program.

Carl Walsh, Lone Star manager here, said this week, "This program has as its objectives the saving of lives and prevention of home accidents by teaching the individual to detect and eliminate home hazards."

Home accidents occur in Texas at the rate of one every 16 seconds and a victim of a home accident dies every seven hours, TSA reports.

Advertisements and stories will tell how home accidents occur and will suggest methods of elimination of these hazards.

A free pamphlet on home safety may be obtained at the offices of Lone Star and the Herald shortly before the first of each month, starting Sept. 1. Based on Texas Safety Association records of home accident deaths and injuries in preceding years, each pamphlet tells the number of accident deaths and injuries expected during the ensuing month—and tells how these will occur and gives the ages of the expected victims.

Two pamphlets tell of home hazards faced by old and young family members in the 65-and-over and the 4-and-under age brackets. Hazard controls are suggested in these pamphlets.

Other materials include a list of 20 suggestions for home safety activities at the community level for club, school, business, church and neighborhood groups. Available for speakers is a list of starters tailored for talks of 5 to 30 minutes duration.

Pensive Notes

Ah, the Popularity Quotient of old J. Penwright will really tumble after this one. The Town of Friendly Religion, pardon—Living, will certainly love me no longer. But I must speak out because something has happened which has affected my own life this past week. Somehow, if this is something which has happened personally to a person it must at least be worth giving ear to.

I have been toying seriously with Christianity for several months now. I have had some long conversations with my religious friend, and I suppose that in some of my less stubborn moments I almost was to the point of what you might call commitment.

I have been able to see the Church, or so I thought, in a much more serious perspective than I had ever thought possible. I had about become convinced that what I had rejected for so long was a local corruption of what the Church really is.

But then we come along with this "revival" which has devoured so much time and effort. Now don't get me wrong. There is nothing wrong at all with the revival idea if it is just to be the opportunity for revival among those who are already committed. But to imagine that a "revival" or "gospel meeting" or whatever else you want to call it is the means for reaching those on the outside of the Church is pure nonsense.

Some of the preachers and church members of our town have been acting as if the Kingdom of God would or could trot right in on the heels of this "revival." I have attended one of these revivals and I came away in tears, not because I was moved by the

service, but because of the harm I believe it was doing to the real cause of the Church. And since my religious friend's church is participating I am somewhat disillusioned. When are the churches going to stop putting on big shows and start living their Christianity in their everyday lives? It would seem to me this is where it really counts.

My religious friend tells me about the meeting of the World Council of Churches in India sometime last year. There was much reaction in that country to the presence of this large and great Christian meeting. But something that one of the Hindu journalists said is just penetrating.

He wrote: "It is good for the Christian churches to get together . . . but what we really need from Christians is not men who take up a microphone but men who live among us and take up a Cross."

When that happens in this town I suppose that there could really be a Christian revolution in our whole life. "Revivals" that try to squeeze conversion into people can only turn many people away from the Church. At least I know one very well, for he is

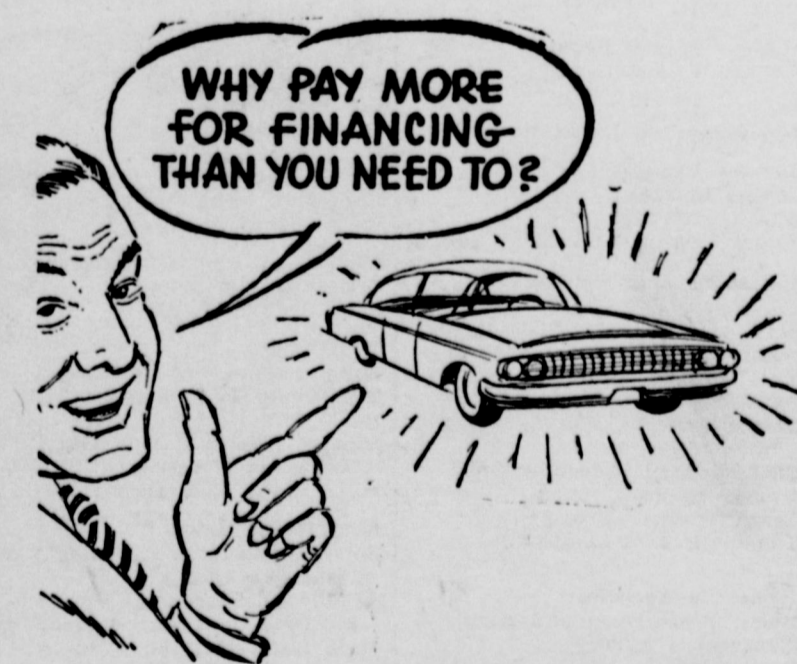

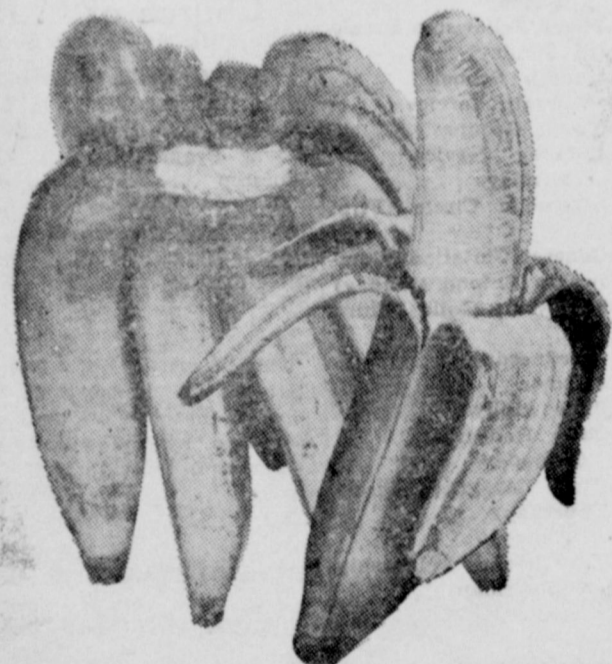
