Scrap Metal Shortage

Still Serious Problem An estimated 120 million tons of scrap or potential scrap were permanently lost during the war years, according to Northern Trust company, Chicago. In addition, a decreasing rate of domestic scrap return is being experienced because of, among other factors, production of more durable steels and the retention of automotive and railroad equipment beyond the normal

scrapping stage. "While higher prices usually bring out more scrap, the price of No. 1 heavy melting scrap occasionally has risen above major basing-point quotations for primary forms of semi-finished steel," the company

Normally pig iron and scrap are charged into open hearth furnaces in about equal proportions. When scrap becomes scarce the pig iron ratio may be increased to about 60 per cent and the scrap ratio cut to 40 per cent. Maintenance of the 60-40 per cent ratio soon tightens pig

iron supplies. Production of pig iron is depend-ent not only upon blast furnace capacity but also upon the movement of additional iron ore, coking coal and limestone to the mills by the Great Lakes fleet and the railroads, both of which have operated this year at near-capacity levels. Large scale expansion in pig iron output would call for extension of all mineto-mill facilities.

Teeth Offer Numerous

Means of Identification

Microscopic lines or streaks in the enamel and dentine of human teeth provide an additional means of identification beyond that available through dentist's records of fillings and other treatment, according to a report to American Dental association by Dr. Gosta Gustafson, Goteborg, Sweden.

One of the tasks in forensic medicine is to identify corpses by comparing their teeth with data obtained from some dentist's records or from persons who knew the victim when he lived. Ordinarily a routine examination of the complete set of teeth is enough for an exact identification of a corpse, but it sometimes happens that only a few teeth remain after crimes or accidents.


In cases of mutilation, too, the remains may be so badly treated as to defy a proper reconstruction. After explosion accidents sometimes only the teeth remain. In all such cases it is impossible to determine the number of victims by means of macroscopic (ordinary visual) exami-

Nicknames of Presidents

Many presidents have acquired nicknames reflecting some outstanding trait or popular evaluation. Such instances as Father of his Country (Washington), Colossus of Debate (John Adams), Pen of the Revolution or Sage of Monticello (Jefferson), Father of the Constitution (Madison), are examples. Usually such nicknames are entirely laudatory, but sometimes they carry a bit of criticism, as, the Accidental President (John Quincy Adams, Millard Fillmore), His Accidency (Arthur, Cleveland), President de facto (Hayes). Others are quite neutral, as for example, the First Dark Horse (Polk), Silent Cal (Coolidge), Napoleon of Protection (McKinley). A few are on a more familiar and intimate basis, and have a more general acceptance, as Old Hickory (Jackson), Honest Abe (Lincoln), Teddy (Roosevelt). The reference to Pres. Franklin D. Roosevelt as F.D.R., by the press generally, was suggested by the President himself.

Care of Sick Child The needs of a sick child, in addition to actual physical care, were the subject of a recently concluded study of pediatric nursing, spon-sored by the National League of Nursing Education in New York hospital. Psychological factors rank high in the care of the child patient, the report points out, but at present the psychological care given is far less adequate than the physical care. For example, instead of encouraging the child to help keep himself clean, it was found that too often the nurse herself took over the task, thereby increasing the child's dependency upon her. During visits to the hospital, the parents can aid in the child's psychological care by giving the nurse information about family life and the habits of the child. Beginning guidance in health habits at home aids the child in making an easy adjustment to hospitalization.

Short but Busy Life Born a Scottish peasant of humblest parentage, John Paul Jones became a sailor at 12, mate at 17, captain at 20; slavetrader, East Indiaman and Virginia planter-all before he passed the age of 26; naval lieutenant at 28, captain at 29, and commodore at 32; at 33, the ocean hero of the Old World and the New, a Knight of France, the trust-ed friend of Washington, Franklin, Jefferson, Lafayette, Hamilton and Morris; at 36, special envoy to the most aristocratic of courts, charged with the most delicate, difficult and intricate of missions-the adjudication and collection of international claims. At 40 he was voted a gold medal by congress; at 41, a vice-admiral in the navy of an empire. He died at the age of 45.





Less Land Will Produce

More and Better Food If American cropland were fenced inte equal shares, your plot would be smaller than three football fields. That's only about three acres, compared with about four at the end of World War I, according to Clinton P. Anderson, secretary of agriculture. If our population grows as we expect, your share by 1970 will be reduced to about two and threequarter acres.

Think of your future in terms of your diminishing share of land. You will have to depend on it because there is very little more that can be brought into use through drainage and irrigation. And we still are using up our soil resources faster than we rebuild them. Yet, your patch of cropland, together the permanent pasture and range, is giving you a higher standard of living and providing a great deal of food to relieve hunger

In the future, on the same land we have today, fewer farmers will furnish greater abundance for more people. The matchless science of agriculture already enables the average farm worker to turn out nearly two-thirds more than he did 20 years ago.

The future will see increasingly better crop varieties, including more hybrids. Plant explorers, after a wartime lapse, are searching the world for new plants. With the old and the new parent stock, scientists will create improved varieties to resist new strains of disease and insects that continually threaten crops. They will give progressively higher yields. They will make possible finer quality and greater food

Heart Disease Deaths

One person dies every minute of heart diseases. One out of every three deaths in the United States is due to diseases of the heart and blood vessels. Deaths from diseases of the heart and blood vessels are three times as high as cancer, six times as high as accidents, eight times as high as pneumonia and eleven times as high as tuberculosis. Heart disease takes a greater death toll than the five other leading causes combined. Diseases of the heart and circulation cause 500 times as many deaths as infantile paralysis. Diseases of the heart and blood vessels cause a greater volume of disability than any other single disease and are responsible for a loss of 152,100,000 work days annually. It is estimated that one out of every 20 persons suffers from diseases of the heart and blood vessels and nearly one out of every two deaths after the age of 45 is caused by heart disease.

tions, according to Iowa State college. But they are susceptible to deterioration when placed in soils with high acid or high alkali content. They are not subject to damage by freezing and thawing, as are some clay tiles. Clay tile with low absorption capacity are good for use in high acid or high lime areas, since they are resistant to action of acid or alkali. They should be dense, uniform in shape, have proper strength and be free from checks, cracks or foreign matter.

Wool, a natural clothing fiber, comes mostly from sheep. Wool is made up of thousands of tiny crinkly threads called fibers, according to "Wool in the World." Ton to Cut Down Losses Cf Call's During Summer

Livestock raisers are here given 10 tips on how to prevent losses and speed up gains of cattle during the pasture season this summer. The American Foundation for Animal Health has issued the following check-list of summer safeguards

for cattle: (1) Don't let animals gorge themselves on lush, young pastures. Guard against bloat and grass tetany by making a gradual change to green feed.

(2) Inspect the herd once week for evidence of pink-eye. (3) In blackleg areas, have all

calves vaccinated against this dis-Protect the herd against flies by spraying with DDT at

least four times during the sum-(5) Examine pastures periodi-

cally for the presence of poisonous plants. (6) Check the herd regularly for accidental wounds through

which screw worms may enter. (7) If suspected cases of lumpy jaw develop, get those animals off pasture and away from the rest of the herd and have them treated immediately.

(8) When calves are unthrifty, suspect the presence of parasites. The parasite danger is especially great on old pastures and community pastures.

(9) If cattle share pastures with stock from other farms, have them immunized against tetanus, blackleg and malignant edema.

(10) Bovine tuberculosis is still a problem, and cattle should be tested periodically for tuberculosis as well as brucellosis.

Electric Motor Industry Celebrates Its 40th Year

On an evening 40 years ago, 33 men, representing 25 companies, assembled to organize the American Association of Electric Motor Manufacturers.

It was the first trade association in the electrical apparatus manufacturing industry and the earliest forerunner of National Electrical Manufacturers' Association,, which was formed in 1926.

Today the industry embraces 180 manu facturers across the land. Last year alone they produced more than 25 million motors, ranging from midgets to giants of 89,000 horsepower.

George C. Tenney, editor and publisher of "Electrical West," says the electric motor made possible the production line and modern industrial techniques.

"More than any other factor", he declares, "the seven or eight horsepower at the command of every American worker, largely in the form of electric motors, is responsible for this country's vast productive capacity and a standard of living which is the envy of the rest of the world."

During the war, he pointed, out, the industry produced millions of motors, in 40 thousand different models. A B-29, he explained, required at least 300 motors, 125 on an LST, and more than 900 on a

Economical Operation of Tractor Tractor engines should operate within definite temperature limits for best economy and performance, according to Guy W. Gienger, extension agricultural englneer at the University of Maryland. To keep the cooling system working at its best he recommends: (1) Be sure the fan belt does not slip. There should be three-fourths inch deflection when you push against the belt, (2) Drain and flush the cooling system at least twice each year, (3) Keep the radiator clean to allow air to pass by all the cooling fins and tubes, and (4) Use clean soft water (rain water preferred) to prevent the accumulation of dirt and lime inside the engine. Rust inhibitors used with soft water will prevent the formation of rust inside the engine.

Insecticide Machines Need Care

Spraying and dusting machinery used in combatting crop pests should be cleaned every day during periods of use. Insecticides may be injurious to rubber and metal parts of the equipment. Keeping the spray outfit in good mechanical condition is important also, as parts may be difficult to obtain. Engineers of the USDA say that a spraying rig can be cleaned after each day's work by running water through it continuously until the water comes out clear. Dusting equipment may be cleaned by emptying the hopper and distributing system and then gently rapping tubes and nozzles while the engine is running. The outside as well as the inside of such machines should be kept free of accumulations.

Fired Hybrids on Way Breeding of a many kinds of flowering plants to be grown from seed in the home garden can follow the lines that proved so succorn. A technique that is coming into use in flower breeding is the utilization of hybrid vigor. When two plants of different lines are cross with one another, the resulting hybrid is often more vigorous than either parent. The chance of obtaining greatly increased vigor usually increases the more
