sHUCKs

by George R. Huckaby

We have read and studied the
offer made by the railroads to
their employees with amazement.

Should the workers accept this
offer without amendment, they
would lose many of the securities
they now have in regard to se-
niority and working conditions.

Through the past half century
the working people have gradually
arrived at a semblance of right
in their relation with management
but should they accept the current
offer they would throw most of
their advances out the window,
and return working people to the
serfdom endured before men had
sense enough to unite.

Read a few of the conditions
insisted upon by the railroads:

B. Road Train and Engine Service Assignments

"1. The carrier has the right to
establish, move, consolidate and
abolish crew terminals, to merge
and consolidate seniority districts
and to establish interdivisional,
inter-seniority district intradivisional
and intradivisional and intrase-
niority district runs in assigned or
unassigned service with the right
to operate any such run, whether
assigned or unassigned (including
extra service), on either a one
way or turnaround (including
short turnaround) basis and
through established crew termi-
nals. The right to operate such
runs as may be established under
the provisions of this rule will be
free of the imposition of any re-
strictions as to class of traffic
which may be handled or as to
the origin or destination of any
empty or loaded cars moving on
such runs; . . ."

"C. Combination of Road and Yard Service

"1. Passenger crews will per-
form any and all switching and
station work in connection with
the cars of their own trains as may
be required of them at their in-
itial and final terminals and at all
intermediate points, including the
clearing of any track or tracks
and the shoving and coupling of
cars on any track for the purpose
of handling the cars of their own
trains, the handling of the light
engine or engines of their own
trains; and in the performance of
such work will handle cars of oth-
er than their own trains as may
be required, including the respot-
ting of displaced cars. Road crews
in other than passenger service
will perform any and all switching
and station work as may be re-
quired of them at their initial and
final terminals and at all interme-
diate points, including the hand-
ling of the light engine or en-
gines of their own trains, whether
or not such switching and station
work is in connection with cars
of their own trains. When switch-
ing or station work is performed
by road crews as provided herein,
such work shall be paid for as a
part of the road day or trip and
additional compensation for such
work shall not be paid under either
road, yard or hosting rules or
regulations. The provisions of
this paragraph 1 shall apply wheth-
er or not yard crews, yard men
or hostlers are on duty when and
where the work is performed.

"2. Yard crews, where em- ployed, may be required to per- form both road and yard service; and where switching limits are established yard crews may be re- quired to perform service outside such switching limits. . . ."

"4. Management has the exclu- sive right to designate and change switching limits, and to establish and abolish yard and hosting service and yard and hosting ser- vice assignments."

"A. Consist of Road and Yard Crews

"1. Management has the unre-
stricted right, under any and all
circumstances, to determine when
and if trainment (assistant con-
ductors, ticket collectors, baggage-
men, brakemen and flagmen) shall
be used in each crew employed in
all classes of road service, . . ."
