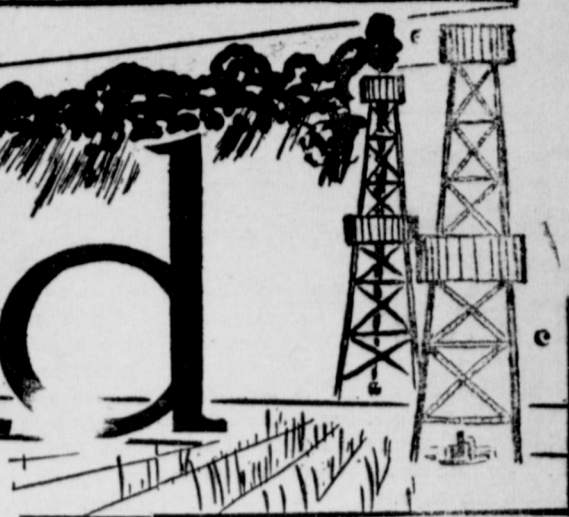

## Contract Let for New Elementary School Building

Approximately 26 men representing various construction companies in Iowa Park and Wichita Falls met Tuesday afternoon in the high school for the opening of bids on the new elementary school building to be erected in the southeast part of town.

C. and W. Construction company of Wichita Falls made the low bid of \$208,863 and was given the contract.

There were four alternates and the board voted to cancel No. 1, which included paving for parking lot and bus driveways.

Alternate No. 4, covered walkway of Ethyle Kidwell elementary school.

The board accepted the two other alternates: No. 2, Low brick wall and portion of concrete walk at flagpole; No. 3, Dwyer kitchen unit in clinic and teachers' workroom.

Representatives of C and W said work on the new school will begin soon and it is expected to be ready for use next January.

The building will be on South Texowa street and will be the third elementary school in the system. It is to be brick construction with glazed tile wainscoting, terrazzo floors in halls and lobby,

vinyl tile in classrooms and ceramic tile in restrooms.

There will be covered walkways, eight classrooms, cafeteria, teachers' workroom, nurse's quarters and principal's quarters, including inner and outer offices.

Plans have been approved by Texas Fire Commission as a semi-fireproof, highest rating as to safety and design.

All board members were present for the bid letting.

## Graduation from IPHS Stiffened

Iowa Park school board recently approved graduation requirements for the high school as follows:

Graduation Requirements: To be eligible for graduation, a student will be required to carry a full program for eight complete semesters. A full program will be five subjects plus physical education, or a substitute approved by the principal. No student will be allowed to take more than five courses plus P.E. or its substitute

in a semester. When a subject or assignment is substituted for P.E. it will count only at the rate of ¼ credit per year. Band, choral, etc. may be substituted for P.E. during the junior and senior years.

Students who attend W. F. George high school for four years will be required to have 18 credits for graduation.

Minimum requirements for graduation for 1963 are:	
English	4
Mathematics	2
Social Science	3
Laboratory Science	2
P.E. (or a substitute)	1
Electives	6
	18

\*Algebra I or higher  
\*\*Two years of a vocational subject or two years of a foreign language may be accepted as an alternate for one year of science. In such cases the remaining required science unit must be either biology, chemistry or physics.

(Any deviation from these requirements must be approved in writing by the principal.)  
Tentative plans to augment the above rule will be voted on at the next board meeting.

## Building Here Continues Apace; Rains Keep Both Lakes Full

—Let's take a look at our city the first half of 1962 and see how it is growing. Miss Dossia Smith, city secretary, reports:

Building Permits:  
Residential, 100.....\$1,008,750  
Commercial, 2.....\$80,000  
Remodeling and additions, 6.....\$12,048

Iowa Park is proud of the new power plant we maintain north of town near the old city lake.

J. C. Keeningsham, water superintendent, reports he and his men are pumping only 600,000 gallons of water each day because of the nice rains we have been receiving. A few hot days the demand ran up to 900,000 gallons.

Average during hot summer days is 1,200,000 gallons but the new and old filter plants are able to supply 1,500,000 gallons daily.

Lake Iowa Park is brimful and running over the spillway. The old lake also has plenty of water in it.

Keeningsham says he is using water from both lakes and using both filter plants. The water has P.H. Test of 8.3 with a total hardness overall of 104, which is quite low. Folk here should feel fortunate in having these two complete filtering plants, which are the most modern in this area, plus two lakes.

Overall value of water improvements in 1960-61 is \$265,444.13 and overall sewer improvement, \$137,822.21.

Iowa Park has in service 1,662 water meters and 1,488 sewer taps. Since Jan. 1, water meters set have been 111 with 122 sewer taps.

Employed with Keeningsham in the water department are Burl Darnell, George Davis, Wayland Walls, Earl Toler, Jackie Blaylock, Louis Crawford

Mayor C. L. Metz and the city aldermen feel Mr. Keeningsham and his staff are doing a fine job in keeping up with the growth of our town. Besides caring for the water plant, they keep the grounds in fine shape. It is really a place of beauty with the buildings painted and clean and the grass and flowers well cared for.

## Applications Sought for IP Postmastership

Examination for postmaster at Iowa Park, 5,790 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until July 17, the US civil service commission announced this week.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy here must have at least three years of experience (education above high school level may be substituted for 1½ years of experience) showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position. They must have resided in the delivery area of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office here. Application forms must be filed with the US Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, District of Columbia, and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

## Two Children Are Drowned in Separate Accidents Here

Tragic death struck Iowa Park twice Tuesday in less than three hours. Both were drownings of children.

### Darrell Lee Claybrook

Darrell Lee Claybrook, 7, son of Sgt. and Mrs. Roy L. Claybrook, 500 block North Colorado, was reported drowned at about 10:30 a.m. as he and some friends played in a stock tank just east of town. The boys were fishing and swimming.

Darrell was playing on a large innertube when he slipped off it into water about 14 feet deep. One of the boys went for help. The fire alarm was sounded and rescue work began.

The small but deep tank was dragged with a seine and heavy chains. Local fireman and others worked for more than an hour before the body was discovered by Dwain Holmes, local business man and fireman. He was assisted by Luther Wakefield Jr., another businessman and fireman, in bringing the body to the surface.

Sand Beach swimming pool sent three lifeguards to assist. Artificial respiration by the fire department's resuscitator and mouth to mouth respiration by

the firemen were unsuccessful. The resuscitator was bought a few years ago by donations to the department.

Dr. Earl Watson of Park Clinic assisted in trying to bring life back to Darrell Lee.

The body was taken to Tanner Funeral Home and transferred to Vernon late Tuesday evening.

The boy's father is stationed at Sheppard AFB and is a former resident of Vernon. The family has been in Iowa Park about a year. Darrell Lee was a first grade student at Kidwell school and attended First Baptist church.

Funeral service will be conducted in Second Baptist church in Vernon at 10:00 a.m. Thursday with Rev. Claude Withrow, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in Wilbarger Memorial Park under direction of Sullivan Funeral Home, with members of Sgt. Claybrook's squadron as pallbearers.

Darrell Lee was born Feb. 16, 1955, in Malvern, Ark. Surviving are his parents; three sisters: Beverly Ann, 10, Tenia Lucille, 2, and Marjorie Antoinette, six months; grandparents Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Claybrook of Vernon and Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Ward of Monahans.

A few minutes after 1:00 p.m. Tuesday the fire alarm was sounded. To the amazement of firemen answering the call, they learned

another child had been drowned in the irrigation ditch just south Wichita river bridge near the Holliday and Kamay road intersection.

### Elena Alambar

Little Elena Alambar, 7, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Alambar, had followed her father to the irrigation ditch and had fallen in unnoticed.

Mr. Alambar found his child floating down the ditch near their home.

Again the firemen, assisted by Dr. Watson worked to revive the little girl with artificial respiration without any response.

Funeral rites were held at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday in Our Lady of Guadalupe church in Wichita Falls. Rev. Buenaventura Ballester, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Sacred Heart cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

Elena was born in Wichita Falls on Nov. 22, 1954.

Surviving are the parents, 12 brothers and sisters, and the grandparents.

The people of Iowa Park have expressed their praise and thanks to the Iowa Park fireman, the sheriff's department and many other persons who assisted in the two mishaps that have saddened our community.

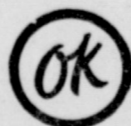

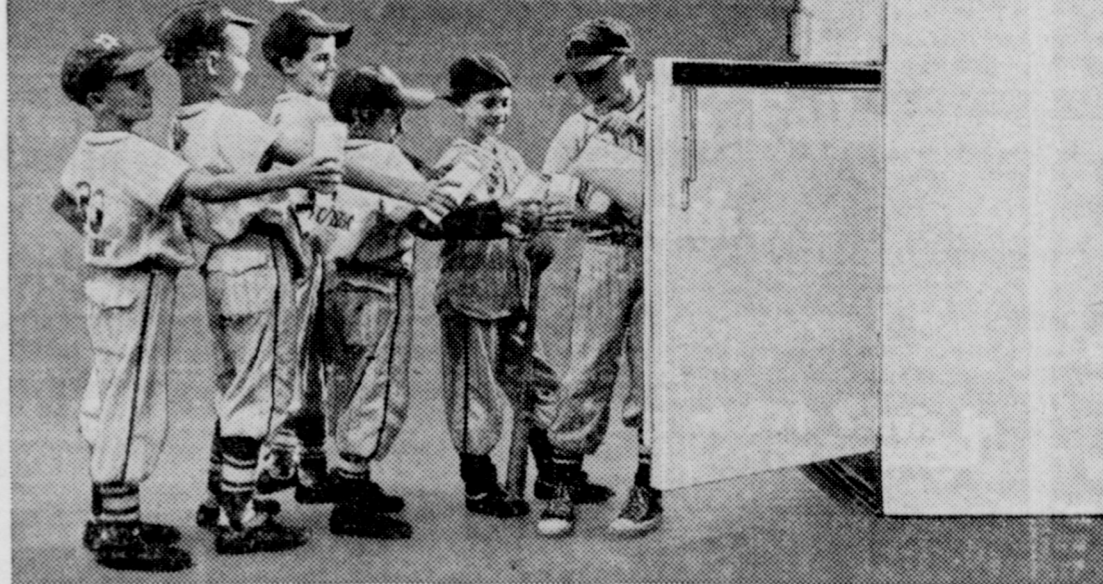

## Christ and a Faith for Our Day

Sometimes people say to the minister, "I may not have been with you in body last Sunday, but believe me, pastor, I was there in spirit." Well, it's very kind for people to give their church the presence of their disembodied spirits!

Many people fall into this trap of thinking there is some significance in saying, "I am with you in spirit." Now it's nice to be remembered, but not when it is an excuse for not being there in person.

Unfortunately one cannot be on the golf course, check his watch to see that it is 11:00 o'clock, and then dispatch his spirit to worship, like sending a pigeon on a timed flight! Nor will his "spirit" be of much help in making a visit to a sick or lonely friend.

This is the glory of God, although it often frustrates our own little desires, that he has made us whole persons. There is no neat distinction between "body" and "soul." We are whole people; and when we do something all of us does it. And when we do not do something, all of us does not do it!

Suppose for example all members of the congregation would decide to be present in spirit but not in body. What a delightful time the minister would have, preaching to disembodied spirits, leading a congregation of ghosts in singing hymns and saying prayers! What an experience of worship! No one would go to sleep. No one would arrive late. No one would think the service ran too long.

Dr. Donald Miller, new president of Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, suggests this would solve many of the church's problems. Spirits would need no heat in winter, no cooling in summer; no cushioned pews, no redecorated sanctuary, no educational facilities, no sexton, no organ or choir or hymnals.

All they would need might be a minister to visit them occasionally when their spirits happened to be at home in their bodies rather than in church!

Also this would be revolutionary in the church's impact on the world. The testimony to Christ of this vast army of spirits would be quiet and undisturbing and quite other-worldly. The church then would not have to bother with attacking problems, exposing evils; it wouldn't even have to give any evidence of its presence in the community.

And if a person were looking for some answer to a deep problem of life, to the facing of a powerful temptation, or searching for some real comfort in his sadness, then he would be able to turn to the empty fellowship of spirits floating around somewhere up in the gallery, while the bodies were at home, or on the golf links, or perhaps at the lake for the weekend.

You may be on the membership role of a church someplace; but if you are not a member in the same way a hand is the member of a body, then you are not a Christian!

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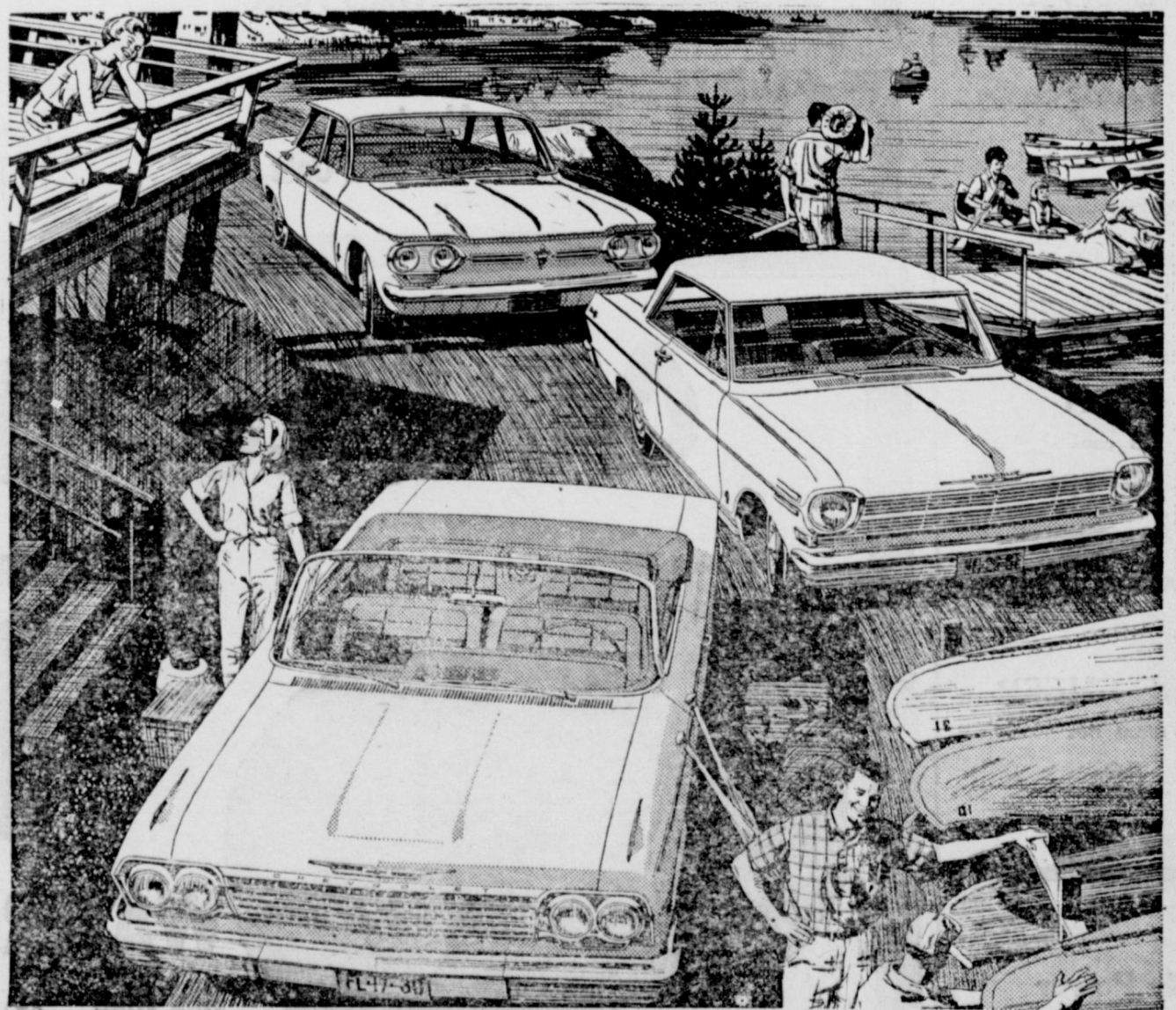

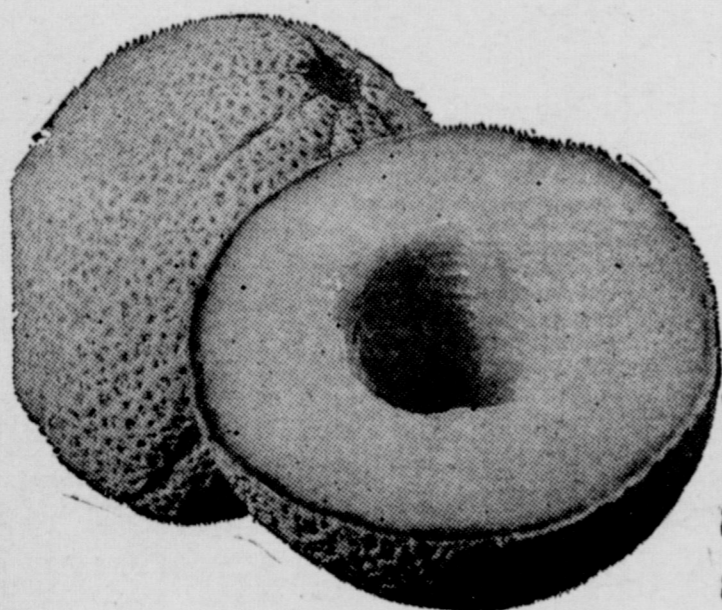

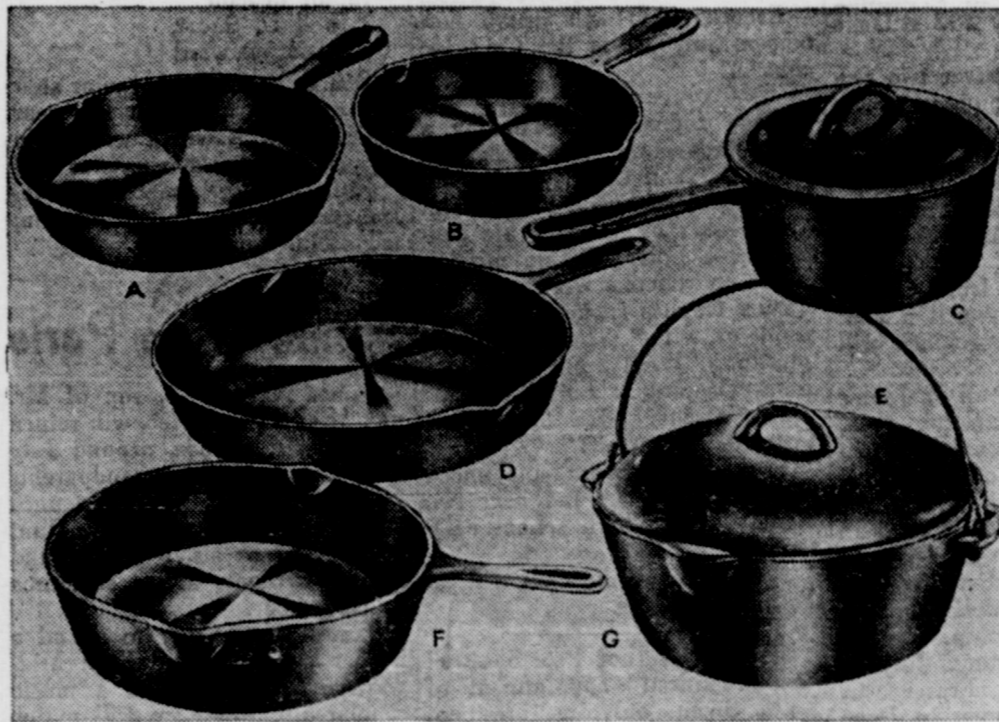
