

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can deal with the

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position. They must have resided in the delivery area of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70

years of age cannot be appointed. Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office here. Application forms must be filed with the US Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, District of Columbia, and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.
