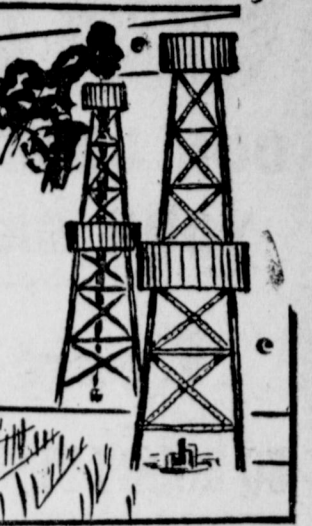

All students will register at the

elementary students south of the

register on this date, including
first graders who have previously
registered.

All new students must have rec-
ords of polio and smallpox shots.
Former students do not have to
show records if the shots are not
over five years past.

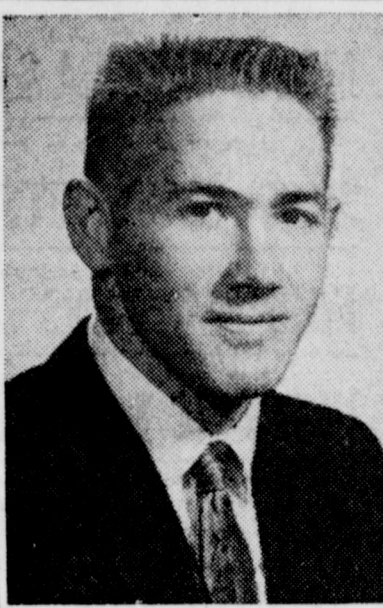
Building Plans Almost Ready

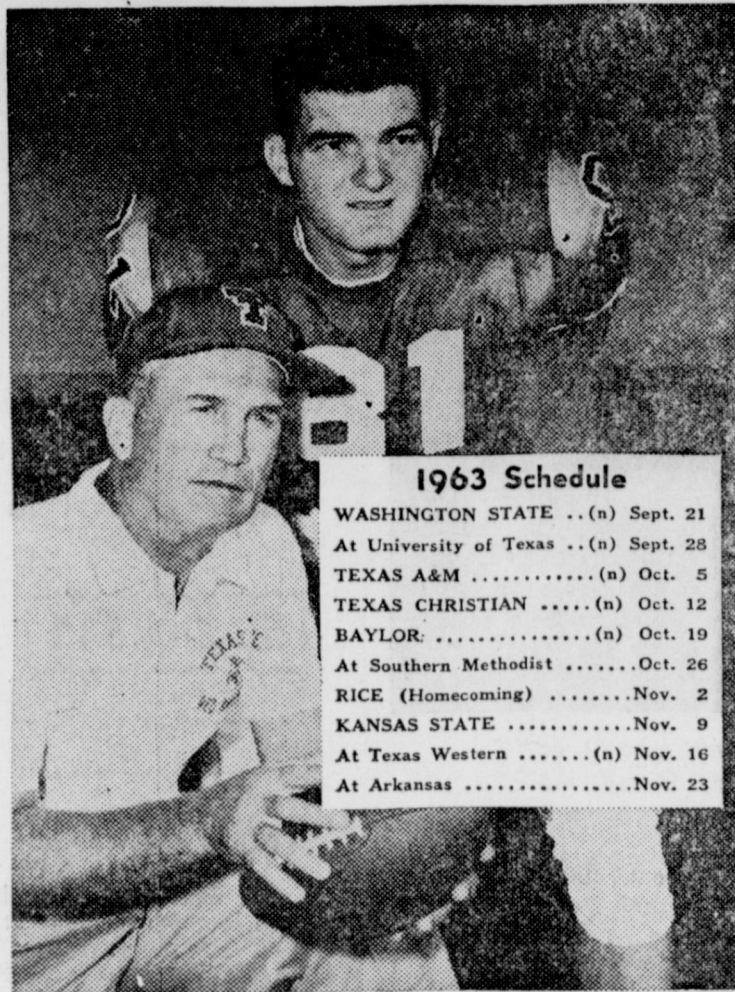

"I Won't Tell about the Supreme Court, They Think We Are a Christian Nation," is the title of an article written by Miss Mary Ann Dold of El Centro, Calif. She is niece of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Rutherford of Iowa Park.

The article was published in the El Centro Press and then in the July 15 Congressional Record.

Miss Dold has recently returned from Europe with a group of students and a professor of the University of California. Through the Austro-American Society arrangements were made for them to spend a night in homes of people behind the Iron Curtain.

Excerpts from her article in which she described a visit to Prague, Czechoslovakia follow: "During this visit I met with the youth of the Baptist church. I witnessed to people whose freedom of religion was being thwarted. These people were persecuted for their belief in God.

"I met students who had been expelled from Charles university; I met children whose fathers were in prison. Jobs in many instances were not available to young people who stood up before their congregation in the presence of Communist officials and announced their belief in God.

"I joined hands and prayed with the people. We prayed that the Iron Curtain might some day be lifted. The youth in Czechoslovakia taught me a lot about my country. America is their dream. 'America,' they said, 'is a country based on Christian heritage.'"

Miss Dold could not write and tell these Christians in Communist-dominated countries about the Supreme Court's action.
