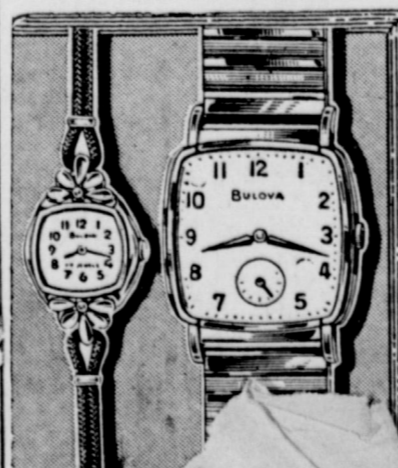

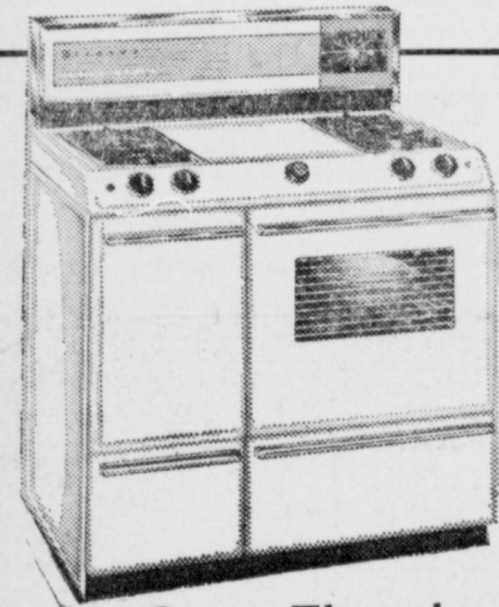

Buttses Enjoy European Trip

Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Butts returned early last week from a vacation trip to Europe. Butts is a rural mail carrier in Iowa Park. Taylor George is his substitute.

The couple left April 30 and went to Old Bridge, N.J., where they visited briefly with a daughter Mrs. Jim H. Lane and Mr. Lane, who is a pilot with Eastern Airlines.

The Buttses boarded the *Queen Elizabeth* in New York May 3 and landed at Cherbourg, France, on May 13. Mr. and Mrs. Lane flew to Paris that day, picked up a rental car and met the parents at Cherbourg.

They arrived in Holland in time for the Tulip Festival. The Keukenhof with its acres and acres of flower beds and lush lawns was a sight too beautiful for description, Mrs. Butts said.

In Amsterdam they took a canal tour. They learned the population of Amsterdam is 2,700,000 and there are 400,000 licensed bicycles. All highways have paved bicycle streets running from town to town in that area. On the canal tour they saw the Tour of Tears built in A.D. 1500; a house three stories high and three feet wide; and the last windmill of the 17th century.

A "must" for visitors to Holland is the Madurodam at Den Haag, which is a fascinating miniature of Holland. They also went to Staphorst where women and children wear wooden shoes and black clothing.

In Germany the couples had a guided tour of a castle at Hildeburg purchased and refurbished by Kaiser Wilhelm. They found the Black Forest and Bavaria fascinating. Houses with colorful pictures on the sides, and quaint dress of the people enhanced interest in the city.

Messrs. and Mmes. Butts and Lane visited Garmisch, Germany, a ski resort area. By chance they met Basi Erhardt, a famous yodeler, and learned he will appear in the Bavarian pavilion at the New York World's Fair next year.

Berchtesgaden, Germany, interested the Americans. They saw Hitler's house, the Gestapo headquarters, and toured Hitler's underground home.

Going over Passo Giovo into Switzerland they were enthralled with the beauty of the lakes and mountains, the profusion of colorful flowers and the cleanliness of the country. A common sight and familiar sound are the herds of goats and the tinkling bells on their necks.

They left Switzerland via Gothard Tunnel where they put their auto on a flatcar for the 9-mile trip.

They arrived in Monaco on the first day of the running of the Grand Prix, a series of races in Europe during the summer.

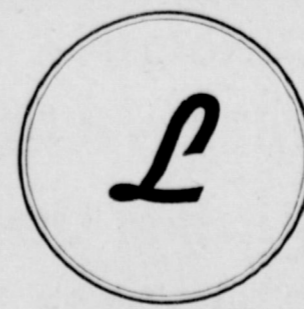
In Paris they saw the king of Sweden on his way to place a wreath on the tomb of the Unknown Soldier at the Arch of Triumph. 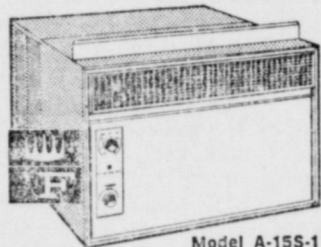

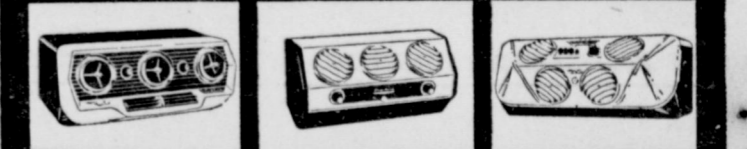
