

The wedding date is June 1. Ceremony will be performed in the church with Rev. Homer W. Thompson officiating.


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## Christ and a Faith for Our Day

Probably the greatest thing that concerns Christians in their personal faith is the "problem" of suffering. I say "problem" because it is only a problem to the Christian. To the man who believes there is no personal God, suffering cannot be a problem; it is then just a quite natural part of things that must be endured with stoic determination, set chin, clenched fist, and a great deal of inward anxiety.

But suffering is a problem to us who name the Name of Jesus Christ, because in Him we know that God is a personal, loving Father who cares for each of His children.

"Why then is there suffering?" Well, we must say that suffering and sorrow are everyone's cup and with varying draughts everybody drinks from it. Some only sip from it. Others seem forced to take long soul-shuddering drinks. In the sweep of a brief time suffering may come to some person time and again; it may seem that the sup of sorrow has that person's name engraved upon it. And this we cannot understand. We cry out "Why?"

A terrible accident comes to a child. Why did it happen? Why did God allow it to happen? And some may even ask: "Why couldn't it have happened to some 'bad' person?" How foolish we are! Who are we to judge who is good and who is bad? We know that we all shall die. Our Lord died at 33 years. Shall we say that He did not have a full life? Is it not foolish to ask, "Why couldn't it have been someone else?" It will be someone else; it will be each of us in our time.

We suffer because we live in a life of order and law. If a man

jumps off the Empire State building and then decides halfway down that he didn't really want to jump off, it is too late. If God were to reverse the law of gravity to save this one person, think of the countless others who would be destroyed!

But basically the reason there is suffering is that there is love! Every person faces the hazard of suffering when he dares to love. C. S. Lewis has said, "To love at all is to be vulnerable. Love anything, and your heart will be broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact, you must give it to no one . . . wrap it carefully round with hobbies and little luxuries; avoid all entanglements; lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness . . . The only place outside heaven where you can be perfectly safe from all the dangers and (pains) of love is hell."

When we are shocked to hear those awful words: "My God, my God, why hast Thou forsaken me?" surely we are told something about the ultimate risks that love runs. This is the reason it takes courage to love, because you know at some point your heart it going to be stepped on.

God does not promise an end to suffering for the Christian. He promises and gives the power to live through that suffering and to know that the sufferings of this present age are not the last word. For God Himself has spoken that last word in the person of Him who is the Word of God.

You may remember the motion picture "How Green Was My Valley." You will recall the remarkable way in which strong hymns of faith were used by the Re-

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



## Open Letter

Recently, the Iowa Park high school student council suggested that a School Policy be initiated in which all persons receiving any position of leadership or honor must meet certain requirements in order to run for that position. The object of this was to elevate the school standards and provide the best leadership possible.

Thus, a screening committee was set up in order to see if these certain persons met the qualifications. The first screening was done in concern with selecting the cheerleaders, and was done by the high school student council. It took five separate council members' votes to screen a person for any reason, or two, to screen one for the exact same reason—and there was no discussion beforehand.

Later in the year the elections for student council were held and before any member's name was to be put on the ballot that student had to pass a screening committee. This committee was not the student council. This year's student council had no say-so over who would or would not be able to run for next year's student council.

The purpose of every school is to help educate and build the character of the individual. As long as a person is elected to some office merely for popularity and meets no qualifications he is not going to try to meet any. This year's student council tried to provide a system in which the school standards and the individual's standard would be raised.

For passing these rules these students have been derided and ridiculed in every manner. Many have yelled because they were screened yet they overlook the fact that when these rules were passed it also included the screening of the present student council members for any position they might seek, thus, they were voting for these rules knowing that they might be screened.

Those who have been screened have yelled bloody murder and accused the student council of being everything from fascist to communist, yet isn't it funny that all large high schools and even junior high have even stricter rules than these.

Those who have been screened have been pitied by many misinformed parents who were told many misinformed versions of why the students were screened, and these parents have run to help these students get rid of the screening instead of helping their students raise their standards!

School elections should not be popularity contests, they should be contests to elect the best leaders. This year's student council recognized this fact and tried to organize a system whereby the students of the highest caliber were in the elections, yet, many want it to be the old way, in

This student council was faced with the decision—will we stand for what we believe and thus, most likely, give up our popularity? Yes! These members have given their popularity to stand for something, they believe, which is worth standing for. These students realize that they will never regain what has been lost, but the hope of all is a better school, dedicated, not to the advancement of their popularity, or that of anyone else, but, to the advancement of education and to a stronger individual character.

The council members, plus the others who are sponsoring this open letter truly hope that some day this town will be willing to accept these ideals and realize that they are good and just, and are needed for a stronger school and for stronger individuals. It is our hope that the parents of all of us students will study these rules unprejudicedly and will realize the true value of them, thus dropping all prejudices and unite to form a better school, not dedicated to the advancement of the popularity of their sons and daughters, but one dedicated to the advancement of education, to the raising of the students' standards, and, to the developing of stronger individuals.
