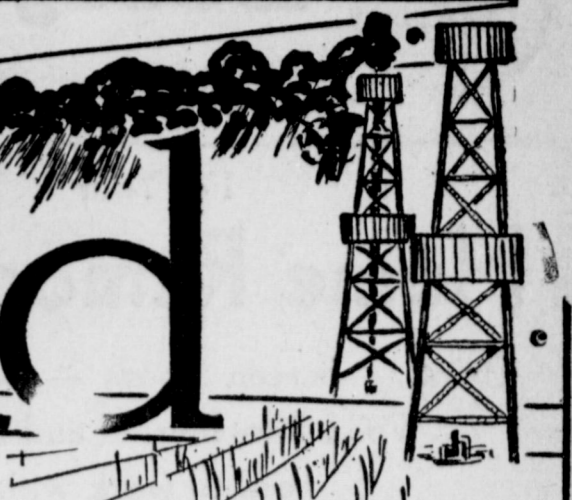

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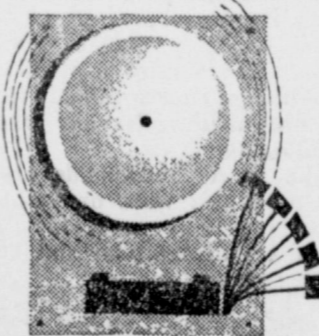

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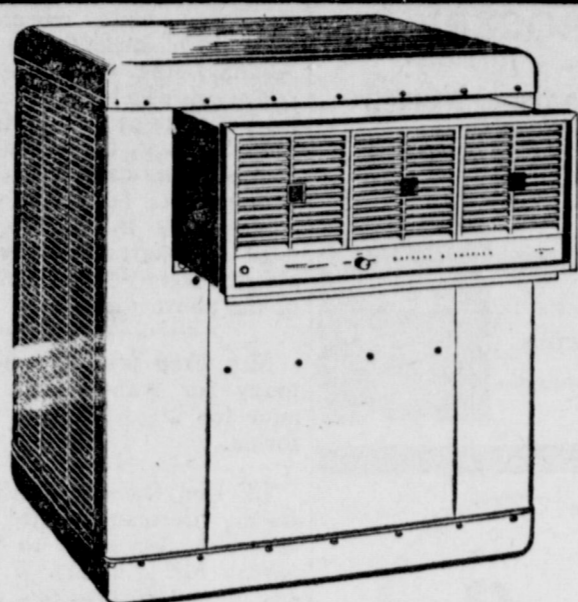
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F. G. and Mary Tilton Enjoy Collecting Antiques and Guns

Captain in the air force reserve, student at Midwestern university, collector of antiques with fondness for pewter objects, immaculate housekeeper, excellent cook.

No—not five persons. Just one—Mrs. F. G. Tilton, 704 W. Rebecca in Iowa Park, wife of M. Sgt. Tilton, SAFB.

Mrs. Tilton, formerly Miss Mary Farley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Farley of Aransas Pass, is a graduate of A.P.H.S. She was selected to enter the WASPS in Feb. 1943. At that time one had to have 100 hours solo time and a private license to become a part of WASPS. She took primary, basic and advanced training at Sweetwater AFB. Later she was at Love Field, Dallas, in 5th Ferry Command. Some of the planes she flew were Stearman, PT-13, twin engine Beechcraft, AT-7, AT-11, twin engine Cessna, UC-78, North American AT-6.

In October 1944 she was transferred to San Marcos navigator school, where she stayed until the WASPS were deactivated Dec. 20 of that year. Mary worked with American Air Lines as reservation agent in New York City, El Paso, Syracuse and San Diego.

She was called back for active duty in 1952 and was assigned to 4th Air Force at Hamilton AFB, Calif. In May 1953 she was sent to Germany. Duty there was at Furstenfeldbruck and Ramstein air bases.

Mary and Sgt. Tilton met in Wiesbaden, Germany. At that time she was an air transportation officer. She was promoted to captain, both in reserves and in active duty, in 1955.

Tiltons were married Jan. 1956 in Victoria, Texas. They went back to Germany in 1959 with duty at Bitburg Air Base. They returned to the States in 1962.

Mrs. Tilton started her collection of antiques with two delicately carved beer steins in Hildeburg, Germany, in 1960. She now has 12 steins. One mug of Bavarian variety is proof-dated 1650. Carvings on each stein tell interesting stories. One of the most interesting details the experiences and emotions of St. Hubertus, the patron saint of hunters.

The sport had become such an obsession that he hunted seven days a week, against his conscientious scruples. One Sunday, according to the carvings, Hubertus was confronted by a large stag with a cross between his horns. Feeling the animal was sent by God to warn him, the hunter fell on his knees prostrate. Even the horse and dogs in the hunting party are portrayed trembling in fear. One of Mrs. Tilton's most treasured antiques is a 100-year-old Russian samovar which she

acquired in Holland. A friend had inherited it from an aunt and had given it to Mary in appreciation for what Americans had done for Holland.

Another item is a small pewter lamp about 200 years old. Whale oil was probably used in the vessel at the wick as a means of illumination. The lamp has its original wick.

Tiltons' home is full of interest for lovers of antique and contemporary, from entrance to exit. A tall grandfather's clock purchased in Germany, a smaller French clock in a marble case bought in Belgium, a collection of spoons bearing the coat of arms of 36 European cities, a carved brass tray acquired in Morocco, imposing English coffee service, many pewter bowls and plates, a coffee table topped with tile coats of arms of Holland, France, England, Austria, Germany, Grecian marble figurines—are only a few of the things which engage the attention and excite the curiosity of visitors to the Tilton home.

Mr. Tilton is a gun enthusiast and collector. One room in their attractive brick home houses his gun collection.

Mrs. Tilton has attended Victoria (Texas) college, the University of Maryland (overseas) and is now enrolled at Midwestern university majoring in elementary education.



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Jury duty is an experience everybody ought to have.

In a criminal case 12 jurors have a duty to do justice as each sees it, and yet be unanimous. In most trials both sides have much to say, and the evidence is conflicting. The jurors vary in ability, temperament, character, education and their experience, and in the question at stake.

A jury made up of both sexes, with wide age and educational differences, jobs and origins must all come up with the same verdict. Upon their verdict much depends—the life or liberty of others, and the public good. So it may take days of talking among themselves all to agree.

Jury duty calls for insight, common sense, courage, tact, fairness, patience (especially toward jurors who disagree with you), good humor, tolerance, balance, willingness to hear others out and change one's mind, readiness to go over and over the facts to find something to bring agreement. In short, jury duty demands a decent respect for the opinions of others.

More and more women share civic duties as jurors.

A jury finds facts. It hears and weighs evidence and then comes to a verdict. It does not make the law—the legislature does; and the judge instructs the jury concerning the law applicable to the particular case it is considering.

The judge will tell you not to find the accused guilty until he is proved so under strict rules of evidence. If you have any reasonable doubt—not imaginary or far-fetched—acquit the accused.

Civil cases do not demand a moral certainty, merely the preponderance of what you regard as reliable and believable evidence.

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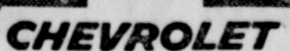

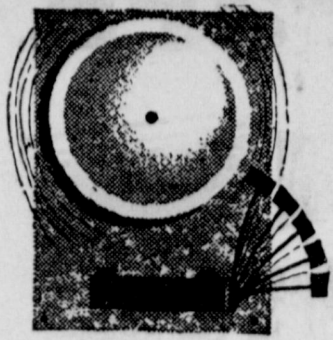

There will be 4,000 seats in the grandstand. Glynn Kelly and his Real Country Fair Hootnannies will present vocal and musical groups each night at 8:00.

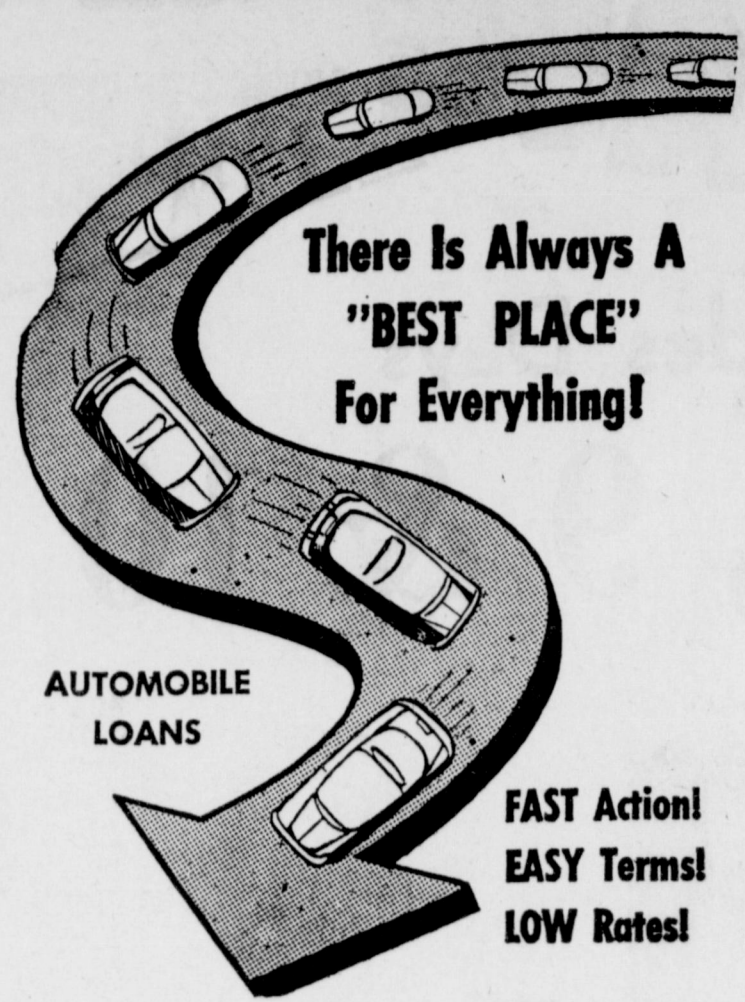
School bands will march and play for the afternoon crowds.

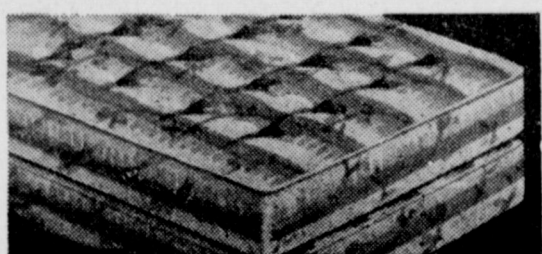

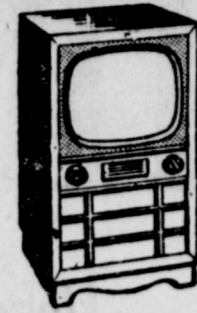

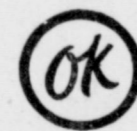
