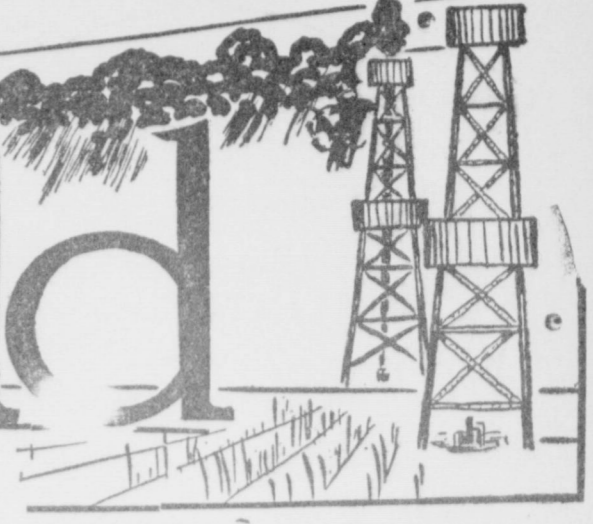

180 Expected to Die in Texas

An estimated 180 persons will meet violent death in traffic, murder and suicide, and other fatal accidents during the 11-day holidays, stated Maj. Harry Hutchison, regional commander of the Texas department of public safety for this area.

Hutchison said, "Experience indicates 92 persons will be killed in traffic, there will be 42 suicides and homicides, and 46 will die in non-traffic accidents."

He announced that "Operation Deathwatch" in Texas will be in effect from 12:01 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 22, through 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 1.

Hutchison continued, "We plan to do everything possible to prevent the estimated 92 traffic fatalities. We plan around-the-clock schedules for our enforcement officers. Our radar units will be in constant operation on as many highways as possible.

Regular highway patrol service will be augmented by personnel from the license and weight and motor vehicle inspection services, giving broader patrol coverage."

Hutchison listed three simple rules of the road for the holiday season:

1. Allow ample time for the trip.
2. Stop occasionally for rest breaks.
3. Report unsafe acts by other drivers.

Mrs. Byarez, longtime resident of Vernon, died in a hospital there Thursday night following several months of illness.

Jo Cowden was chosen for the all-tournament team because of her fine play.

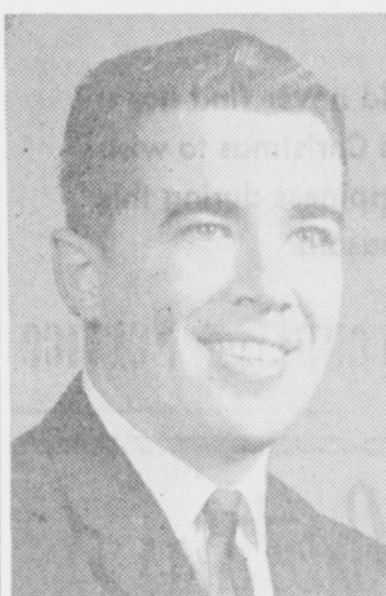

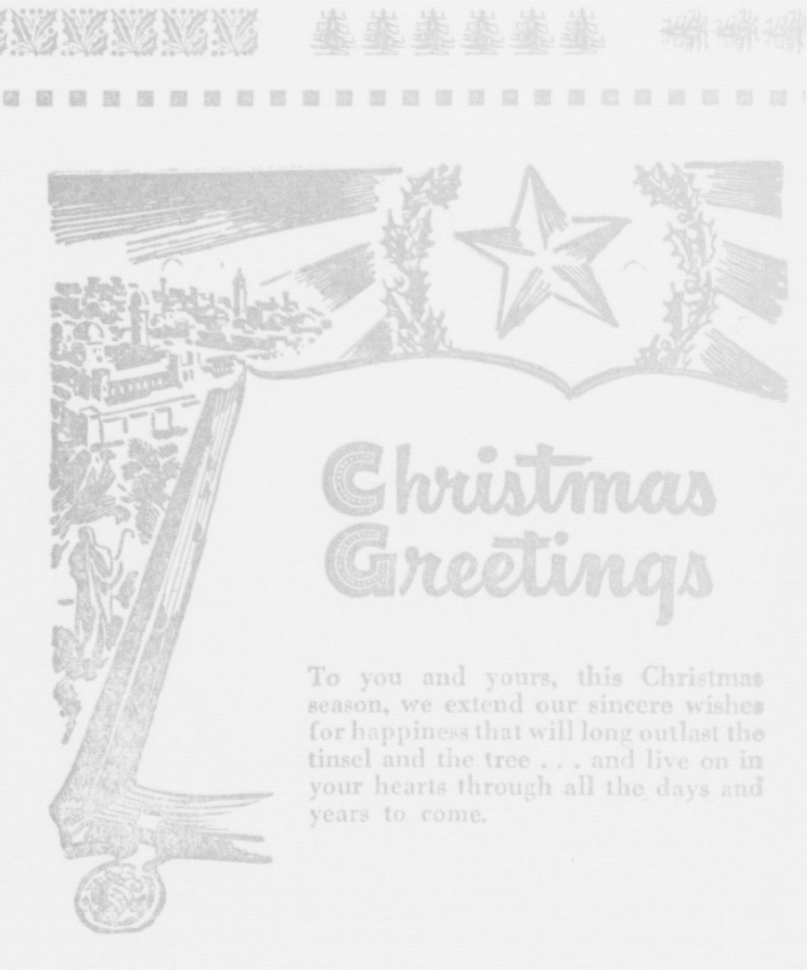

No dead animals, or any part thereof, fish, decayed vegetable, food, manure, garbage, offal, rubbish or filth of any kind, by which its decay or decomposition, soil, or would be caused, shall be placed, or permitted to be placed or situated on property under control of said District.

2. FIRE ARMS

The possession of any rifle, shot gun, side arm, compressed air gun, or air gun or device, property, property under control of the District, or on water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

3. SAFETY

Rules of safety concerning speed, operation, lights, life preservers, size of craft, construction, etc., shall be the same as provided by the Laws of the State of Texas covering the operation of all crafts.

All bathing and swimming in the water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

All water skiing, boat racing and high speed operation of boats on water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

No landing shall be allowed without boats or waders.

No fishing shall be permitted within the hearing identified as being restricted waters.

No boats or boat trailers shall be allowed to remain unattended in the water.

4. SIGNS

No sign or signs shall be removed, destroyed, defaced, or otherwise manipulated, which have been placed on District property or on property under control of the District.

5. FISHING

Christ and a Faith for Our Day

by Boyd Schlenker



Commercialization of Christmas is a horribly lashed whipping boy, yet it is a true one; it cannot be escaped. It seems that old Saint is meeting me every time I turn around, sliding down my eery chimney I see, and greeting me at every corne.

I have thought of every way of trying to avoid what I must say: rationalize by saying there is no problem because Santa brings so much joy, pretend it isn't there, forget, et cetera.

I used to think Santa Claus and Christmas were compatible; I would still like to think so, probably because a change would have to be so great, and painful, and because we like Santa Claus.

He is a "saint." That's what "Santa" means, after all. He is a secularized saint — St. Nicholas. We like to see him gurgling down "a pause that refreshes" or think of him as the embodiment of the great spirit of Christmas (cf. the great pumpkin!).

Many years ago I even wrote a "sermon" entitled "Christ and Santa Claus" where I was determined to make the whiskey old gentleman compatible with our Saviour. I have even seen a "recreant" picture, haloes and all, with Santa kneeling before the manger cradle, with a present he has plucked from his bulging bag.

I react against all this now for two main reasons. First, no matter how nicely and easily we go about it, we cannot avoid the fact we are involved in a deception of our children about how things really are, when we teach them that Santa is a real being—a real being associated with Christmas.

This wouldn't be half so bad, except, at the same time, we teach our children that Jesus Christ is a real being associated with Christmas. Sooner or later we must admit that we were just kidding our kids about Santa (although he's a nice idea).

What does that do to Jesus? And what does it do for children's ultimate respect for their parents?

In the second place, I react against the emphasis on Santa, because his message is not compatible with the Christian gospel—the Good News to all men. The message of Santa Claus is "You'd better watch out, you'd better not cry, you'd better not pout, I'm telling you why, (I'm) coming to town."

In other words, if you are good little boys and girls, Santa will bring you a nice gift. The gospel of God in Christ is, if you are good little girls and boys, or if you are bad little boys and girls, it doesn't matter; repent and come to Me, for I have the gift of Life itself.

Santa Claus is tied up with the bright and showy, the earthy spectacular approach to Christmas. As Christians who see in Christmas the point in human history when the Lord God Almighty stepped onto the stage of our life, we must reject all the noisy emphasis upon the strictly material aspects of Christmas. These are

not religious, but inventions of a society that needs the real Christmas message in crisp, bold terms.

From this point-of-view we should not have any well-meaning church member dressed up in a Santa Claus suit in our church this Christmas. We'll get enough of that elsewhere. Let's hear the gospel this Christmas.

Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, Iowa Park, Texas.

ORDINANCE NO. 1

Be it resolved that the following Ordinance of Rules and Regulations are adopted by the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 and that the same shall be applicable upon the lands owned by said District, as well as any and all lands under its control, and upon the waters of Lake Iowa Park, as provided by and in accordance with Section 59, Article 18 of the Constitution of Texas, and Chapter 25 Acts of the 39th Legislature, 1925, as amended, and as may be hereafter amended or adopted by the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3.

1. SANITATION

No trash, garbage and refuse may be left or deposited on District property, or on property un-

Regulations passed by the Board of Directors of the Water District shall control the taking of fish from Lake Iowa Park. All fishing in the lake will be subject to the laws as outlined by the State Game and Fish Commission.

6. PENALTIES

The performance of any act forbidden by this Ordinance shall be punishable by the imposition of a fine of not more than \$200.00 together with the costs of court, provided the fine and costs of court may not exceed \$200.00. The fine collected here and under, in as far as may not be required for payment of the cost of the court, shall be payable to the District and shall be credited to its general operational fund.

Any person or persons refusing to abide by the regulations as set forth by this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of violation and subject to penalties provided therein.

If any provision of this Ordinance and these Rules and Regulations or the application thereof to any person, situation or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Ordinance or these Rules and Regulations which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance and these Rules and Regulations are declared to be severable.

This Ordinance and these Rules and Regulations shall become effective after its and their passage and publication, as required by law.

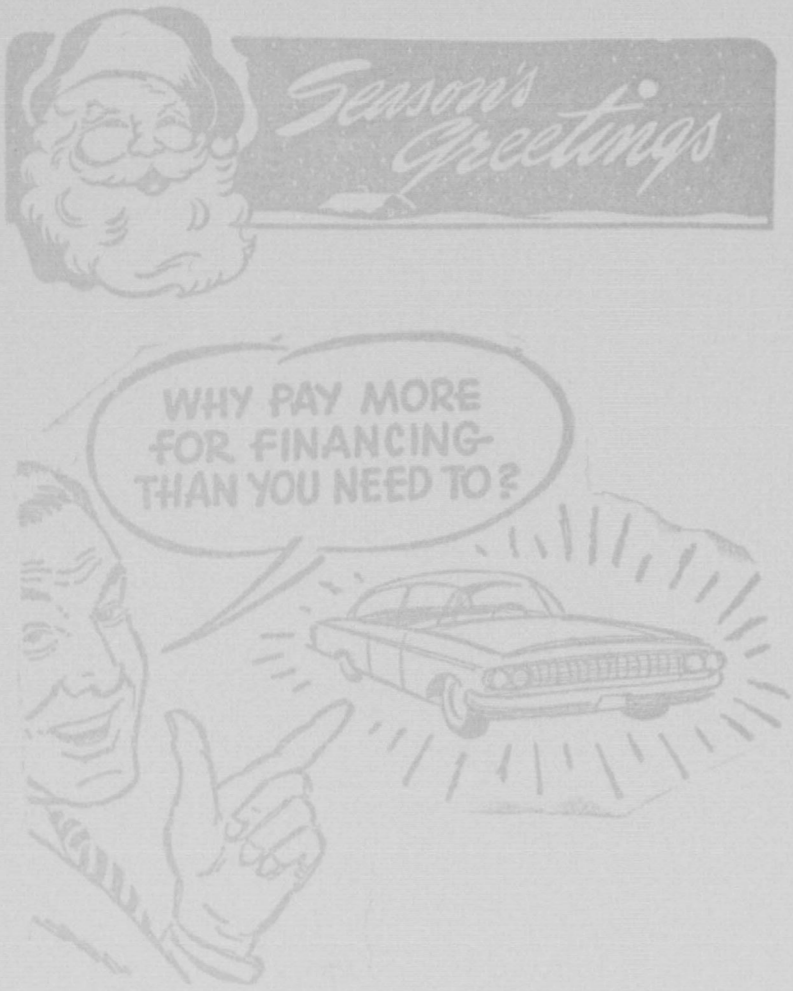

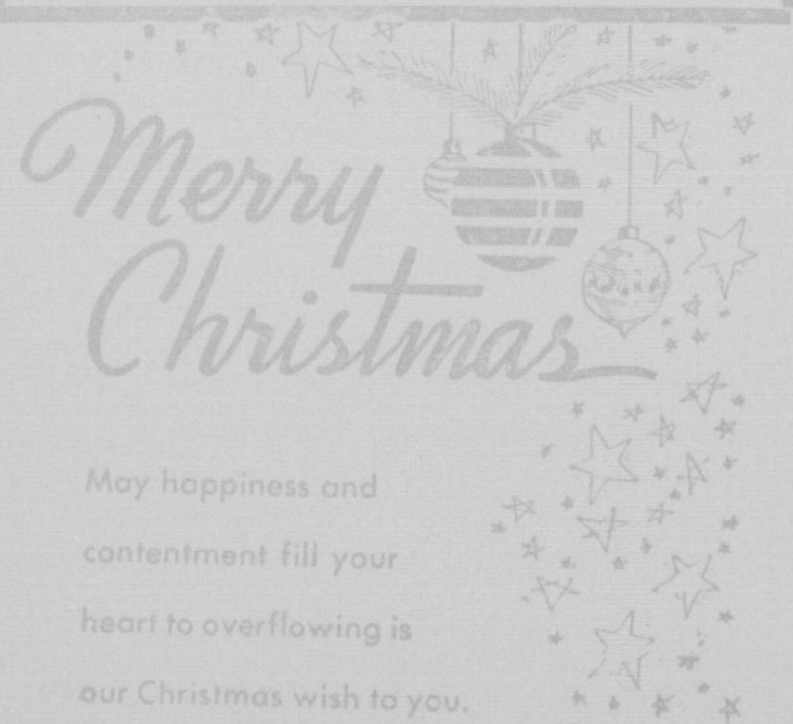
