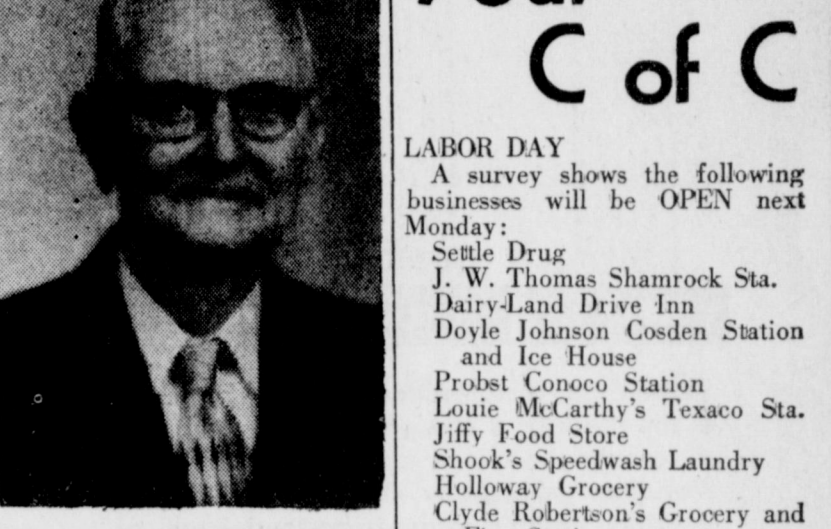
Jim White and his father were building contractors and also ran steam engine and separator on threshing machines in this area. He was a well known ginner and machinist.

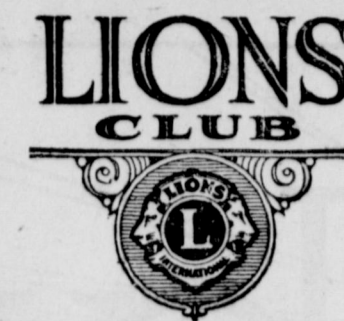

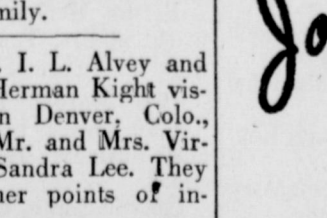
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## Kamay, Valley View, Kadane Corner

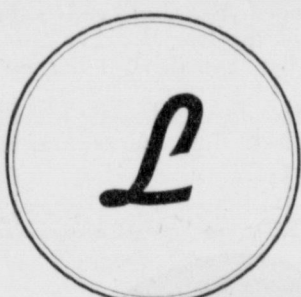

## Reader Writes

To all who may know these presents:

It was a great pleasure to read what Mr. Lee wrote regarding the big grass fire back in the year 1922. Everything he said was true, perhaps a lot more could be said, but what I should like to say has to do with my opinion at that time—what all these years have meant to both Dave and me, and to our families. We, as well as our children and grandchildren have a "Western" hero, one and the same.

My little brother and I were skipping about in the liveoak bushes that Sunday afternoon when suddenly a stifling smoke came from the north. I knew there was a grass fire, so hand-in-hand we ran, we thought, toward the plowed field. Instead, we almost ran over the water barrels from which we had watered calves an hour previous.

I knew Dave couldn't outrun the fire, so I lifted him into a

barrel, pulled the wagon sheet over the top and hunkered under the loose end. When the fire came into view, the roar was so frightening I told Dave to sit in the barrel and I would run for safety.

No sooner had I started along a trail than I heard the clatter of a running horse. Looking back, I saw the dim outline of a rider who was leaning in the saddle—reaching for me. I screamed and ran the faster, but he grabbed me up and pulled me into the saddle. I just knew it was C—T—, a slouchy, bearded rider who made a point to smile at all the girls and women. I hated him. I tried to bite his arm off, and did claw his face something awful.

Once inside the field, he literally pitched me to the ground and whirled his horse back into the smoke. Shortly the horse bolted back into the field. The rider dismounted with my brother wrapped in a saddle slick. His face and left hand were bleeding profusely. It wasn't T—. I felt so sorry. I'd never seen the rider until that day. I couldn't think of a thing to say. When I tried to examine his hand he pushed me gently along. "Scram, honey, this kid's bleeding too, and freezing."

Dave's brow was skinned when he was lifted from the barrel.

Dave was in bed several days with a deep cold. Every night—until my little brother was clear of temperature—this rider came and sat in the sick room until midnight and after.

Soon thereafter Mr. Lee rode out of the basin. Eight years later someone had a letter from him. He was near Ogden, Utah.

As time passes, our children and their children never seem to tire of hearing the story when a lone rider—a strange one—literally pulled mother, daddy, grandma and grandpa out of pure fire. We hope they never forget it.

It was during our recent trip to Texas that our 12-year-old granddaughter got the thrill of her life. It was dark when we came to his town. A service station attendant told us how to get to his house. When Dave sounded the horn in his driveway, a light came on in the living room.

Marcy bounced out of the car, grabbed him around the neck and cried out, "He's real, Mama—real."

## Soil Conservation

Field observations show that an increasing number of farmers in this area have applied good management of their small grain residues, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist.

Stubble mulching and crop residue management have retained some subsoil moisture that with even limited fall moisture will get fall seeded crops into the winter.

Albert Brockriede, Jack Payton and George Streit of Punkin Center are farmers where fair subsoil moisture has been found under stubble mulching. There are many others.

High residues may create a need for application of fertilizer at time of wheat seeding. Soil analysis will give a basis for fertilizer recommendation. In the event no analysis is available 10 pounds of nitrogen per ton of residue will usually take care of decomposition. Additional fertilizer would then be needed for production.

No reduction in germination will be had when fertilizer is placed in a band below seed.

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When you get the short end of a deal you may feel inclined to claim mistake or fraud to get out of the contract.

But courts are not inclined to correct your business mistakes unless they also find serious injustices. For to charge the other party with fraud is serious since that is a crime as well as a cause of civil action.

Our courts demand more proof than usual in civil cases where one sues to get out of a contract on the grounds of fraud.

Suppose Smith and Black agree to do something in clear language but Smith does not grasp the terms of a plain contract. This failure of Smith will not void the contract and our courts will enforce its terms.

But suppose instead Black well knew Smith had made a mistake, and he still didn't explain it to Smith. When this is proved, Black may have trouble enforcing his contract.

Both parties often make a mistake which may void the deal. In one case Raffles agreed to buy and Smith to sell goods arriving on a ship named the *Peerless*. But it just happened that two steamers had the same name. Raffles and Smith had in mind different ships. No contract. Why? No meeting of the minds.

But to end such a contract both parties must make a mistake about something in the contract.

People often make oral agreements and later write the terms down. Suppose they make a mistake in doing this. When they find such a mistake they can go into court and have the contract reformed.

To induce the other party to agree through fraud makes the contract void. For a court to act in a fraud case one must prove 5 things:

1. A false representation
2. The speaker's knowledge of its falsity
3. His intention to mislead the other party
4. The other's innocent reliance

on the statement  
 5. Damage resulting from the deception

Unless every one of these elements is proved, there is no legal fraud.

Except for guardians and others in positions of great trust, the law assumes that persons deal at arms length and have equal ability to protect themselves. The law, in short, expects you to use your head in checking out claims and facts. This goes to the ancient Roman principle: Let the buyer beware. The law expects you to look into the claims of the other party, and not to agree to any old paper shoved under your nose as a "standard" contract.

# NOW IS THE TIME TO CHECK THE LIGHT YOUR CHILDREN USE FOR HOME STUDY



Even children who pass the eye chart test with ease need special light for home study. Reading and other close visual tasks require plenty of good light to make seeing easier and to prevent eyestrain and fatigue. For best light from a table lamp, use at least 150-watt illumination. The lamp should be tall enough to spread light evenly over the work area and properly shaded to shield the light source from the eyes. A diffusing bowl is recommended to soften the light and prevent glare. Check your children's study light now. Better light means better sight and better grades.

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
