

Claud Lee Reaves, 72, died  
Sunday in a Wichita Falls hospi-  
tal. He had been hospitalized a  
week following a heart attack.

Funeral service was conducted  
from the Iowa Park Church of  
Christ, Tuesday, Jan. 22. Two  
former ministers here — Boyd  
Taylor of Irving and Floyd Spi-  
vey of Wichita Falls, officiated.  
Burial was in Highland cemetery  
under direction of Tanner Funer-  
al Home.

Pallbearers were W. B. Shook,  
Loys Barbour, R. L. Good, Jack  
Vestal, Harrel Sullivan, and Loy  
Rogers. Honorary pallbearers  
were B. L. Bradford and deacons  
of the Church of Christ.

Reaves owned and operated a  
grocery in Iowa Park for some  
35 years. For the past few years  
he has been manager of the Speed  
Queen Laundry here.

Claud was born June 9, 1890,  
in Lyle, Tenn. He came to Iowa  
Park in 1908 and was employed  
with Overbey-Troutman Grocery  
and Dry Goods. In 1913 he re-  
turned to Tennessee where he was  
married.

The couple returned to Iowa  
Park and lived here until Claud  
went into the armed services dur-  
ing World War I, where he spent  
most of his time in France.

Following his discharge from  
the service, he returned to Iowa  
Park and continued in the grocery  
business, this time for himself.

Reaves was an elder and Sun-  
day school teacher in the Church  
of Christ.

Surviving are the widow Mrs.  
Gerlene Reaves; two daughters:  
Mrs. Sue Jones and Mrs. Royce  
Kimberlain, both of Iowa Park;  
one sister Mrs. Locke Lowrance

Bill Carter, football and track  
coach at IPHS, has resigned to  
accept the head track coaching  
and assistant football coaching po-  
sition at Amarillo Tascosa high  
school. Bill is one of the best  
known track coaches in the state.

Graduate of Abilene Christian  
college, Carter served three years  
as football coach at Zundy junior  
high and coached WFSH Rowdies  
for six years. He coached a year  
at Holliday before coming to Iowa  
Park five years ago.

Carter-coached Hawk thin-clads  
won the state track and field  
meet in 1961 and placed high in  
1962. Iowa Park athletes still  
hold state records in 440 relay,  
mile relay and 180 low hurdles.

Local school men term Carter  
one of the finest men ever to  
coach here, both in character and  
achievement, and his absence will  
be regretted.

### Religious Survey Completed Here

Rev. Darwin Farmer, director  
of surveys and research director  
mission department, Baptist Gen-  
eral Convention of Texas, gave  
direction to the Metropolitan area

Iowa Park for the religious sur-  
vey conducted Jan. 18-23.

He reported to the Herald on

Stewart, pastor Central Church  
of the Nazarene, Wichita Falls,  
survey technician, will present re-  
sults of the survey.

Farmer said Wednesday, "The  
spirit of co-operation in the face  
of adverse weather conditions, on  
the part of volunteer surveyors,  
cannot be praised too highly. Any  
city is fortunate when she is  
blessed with pastors who unite in  
such an undertaking."

According to Farmer, this is  
one of the greatest co-operative  
efforts ever engaged in by church-  
es here. Co-operating were Assem-  
bly of God, Christian, Faith and  
First Baptist, Presbyterian and  
Valley View Methodist churches.

## 1849 Sale Bill Is Interesting Reading Now

Below is an account of a sale in 1849 which took place near Versailles, Ky. It was taken from the Live Stock Reporter, a newspaper of that day.

Mrs. Etta Macraye came into possession of the newspaper clipping from her grandmother. It was re-run in a Texas newspaper in the early 1920's. Mrs. C. H. Partney of Throckmorton was so fascinated when she read the article she clipped it and has preserved it.

Her daughter-in-law Mrs. W. G. Partney of Iowa Park, found the clipping while perusing old newspapers on a recent visit to Throckton. She, too, was quite fascinated and passed it on to Mrs. Homer Blalock, a newspaper correspondent, so others might enjoy the article.

The sale reads as follows: "Having sold my farm and am leaving by ox team for Oregon Territory on March 1, 1849, I will sell all my personal property except two ox teams, Buck and Ben, and Lon and Jerry. The property consists of the following: Two milk cows, 1 gray mare and colt, 1 pair of oxen, 1 yoke, 1 baby yoke, 2 ox carts, 1 iron plow with wood mold board, 800 feet of poplar weather boards, 1000 feet three-foot clapboards, 1500 ten-foot fence rails, 60 gallon soap kettle, 85 sugar troughs made of white ash timber, 16 gallons maple sugar, 2 spinning wheels, 30 pounds mutton tallow, 1 large loom made by Jerry Wilson, 100 split hoops, 1 32-gallon barrel of Johnson Miller whiskey seven years old, 20 gallons apple brandy, 1 40-gallon copper still, 4 sides of oak-tanned leather, 1 dozen wooden pitchforks, a half interest in the tan yard, 1 32-caliber rifle, bullet molds and powder horn, a rifle made by Ben Miller, 50 gallons of soft soap, hams, bacon and lard, 40 gallons of sorghum molasses, 6 head of fox hounds, all soft-mouthed but one.

"At the same time I will sell my Negro slaves—two men, 35 and 50 years old, two boys 12 and 18 years old, two mulatto wenches, 40 and 30 years old. Will sell all to same party as I will not separate them.

"Terms of Sale—Cash in hand or note to draw 4 per cent interest with Bob McConnell security. My home is two mile south of Versailles, Kentucky, on McConnell Ferry Pike. Sale will begin at eight o'clock sharp, a.m. Plenty to eat and drink."

## 23 Study Club

Cuisenaire method of teaching arithmetic was demonstrated at a meeting of 23 Study club Thursday afternoon of last week, when members and guests met in the cafeteria of Kidwell elementary school.

Mrs. Roy B. Smith and Mrs. John Sibley, first grade teachers, assisted by 15 pupils, demonstrated what has been learned since the start of school in September. Steps used are free play, qualitative arithmetic and quantitative arithmetic.

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
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## Sewells Enjoy South Rhodesia
