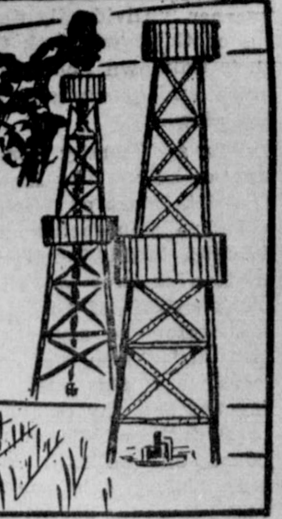

Childers of Abilene.

Other dignitaries attending included Deputy District Governor Ben Keith Lawson of Chillicothe; Zone 1 Chairman Lester Blair of Vernon; District Director of Public Relations M. J. Weaver of Olney; International Counselor Cub Cubertson of Vernon; International Counselor Lester E. Brooks of Iowa Park; Zone 10 Chairman Rollins Woodall of Iowa Park.

Organ music was furnished during the banquet by Mrs. O. E. Lochridge. Lion Homer Thompson offered the invocation.

Dr. D. L. Ligon, president of the Wichita Falls Lions club and vice-president of Midwestern University, presented two talented and outstanding musicians from Midwestern: Ron Anderson, vocalist, and Miss Vicki Smith, pianist.

Brooks served as master of ceremonies for the evening. He presented the honored guests and visitors from other clubs: Wichita Falls and Wichita Falls (Evening), Electra, Vernon, Burkburnett, Olney and Iowa Park (Evening).

Following dinner, Brooks introduced Wilson, who made awards to 13 members of the host club for 100 per cent attendance during the past year. They were Alan Berry, R. R. Brubaker, George Huckaby Sr., Keith Swim, Rollins Woodall, C. E. Birk, Dan Barnes, Henry Jones, E. E. Voyles, L. E. Brooks, Sam Hill, Curtis Sewell, F. M. Wilson.

Ten-year Old Monarch chevrons were presented to Richard Hill and J. B. Smith. Twenty-year Old Monarch chevrons and certificates went to Brooks, R. A. Tanner and Sam Hill.

One of the honor members of the evening was Dr. Gordon G. Clark, the only remaining charter member of the organization. He was awarded a 30-year chevron and certificate, and the host club presented him a beautiful Lions club emblem desk set.

Mrs. Bonnie Hudson, widow of C. C. Hudson, charter member and first president of the club, was honored by the host club. She was presented a lovely shoulder corsage and Brooks read a poem dedicated to Lion Hudson.

Childers introduced the speaker of the evening, DeVorss, as a Master Key member, a past president of his local club, and past district governor. DeVorss is mayor of Wichita and past president of the World Congress of Mayors.

In a pleasing informal manner, the speaker told of his experiences as a representative to the Congress of Mayor, which was held in Florence, Italy. He stressed the fact that Lionism and its principle of service are keys to world understanding and peace.

"We Americans," he said, "take for granted our freedom and service. Lionism is helping establish a better understanding among all peoples of the world. It is at work as never before. We should do the best we can with what we have—and give service by living our lives with service as the guiding principle."

DeVorss was presented a gift by the local club in appreciation of his service to Lionism and to the local group.

Brooks then pointed out that the Wichita Falls club 30 years ago sponsored establishment of the Iowa Park club, which in turn had sponsored the Iowa Park Evening club.

Iowa Park's Honor Graduates



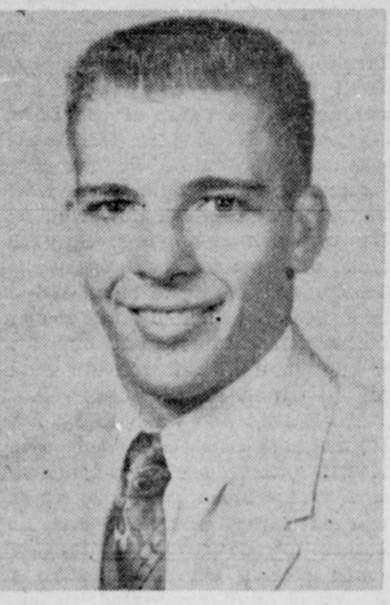
Top honors in the Class of 1958 at Iowa Park High School go to Tommy Starkes, and he will make the valedictory address at commencement exercises this spring.

Funeral services were held for Mr. John Franklin Quick, 82, a retired oil operator, Tuesday afternoon, May 6, in the Faith Baptist church. The body lay in view at the church an hour before the services.

Rev. George Shropshire, pastor, and Rev. W. F. Ferguson of Lubbock officiated.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were L. E. Brooks, R. R. Brubaker, L. C. Hill, Fred Hays, Joe Price, Fred Parkey. Honorary pallbearers were the deacons of First and Faith Baptist churches.

Mr. Quick died at his home Sunday evening after several weeks of serious illness.

Born Feb. 20, 1876, at Bluffton, Ind., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Quick, he was married Nov. 27, 1901, to Miss Lena Bennett of Poneto, Ind.

Mr. Quick and family moved to Pecos, Texas, in 1911. Leaving Pecos in the spring of 1916, Mr. and Mrs. Quick and their two children Louis and Janet came to Iowa Park, locating north of town. Reflections from the Bible

When Ananias came to Saul in Acts 22:16 saying, "Saul, Saul, why tarriest thou, Arise, and be baptized and wash away your sins, calling on the name of the Lord," Ananias had no idea that water washed away sins. NOTICE OF ELECTION
THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF WICHITA
CITY OF IOWA PARK
To the Resident, Qualified Electors of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, who own taxable property in said city and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:
Take Notice that an election will be held in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, on the 17th day of May, 1958, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the resolution adopted by the City Council on the 29th day of April, 1958, calling said election, which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION
by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, calling an election on the proposition of the issuance of \$75,000.00 City Hall and Fire Station Bonds.
Whereas, the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes herein-after mentioned;

Be it resolved and ordered by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:
1. That an election be held in said City of Iowa Park, Texas, on the 17th day of May, 1958, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$75,000.00, maturing serially or otherwise in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Twenty Five (25) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four and one-half (4½%) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said bonds, for the purpose of constructing and permanently equipping a City Hall and Fire Station in said City, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall, Iowa Park, Texas, within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election, to-wit:

Elvy G. Sargent, Presiding Judge,
James W. Park, Judge,
Mrs. R. R. Brubaker, Clerk,
Mrs. A. R. Watson, Clerk.

3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote at said election.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

'For the Issuance of City Hall and Fire Station Bonds'
'Against the Issuance of City Hall and Fire Station Bonds'

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall in said City, and at two other public places within said City, not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.

No one, so far as Senator Ralph Yarborough knows, has ever played the bag pipes to try to attract a crowd to a political rally in Texas. But the Senator looked like he might be considering such a move recently when he welcomed Miss Jeanette MacNaughton of Westville, Nova Scotia, to the nation's capitol. New Waterways Opened For Trailer-Sailors

By Jeanne Smith, Dodge Safety Consultant

MODERN BOAT TRAILERS, sturdy and flexible, have been instrumental in opening up new waterways to outboard boaters, according to boating safety authority Don Guerin, president of the American Power Boat Association.

The combination of boat and car permits vacationers to enjoy unlimited horizons, exploring a new locale every day. Trailer-sailors are not blocked by the end of a lake or highway, Guerin points out. They have the amphibious equipment to enjoy their trip on land and water.

Safe trailering, says Guerin, hinges on these few simple rules, plus some practice to acquire confidence.

Handling: Forward progress with a trailer hitched onto your car is not difficult. It requires just a little practice to get used to the wider turns, extra weight and more gentle backing.

Backing a trailer, however, can be troublesome even after practice. Main thing to remember, of course, is that you steer left to make the trailer go right. It sometimes helps to imagine that the back of your car is the front as you maneuver. Some boaters even attach another hitch to their front bumper for close maneuvering. This has the added advantage of keeping your rear (or power) wheels on firmer ground when launching on soft damp ground.

And if your rear wheels do get stuck, remember that old trick for doubling your traction—release about one-third the air from the rear tires. This often will get you out, still leaving enough air to get to a filling station.

With up to 70 horsepower available this year in outboards, boaters will make more use than ever of modern boat trailers to get the full benefit of their rigs for cruising, water skiing, fishing and family fun on the water.

These few safety hints, says Guerin, will keep outboarding among America's safest family recreations.

HITCH: Your hitch should be bolted to the frame of the car, not to the bumper, for utmost security. Supplement your hitch with a safety chain, just in case of hitch failure.

Lights: While state laws vary, three sets of trailer lights—stop, tail and directional, as on your car—will meet the strictest requirements and give you the best margin of safety.

UPKEEP: Regular lubrication is important, especially for the coupling. Wheel bearings require packing more often than on your car, particularly after salt-water immersion.

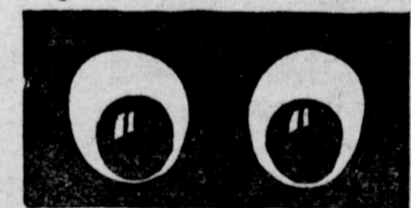

Churches have been mailed the talk of Rev. J. A. Birnbaum of the St. Paul Lutheran church of Vernon. Birnbaum delivered this talk titled "The Land and the Book" at the W-W SCD annual awards banquet. Other soil stewardship information has been supplied to many ministers who have shown an indication of using one of their church services to stress soil stewardship.

Nolen J. Fuqua, president of the National Association of SCD, of Duncan, Okla., wrote the following in urging churches to assist:

There is in every man, latent though it may have become, an awareness of his responsibility to God for the wise use of our soil and its related resources—water, plants and wildlife. It is the responsibility of those who assume the leadership for spiritual and moral matters to include in their sphere of effort the awakening of man to his soil stewardship responsibility.

The church is, and truly ought to be, a factor for reminding man of his obligation to God in the use of God's rich natural gifts. For too long our people have neglected or used without appreciation or understanding these divinely created resources.

Already in this comparatively young nation we have lost millions of acres of good productive land. We have let water, a necessity and a boon to every community, become a scourge as it rushed seaward, bearing loads of sediment to stream, channel and precious reservoir.

Therefore, we may see in every muddy rivulet, in every dust laden wind a warning from God. His rules regarding the use of His earth by man are being ignored. All people must now realize the importance of an abundance of good water and its relationship to our soil and our watersheds, for soil and water are life itself.

The stewardship of soil and water resources must be the concern of everyone who loves his nation. The responsibility of this stewardship rests with the people who own and operate the land. These are the farmers and the ranchers. Upon them we must depend to save and to improve what we have left in soil and water resources.

The nation's SCD need the help of their church leaders in this divinely-directed responsibility.

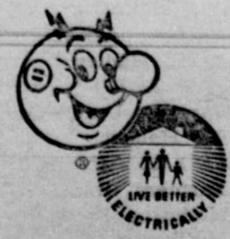
