New representatives added to the youth advisory council last week were Roberta Butts, Lavonia Hanaway and Lillian Todd.

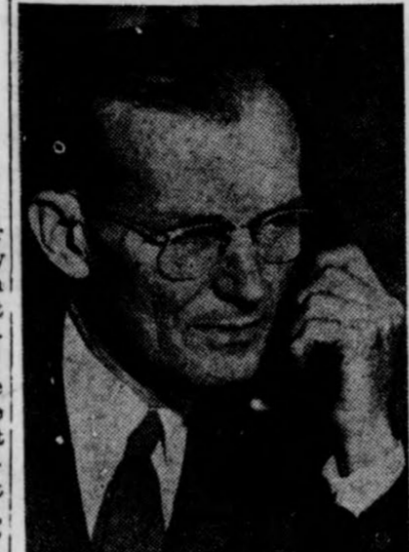

## Agriculturists From Turkey Are Guests Of Experiment Station

Iowa Park has had five unusual visitors this week. They are Turkish agriculture authorities who are in the United States to study our farming methods.

There are 45 in the party who are in the U.S. under the reciprocal training program of the Marshall Plan in the interest of forestry, agriculture and veterinary procedures. Four women are among the 45 visitors.

This group arrived in America on April 10 and will spend six months studying before they return to their own country.

The five Iowa Park visitors were sent to A & M college, which is their headquarters while in Texas. They have visited experiment stations at Houston, in the Rio Grande valley, Corpus Christi, San Antonio, Gonzales, Pearsall, Carrizo Springs, Lufkin, Waco, Fort Worth and Iowa Park. They go to Lubbock and then back to A & M.

From Texas they will go to California for two months.

The visitors were guests of the Lions club Tuesday. They witnessed an insect control demonstration on the Joe Cope farm in the Wichita Valley Farm area and other farm activities here. L. E. Brooks, superintendent of the Wichita Valley Experiment Station, has directed them on most of their tours.

The five are Mehmet Camskan, a county agent in Manisa. He is married and has two daughters. Huseyin Ziyaettin Ockel, director of the irrigation experiment station at Menemen, Izmir. He is married and has two sons and a daughter.

All Selim Selimoglu, teacher and extension worker in agronomy, of Bornova, Izmir. He is married and has a daughter two years old.

Bekir Buyukyazioglu, assistant director of the cotton experiment station in Nazli. He is married and has two daughters.

Yusuf Kutsi Cengiz, chief assistant at the experiment station at Menemen. Married and has two daughters and a son.

The visitors will return to Washington, D.C., before leaving for Turkey.

Mr. Cengiz read a prepared talk at Lions club luncheon Tuesday. The men have studied English only a short time, but do remarkably well at understanding our language.

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at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 30th day of June A.D. 1952 then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 14th day of May A.D. 1952, in this cause, numbered 50,387-A on the docket of said court and styled Adelaide Hartwig, Plaintiff, vs. Robert Hartwig, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:  
 After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about July 15, 1948 and continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about November 15, 1951, when defendant left plaintiff. During the time plaintiff and defendant lived together the defendant displayed cruel, harsh and tyrannical treatment toward this plaintiff without cause or provocation up to the time defendant left without cause or provocation; that there was one child born of such marriage, a girl of about (4) years of age, Lorraine Hartwig; that this Court has no jurisdiction over said child because she is with plaintiff's mother in New Jersey; and that there is no community property.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer herein, and that upon trial hereof, she have judgment for divorce and for such other and further relief, in law or in equity, to which she may show herself justly entitled.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

Some courts boast germ-free bedrooms, treated with ultra-violet rays, and in other courts bathrooms are sealed with a tape showing all fixtures have been thoroughly sterilized by some new process and that the new occupant is the first one to enter.

It was easy for the Yeargans to believe there are 8 million trucks on the road. By the time they reached home, they said they had passed 4 million and the other 4 million had passed them.

Stations and restaurants along the Pennsylvania Turnpike definitely catered to the traveler: food

and service were of the best. Rest rooms provided electric razors, hair oil, handkerchiefs, perfumes (your favorite), hand lotion, Kleenex, and air blowers for hand drying.

Engineers figured the turnpike would have to carry 3500 cars when they planned it. A few months after it was opened in 1940 it carried 5000 cars daily; in 1949 it averaged 10,000 a day. 1952 promises to be a record year for travel. Tourists are on the move earlier than usual this year. Highways are already full of cars from every state; tourist accommodations are taken so early that latecomers have a discouraging time finding a place to sleep.
