The Minister is always faced with the temptation to be talking all the time; somehow people expect it of him. But what people really need at many points in their lives is the sympathetic listener. Taylor Caldwell says that man's "real need, his most terrible need, is for someone to listen to him, not as a patient, but as a human soul. He needs to tell someone of what he thinks, of the bewilderment he encounters when he tries to discover why he was born, how he must live, and where his destiny lies."

And so, we tend to make life all too wordy. The next time you are tempted to expound at great length, think first of what really will be most needful in the situation. You may be confronted with

a person who is secretly crying: "Listen to me for a day—an hour—a moment!"

Remember too, where human being fail at this responsibility, there is One who always is ready to listen and hear us out. And while He listens, you will find your problems being solved. Who knows; He may speak to us also. If we listen.

Wind, Rain

Iowa Park area received rain and strong winds early Monday evening of this week. Straight wind over 70 miles per hour kicked up dust in front of the rain and small hailstones.

Iowa Park received 1.75 inches of rain in about 30 minutes. A few homes suffered water damage, blown out picture windows, and water running in windows and under doors.

Soil Conservation

Eleven co-operators with the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation district in Iowa Park work unit area received fish for stocking farm ponds recently.

J. M. Towles and George Streit of Electra, Leonard Peyton of Iowa Park, Tom Holeman and E. W. Roderick of Burkburnett, Robert Rathkber of Wichita Falls received bass and bluegill for one or more farm ponds.

Fish are furnished by hatcheries of the Department of Interior through agreement with Soil Conservation Districts.

SCS assists co-operators in planning fish pond stocking and management.

Control of about 7500 acres of mesquite was started this week on Tom L. Burnett ranch of Iowa Park. Brush control and management practices that encourage grass production were planned through the Great Plains Conservation Program. There was outstanding grass improvement last year on about 600 acres.

Seedings of native grasses on cropland retired from cultivation during 1961 on Clear Lake Stock Farm continue to look good, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist. This ranch seeded an additional 126 acres this year to native grasses under the GPC plan.
