Death Strikes Many Families

Fred Staber

Funeral services will be conducted for Fred Staber, 73, Friday, May 16, at 2:00 p.m. in Wichita Falls. Dr. Earle Crawford, pastor of the First Presbyterian church there, will officiate.

Mr. Staber died in a Wichita Falls hospital Wednesday after a short illness. He was one of Wichita county's pioneers.

Born March 5, 1886, in Germany, Mr. Staber came to this country in 1886. He settled in Specht Colony north of Iowa Park.

The Staber family resides on the Wichita Falls highway. He and his sons have long been prominent farmers in this area. He was a top winner as a conservation farmer in the Bridwell Soil Builders program of 1954.

Survivors include the widow; two daughters: Mrs. W. E. Dunlap of Denver, Colo., and Mrs. J. Richard White of Wichita Falls; three sons: Lt. Donald E. Staber, air force, serving at Albany, Ga., Harold I. and John F., both of Route 1, Wichita Falls; three sisters, two half-brothers, eight grandchildren.

Burial will be in Highland cemetery of Iowa Park. Pallbearers will be Dave Mendenhall, E. T. Patterson, Tom Witherspoon, I. N. Carlis, G. H. Gwinn and Edd Hennig.

Mark Lowry

Mr. Mark Lowry, 52, of Bryan, son-in-law of Dr. and Mrs. C. J. Simpson of Iowa Park, died suddenly Saturday evening at his home.

He was mowing the lawn and sat on the porch to rest. His wife, the former Miss Rebecca Simpson, heard him fall and called for help. He was pronounced dead after the fire department used respirator equipment.

Memorial services were held Monday morning in Bryan, where Mr. Lowry was employed with the engineering extension department of Texas A & M and maintained his office.

Funeral services were conducted in Bonham that afternoon. Burial was in the Dodd City cemetery near Bonham.

Mr. Lowry was a member of a pioneer family of Dodd City.

Survivors other than his widow are two sisters and two brothers. Dr. and Mrs. Simpson and Mrs. Odessa Thompson of Iowa Park attended the services in Bonham.

HEART ATTACK TAKES UNCLE IN GAINESVILLE

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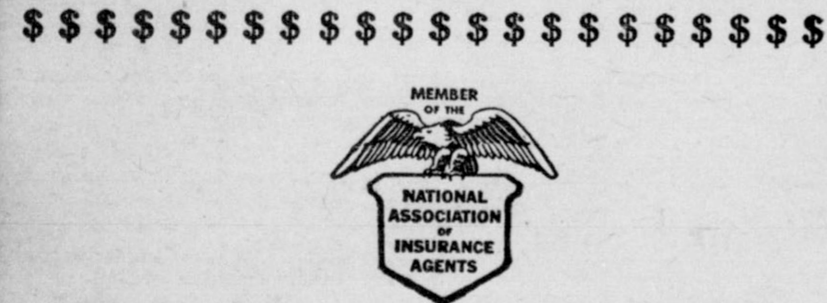
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AN Invitation TO FAITH BAPTIST CHURCH

"For the love of Christ constraineth us; for we thus judge, that if One died for all, then were all dead; and that He died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto Him which died for them, and rose again. For He (God) hath made Him (Jesus) to be sin for us, Who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him." II Cor. 5: 14-15, 21.

The compelling power of the love of Christ constrains (forces) the Saved into judgment upon themselves. This is the judgment:

- (1) Christ died for our sins. "Who was delivered for our offences. . ." Rom. 4:25.
- (2) And we who are the Saved are dead to the old life of sin; that sin no longer has the power to rule our lives. Rom. 6:6-14.
- (3) And we are alive unto God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Rom. 6:11.
- (4) Therefore we are not to live from now on for ourselves, but for Him who died for us and rose again (above text).

The essence of love's judgment is this: "We are bought with a price; therefore we should glorify God in our bodies, and in our spirit, which are God's" (See I Cor. 6:20). Judgment shall begin at the House of God. Can you judge yourself aright? Are you walking in the world and with the world or do you walk in the world but not of the world? Many people profess Christ, but they do not belong to Christ. There is no constraining love making them live simply and solely for Christ. Many profess Christ, but let self set the pattern and mold their conduct. You must judge, for you will be judged! ". . . if we would judge ourselves, we should not be judged. But when we are judged, we are chastened (corrected by punishment or by subjection to suffering, trials, etc.) of the Lord, that we should not be condemned with the world." I Cor. 11:31-32.

MOTOR MAIDS

Easy On The Gas-- Ahead On Safety

TEENAGERS ARE DISCOVERING that careful driving really pays off!
 Through competition in high school safety-economy runs, participants find that taking it easy on the gas puts them ahead in safety and also stretches the weekly allowance.

Patterned after the national economy run, the high school driving tests gratify teenagers' desire for competition and teach them that high speeds, "jack rabbit" starts, sharp turns and sudden stops will sharply reduce gas mileage.

Officials who sponsor the junior runs believe that, although most teenagers possess mechanical ability and are skilful drivers, some lack the proper mental attitude for safe driving. Through these high school contests, held throughout the country, they hope to persuade young motorists that safe driving is as socially acceptable as making the football team or the honor roll.

In the runs, usually limited to about 35 participants, ability to drive both safely and
