The position of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce on the proposed lake for water supply has been questioned. THAT position is as follows: The Board of Directors meeting July 16th voted to encourage all eligible voters to vote.

They did not oppose the construction of a new lake or proposed bond issue. General discussion among the directors did not question the need of water for Iowa Park now.

It is suggested that each voter take the facts prepared by engineers and evaluate the alternatives for an Iowa Park water supply and vote his conviction.

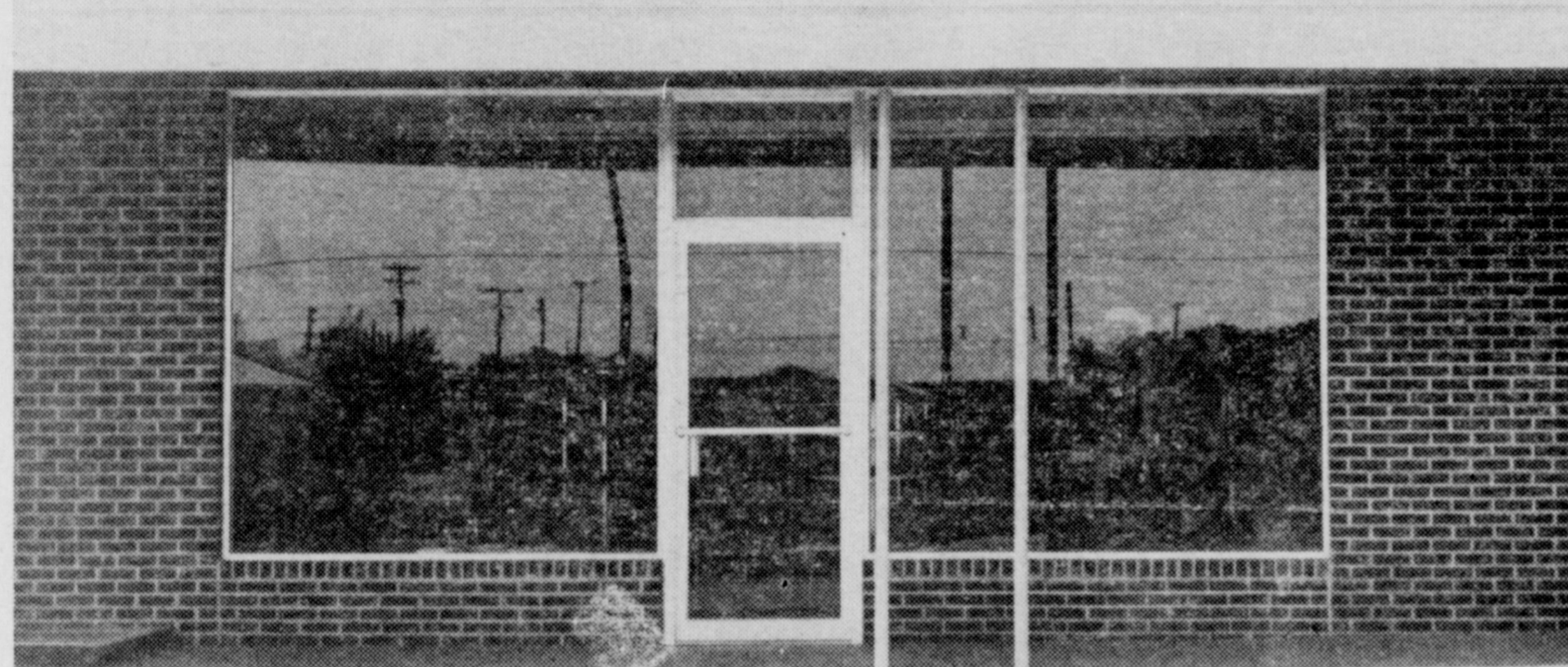

Voting Set Saturday on Bonds for Building New Lake Here

City of Iowa Park and Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 will hold a combined election Saturday, Aug. 11, at the City Hall from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Purpose of the City balloting is to authorize execution of a water supply contract by and between the City and the Water District.

On the other ballot will be the proposition of issuing \$700,000 in bonds to be used for construction of a new lake. The dam to be erected will be on the North Fork of Buffalo Creek and is expected to impound enough

water to assure Iowa Park citizens a plentiful supply for many years to come.

All qualified voters who own taxable property in the city, who have rendered their property for taxes, are eligible to vote in both elections.

Publishers of the Herald do not feel qualified to suggest to its readers how they should vote—but we do suggest that all eligible voters who have studied the proposition enough to have an opinion, should go to the City Hall this Saturday and cast a vote on these important questions.

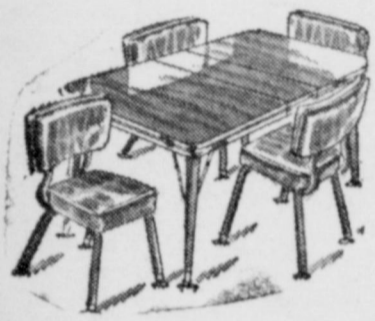

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may create the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties; the assumption of the district of any included city, town or county hospital indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereto to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assessed by a majority of the qualified voters...

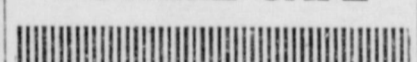

To the Citizens of Wichita Co. Water Control and Improvement District No. 3:

The City Council of the City of Iowa Park fully and completely endorses the North Fork Buffalo Creek reservoir and pipe line project proposed by the District.

The existing raw water supply facilities of the District are excellent but are now inadequate to meet the needs of the City. The average 600,000 gallon per day has been surpassed. The 900,000 gallon summer peak day capacity of the pipe line has been exceeded on numerous days. Therefore, the City Council has urged that the proposed new facilities, both reservoir and pipe line, be secured immediately to avoid any emergencies.

City distribution mains and treatment plant have been enlarged and are now in excellent condition since the completion of the recent City bond improve-

ment program. Operation and maintenance costs are now much lower and therefore the City is in position to pay the District more for raw water without any increase in the water rates. The City has tentatively agreed to pay the District a minimum of \$2,500.00 per month instead of the \$1,200.00 per month now being paid.

An extended hot and dry period now would place the water supply of the City in a critical condition.

The program proposed by the District is needed urgently, and the City Council requests the support of all citizens for the program.
