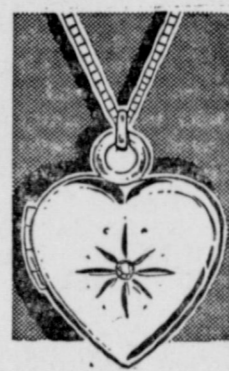

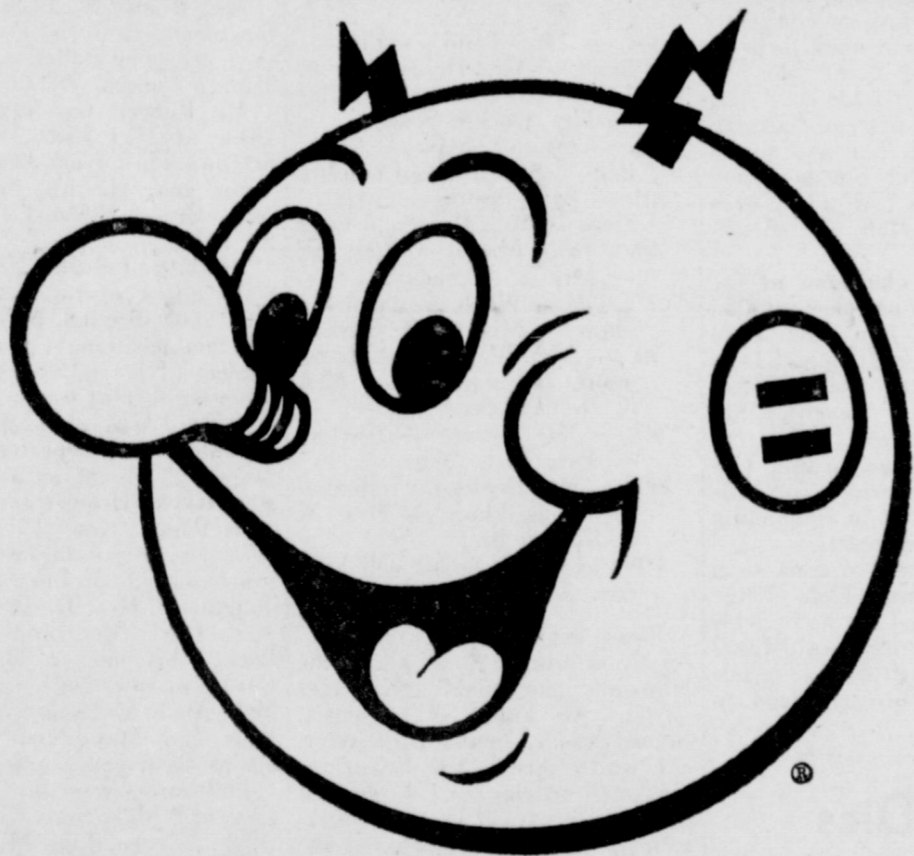

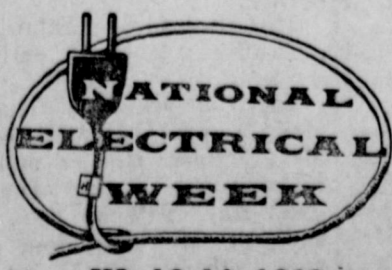

 Plan For Better America**

President Kennedy has presented to the American people one of the most serious and sober State of the Union messages in recent history.

It was remarkable in the clarity with which it outlined the problems the nation faces, both at home and abroad.

It was cautious, yet it did not lack hope. Mainly, the President said two things:

▶ Our economy is sluggish, and the nation needs tax cuts and tax adjustments to stimulate economic growth.

▶ World conditions are such that we must increase our defense spending to provide for the nation a defense suited to the Sixties.

The tax cuts will be designed to give tax relief where it will help the most—to the

American consumer. The great bulk of the cut—some \$11 billion—will benefit individuals, with the larger portion going to persons in the lower income brackets.

The remaining \$2.5 billion of the proposed \$13.5 billion cut would be applied to corporate taxes.

When put into operation, the cuts will stimulate economic growth by putting more purchasing power in the hands of the consumer.

Lower income workers, who spend 93 per cent of their income, will have more ready cash. This means business will be able to provide and sell more goods.

Since business taxes also will be reduced, more money will be available for expansion, which, in turn, will mean more jobs.

Thus, the ultimate goal of the tax cut is to halt unemployment, which, the President pointed out, has been around 5 per cent for 61 of the last 62 months, despite the fact that it has dropped one million since he took office.

In regards to the world situation, the President said he foresaw "no spectacular reversal in Communist methods or goals,"

and cautioned the nation against trying to save money on defense.

"There is no substitute for adequate defense, and no 'bargain basement' way of achieving it," he said.

Nor did the Russian-Chinese split in the Soviet camp provide cause for jubilation, he continued, saying:

"Here hope must be tempered with caution. A dispute over how to best bury the Free World is no grounds for Western rejoicing."

Our foreign policy, he emphasized, will continue to rest on Allied unity in NATO and on development of good relations with the European Common Market under the Trade Expansion Act passed by the 87th Congress.

And he urged support for foreign aid to combat "the forces of poverty and despair" that breed Communism in underdeveloped areas of the world.

There were many other areas the President touched upon. And though he said that "the state of the nation was 'good,' he left no doubt that it could be better; and that the job of making it better was the job of all Americans.

These are the twin tragedies—the unmet challenges of our nation and of our time. These challenges will be met only when we learn to look upon the need for educational advancement in the United States as a national emergency of the most urgent order.

For it is in time of emergency that we stand together with the unity and determination needed to make war on "non-education," the common enemy of mankind.

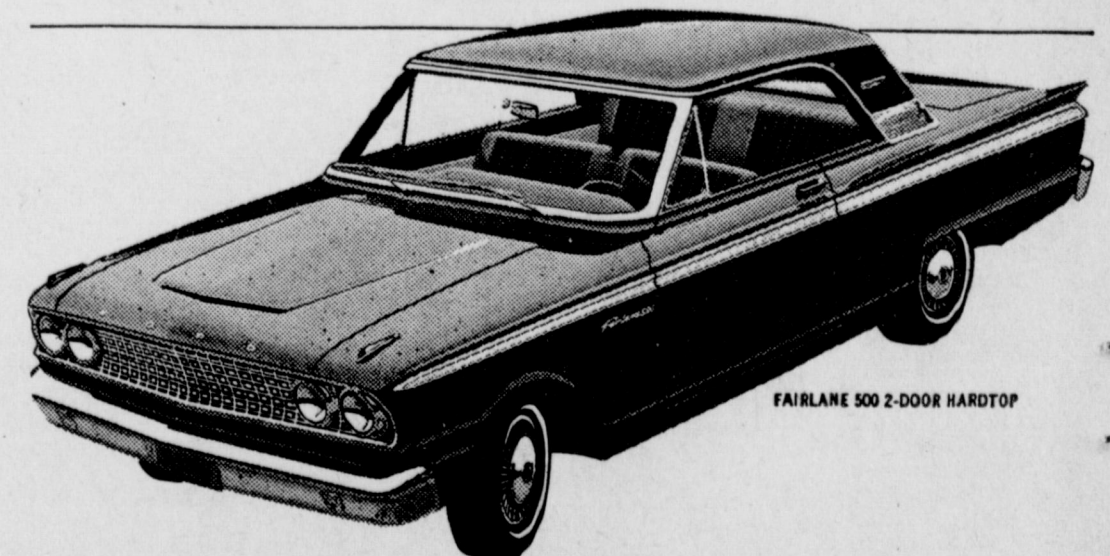
