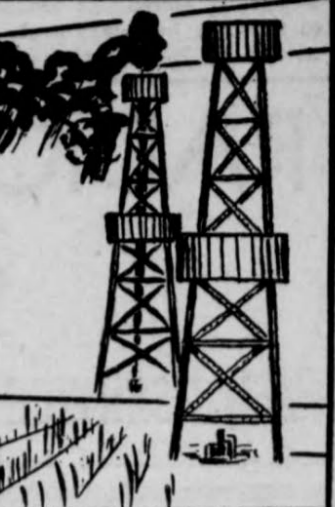

## Heart Attack Fatal To George A. Hoge, Auto Parts Dealer

George A. Hoge, a long-time resident of Iowa Park, died in a Wichita Falls hospital early Sunday, May 18, following a heart attack on Thursday, May 15. Mr. Hoge had not been in good health for several years.

Mr. Hoge was born in 1889 near Frisco in Denton county. He became a stock farmer at Rhome, where he remained until 1919. At that time he and Mrs. Hoge came to Iowa Park and became associated with his parents the late Mr. and Mrs. G. Hoge.

During the past 33 years Mr. and Mrs. George Hoge have made many friends in Iowa Park and the surrounding area. The Hoge Auto Supply has been one of the most successful businesses in our community through the years. As a hobby Mr. Hoge continued his interest in stock. He was a breeder of the Prince Domino line of Herefords and was an active member of the Texas Hereford Breeders association.

He was a member of the Methodist church, the Masonic lodge and the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

Funeral services for Mr. Hoge were conducted Tuesday afternoon in the Methodist church with Rev. Guy E. Perdue, pastor, in charge. Assisting were Boyd Taylor, minister of the Lincoln Street Church of Christ, Wichita Falls, formerly of the Iowa Park church, and Cleo Jones, minister of the Church of Christ here. Masonic graveside rites were conducted at the Highland cemetery of Iowa Park.

The bride's colors of blue and white were used in table appointments. Blue and white flowers in blue pottery were also placed at points throughout the room.

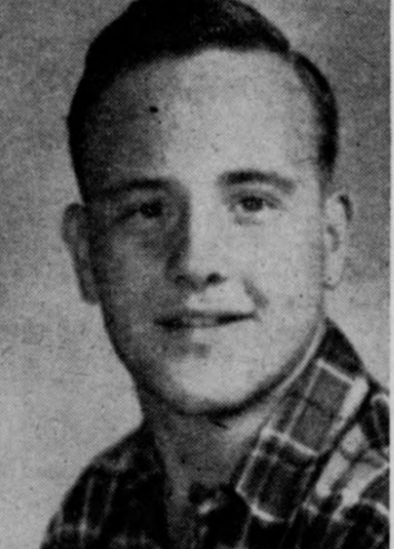

## SHUCKs

DEAR EDITOR:

I would like to point out that the whole political battle between Democrats in Texas has been brought about by Governor Shivers' steadfast refusal to say that he will accept the rule of the majority at the Democrats' National Convention. We cannot follow a local majority who would, by their own acknowledgment, ignore the right of the national majority.

There is no substitute for majority rule in a democracy. Without it we would have anarchy. This direction Americans cannot afford to follow, regardless of which national party they believe in.

In our fervor to follow one leader to destroy another, we must not lose sight of the great and fundamental principle that the majority of the people must be allowed their right to rule. This must be protected zealously in every forum and in every election. We cannot follow a leader who has denied this at the outset.

I might add that when the majority of each national party has spoken at their national conventions, they will then offer the product of their judgment to the people of the nation so that the majority may again reject or accept the candidate and the platform of either party.

There is no other moral way in a democracy, and Governor Shivers' leadership in this respect is basically wrong.

# Which Farm Is This?



(Published in the Iowa Park Herald, May 22, 29, June 5, 12, 1952)

**THE STATE OF TEXAS**  
To: H. F. Haley, Defendant,  
Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear by filing a written answer to the Plaintiff's Petition at or before ten o'clock A.M. of the first Monday after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being Monday the 2nd day of June 1952, at or before ten o'clock A.M. before the Honorable 30th District Court of Wichita County, Texas, at the Court House of said County in Wichita Falls, Texas.

Said Plaintiff's Petition was filed in said court, on the 16th day of April A.D. 1952, in this cause, numbered 50,261-A on the docket of said court, and styled, Tina Haley, Plaintiff, vs. H. F. Haley, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to wit:

After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about June 24th, 1906, and continued to live together until on or about June 1940, when plaintiff obtained a divorce from the defendant; that they were remarried on or about August 8th, 1945, and continued to live together until on or about September 5th, 1951, when by reason of a course of cruel treatment on the part of the defendant toward this plaintiff without cause or provocation, was of such a nature as to render their further living together insupportable. Plaintiff further alleges that they acquired the property at 2314 Broad Street, Wichita Falls, Texas before they were separated the first time and that during the time they were separated, plaintiff paid for said property from her separate earnings and that outside of about Two or Three hundred dollars said property has been wholly paid for by plaintiff during the time that they were separated and that it is her separate property.

WHEREFORE plaintiff prays that defendant be cited by publication as required by law and that on final hearing she have judgment for absolute divorce from defendant

and that said property above described be decreed to be the separate property of plaintiff, or in the alternative, for the court to decree what the interest of defendant is in said Community Property.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.

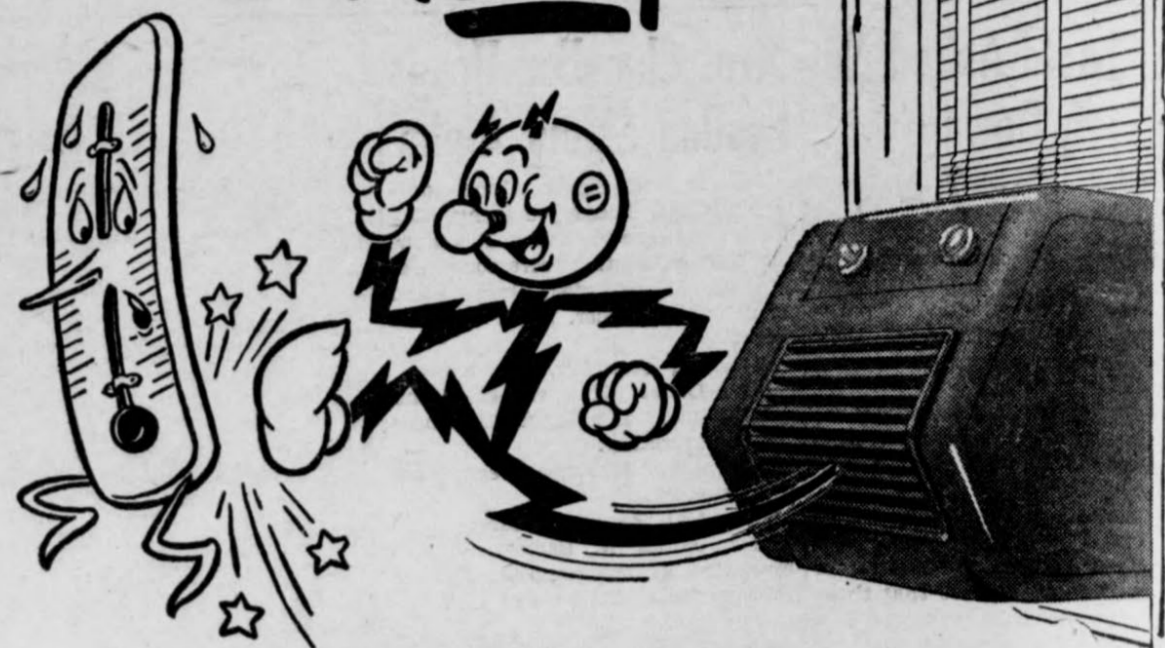

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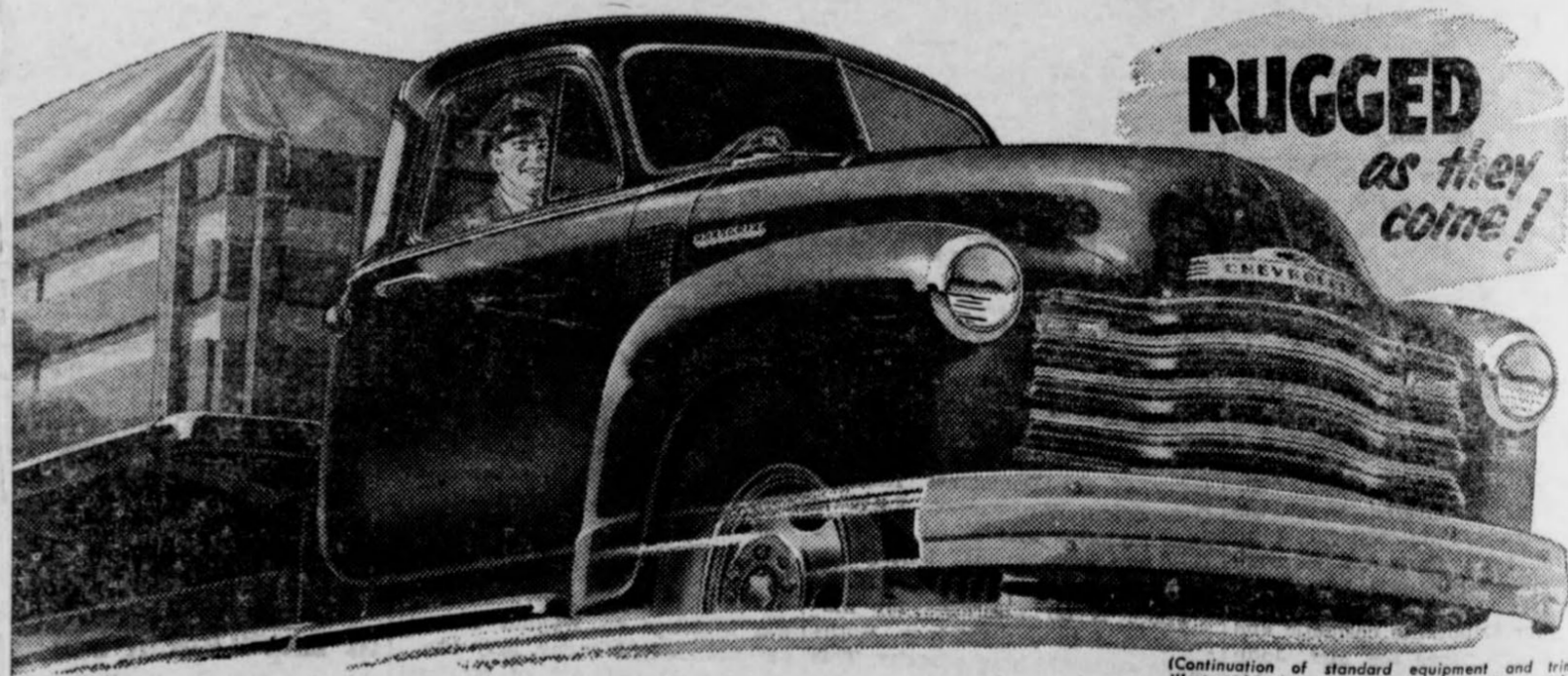

# Your Congress

The Labor department is in the middle of a fight in Congress over establishment and enforcement of minimum wages in companies doing business with the government.

Sen. Fulbright (D-Ark.) says the Labor department has gone farther than Congress intended. The most immediate seriousness of this, Fulbright charges, is the department's impeding the defense program by applying requirements which prevent or discourage industrial and other producers—especially small and medium sized firms—from participating in the defense effort.

Sec. Tobin says Fulbright's suggestions for changing the Labor department's course are impractical. He declares they would contribute to lower wage rates, contrary to the philosophy of recent years.

At issue is the Walsh-Healey Act which requires producers filling federal contracts of \$10,000 or more to pay minimum wages set by the Secretary of Labor, who is to fix those minimums on the basis of prevailing rates in the locality.

After the Supreme Court plucked the feathers of the old NRA Blue Eagle back in the 1930's, Congress quickly enacted the Walsh-Healey Act as a stop-gap measure until more comprehensive wage legislation could be passed.

The latter was produced in 1938 as the Fair Labor Standards Act, better known as the Wage-Hour law. It was decided to retain the Walsh-Healey act until the Supreme Court had ruled on the Wage-Hour law. The court upheld the Wage-Hour law but somehow the Walsh-Healey act has remained on the statute books.

Through an amendment to the Defense Production act, extension of which will be debated soon, Fulbright seeks to insure that the Labor department will follow the original intent of Congress in administering the Walsh-Healey act.

He charges the department uses the act to establish nationwide minimum wages for a given industry whereas the act states that wages shall be based on "industries operating in the locality in which the work is to be performed."

The result of interpreting "locality" as meaning the whole country, Fulbright says, is to upset economic conditions in local communities by disrupting local wage patterns and to penalize small producers. The latter is true, he adds, because the nationwide minimums

are based on rates paid by the biggest operators in the field. Fulbright charges the department has ignored the act's exemption provisions. He notes the act exempts purchases of "such materials, supplies, articles or equipment as may usually be bought in the open market." But the department argues that it makes most of its purchases under contract directly with producers and those producers are not exempt, even though they may also sell in the open market.

Here again, the senator says, the effect is to discourage entry into the defense program of small producers who fear their wage rates would be increased to levels they could not sustain under competitive conditions after leaving the defense program.

But the department's newest Walsh-Healey regulation is, as Fulbright sees it, the payoff. The contractor would have to agree that: (a) he and his subcontractors will observe all of the act's labor standards; (b) the contractor will police his subcontractors for compliance; and (c) he will assume financial responsibility, paying fines and damages, for their failure to comply.

That regulation is due to become effective July 1. The Defense Production act is due to expire June 30. Presumably Congress will have acted on extension of DPA, including Fulbright's amendment, by then, and in so doing will have declared the winner in the Tobin-Fulbright bout.

### ★ Soil Conservation

Due to the great need of good summer legumes in this area and to the possible shortage of Chinese red peas, it is expected that a good acreage will be planted to guar in the near future.

Farmers in the western portion of the local Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation district around Harrod and Vernon have had excellent results with guar as a soil improving crop.

Carl Zook reports cotton yields greatly increased following guar. He had little insect damage on crops following guar and believes such crops simply outgrew the insects.

Fred Hanna, near Vernon, produced over 1,000 pounds of guar seed an acre last summer on a deep sandy soil despite the dry conditions.

John Jokel, near Crowell, had guar one year that increased the following yields of feed by 30 per cent. He had it on both mixed land and sandy land. Guar produced 12 tons of top vegetative growth, whereas peas produced only 5 tons. Guar was not so succulent as peas and indications were that the organic matter would be maintained over a longer period of time.

Raymond Kubicek, near Crowell, had cotton yields increased 50 per cent following guar and feed yields from 30 to 50 per cent. He also reports far less insect damage on cotton following guar.

The Wichita Valley Experiment Station has had good results with guar. Their highest yield has been 1155 pounds of seed an acre with an average of 700 pounds.

Lester Brooks, superintendent of the station, finds that guar has good lasting qualities. Sorghum following guar was the best ever produced and oats following that (two years from the guar) are also doing exceptionally well.

Guar should be planted about cotton planting time and handled similar to grain sorghums with standard farm equipment. It is adapted to a wide range of soils, but does best on mixed or sandy soils.

The following weekend they expect to attend commencement at Davidson college, N.C., Mr. Yeorgan's alma mater. The new College church will be dedicated Sunday, June 1 at the baccalaureate service.

Visiting in South Carolina, they will attend graduation exercises of Clemson A & M college where a nephew of Mrs. Yeorgan is to receive his degree.

Included in their itinerary will be a visit with relatives in Philadelphia and St. Louis. They will return to Iowa Park, June 18.

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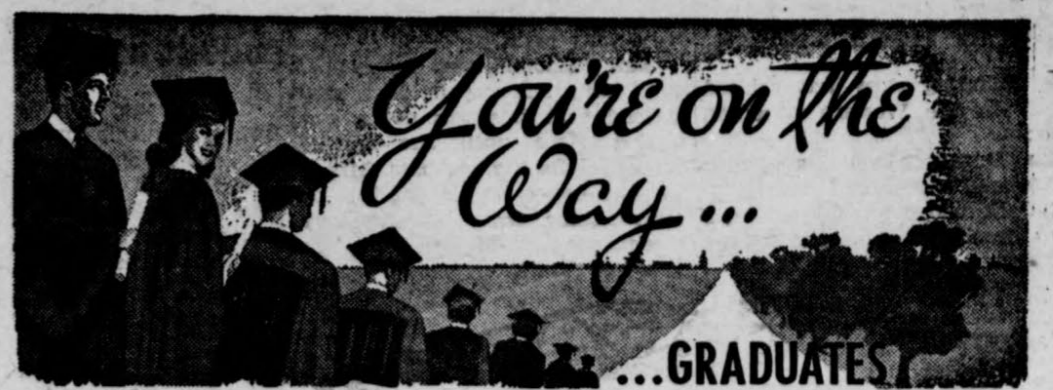
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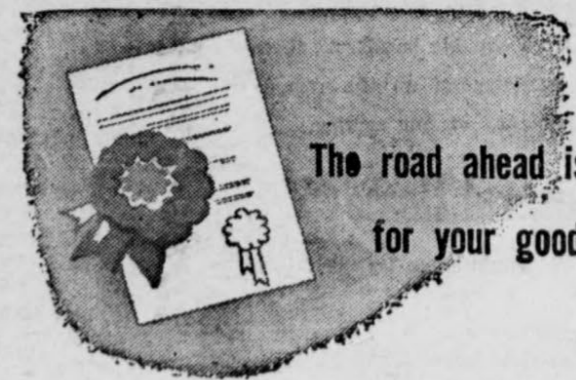
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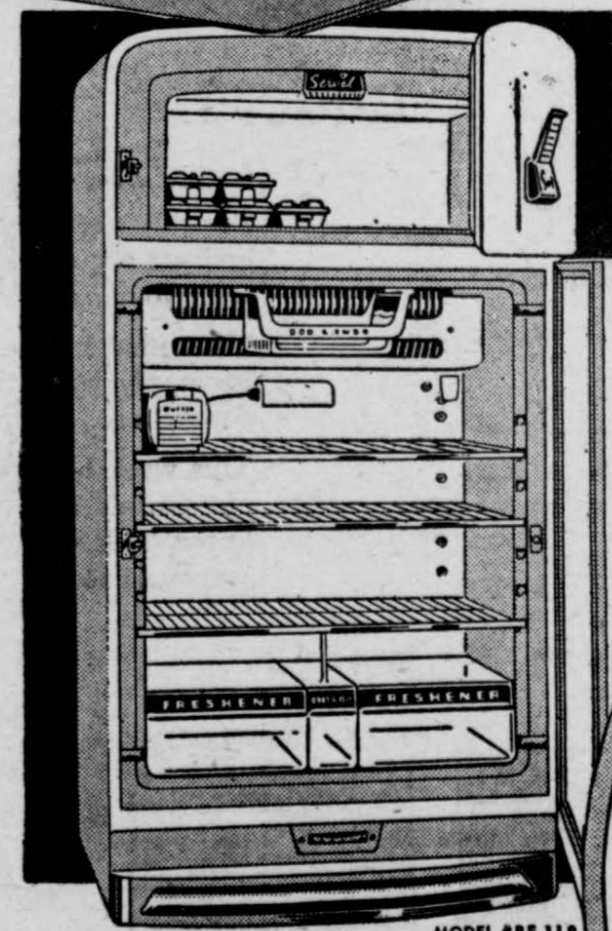
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### Former Parkan Makes Good at Bass Fishing

### Motorists Advised About Atom Attacks

Don't count on the shelter of your automobile for more than limited protection from an atom bomb attack, Paul R. Kulp, manager of the Texas division of the American Automobile association, this week cautioned Texas motorists.

Kulp's advice was based on information received from the U.S. Civil Defense administration which recently evaluated the possibilities of using autos as A-bomb shelters in a series of atomic tests on five cars at the Nevada proving grounds. "Occupants of cars with metal tops will have good protection from light falling objects. However, automobiles give no significant protection from penetrating atomic radiation," Kulp said.

He pointed out that while automobiles will not provide safe shelter, they are better than no shelter at all. He passed on the following instructions from the Civil Defense authorities:

"If there is a warning and you should be in a congested section like a downtown area, the car should be parked at the side of the street. Leave it and hurry to the nearest designated shelter, or take refuge in the tallest building nearby. If the car is a considerable distance from shelter, occupants should roll down the windows to minimize danger from flying glass and should crouch down as low as possible.

"In case the first sign of attack is the bomb flash, vehicles should be stopped and then occupants should crouch as low as possible, remaining there until debris has

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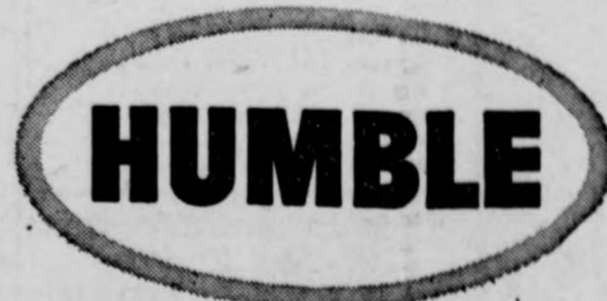

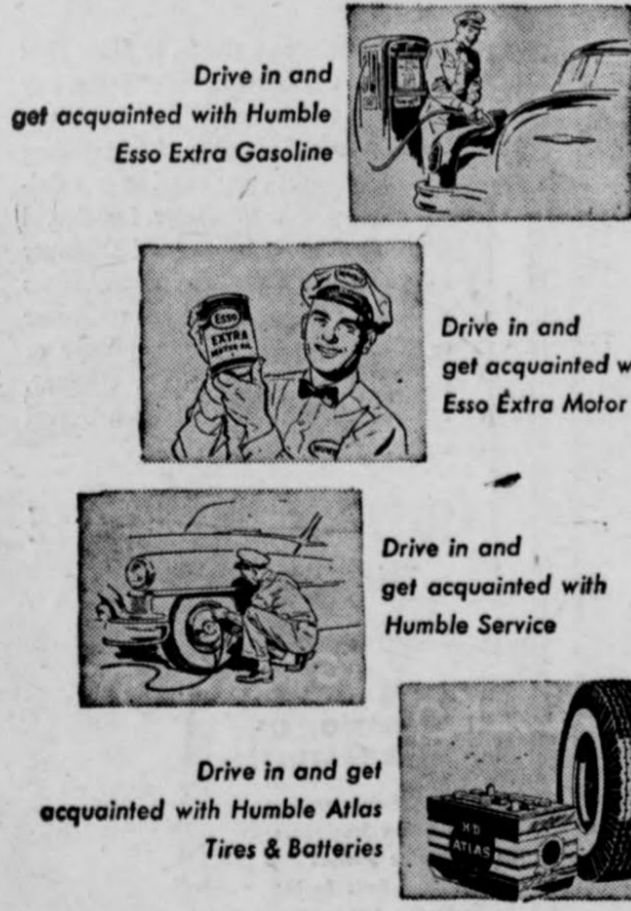
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
