Guns Prohibited by Water Board

Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, Iowa Park, Texas.

ORDINANCE NO. 1
Be it resolved that the following Ordinance of Rules and Regulations are adopted by the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, and that the same shall be applicable upon the lands owned by said District, as well as any lands under its control, and up to the waters of Lake Iowa Park, as provided by and in accordance with Section 59, Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas, and Chapter 25 Acts of the 39th Legislature, 1925, as amended, and as may be hereafter amended or adopted by the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3.

1. SANITATION
No trash, garbage and refuse may be left or deposited on District property, or on property under control of said District. No dead animals, or any part thereof, fish, decayed vegetables, food, ash, garbage, offal, rubbish or filth of any kind, by which its decay or putrefaction could or would become offensive, shall be placed, or permitted to be placed or situated on property belonging to the District or on property under control of said District.

2. FIRE ARMS
The possession of any rifle, shot gun, side arm, compressed air gun, or air gun on District property, property under control of the District, or on water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

3. SAFETY
Rules of safety concerning speed, operation, lights, life preservers, size of craft, construction, etc., shall be the same as provided by the laws of the State of Texas covering the operation of all crafts.

All bathing and swimming in the water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

All water skiing, boat racing and high speed operation of boats on water under control of the District is strictly prohibited.

No fishing shall be permitted within the locations identified as being restricted areas.

No boats or boat trailers shall be allowed to remain unattended in the water.

4. SIGNS
No sign or signs shall be removed, destroyed, defaced, or otherwise manipulated, which has been placed on District property or on property under control of the District.

A called meeting for all T-O Fair directors will be held at 7:30 p.m. Dec. 6., in the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, to hear a report on building and financing the new auditorium by the ways and means committee.

Taylor George, Oral Jones, Rex Jennings, Buck Voyles, W. A. Hotchkiss and Ben Ludy make up this committee.

Discussion will be had of the plans for the 1963 Fair, which is held annually the last week of September.

In issuing the call, Pres. C. E. Birk and Vice-President T. Leo Moore urged every director to make a special effort to attend. They reported the Fair is out of debt for the first time in its history.

Cotton Farmers Vote Tuesday
Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman urges that eligible cotton farmers "accept their responsibilities by voting for the continuation of marketing quotas and acreage allotments" on Dec. 11, date for the national marketing referendum.

"A large vote for this program will re-affirm farmers' support for wide supply management programs and reject any contention on the part of some groups that farmers do not want marketing quotas and acreage allotments in return for a fair price."

"The cotton producer will be in a better position to present his case for a long range cotton program including such tools as direct payments, already approved for wheat and feed grains, if he will register a large affirmative vote in the referendum."

"Many Congressmen will be watching the results of the vote, to determine the attitudes of the farmers toward continuation and broadening of farm programs designed in their best interest."

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

John R. Jones of Iowa Park is making progress in applying his Great Plains conservation plan, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist. All the cropland has had a complete irrigation system consisting of land leveling, ditches, checks, turnouts and borders installed. About 13 acres have been sodded to coastal bermuda. Another 15 will be sodded next spring.

Mesquite has been controlled, pasture has been rested, irrigation water has been applied.

Assistance in planning, application and cost share are available to eligible applicants through the Wichita county GPCP.

Barwise estate of Electra is terracing about 325 acres. This is the largest block terraced this year by the Iowa Park work unit. Waterways were constructed two years ago, that will be seeded to grass and will now give outlet protection for terraces.

SCS is ready to assist farmers to plant and apply waterways.

Some people would deny us the right to speak of Christmas now; we had better recognize this. They would say that one good look at the world would show Christmas to be a fairy tale. Of what value is a beautiful story? they ask.

Beautiful stories beat their heads to death on the hard walls of life! Stars and singing angels and worshipping wise men, and adoring shepherds are all "old sisters" of a day gone by, they claim. "They are nothing but empty sentiment."

At best, these people say, Christmas can have value only as we make a one-day truce with reality and dream ourselves into an unreal world of fancy, only to be awakened the day afterward to find the scattered wrappings

and tissue-paper of broken day-dreams!

If people have this idea about Christmas, it is because Christians are quite careless in what they say about Christmas and how they celebrate it. The message of Christmas is not some pious, sweet children's story.

The person who says "Christmas is really for children" has missed the message. He has not heard of a God who loves so deeply and completely that He put His foot onto earth, to redeem an angry, warring and lost people.

There was nothing "sweet" about that first Christmas. It took place in a smelly stable; there was no snow. And it was rough; because the Crib and the Cross were carved out of the same wood.

Good news? You bet your life. "The hopes and fears of all the years are met in Thee tonight." Are you really prepared to receive Him in this Advent season? The clock of history again is about to strike. The bells of Bethlehem are ready to ring.

And how will he hear? Will it be a nice little story? Or will we hear the rumbles of a God who invades our lives? There will be no peace on earth until there is Glory to God in the Highest. That always comes first.

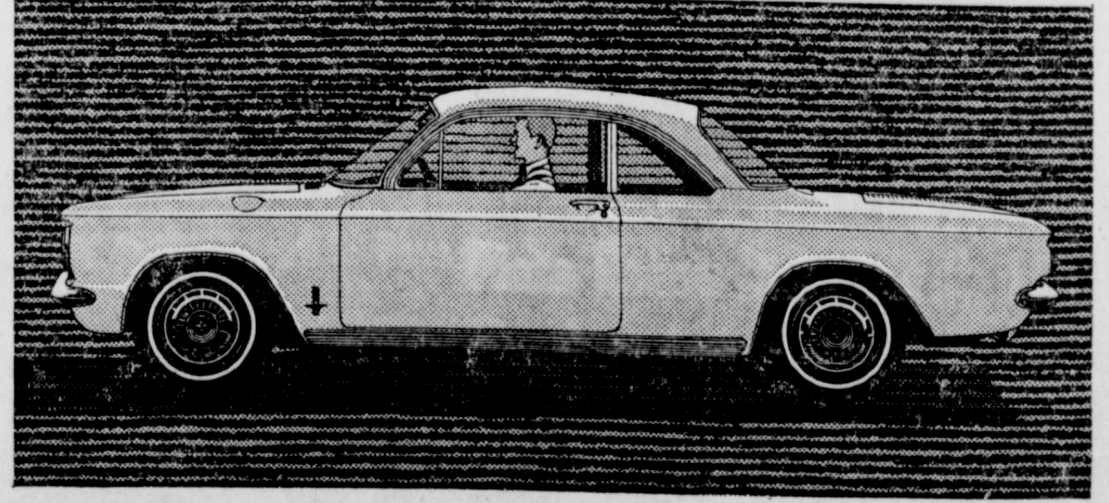

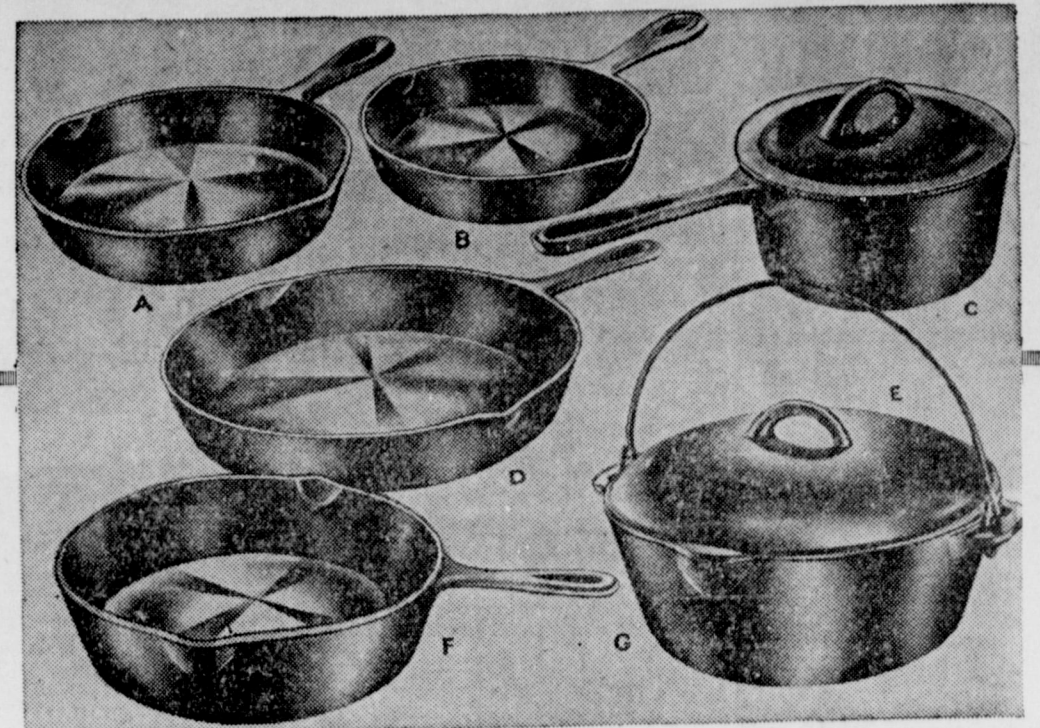
