They are fond of mutton, lamb and chicken but do not care for beef. According to Mrs. Coleman, Persian food is delicious; it is highly seasoned with turmeric, garlic and onions.

The gabah or carpet is every

thing to the Persians. Many sleep on it, eat on it and entertain guests on it. They roll it up and put it in a niche and consider their housecleaning done.

Among the souvenirs the Cole mans brought back are bubble pipes-one used by the poor and the other by the wealthier class. The former is about two feet high and made of clay and wood. The long flexible stem is arranged so the smoke is cooled and purified by passing through water. Men of the villages squat around drinking tea and smoking one pipe. For the sake of sanitation they place their hands around the mouthpiece so their mouths never touch it.

Other souvenirs with special significance are two hand-blown glass tear vases reputed to be over 400 years old. Tradition says that when an Armenian knew he was going to war he bought his wife, a tear vase. When she cried of loneliness for him she caught the tears in her vase. When her man returned, he could measure her love for him by the water in the vase. In case he did not return,
